

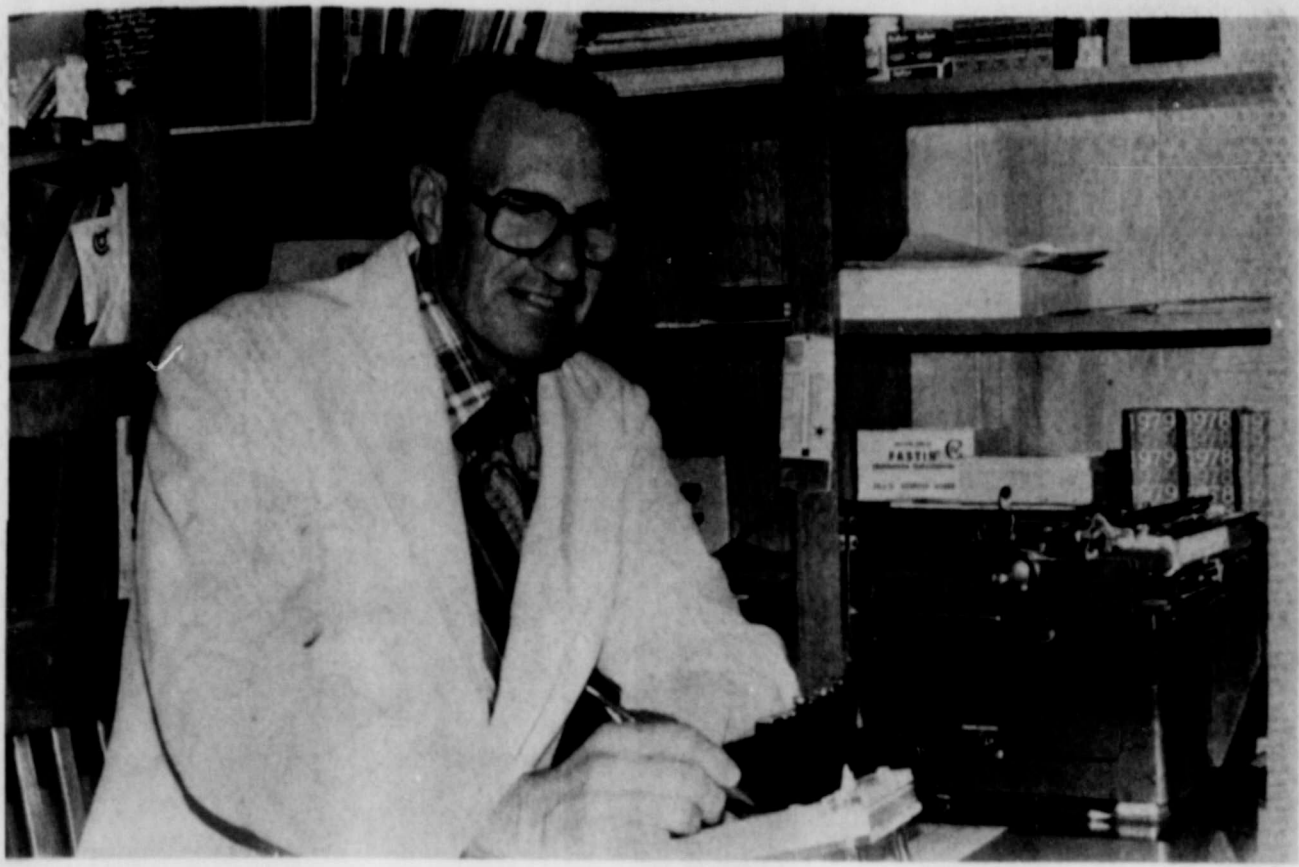

## Commissioners Vote To Build Jail

### Bond Election Set In February

Mills County could have a new jail facility sometime next year if the wishes of the Commissioners Court are carried through.

The Court voted unanimously at its meeting Monday to proceed with the building of a new jail, and to hold a bond election to finance the project.

The election, according to the motion, would be held the second week in February, 1980.

**THE COUNTY** has been studying the proposal of a new jail for several years, dating back to 1972, when a new facility was constructed for Lampasas County. The commissioners have put in countless hours of study and thought into this project, and decided that a new building was the best solution to the local problem, since the refurbishing of the present antique jail was too expensive for the results.

**A GROUP** of Mills County men were at the meeting Monday voicing their support for positive action in the jail matter, citing the "absolute need" as their priority, with the commissioners, sheriff and judge to come up with plans and specifications for the project.

The commissioners decided that a bond election, with a short duration would be the best solution to the problem of financing the jail.

Of course, the exact amount will be known by the time the election is called, following the receipt of estimates of the construction costs.

