HISTORY IS EXPECTED to be made in the Texas primary voting on Saturday, but due to an unusual set of circumstances, voters in the Bovina precinct are not expected to take much of a part in the "history making."

State Republican leaders expect the largest turnout ever for the GOP state primary, with three "name" candidates waging a battle for the governor's nomination: Bill Clements, Kent Hance and Tom Loeffler.

The only catch locally is that for the primary the Bovina Republican precinct has been combined with Friona's, and those wishing to vote in that primary will have to drive to Friona.

It's the second primary for the two precincts to be combined. It was that way in 1982, when the Friona precinct Republicans were obliged to drive to Bovina in order to vote. Party officials blame the combined precincts on a lack of volunteers to run the elections.

However, the number of voters who will participate in the GOP primary in this precinct no doubt would have been limited anyway due to the two local races, for county commissioner and the Justice of the Peace.

At any rate, there are plenty of races which should interest the voters on Saturday, and this should bode for an unusually large turnout of local voters.

Election officials urge the voters to bring their yellow voter registration cards with them to the polls. But don't let this deter you from voting. You can still vote if you have misplaced your card.

IN SWITCHING TO and from Daylight Saving Time, most people enjoy that nice long Sunday in October and more or less dread the shortened weekend in April, and there is sound biological reason for this.

One of the fascinating scientific discoveries of the past decade is that human beings—indeed all living things on earth—operate according to an inborn circadian (from the Latin, *circa* and *dies*, around the day) rhythm. Human sleep cycles, body temperature, and even the function of certain hormones wax and wane around the clock.

Curiously enough, human beings are out of sync with the turning of the planet they inhabit: the human internal "day" does not last 24 hours, but 25. Experimental subjects confined for several days to a clockless room and given no clues about the actual time of day quickly adopt the longer schedule.

This is why it is easier for us to lengthen our days than to shorten them—and why we feel all right after a plane flight westward across two or three time zones, but exhausted after flying the same distance eastward.

That's also why we happily adapt to a new bedtime in October but complain about the springtime switch. Staying up an extra hour is fun; getting up an hour early usually isn't.

These circadian rhythms can have major economic and health consequences. It is estimated that some 27 per cent of American working men and 16 per cent of working women rotate between day and night shifts. These people work in round-the-clock manufacturing, in the military, on airlines and other forms of transportation, in radio and television, or as health-care professionals.

According to a study in *The New England Journal of Medicine*, over 80 per cent of these people "have serious sleep disruption (insomnia at home and sleepiness at work)," which lowers their productivity as well as the quality of their lives. The study also cites a higher risk of cardiovascular and digestive tract diseases among these workers.

These problems, however, can (Continued on Page 7)

finals Friday night at Big Spring, and in the 1600-meter race on Saturday.

Scott Scaff, the Mustangs' other regional qualifier, will run in the 110-meter high hurdles. Preliminaries are Friday night.

Meanwhile, four members of the Fillies' track teams will compete in seven events at the regional meet.

