General Manager Findley of the Capitol Freehold and Land Invest. ment company, who is in position to know the actual condition of things said: "While the losses of cattle in exact number of 14,260 head is unquestionably a fabrication, and no such report of our losses has been made by our men.

"I will say that the weather in that part of Texas during the last winter has been more rigorous than came there late in the season than have been known in years. This have been known in years. This has resulted in a rather larger percentage of loss to many cattle owners than usual. We have had occasion to move some of our cattle to new pastures this spring, having sold a good portion of our land—nearly half of the original 3,000,000-acre tract having now been sold to "The secret of this young-old or small ranchmen and farmers-and out it is that broad, catholic, cheer- in other pastures have come through with no more than an average loss.

"We have at present close to 100. 000 head of cattle in our Texas pastures and it has been our custom each year to charge off a death loss of 71 per cent, of course that means, with a little more than an average loss, something above 7,500 cattle that have fallen this year, but only a portion of these of course have been lost in the recent severe winter weather. Our section of Texas is rapidly developing as a farming region and the farmers there who have raised their own grain and fodder crops with which to carry their cattle through bad weather have suffered practically no loss of cattle as no more favorable region for carrying cattle is to be found if feed is provided for them in the few stormy days of winter."
