Farm Bureau calls for 1995 Farm Bill to promote marketing

ST. LOUIS - American Farm Bureau Federation delegates narrowly adopted a farm program policy last week, calling for a 1995 Farm Bill that will continue to move the U.S. toward a market-oriented, export-competitive agricul-

Texas Farm Bureau President Bob Stallman's comments regarding the new Republican controlled Congress helped defeat an amendment that would have prohibited farmers from receiving deficiency payments on non-program

crops grown on flexible base

The provision finally approved by delegates was written to allow farmers more flexibility in responding to market forces, while providing a food security "safety net."

"This amendment goes to the heart of the philosophy and changes that are taking place in Congress and in agriculture," Stallman said.

The amendment to which Stallman objected was proposed by the South Carolina Farm Bureau and would not

have been much different from existing policy.

The Texas Farm Bureau president quoted new U.S. House Agriculture Chairman Pat Roberts of Kansas, who spoke at the Farm Bureau convention last week.

"Chairman Roberts told us that the status quo does not live in Washington anymore," Stallman said.

In adopting the farm program resolution, delegates said:

✓ American farmers need target price protection to offset limited access to world markets because of existing trade barriers and internal farm policies in foreign countries

✓ There should be no modifications in the farm program that would interfere with the market-oriented goals of competitive loan rates, voluntary stock reduction programs and income supplement as farmers move toward a market-oriented agriculture.

√ Farm program payment eligibility should not be tied to a means test

✓ The Commodity Credit Corporation should not be allowed to exempt itself from the federal rule making and public comment procedures

✓ Tenants or landowners are entitled to benefits of federal legislation on any farm that is in complaince with the provisions of the farm program, regardless of the status of their other farms

✓ Participation in any federal or state water projects shall not adversely affect a grower's participation in any USDA

Bottom line farming classes set

Bottom Line Farming, a financial training curriculum offered by South Plains College to help farmers learn more about borrowing, begins Wednesday, Feb. 1 at the Muleshoe State Bank Community Room.

Classes will meet from 1-5:30 p.m. Wednesdays and Fridays.

The curriculum for the program was developed by Ron Presley, SPC assistant professor of agribusiness in conjunction with the Texas A & M Extension Service and Texas Rural Communities. The course is offered through SPC's Division of Continuing Education.

The course was instituted because of a Farmer's Home Administration mandate, part of the 1990 Farm Bill, that all its direct and guaranteed borrowers complete and pass educational courses involving agricultural finance and agricultural production.

Presley was employed as a consultant in 1991 by Texas Rural Communities to develop a curriculum.

The course consists of 36 classroom hours and covers such topics as goal setting and

Taking care of money for the entire county can be a real challenge

Dorothy Turner, a native of Bailey County, has a desk job that is basically 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. every weekday. But surprisingly, it is a job that she finds challenging. She is the Bailey County treasurer and every transaction that goes through the county has her signature on it.

Turner was recently reelected to another four-yearterm to her position as county treasurer. She has held this office since 1981.

"The main thing I like about my job is being able to serve all of the people," Turner said. "I am a public servant and I am here to serve all the people in this county or people who come to me from elsewhere."

Turner considers Bailey County her home, where she was born and reared. She graduated from Sudan High School and has lived in Muleshoe since 1950.

"My job is real challenging because I handle taxpayer's money and the county's. I have to keep up with a lot of balances and do a lot of reporting, so it is a real challenge to be able to do all of that. "

Turner added, "But it is a challenge I like. It keeps you going, it keeps you interested and it keeps you busy."

The nature of Turner's job many times requires her to work alone, which she has grown accustomed to. But she does get to work with other people as well in coordinating efforts with other county offices. She also receives a great deal of assistance from Bertha Combs, who was hired a few months ago as community services director and as

Some of Turner's responsibilities as county treasurer include preparing payroll and serving as the investment officer for the county. She is also responsible for seeing that all monetary obligations to the county are paid.

✓ There should be no environmental mandate for participation in the federal farm program

✓ The current system of commodity specific crop acreage bases should remain intact. Base acreage should be determined on a five-year moving average of planted or considered planted acres. There should be a conversion to a "whole farm" base or similar system which consolidates all program and allowed nonprogram crops. These crops would include oilseeds (soybeans, sunflowrs, safflower,

canola, sesame, castor beans and guar). Some experimental and industrial crops would be allowed under the Farm Bureau plan

✓ Producers should be allowed to plant any combination of program and permitted non-program crops on whole farm bases.

AFBF delegates said they want proven yields used in calculating deficiency payments and target prices maintained at the current levels.

They also stated a preference for maintaining the farmer owned reserve as it is presently structured.

"Blue, Blue, My World Is Blue"

hat's incredible! Or so the now defunct television show maintained. They were doing a story about a man who was infatuated with the color blue. To prove it, he was busily engaged in painting a mountain blue. "That's insane!" seemed a more accurate caption to me.

I thought of that eccentric painter as I was reading G.K. Chesterton, Chesterton, an amazing man who could turn a finer phrase than anyone before or since, died in 1936, but he describes our world when he says, "We are not altering the real to suit the ideal. We are altering the ideal: it is easier." His example? A man whose ideal for the world is that it might be blue.

Each day, brush in hand, the little man begins the business of painting the world blue. Not an easy job! Some tigers will no doubt resist the change valiantly, but as long as each day he paints so much as a single blade of grass blue, he's reaching toward his goal.

Chesterton laments that modern thinkers aren't as sane as our little painter. Instead, they're like men who begin to paint the world blue, but with each new philosophy they hear they change their "ideal" color to red or yellow or green and their former work is for naught. Blue tigers and all, it fades into obscurity.

How different from the philosophy of Christianity! Christianity stubbornly refuses to change the ideal. Instead it maintains that through the power of God, man himself can undergo a radical change of heart, indeed, that he must. Perhaps in another religion Paul could have remained the zealous but mistaken Saul, but not in this one.

Christianity never changes the ideal; it points us to a Savior who is Himself the only way to reach it. Our world tries to convince princes to be content with "frog-hood," which would be fine if we were meant to be frogs. But Christianity is never content until man is once again, as in Eden, a prince. As the ideal, it holds before man the Prince of Peace, forever unchanging, forever offering his followers the power to change.







Geography Bee in response to a growing concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the United States.



Furgeson replied.





Gramm offers bill to safeguard property rights

Sen. Phil Gramm has introduced legislation to protect property owners from the avalanche of federal regulations and restrictions that can strip private property of its value without compensation to the owners.

rights in America today, the fundamental freedom to aquire, use and dispose of private property has become a poor relation. In fact, it has very nearly been drummed out of the family because of the federal government's relentless assault on private property," Gramm said.

Gramm's "Private Property Rights Restoration Act" safeguards the rights of individuals whose land is the target of governmental regulations or policies which reduce or destroy the value of the property. The bill requires compensation to be paid when such a taking has reduced property valued by at least 25 percent or \$10,000.

It also requires that compensation and legal fees for property owners who sucessfully plead their case in court be paid for with funds from the agency which issued the unconstitutional regula-

During the first year of the Clinton Administration, the Federal Register, which is the daily publication of all federal regulations, printed 69,684 pages of rules - the highest since Jimmy Carter's record level.

"This property rights legislations reaffirms the Senate's commitment to privat e prop-

WASHINGTON - U.S. erty, and it says in the clearest possible terms that while Bill Clinton and Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt may view private property as being an outmoded concept, the Congress disagrees because the Constitution disagrees," Gramm said.