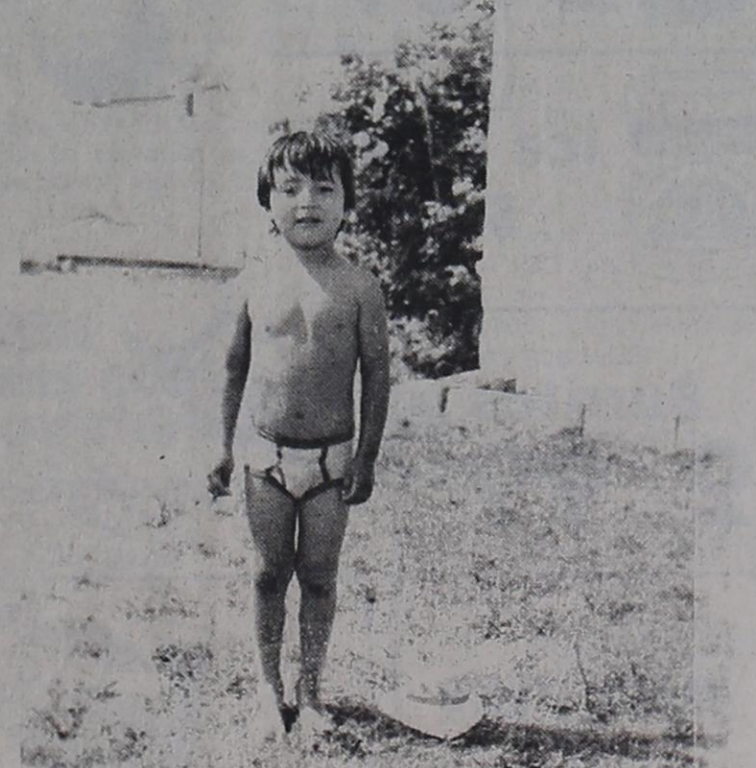
Marie Pesch will compete in the shot put, discus and hurdles race. Mindy Neal will see action in the high jump, long jump and triple jump.

Then, these two will team with Robbie Stowers and Terisa Shepherd in the 800-meter relay. The relay prelims and the hurdles prelims are slated for Friday.

At the regional qualifiers' meet at Levelland last Saturday, Miss Pesch threw the discus 124-11, her best of the year, and the shot put 39-1. She had to settle for second place in each event. Marie also was second in the hurdles race at 15.7.

On Monday, some team members went to Plainview for a workout at Wayland Baptist University. Mindy Neal had a triple jump of over 35 feet, which was her best of the year.

Those performers placing first and second at the regional meet will qualify for the state track and field meet.

Commissioner, J.P. Races Top Primary

A large turnout of voters is expected Saturday in the Democratic and Republican primaries.

The Democratic primary will hold the focus of voters in Precinct 2 for a pair of reasons: (1) there are contested races for the county commissioner's and justice of the peace nominations, and (2) Republican voters will be forced to drive to Friona to cast their votes.

The contested local races will add a little color to what has been otherwise a lack-lustre Democratic primary campaign. There are three candidates in the commissioner's race and four for Justice of the Peace.

Candidates for the commissioner's nomination are (ballot order) Lawrence Widner, Don Murphy and Thomas Ware. Commissioner Tommy Williams, who will have served in the office four years at the end of this year, chose not to seek re-election.

The winner of the primary election is virtually assured of being the next commissioner, as no one is seeking nomination in the Republican primary.

Incumbent Justice of the Peace Wayne Spears has three opponents for his office. Those listed on the ballot are (ballot order) Bonnie Clayton, Spears, Norbert Schueler and A.T. (Buster) Morgan.

In other county races, County Judge Porter Roberts is challenged by Brenda Miller. County Treasurer Benna Felts Tarter is retiring, and her office is sought by Jerry L. Davis and Anne G. Norton.

Larry Mitchell, currently serving as Democratic Precinct Chairman in Bovina, is the only name listed for the position on the ballot.

There is no name on the ballot for county Democratic party chairman, but a movement has been started to write in the name of longtime Democratic leader Wendol Christian for the office.

Two names are on the ballot for the Demo nomination for U.S. Representative, 19th District. They are Gerald McCathern and Mary Nell Mathis. McCathern, a Hereford farmer, is well-known in this area for his work on behalf of farmers, particularly in the American Agriculture Movement. Mrs. Mathis is a CPA from Lubbock.

Governor Mark White has drawn five opponents on the Democratic ballot. Among these are Andrew C. Briscoe III, a cousin of former governor Dolph Briscoe, and Ron Slover of Amarillo, an advocate for the Panhandle's oil and gas industry.

Registration of kindergarten children and pre-kindergarten children will be held May 7 from 3-4 p.m. at Ridgelea School.

Each child must have a birth certificate and shot records.

