All-Day Festival Here Saturday

Texas-style lunch and a fish fry supper will highlight the Saturday Fiddlers' Festival at Mills County Park in Goldthwaite. The Goldthwaite Fire Department will be in charge of the barbecue which begins at 11:30 a.m. Saturday. The fish fry will begin about 5 p.m. and is under the direction of the Goldthwaite Lions Club.

Between the two meals an all-time fiddlers' contest will be held at the outdoor theater

in the park. Approximately fifty fiddlers are expected to compete for over \$650 in prizes. The fiddlers' contest is approved by the Texas Old Time Fiddlers' Association. The contest will begin at 1 p.m. and last all afternoon.

FLEA MARKET

Ronnie Aldridge, chairman of the flea market committee, says that a number of booths will be set up in and around the park and merchandise will

be sold all day Saturday.

Mrs. Wendell Tucker, arts and crafts chairman, reminds visitors to see all the displays that will be in the park on Saturday. Five dollars is being charged for a flea market or arts and crafts booth. There will be no commission on sales made.

FLAG CEREMONY

The festival officially begins at 9:45 a.m. on Saturday with a ceremony on the Mills County Courthouse lawn to dedicate

the official Bicentennial flags. County Judge Herbert Faulkner will be master of ceremonies and a military band from Fort Hood will be present to provide music.

The United States Flag, Texas Flag, National Bicentennial Emblem Flag, and Mills County Emblem Flag will be presented at the ceremony.

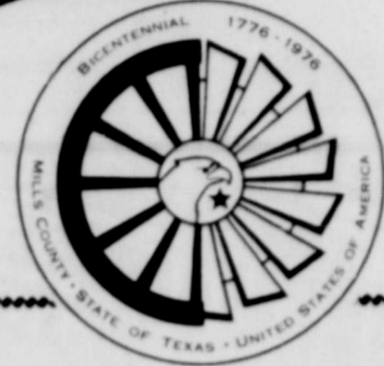
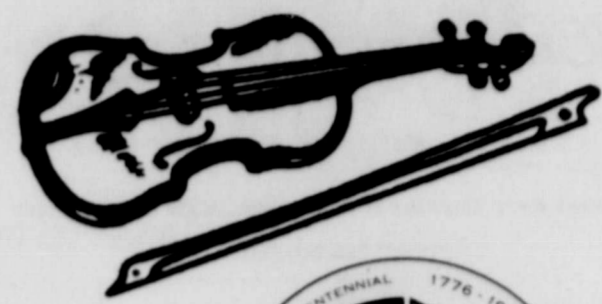
Judge Faulkner reminds everyone to attend the ceremony and then attend the festivities at the park.

Three Cases Handled In Co. Court

Michael Locke and Anthony Bosquez were tried last week in Mills County Court on a charge of petty theft and received a fine of \$50 plus court cost and one year probated county jail sentence.

Byron Lyndrum also came before Mills County Court and was sentenced to 12 months probated sentence and fined \$300 plus \$50 court cost for three counts of Class A misdemeanor. Also, he was prohibited in indulging in any alcoholic beverages or narcotics and an eleven p.m. curfew was pronounced by County Judge Herbert Faulkner. Landrum was fined \$300 plus court cost for criminal mischief.

All three of the above cases were handed back to county court from the grand jury last week.

Two Persons Hospitalized Following Tuesday Accident

Minor injuries were received as a result of a two-vehicle accident Sunday, May 25th, 12.2 miles north of Goldthwaite.

The accident, which occurred on a county road, involved a 1974 Ford driven by Carl Evans Jr. of Priddy and a 1972 Datsun driven by Arthur Meyer of Mullin.

The Ford was traveling east on the county road and the Datsun was headed west at the time of the accident. The left front of the Ford struck

the left side of the Datsun. Mr. Meyer and his wife both received minor injuries in the accident. The vehicles were estimated to have sustained moderate damage.

Tuesday morning around 8:55 a.m. 7.7 miles west of Mullin a two-vehicle accident occurred on U.S. 84.