Details of the bond effort are still to be decided, but officials believe that a figure in the \$250-\$300,000 range will probably be the amount necessary. The amount of money needed for the jail project is small when compared to the valuation of property in the county, and should be raised without a large burden on the taxpayers of the county.

**COUNTY JUDGE** Jamie Ledbetter named three committees to seek answers to be delivered to the court at the next meeting on December 10th.

He placed himself and Sheriff H. G. Brooks on the committee to determine the size and type of facility needed to meet the requirements of the county and the jail standards set forth by the State of Texas.

Commissioners Lewis Watson and Hawley Jernigan were asked by the judge to determine the location for the jail, the approximate interest needed to pay off the bonds, and the length of time that would best suit the county to pay off the bonds.

Ledbetter appointed Commissioners William Glenn Crawford and Bill Bishop to look into the type of construction and the amount

of money needed for the total project.

It has been reported many times the reasons for the present transfer of jail prisoners from Mills County to Brown County for containment. The old Mills County jail is not suitable for prisoners of any kind, and could conceivably result in legal action against the county if persons are kept there. The transfer of these prisoners also costs the county a lot of money that could be used to furnish upkeep on a local facility.

**IN OTHER** business, the commissioners voted to pay \$1100 to the Mills County Fire Department's retirement fund. The money will be matched by \$1100 from the City of Goldthwaite and \$1000 from the State of

Texas to bolster the retirement fund already established. It was also the hope of the court that the retirement would stimulate the enrollment of firemen in the organization, as they are sorely needed.

Several men from the fire department and others explained the need for the retirement program.

The proposition passed unanimously by the court.

Along with the money went a vote of appreciation from the judge and commissioners, citing the many hours of work, not only in actually fighting fires, but in the preparation needed.

A motion was made by Judge Ledbetter to increase the sheriff and deputy mileage from the current 18 cents to 21 cents. The motion died for lack of a second.

### Eaglettes Win First Home Court Game

The Eaglettes defeated Lometa 63-44 in their first home court outing of the season.

Melanie Vaughan scored 16 points and had 6 rebounds. Angela Beavers scored 14 points and had 6 assists. Beverly Carothers scored 9 points, while Tana Allen scored 8. Patti Wilcox scored 5 points, followed by Andrea Geeslin with 4; and Sunnye Sims with 2.

DeAnna Henry and Cindy Berry scored 3 and 2 points respectively; their point totals by no means indicate the type of game they played. They were outstanding on the defensive boards, pulling down 13 and 11 rebounds, respectively, in two quarters of play.

Rena also saw action in the Varsity game.

The score by quarters was: 22-6; 32-27; 54-29; 63-44.

Coach Yarborough stated that the game was the Eaglettes best offensive showing this season. "I believe we passed about as well as we ever have. The only low spot of the game was the fact that we hit only 7 of 19 from the foul line. We have not hit 50% yet; some of our better free throw shooters in the past just haven't come around yet," she said.

The J.V. Eaglettes defeated Lometa J.V. 21-15.

Becky Shelton scored 4 points followed by Kelli Connally and Andrea Geeslin with 3 each. Patti Wilcox, Cindy Knight, Laura Muse, Melonie Gib-

hard and Sharon Hale scored 2 points each. Molly Winters scored 1 point.

Other Eaglettes seeing action were Lesa Yeager, Karen Daniel, Tracey Shelton and Kyla Brown.

The score by quarters was: 6-3; 12-6; 14-9; 21-15.

The next home games will be against Stephenville on Monday, December 3.

## Childress Hospital Stages Open House Festivities Sun.

The formal opening of the Childress Clinic and Hospital, the realization of a ten-year dream, was held in 1959.

This week, following an expansion project, the Mills County medical institution will hold Open House again, to celebrate 20 years of practice here.

The open house will begin at 2 p.m. and last until 4 p.m. at the building, located on Parker Street in downtown Goldthwaite.

Dr. Marvin Childress began his medical career in Goldthwaite in 1949. The construction of the first part of the clinic, included seven hospital beds. This initial project was a community wide effort as interested citizens contributed much to its development.

At the present time there are four doctors associated with three doctors associated with Dr. Childress in the practice of medicine here. Dr. Douglas Dennis arrived on the scene here in November of 1979; Dr. Nirmal Mazumdar came to Goldthwaite in September of

1978, and Dr. Vijay Koli began his practice here in March of this year.

The new wing, containing over 1400 square feet of floor space, houses the offices and examining rooms of Dr. Mazumdar and Dr. Koli, as well as additional waiting room areas and filing room.

The doctors and staff of Childress Clinic and Hospital cordially invite all the people of the area to attend an informal open house and anniversary celebration at the facility this Sunday afternoon. A special invitation is voiced by Dr. Childress, founder of the institution.