Pre-kindergarten children must be four years old before September 1 and kindergarten children must be five years old before September 1.

Other Democratic hopefuls in the governor's race are A. Don Crowder, Bobby Locke and Sheila Bilyeu. Crowder has been the most flamboyant of the Demo hopefuls, openly attacking White.

For instance, he has called a piece of clear plastic an X-Ray of White's head. He's also called the governor "one of the first nerds in Texas," a "scumball," and "a low-life scumball." He also gets notice by saying whoever wins will have to raise taxes or pass a state lottery.

Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby has one opponent, David Young.

Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower is opposed by Noel S. Cowling.

The governor's race is the main draw in the Republican primary, where three candidates have been slugging it out for the opportunity to oppose Mark White in November.

The candidates are former Congressman Kent Hance of Dimmitt, former governor Bill Clements and Congressman Tom Loeffler. Hance has always been a favorite in this area, and this is his

first race since swapping parties after his close statewide race for the U.S. Senate.

Four candidates seek the nomination for lieutenant governor in the Republican primary. They are David Davidson, founder of a non-denominational Emmanuel Fellowship Church at Gonzales; District Judge Virgil Mulanax of Gilmer; Glenn Jackson of San Antonio, a self-employed instructor of applicants for real estate and insurance licensing exams; and Aaron Bullock of Kingwood, who has refused requests for interviews and so far hasn't been seen by his opponents.

GOP voters will be asked to choose from two judges and a former prosecutor for their nominee for Attorney General: San Antonio District Judge Roy Barrera, Jr.; District Judge John Roach of Plano and Ed Walsh, ex-Williamson County district attorney who sent confessed serial killer Henry Lee Lucas to Death Row.

Challengers for agriculture commissioner on the GOP ballot are Bill Powers, executive vice president of the Texas Poultry Association, and Charles "Farmer" Trompler.

Baseball Signup, Tryouts Saturday

Last chance to sign up for baseball before tryouts will be Saturday, May 3 at the High School Cafeteria from 2-4 in the afternoon. You must be signed up to play in order to be drafted and play on a team. Remember, youngsters, you are to bring a parent, birth certificate and fee of \$10 and \$5 for additional children in a family.

Tryouts will also be held that day, May 3 at 4 p.m. at the ball park.

Children signed up to play baseball, ages seven through twelve, before August 1, must tryout to be put on a team, unless they played last year on the Bovina Supermarket, Kirkpatrick's, Shirley Grain or Bovina Blade teams. These teams will stay the same.

The program will be changed some this year. There will not be a pitching machine used! If a child is five years old before August, 1986

and does not turn seven before August 1, they will be playing t-ball, and all others will play regular baseball. All games will be played when scheduled, unless the weather doesn't permit.

Last year was the first year in several years for a baseball program in Bovina. The board of directors had a lot to learn and mistakes were made, but with help and interest from the people, they are sure they can build a good program.

Coaches are still needed for some teams and if you can help, let them know.

If you cannot make tryouts, you need to contact the officials and let them know and we can work it out.

If you have any questions, call Ella Jo Stormes or Gloria Rackley. If there is a problem with the fees, we can work that out too, says the ones who are in charge, just let them know.