Margie Maxey of Mesquite, driver of a 1973 Chevrolet Blazer, was traveling east on 84, attempting to pass a trailer-truck, when she was in collision with a 1967 international pickup traveling west on U.S. 84. The pickup, driven by Wesley Gibbs of Zephyr, had just turned on to 84 from a county road.

The driver of the Blazer was transported to Brownwood Community Hospital by Wilkins Ambulance. Gibbs was taken to the same hospital by private vehicle. The two were considered to be in fair condition. Also, a passenger in the Blazer sustained slight injuries.

Damage to both vehicles was estimated as heavy.

Local law enforcement officers investigated.

Food Stamp Eligibility Listed

The statewide food stamp program was completely implemented in Texas in November 1973. The food stamp program is a dual operation of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) and the State Department of Public Welfare (DPW). DPW is responsible for the certification and issuance of coupons.

Households may be eligible for food stamps if they:

1. Meet national standards for income and resources or have all household members receiving public assistance or supplemental security income.
2. Be made up of a group of persons, excluding roomers, boarders, and live-in attendants who are living as one economic unit.
3. Cook their own food at home.
4. Citizens or aliens lawfully admitted for permanent residence.
5. Make certain that able-bodied household members over 18 register for employment.

The food stamp program is to help low income families get more food for their money, to safeguard the health and well being of the nation's population, and raise levels of nutrition among low income households.

Anyone who feels they may potentially be eligible for food stamp benefits should make application through the local Department of Public Welfare Office. The standards for participation in the food stamp program are the same for everyone without regard to race, color, religious creed, national origin, or political beliefs. Any food stamp participant may require a fair hearing if he feels a decision regarding his participation has been unfair.

Extension Highlights

BY JUDY BEAVERS

Proper care of freshly cut flowers before arranging will greatly prolong their useful life. Even iris and hemerocallis will respond to conditioning and perform nicely at a flower shop whereas they will soon droop if not properly cared for.

Successful flower conditioning is dependent upon the following steps:

1. Make clean cuts with a sharp knife or shears. Dull tools will crush the stem and partially plug the water conducting tissues. Any method which will produce a clean cut surface is satisfactory regardless of whether the cut is slanting or at right angles. Crushing or splitting the stem to aid water uptake is effective only on flowers having hard woody stems such as garden chrysanthemums. Even here, cutting shorter stems to expose softer tissue will usually be more effective.

2. Use clean containers. Rinse containers with household bleach solution to get rid of bacteria that may be left from previous use.

3. Place the cut stems in warm water (110°F) before any wilting takes place. It may be advantageous to carry a container of warm water to the garden as you cut the flowers.

4. Make sure there is sufficient water in the container so that several inches or more of the stem will remain below water after the flowers have an opportunity to take up as much liquid as possible. Foliage which will be covered by water should be removed as it will deteriorate rapidly. Remove no more foliage than necessary as some foliage is needed in making attractive arrangements.

5. Completely cover the flowers with plastic film to retard moisture loss and place in a refrigerator or air conditioned room from four to six hours. Be sure to allow the flowers to cool and take up moisture.

Properly conditioned flowers can be arranged in any type of container with little danger of wilting so long as the stem ends are covered by at least 1/4 inch or more of water. The arrangement should be kept out of drafts and direct sunlight. Drafts from heating and air conditioning vents are especially harmful and will materially shorten the life of cut flowers.

The value of chemical preservatives in the water varies with the kind of flower and the length of time you wish the flower to remain in good condition.

Many of the so-called home remedies can actually decrease the flower life. The commercial preservatives are much more dependable when used according to the instructions on the container. Of much greater importance is the cleanliness of the container. Previously used containers should be thoroughly cleaned before using again.

An attractive arrangement of flowers will add much to the decor of a home. Proper conditioning of the flowers will prolong the life of the cut flower and justify the time and the effort spent in making the arrangement.

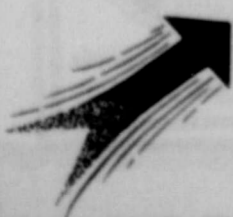