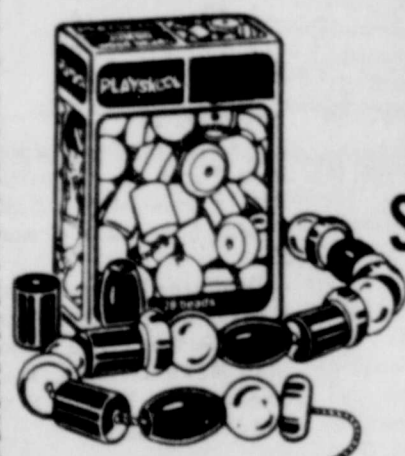

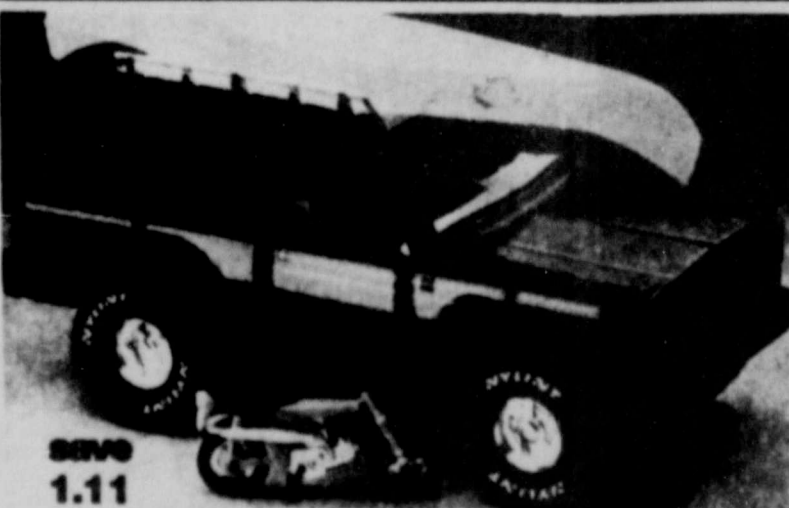

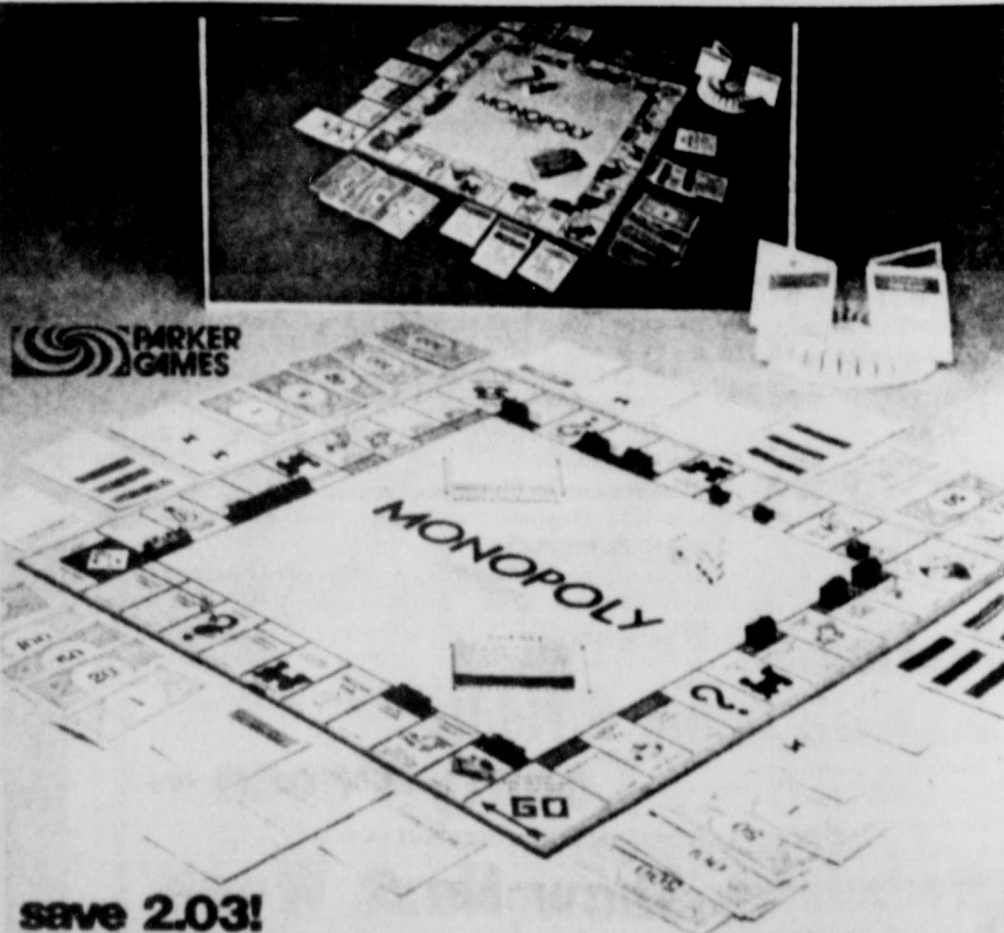

**HERE WE GO AGAIN!**

In 1964, the Congress authorized \$45 million for a pilot project using food stamps to aid the poor. In 1979, that program will cost taxpayers over \$8 billion, and it is estimated that 25% of our population is eligible under current regulations.