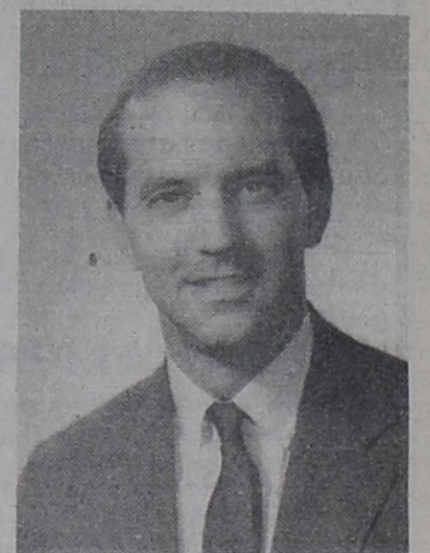
Caldwell Promoted By His Company

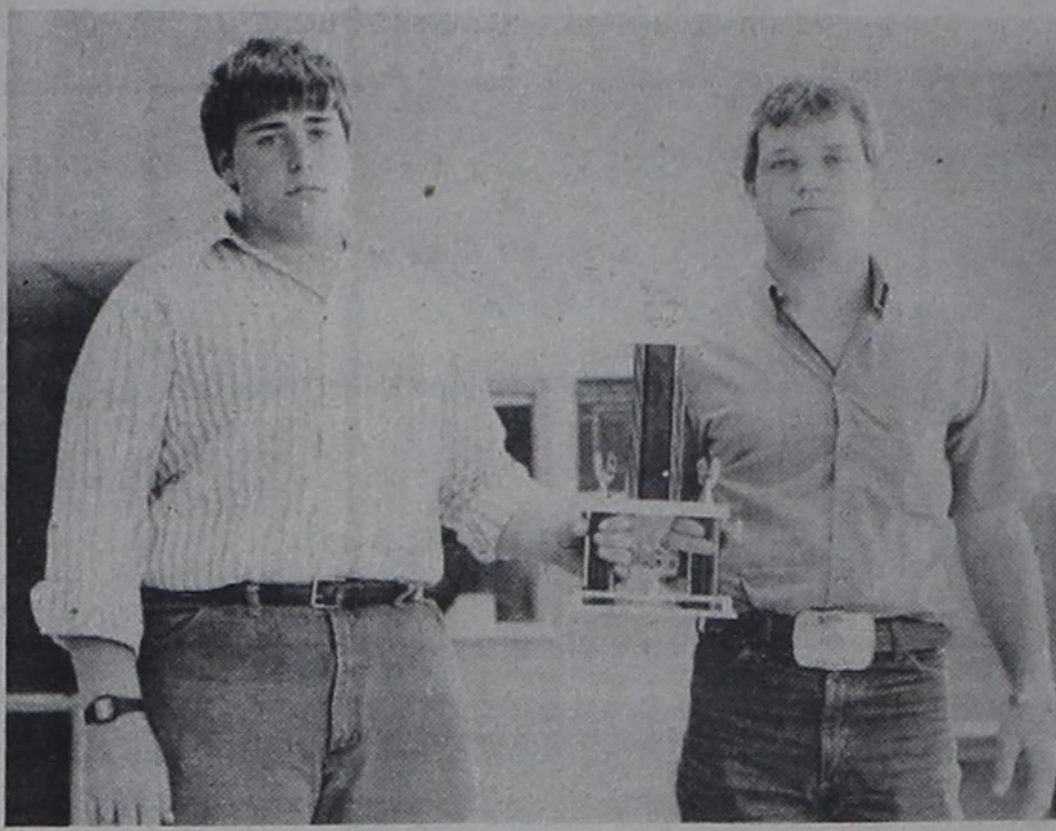
5 YEARS AGO--APRIL 29, 1981

be alleviated by applying our knowledge of the circadian rhythms. In one experiment at a Utah potash mine and processing plant, workers had been advancing from day to evening to night shifts on a weekly basis, a grueling procedure that would have affected them rather like flying eastward around the world in three hops, departing every Monday.

But when they were allowed to stay on one shift for three-week periods and to rotate in the other direction--night to evening to day--their circadian systems were disrupted less. Productivity improved and so did health.

For people fortunate enough to work by day and sleep by night, circadian rhythms explain many everyday puzzles. If you find it hard to get up on Monday, for instance, it may be because your body partially reset its biological clock over the weekend, and you are forcing it to change back on Monday morning.

