



Austin, Texas, June 15 .- Court of Civil Appeals today affirmed the case of the State of Texas vs. Jot the State sought to recover two sections of school land in Hutchinson county, but loses again.

Coolidge, Kas., June 14. - Ninety-one miners were unloaded about three miles west of Coolidge at 4:30 in the morning. Sheriff Jack Brady and forty deputies of Hamilton-county were at the state line to prevent the deported men from entering Kansas. When the train stopped the militia lined up on each side, ordered the miners to keep walking up the track.

The men werd dumped on the prairie without food or water, for the soldiers and deputies, in their haste to get home, had forgotten to unload the small stock of commissary supplies, the train carried when it left Victor.