On October 25, the Congress once again stamped into never-never land and passed 290 to 105 a massive new welfare program appropriating \$1.6 billion for a low-income, energy assistance program. Under the banner of freezing millions in the North and East, some 200 Democrats and 90 Republicans could hardly wait to solve the dilemma with another federal boondoggle which I predict will not be "temporary" as it was sold, and indeed will grow into a \$5 or \$6 billion burden by Fiscal Year 1981. Under the terms of the bill, \$400 million will go to Supplemental Security Income (SSI) recipients all over the nation — amounting to over \$100 per recipient in lump sum payment. An additional \$800 million will go to families receiving Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) payments and to those under 125% of the poverty level. The remaining \$400 million will go to the states under a formula designed to give the northeastern states 90% of the funds.

There are numerous things wrong with the bill, not the least of which is the fact that its own sponsors admit that over 40% of the money will go to people who don't have any legitimate reason to receive it. Although the money is supposed to be for heating assistance, the fact is the money will be doled out in a check and can in reality be used for anything the recipient wants.  
Nobody denies that fuel costs are damaging to our economy. Certainly, the poor and elderly must bear an expensive burden from those costs. That is not the issue, and those 105 of us who voted against this bill (46 Democrats and 59 Republicans) do not argue that point at all. We are merely saying that this shotgun, hully-gully, money-slinging approach is not the way to do it. That is exactly what is wrong with all our welfare programs now. We have so many getting benefits who don't deserve it until those who do must suffer unjustly. We simply do not do enough for the sick, the elderly, the disadvantaged and handicapped, while we expend billions on those who won't work simply because we will adequately take care of them anyway.

We must recognize that this government cannot be all things to all people. We must sometime look to those people who go to

## Dr. Childress Began His Goldthwaite Practice In 1948 With A Dream

Upon his arrival in Goldthwaite in 1948, Dr. Marvin A. Childress envisioned a medical clinic and hospital for this county-seat town of Central Texas.

This time is preceded by another 10 years of service by Dr. Childress in practice here.

The facilities of the Childress Clinic and Hospital are utilized by persons from all the surrounding counties as well as the citizens of Mills County.

The clinic and hospital currently has over 70 employees in all departments, as it provides medical care for the people who enter its doors.

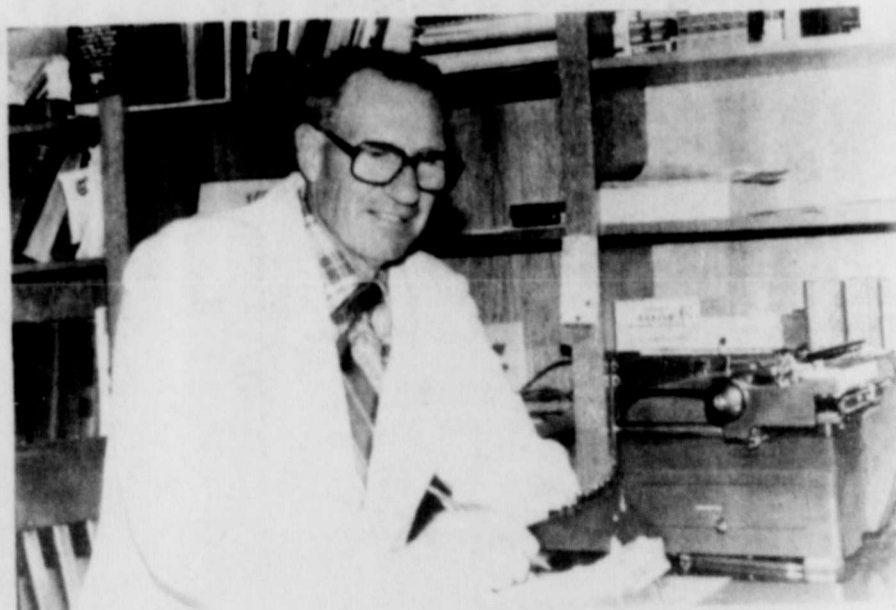
### Sunday Is "Dr. Childress Day"