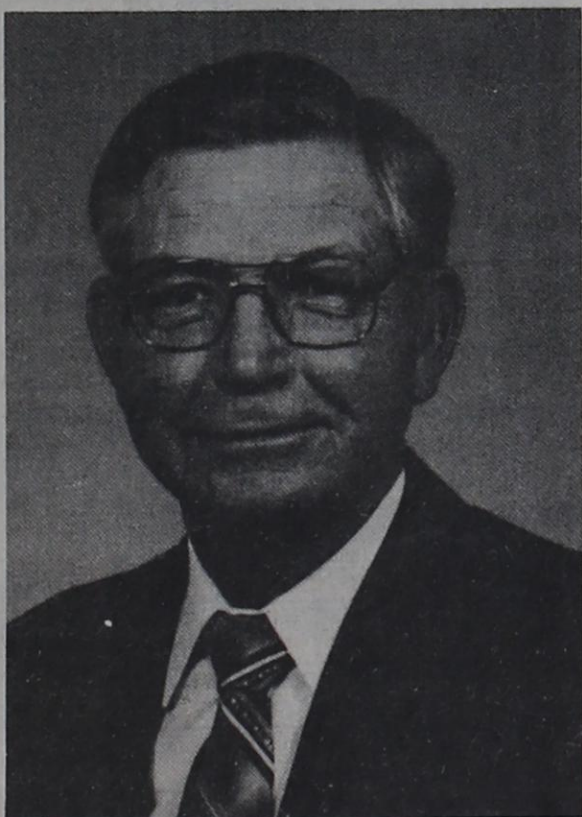

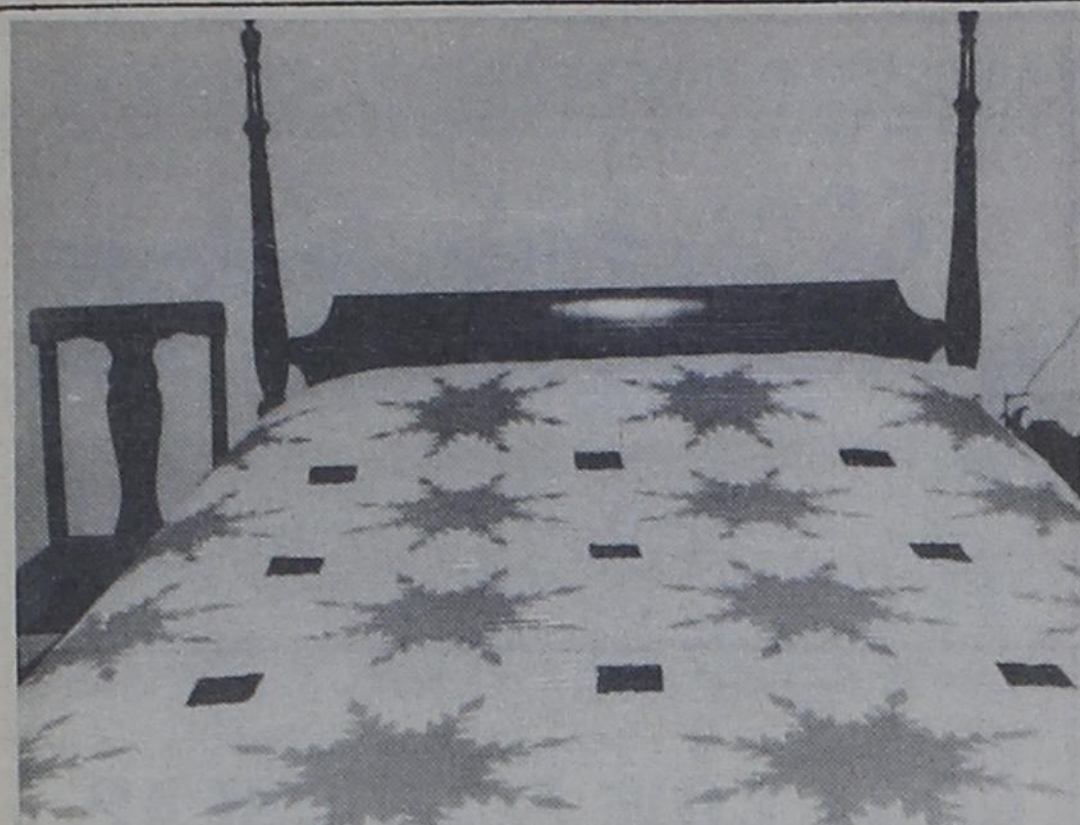

Sesquicentennial Notes

"During the winter of 1943-44, the members of the athletic teams could not get shoe ration stamps to buy basketball shoes without reducing their permits to buy other shoes. Therefore, the school board bought the shoes for the boys and girls who participated in those sports and in turn rented them to the children in order to maintain a revolving fund for this purpose.

In June, 1944, a consolidation election was held and the Bovina Independent School District was extended to the New Mexico line and increased in size by 24 square miles.

An additional room was added to the superintendent's house, M.H. Martin was employed to assess and collect taxes, and tax values were raised 20 percent. Voters elected R.S. Johnston and E.V. Isham to the school board. The superintendent's salary was raised to \$250 a month and a single salary schedule for teachers was adopted. This schedule recognized the training and experience of teachers but did not discriminate between high school and grade school teachers.

Cherry was re-elected for

another three-year term. A tax rate of \$1.50 was voted and valuations were lowered 14 percent. The balcony in the gym was removed and the gym re-done.

In March, 1948, a special meeting was called to consider ways and means of effecting a consolidation with the Rhea district. Some parents had shown interest in this, but there was much opposition to the plan also.

To stimulate the estimation of the Bovina School in the eyes of its neighbors, the Bovina board approved the purchase of some surplus war buildings from the Pampa Air Base. Several town lots were also purchased from the Halsell estate to enlarge the school campus.

After considerable arguments, elections and finally court decisions, the case was finally settled in favor of Bovina and Rhea consolidation. Later, after bitter struggles, a few sections of land were added to Bovina from Farwell district. Eventually the Rhea election was again contested and the outcome of this Rhea petition was that the Bovina district suffered a great loss of territory on the north side.

