Goldthwaite scored when Ray Frazier tossed a screen pass to Byron Landrum who went 76 yards for the second quarter touchdown.

Aside from that, it was all DeLeon as the Bearcats got in their final tuneup for the state playoffs.

The Bearcats stacked up a 20-0 lead in the first quarter and had the game well in hand before Goldthwaite's string-breaking touchdown.

Craig Smith, the De Leon quarterback, opened touchdown action with a 12-yard run and Johnny Golden, who rushed for 112 yards on 19 carries, got the second one with a three-yard blast. Smith ran for an even 100 yards on 13 plays.

Mark McKillip wound up the first period action with a one-yard dive.

But there was more to come in the second period with flanker Terry Nabors taking in the fourth DeLeon touchdown with a 25-yard sprint, then Smith connected with Marney Wilkerson on a 16-yard scoring pass to make the margin 34-6 at half-time.

DeLeon kept the lid on its offense in the third quarter, but exploded for another pair of touchdowns in the final period to account for the final margin.

James Hodges gouged one yard for the first one and Rocky Hardin legged off eight yards for the finale to wrap up the regular season for DeLeon.

## Number Of Deer Killed Fewer Than Previous Years

A total of 154 deer were taken to Mills County Locker Plant Saturday and Sunday, the first weekend of deer season, according to Joe Langford, owner of

the plant. Of this total, 130 were bucks and 24 were does.

The largest buck received at the locker was a ten-pointer and the heaviest weighed 139 pounds. According to Mr. Langford, this is the heaviest deer brought into the locker in several years.

First reported kill received at the processing plant was a six-pointer bagged by Gregg Jernigan.

As of Tuesday the locker had received only two turkeys.

The number of deer killed in Mills County so far this season is considerably less than in previous years. Last year during the first weekend of the season a total of 262 deer were reported at the locker plant.

## Maximum Earnings That Count For Social Security To Increase Jan. 1st

Beginning January 1, 1975, the maximum amount of earnings in a year that count for social security will increase to \$11,100 up from this year's maximum of \$13,200. In announcing this, Glen McNatt, manager of the Brownwood Social Security Office, said that also in 1975 the maximum amount that a beneficiary can earn and still get all his social security checks

will increase to \$2,520 in a year. The 1974 figure is \$2,400.

McNatt said that people who earn more than \$2,520 in 1975 may still get some social security benefits, but every dollar they earn above \$2,520 may cause a reduction of 50 cents in their social security benefits for the year. No matter how much they earn in 1975, they can get their full benefit

for any month in which they do not earn more than \$210 in wages (up from \$200 in 1974) and do not perform substantial services in self-employment.

The new tax base of \$14,100 will provide additional income to the social security program without increasing the taxes of workers who earn \$13,200 or less in a year. The social security tax rate, now at 5.85 percent of taxable earnings for employees and employers each, and 7.9 percent of taxable earnings for self-employed people, will remain unchanged in 1975. The maximum social security a wage earner will pay in 1975 will be \$824.85, and a self-employed person, \$1,113.90. About 19 million workers will be affected by the increase in 1975 because they will earn over \$13,200.

"In return for the increase in taxes," McNatt said, "these affected workers will have greater protection because a larger amount of their earnings will be credited toward benefits. This will mean higher benefits for them and their families in the event of retirement, disability, or death, than would have been possible without an increase in the base."

About 1,250,000 beneficiaries will receive additional benefits as a result of the increase to \$2,520 in the retirement test exempt amount in 1975. Additional benefit payments for 1975 will amount to an estimated \$62 million.

"I have been drunk some 40 odd years on some evil reports about your town and the attitude of the people there toward my race (Colored) passing through your city. The predominant thought in the minds of most colored people has been that it's a risk of our lives to even pass through in the most innocent way - many have even routed their trips westward by other ways. But I am glad to state that upon a test visit which I made there I was sobered up on that wrong report. I wrote a letter to Rev. Joseph L. Emery asking him if his people would feel imposed upon for me to slip into his church service during my lay-over there for a point beyond. Upon my visit I was pleasantly greeted by a large host of Christian men and women. I met some of the finest people that I've ever met in my 76 years. I wrote an open letter to one of our colored papers informing them that there are some real white Christian people in Goldthwaite. I want to visit again at some convenient time. Very humbly,  
W. M. B. Carrington"

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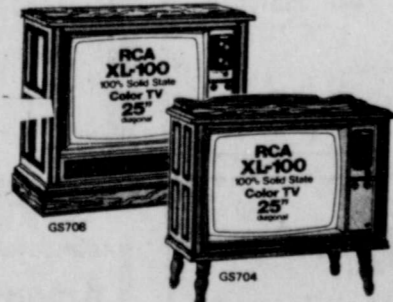

**STATE CAPITAL  
Highlights  
AND Sidelights**

AUSTIN, Tex. — The whopping state surplus expected to be available to the legislature will permit \$500 million in new spending without generating tax bills for another eight years.

