#### How They Manage to Learn English And Reach America.

Washington, April 24. - John Me-Guire, a representative of the trade and labor council of Honolulu. Hawaii, was in conference today with Secretary Morrison of the American Federation of Labor relative to the immigration of Japanese coolies to he Hawaiian islands. He told Mr. Morrison that the Japanese are coming in, in large numbers and that as a rule after remaining a short time they continue their journey to the United States. ## FLEETS WON'T MEET

Admirally Circles Are Not Looking For a Sea Fight.

#### NOT PROCEED TO VLADIVOSTOK.

A Statement of The Losses in all Battles of Mukden From February 1 to March

14 Have Been Greatly Overstated Regarding Casualties.

St. Petersburg, April 27.-Admiralty eircles are coming to accept the viey that there will be no general action between the fleets of Russia and Japan for some time, basing their belief on strategic and tactical reasons which incline Admiral Togo to avoid a decisive action until he has made every effort to demoralize the Russian fleet by torpedo attacks and interference

with transports by his cruiser division. The admiralty scouted the reports that engagements have already occurred, pointing out the great distance separating the places where the dis patches originated, and a naval staff correspondent states that dispatches from every source should not only be doubted but mistrusted.

The probability of a sortie by the Vladivostok squadron in an attempt to join Admiral Rojestvensky is discussed by the Razvedchik, a military weekly paper, which confirms the re port that three cruisers, Gromobi, Ros sia and Bogtayr, have been repaired and that Vladivostok has been freed of ice, and comments on this accession of strength to Rojestvensky. The paper also intimates that there is a pos ty that Vice Admiral Nebogatoff may await a second reinforcing squadron and expresses the opinion that Rojest vensky will not proceed as rapidly as possible to Viadivostok.

Gunshu Pass, Manchuria. - An exact statement of the losses in all the batbles of Mukden from February 1 to March 14, compiled by the general staff, shows that the casualties were greatly over stated in earlier reports Statements from Japanese sources indicating wholesale captures of prisoners are now denied. In reality, it appears, the Russian losses amounted to two generals, who were taken prisoners, and 87,777 men, of whom the greatest part, about 55,000, were wounded. In evacuating Mukden and retreating to the northward the Russians lost 32 guns, of which three were mortars, three old type field guns with piston action and 26 quick-fire guns. Of the siege artillery every gun and all the ammunition earts were sent north two days before the retreat began. General Karevitch, the chief of staff, calculates that other losses, aside from wounded, were as follows: 15,000 killed, 7,000 to 8,000 known to have been captured and 10,000 to 12,000 missing. whom several thousand were drivers, sanitary and commissariat

The buildings destroyed were occupied by furniture dealers and manufacturers of cotton underwear on the upper floor, while the ground floor was occupied by the Van Norden Trust company, a Hebrew loan society, and the Hebrew Charity Association. The flames burst through the roof a hundred feet in the air and made a most spectacular fire, but they were soon quenched. The loss is \$200,000.

The fire broke out from an unknown cause shortly after five o'clock just as several hundred employes were leaving the building, but no casual ties were reported.

During the fire Acting Battalion Chief Weiland was killed, and one end of the block on Grand, Orchard and Allen streets was gutted, causing a loss estimated at about \$200,000. The fire was under control and Wieland was ascending a ladder on the Grand street side, when it slipped and he was plunged through a plate glass window. He was removed to a hos pital, where he died.