When school started in September, 1948, the surplus army buildings were made into a modern school cafeteria and a first class

vocational agriculture shop.

Two school buildings from the old Rhea school were moved in to be used as a band and dark room and a veteran's vocational school.

In 1949, Cherry left Bovina to accept a position as superintendent of the Lorenzo School. Mr. W.H. Willoughby was elected to head the Bovina Schools. He assumed his duties on July 1, 1949, and began the selection of replacements for the faculty. Willoughby and the board began plans for developing a building program which would include a new gymnasium and a remodeling of the old space in the comfortable and useful auditorium. This program was carried to completion in 1951. The football team under Coach Ratliff won the district title in 1950.

In February, 1950, the school board re-elected Willoughby for a two-year term.

In the early morning hours of September 17, 1953, a boiler in the basement exploded and the two-story brick building was destroyed by the fire. School was held in the churches and temporary buildings on the school campus the rest of the school year. In 1954, the present school building was completed and ready for use.

W.H. Willoughby was superintendent at this time. James Acheson and Atmar Acheson of

Lubbock were the architects and Sanders Construction Co. were the builders. School board members at that time included Arnold Hromas, president, T.F. Taylor, secretary, T.W. Fuller, H.J. Charles, M.E. Ezell, Wendol Christian, A.E. Steelman, and Earl Stevenson.

In 1964, the need arose for more classrooms. A small gym for elementary use and six classrooms were added on to the present building. Later in 1967 more classrooms were needed and the Ridgelea School on West Highway 86 was built. Kindergarten through second grade and the tax office presently occupies this building.

Other superintendents to serve Bovina Independent Schools have been Warren Morton, Otis Spears, L.F. Jacobs and Larry Wilson.