This was the good news handed a House revenue and taxation sub-committee last week.

However, Texas Research League added the warning that spending all the billion dollar surplus in eight would make a \$1.43 billion tax bill necessary in 1977.

Legislative Budget Board has told lawmakers present spending levels, plus mandatory increases for state employee salaries and emergency school aid, will "leave over" \$1.502 billion at the end of fiscal 1977.

A TRL projection handed the legislative sub-committee discussed creation of a tax stabilization fund as one alternative for dealing with the unprecedented surplus.

Creation of the fund would make it possible to avoid new state taxes for at least eight years and still permit new program spending of \$250 million a year increasing to \$500 million a year by the 1982-1983 biennium, TRL calculated.

However, TRL conceded: "It may be unrealistic to suggest that the next three sessions of the Texas legislature might be willing to hold in trust such a large surplus solely for the purpose of avoiding tax increases in future years. There is no historic precedent for such restraint."

**SCHOOL AID ALTERED** — An attorney general's opinion, hailed as one of the most significant in recent months, signaled a new approach to state formulas for finance aid to schools.

Atty. Gen. John Hill held the Commissioner of Education should require county tax assessors to report the percentage of market value used in determining assessed property value.

And he said the commission should use that data in "computing the county economic index to achieve uniformity of property values of each county as compared with every other county."

Education Commissioner Dr. M. L. Brockett last week wrote all county tax officials requesting the data, and said it will be used for computing the 1975-76 economic index to be considered by the State Board of Education next March.

**NEWSMEN OUT** — Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake, expected to be named speaker next January, said consideration is being given to barring news reporters and other non-legislators from the House of Representatives floor.

No firm decision has been made, however, Clayton stated.

Meanwhile, the House administration committee named a three-man sub-committee to consider what facilities may be made available for reporters covering the legislature if they are banned from the floor during legislative debate.

Clayton said he considered the move only in the interest of promoting "decorum" in the legislative process. He said onlookers at the capitol are dismayed by what they see on the House floor, and anything that helps restore order may be a public service.

**COURTS SPEAK** — Failure to buckle a seat belt is no legal cause to cut down compensation to accident victims, the State Supreme Court held.

In another case, the High Court directed a fullscale trial of a lawsuit by the widow of a crane operator against

## Extension Highlights

The holiday season is upon us. This is the time of the year when we usually look forward to holiday treats and candies. However, this year homemakers are faced with sugar prices which have increased over 200 percent.

When serving snacks, replace sweets with nutritious snacks such as tangy cheese, crisp crackers or fresh raw fruit. Popcorn and raisins also add variety to your informal entertaining.

Serve desserts containing small amounts of sugar such as rice pudding, coffee cake or baked apples with honey.

Substitute honey, molasses, sorghum and other syrups for sugar in your favorite baked goods.

The conversion for one cup of sugar is as follows:

Use one cup of honey, reducing the liquid 1/4 cup for each cup of honey used. If you prefer to use molasses or sorghum for 1 cup of sugar, use 1 1/2 cups molasses or sorghum and reduce the liquid 1/4 cup for each cup of molasses or sorghum used. Two cups of corn syrup can be substituted for 1 cup of sugar if the liquid is reduced to 1/4 for each cup of corn syrup used.

To insure a quality product, about half of the sugar should be retained in the recipe and syrup substituted for the other half.

Add sugar to fruits or sauces at the end of the cooking period, thus using less sugar to get the same amount of sweetness. Learn to appreciate the natural flavor of foods such as coffee, cereals and fruit instead of using excesses of sugar which changes the flavor.

Use jellies, jams and preserves, gingerbread or molasses cookies for desserts in lieu of rich cakes and pies. Learn to appreciate the characteristic flavor of honey, sorghum and maple syrup.

1/2 cup brown sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind  
2 tblsp. lemon juice  
3 eggs  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 1/2 cups milk

Toast bread slices; arrange 4 slices in bottom of greased 9x9x2 baking dish. Brush with 1/2 melted butter. Combine apple sauce, raisins, brown sugar, cinnamon, salt, nutmeg, lemon rind and juice; pour over bread in dish. Top with remaining toast slices; brush with butter. Beat eggs, add 1/4 cup sugar and milk. Pour over ingredients in dish. Cover with aluminum foil. Set pudding in pan of warm water. Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, 45 minutes. If desired, serve with whipped cream. Makes 6 - 8 servings.

