As a rule editors have more courage than other people in a community; they need it every day in the work and develop it by constant practice. They are used to public contumely, they are hardened to abuse. They don't care what people think of them. So they are easy prey of men with axes to grind. THE INCOMPREHENSIBILITY OF FIGURES.

We have heard of people going crazy counting their money and have thought it strange, but it is not so when we come to analyze the figures that attempt to tell how much we own. The country boasts of many multi-millionaires, and some billions, and if you never stopped to think how long it would take to count their wealth, a dollar at a time, you have little idea of the burden on their minds, to say nothing of the other troubles that come with wealth, and you may be glad that you are not a millionaire. Mrs. O. P. Austin, chief of the bureau of statistics at Washington, says:

"We all know how rapidly an expert counter of coins will manipulate them. You can scarcely follow the motion of his fingers as he shifts the shining coins from one pile to another and counts them. The treasury expert will count it up all day long, but that is their limit. Working eight hours a day, then an expert counter of coins will count 32,000 silver dollars in a day, but how long at that rate will it take him to count a million dollars? Thirty-one days. Think of a man counting silver dollars, hour after hour, day after day, as fast as he can count them, and yet finding at the end of thirty-one working days he had only counted one million. But that is only the beginning of this measurement of great figures, for if this same man were to go on counting silver dollars the same rate of speed for ten years he would find that he had only counted one hundred million of them, and to count a billion dollars would require 102 years of steady work at the rate of 8 hours per day during every working day of every one of the 102 years. So when I begin to talk to you of billions of dollars in the measurement of our commerce or that of the world please remember that a billion is a thousand times as much as a million, and even that expert who can count a million in thirty-one days must take a full century to count a billion. And when we realize this I think that you will agree with me that the figures which measure our commercial progress are not merely wonderful—they are appalling."

Sometimes we get a story that throws a great white light upon the aboriginal depravity of what lawyers know as the ethics of their profession. Such a one comes from Boston—a story of two confessions, one by an assassin, who, on conviction, declared himself guilty; another by his attorney, who thereupon admitted that he knew him guilty all the time. For my part I do not know which of these worthies is entitled to the least respect, the fellow who strangled his wife and cut off her head, or the fellow who, knowing it, strove for gain to beat the just and necessary laws of his country by turning him loose. On the last great day, "when the leaves of the Judgment Book unfold," it will be interesting to see what view is taken of the matter in a court where "the ethics of the legal profession" cut no figure.—Ambrose Bierce in Chicago American.

WORKING A WONDEROUS CHANGE

A prophecy of wonderful changes in the cattle business is made by the Stockman Journal,—prophecy based on the expressed intention of a well known cattleman, who deals out a terrible tale of woe, as to the unprofitableness of the business that afortime has been the pride and glory of the state. This man owns three fine ranches aggregating fifty thousand acres, and they are well stocked with cattle, but he says: "I am going out of the cattle business almost entirely. I have become convinced that there is no more money in it for me, and I am going to place my ranches on the market in small tracts and sell all my cattle except my registered herd of Herefords, numbering about 150 head. I think I will build a small house, sink a well and make other improvements on every 320 acre tract I possess and sell it to the men who want homes in the west."

"I know I can make good money on the capital I have invested in the cattle business by diverting it into other channels. The hand of every man you meet seem to be raised against the cattleman. Even nature deals him some very hard knocks, and what he is able to save from that source is taken from him in the market manipulators. I have just had some experience with a bunch of fed cattle that makes me sore, for I lost

good money on them. There is always something that can be depended upon to happen just at the right time to cause the cowman to lose money, and I am tired of it. I have reached the age in life where I can no longer dally with the situation, and I am going to look for something that I know is better. I can sit down in any town in Texas and loan out my money and make more out of it than I could out of the cattle business. I like the cattle business, because I have followed it so long, but I feel the time has come when I must just simply stand from under, and that is just what I am trying to do."

The basis of this man's complaint is than between short range and the beef trust the life is being squeezed out of his business, and if he carries out his announced purpose and if other stockmen should follow suit a mighty change would be worked in Texas. The number of cattle would probably not be reduced—might be increased—and they would be of better grade and in the hands of many more people, who would populate the country and greatly improve all lines of business, for the stockman with his immense herds and broad expanse of pasture does not make much business.—Henrietta Independent.

The Russian government has issued an official proclamation explaining that it was unprepared for war, asking its subject to be patient and promising to inflict "just chastisement on the nation which has provoked the struggle." Russian officials have named March 4 as the date most suitable for military attaches of other governments to join the Russian army for purposes of observation.

A new fraud is being "worked" in some of the country towns in north Missouri. A man wearing a government badge and claiming to be in the secret service enters stores and looks into the cash drawers for counterfeit money. He invariably finds a few pieces which he confiscates. He then disappears before the merchant realizes that he has been defrauded.—Chronicle.

Cole Younger, the pardoned Missouri bandit, who set out to serve a life sentence in the Minnesota State prison, has turned up here as a worker of statehood for Oklahoma. He proposes to unite Oklahoma and Indian Territory in one State, and he has been rather successful as a lobbyist. There is one senator who will do anything he can in reason for Younger. This is Stephen B. Elkins. It was Elkins, more than anybody else, who was responsible for the pardon of Younger and his brother, and the reason was that a way back in his boyhood days in Missouri he owed his life to the two brothers. They were serving at the beginning of the war, with a band of guerrillas which picked young Elkins up, and it was owing to their pleading that the boy was spared. He has never forgotten the service, and says he never will.—Washington Telegram.

By skin grafting, Mrs. Kate Leberonz of Temple, is to have a new scalp in the place of the one torn off by getting her hair caught in machinery several months ago. Her daughter heroically furnishes the necessary new cuticle.

A report from London states that a twenty million rouble 5 per cent loan will be issued and that the Vanderbilts and other Americans are concerned in the deal. In this connection it might be well to state a rouble is equal to 50 cents.

Tom Burt, said to be a hobo, attempted criminal assault upon the 10-year-daughter of Eli Merrill at Dalhart Monday, and was thrown in jail. An angry mob was forming and to prevent lynching he was rushed to Armstrong county and placed in prison at Claude.

Up to the 20th of this month the loss of life in the war between Japan and Russia is estimated at 4,956. Of these, according to all creditable reports, Russia has lost 4,542, either killed, frozen or drowned, 600 succumbing to cold in the attempt to march across Lake Baikal and 8000 being drowned by sinking through ice. In battle 692 Russians have been killed outright. Russia has killed 943 of her own men. On the Japanese side the loss officially reported is 4, unofficially reported 410 making the total Japanese loss 314.