In 1979, Mr. Robert Owen was hired as superintendent, with Mr. Kenneth Gauntt and Mr. Herman Connor as principals, and all three hold these positions now."

(This is an addition to the research done by Mrs. W.O. Cherry for a master's thesis, since the publication of her thesis in the Parmer County History Book.)

The present high school principal is Mr. Joe Rackley and Mr. Kenneth Gauntt is principal of kindergarten through grade eight. The superintendent remains the same.

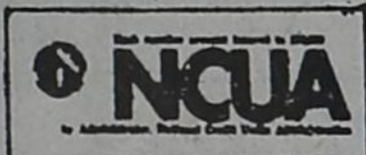

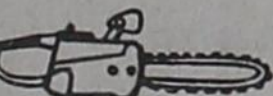

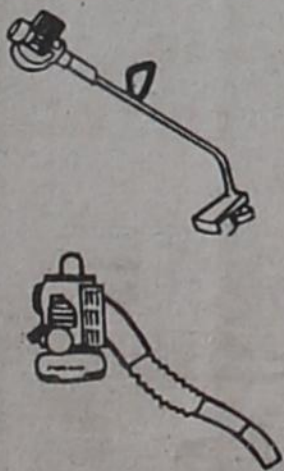

On The Farm

An aphid, which for almost a century has plagued small grain producers halfway around the world, has made its first U.S. appearance in wheat fields on the South Plains of Texas.

Entomologists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service revealed April 1 that the Russian wheat aphid has been identified in fields from Gaines to Hall Counties and from Parmer to Scurry Counties, and in Curry County, New Mexico.

"This is no joke to our wheat farmers," said Dr. William P. Morrison, Extension entomologist, at a press conference at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, Lubbock. The infested area annually produces some 17 per cent of the state's wheat, with a yield of about 26.4 million bushels on 1.3 million planted acres. Yield reductions can result from infestations by this aphid, Morrison said.

The Russian wheat aphid injects a toxin into the plant on which it feeds. This can make the plant turn purple; cause infested leaves to exhibit white, longitudinal streaks; and give heavily infested plants a flattened appearance with the tillers lying almost parallel to the ground, the Extension entomologist said.

"The aphids are found mainly on the newest growth of the wheat plant, generally at the base of the tightly curled last leaf," Morrison said. In later stages, the aphids infest the flag leaf. Emerging wheat heads may become bent and white.

Morrison said a few fields he has examined on the South Plains in the last few days were beginning to experience whitish circles, three to five feet in diameter, where the aphids had begun to kill the wheat.

The Russian wheat aphid is relatively small, less than two millimeters long. It is green, with an elongated, spindle-shaped body. The Extension entomologist said it is easily distinguished from other aphids by extremely short antennae; a characteristic projection above the cauda (or tail) which gives it a "double tail" appearance, and, to the naked eye, absence of prominent cornicles (or dorsal tubes) typical of other aphids.

It got its common name because it is indigenous to southern Russia, where it has been a pest of wheat and barley since the turn of the century. It also has been common in the Middle East and Mediterranean coastal region of North Africa and Europe. In 1978 it was found to cause severe damage in South Africa. By 1981 it was found throughout South Africa and also was identified in central Mexico. By 1983 it had spread to northern Mexico.

There are no records until now of this aphid occurring north of Mexico.

Wheat producers and county Extension agents across the Texas South Plains began seeing the unfamiliar symptoms in area wheat fields about March 20 and asked Morrison for help. He examined specimens and recognized that the aphid wasn't common to the area. On March 25, Morrison consulted Dr. Bob Burton, USDA Agricultural Research Service entomologist at Stillwater, Oklahoma, and sent him specimens by express mail. Burton tentatively identified it as the Russian wheat aphid.

On March 25, Morrison telephoned Dr. Manya Stoetzel, USDA taxonomist and aphid specialist at Beltsville, MD. He sent her specimens by express mail. Stoetzel made positive identification on March 27.