Here's a solution for temporarily flameproofing materials: Mix 3 ounces of boric acid; 7 ounces of borax; and two quarts of water. Saturate fabric or material and allow to dry drip. The material will resist fire until washed or wet by rain.

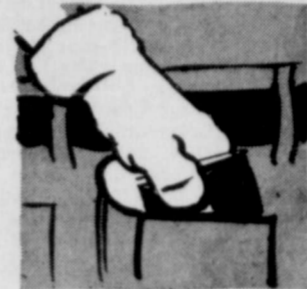

## THE FAMILY LAWYER

### Mittens for Pickpocket

Not long ago a man found guilty of picking pockets was granted probation on the condition that he wear mittens whenever he went out in public during the following five years.

This order suggests the wide range of possibilities that may occur to a sentencing judge when he allows a convicted person to go free on probation. The idea, of course, is to keep the culprit from getting into trouble again.



As a matter of law, the judge has considerable leeway in setting conditions. Besides the usual requirements, such as avoiding association with criminals and keeping in touch with a probation officer, special limitations have also been held lawful.

- Examples:
- 1) that a bookie should not have a telephone in his home;
  - 2) that an assaulter should not go near a certain woman; and
  - 3) that a labor "goon" should not be eligible for union office.

On the other hand, the law is leery of conditions that are too freakish (because they are hard to enforce) or too severe (because they are hard to live up to).

Also, there are constitutional limits that must not be transgressed.

In one case, a court granted a man probation on condition that he donate blood to the Red Cross. But this condition was thrown out on appeal because it called for "invading the physical person in an unwarranted manner."

Equally invalid was a condition in another case that the felon, who was a promising athlete, not play any college or professional basketball. The appellate court said that such a restriction, rather than keep him out of trouble, was more likely to get him back in.

## Farm-facts

Compiled From Sources Of The Texas Department of Agriculture John C. White, Commissioner

TEXAS' PECAN crop is expected to be 35 million pounds, and if that prediction proves correct that would be a 75 per cent increase over the 1973 pecan crop. The best set apparently is in the San Saba and Cross-Timbers areas, ranging from moderate to heavy. The East Texas pecan crop is expected to be light, and the South Central Texas crop is expected to be poor to good. Last year's onslaught of walnut caterpillars, which denuded many pecan trees, had a very adverse affect on this year's pecan production... Sugar cane production in Texas is expected to be 960,000 tons compared to 734,000 tons in 1973. That production will be from an estimated 28,000 acres, compared to 18,600 harvested last year... During the week of August 18-24, there were an estimated 263,000 persons working on Texas farms and ranches, a drop of seven per cent from the previous month. Of that total, 83,000 were hired laborers and the remainder family laborers... Peanut production in Texas is estimated to be 454,500,000 pounds, compared to 471,225,000 pounds last year.

A NEWSPAPER story the other day asked the question: "Earth's Worst Friend a Goat?" The writer blamed some unnamed ecologists for claiming the goat is the most dangerous animal in the world, because it chews up trees and gnaws all plants down even to the roots, "thereby causing soil erosion in already arid areas." The controversial goat has a history that extends back as far as mankind's; but he has his defenders, and rightfully so. In times of famine, the goat probably will be the last animal to starve; and he is the source of cabrito, you know, as well as of mohair—if he has the right family background. The Texas Department of Agriculture uses "Judas goats" at its export facilities along the border with Mexico, and they are very helpful in the export program. Fifty years ago, the Department also was using goats in the pink bollworm eradication program. As an eradication measure, infested cotton fields were cleaned of all vegetation and the debris burned. Entomologist R. E. McDonald wrote, in 1925, that goats were used to clean infested cotton fields in Brewster and Presidio Counties and that they cleaned fields "like no human hands could." Like most animals, goats have their faults, but they can't be all bad.

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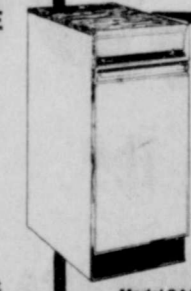
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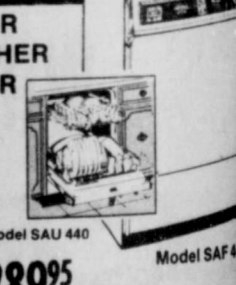
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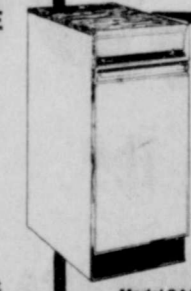
