FULLY GROW ALFALFA. Dalhart Sun:-Responding to method of planting alfalfa which for this part of the Panhandle, I securing a good stand:

Select a plot that has been in culivation a year or more, preferably one than has been well tilled and kept free from weeds. Plow deep in the fall or early winter. I usually follow the plow with a subsoil plow. Harrow down well every day what you have plowed, you cannot get the land to well harrowed. Make it fine and free from lumps before you leave it. I have found May to be the best month for seeding Just before seding thoroughly, barrow the land. Use an adjustable torney who is making such a record I don't mind takin' whatever luck harrow setting the teeth so they set at an angle of about forty-five degrees. The object of this is to thoroughly pulverize the top soil to use a disc, you will stir too deep. This harrowing is important and

should be done thoroughly. For seeding use preferably presser wheel shoe drill. Set it to Hook it up so that the shoes will W. M. There have been described several different conditions of disease which are accompanied by an exudation or gum, not only of the peach, but of other stone fruits. The exudation of gum from wounds is especially characteristic of these fruits, in which case under normal conditions the flow of gum is not great, but it is a protection against weathering and invasion by parasitic fungi, besides greatly assisting the process of healing. It is only when the flow of gum becomes excessive or chronic that it assumes the nature of diseases, and then it is due to some obscure cause of physinlogical nature such as improper or root conditions, or anything which may interfere with the natural functional activities of the tree stinging of the fruit by insects or the operations of the fruit bank beetle (also called the pin borer) on the tree always excites a flow of gum. It is to the work of the fruit bark beetle that it is wished to call attention here. This is the only type of gum ming disease that has been observed, and it only in a few isolated cases. This particular trouble has been reported as being very injurious at times in New York, Ohio, Blipois Maryland, and other eastern states, The fruit bank beetle is a small black insect one-twelfth to one-tenth inch long, and the injury it causes consists in the making of a great number of small holes through the bark to, or ing a \$16,000 atoms wall around the into, the sap wood, rausing an extensive gum flow and a deadening of the bark immediately around the punctures, usually resulting fatally to the tree. It is reported that the insort more commonly visits sickly trees than healthy ones, and that on such trees the larvae can be found in num-

bers between the bark and wood. There seems to be no definite remedy recommended, and perhaps the only one to be suggested in the paint ing of the tree trunks with some kind. of wash that will tend to keep the insects away, together with keeping the dead trees and similar trash well cleaned out of the orchard.

Catch Crops.

The following catch crops are sug grated by A. C. Hallman:

Rape sown with outs or haring about two weeks later than the grain is sown, at the rate of three pounds to the acre, and brushed in with a weeder, gives grand pastures in the fall for hogs and young cattle. Hape can also be sown with the last cultivating of cors, and when the crop is removed the young plants grow right along, and

give lots of green feed in the fall. Wheat slubble, gang-plowed shallow and sown early with oats mixed with a few pear, barley or rye, also give an abundance of fail pasture for cows. Stape can also be sown, and gives nice fall picking. I have shown be stubble with rape and some grain and

had good results. Timothy should always be sown with fall wheat, even if it be plowed down right after harvest. The need amounts to only a triffe. It never winter kills, and where the wheat in winter-killed or heaved out the timothy is there, keeping down the weeds

Rye is an excellent crop to sow in the fall for late picking or early pascrop, and where not wanted for pas ture will add a lot of humus to the soil when plowed down. Some seasons white turnips will well pay for the labor, when sown after a crop is taken off. When sown in drills your can clear the land by frequent culti-

Catch crops not only help to enrich the soil, but also help to clean it. With shallow cultivation all foul weeds germinate; these are picked off through pasturing, and you are rid of them.

A large number of the failures with poultry have been made by people who seemed to think that any one could take care of a hen and a flock of chickens, and invested heavily before they knew the business. I be experience, if not more, to be a successful poultry man than it does to enter any of the trades or professions. When you have decided that the poultry business is the right vocation for you, the next thing is the right location. The market, soil and climate should be the factors in determining the location, in the order named. A good market is most essential,-near some large city, if possible.-Charles S. Greene.