Very little research has been done on the pest, and that was in South Africa under conditions different from the Texas South Plains, Morrison noted. Since the pest was identified here, Dr. Tom Archer, research entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock, has initiated tests on chemical control measures and to determine if the aphid will feed on grain sorghum and corn, major area crops.

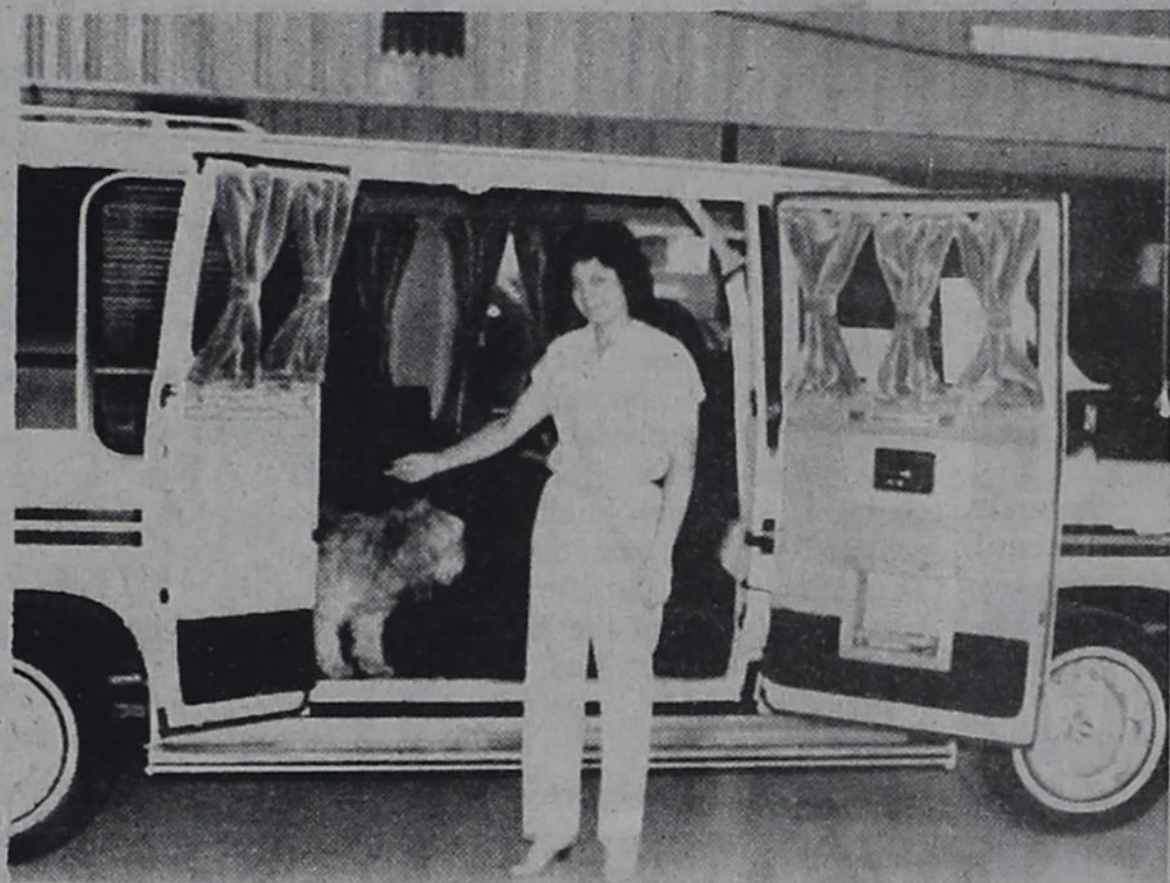
The recommended control measures, at present, are treatment with a combination of a contact insecticide, such as parathion, plus a systemic insecticide, Morrison said. He said this would cost farmers approximately \$5 an acre applied aerially.
