THE DOCTOR'S MELONS | THE PRESIDENT TALKS

BETTERMENT OF CIVIL SERVICE OVER THE COUNTRY.

Commends Present Civil Service Law and Points Out Advantages-Says Intrusion of Politics Always Does

Washington, May 17. - President Roosevelt delivered an address at the White house to representatives of several state and municipal civic commissions and of the national civil ser vice reform league who met here for a conference with the commissioner of the general government with a view of considering questions for the betterment of civil cervice through out the country. The president said:

"One of the gratifying things of recent years has been the rapid spread of interest in the whole movement culiarly incumbent upon you to see that there is not a chance for the opponents to say it is not practical. The efficiency of the service with honesty is of course the corner stone of efficiency must be the prime test of what you do."

The President said that exceptions to rules will always be found necessary mentioning promotions by the system of written competitive examinations as an instance where the best results were not secured. He urged the delegates not to be afraid to make these exceptions, "but," he continued, "be sure you are making the exception for proper reasons.

"In other words do not believe for one moment that any system of rules can be devised under which it will be possible to shield yourself from the duty of exercising your own judgment | mony." or your own independence.

"After considerable experience in almost every kind of governmental work. I have never yet found any position or any branch of the service as regards which the intrusion of political reasons do not damage.

"I am now naturally brought into relation with a great number of important offices in different branches of the government throughout the country and I continually have to consider the question of efficiency with which they are handled. Practically without exception I find that an office in which there is laxness in the administration of civil service law, where there is an effort to circumvent the law, where there is effort to get around it, is an office in which poor service is rendered; the chance for fraud, for peculation for dishonesty, is always greater in such an office than in the office where the law is well and faithfully observed. And while of course it is true that the mere never result in a thoroughly efficient administration of any office, yet I am inclined more and more to feel that the observance in letter and spirit of the civil service law is the first requisite in obtaining clean, decent, efficient governmental service in any branch or bureau of the government.

MOODY WON'T REPLY. Says If Statement Is Made Will Come From President.

Washington, May 16. - Attorney General Moody and Senator Allison conferred with the president on the situation that has arisen concerning the railroad rate bill in the senate.

On leaving the executive office Mr Moody said that he would make no statement in answer to that made by Mr. Tillman in the senate; that if any statement is made it will come from the 'president. He would not say, however, that such a statement is to be made.

KNOWN IN AMERICA.

London, May 16. - The colonial office has been advised that Sir Robert Bromley, administrator of the island of St. Kitts, British West Indies, died there.




