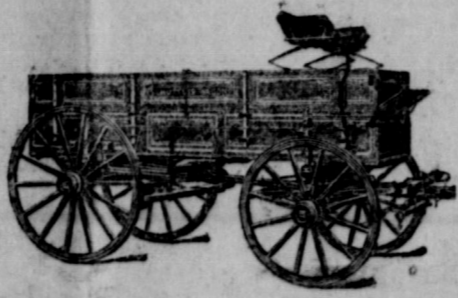

Mr. Morton deposes that the charge is just, as the introduction was the direct means by which the railroad was sold. Persons with money and nothing else are willing to pay liberally for introductions to persons with everything. The palm of the friendly guide to exclusive circles is well lined by those who are outside and have to be personally conducted to the inside. But the pure "business introducer" has not been recognized as an established occupation.

fully prepared typewritten statement in which he said the president had sent Ex-Senator Chandler to him and that the agreement was between Tillman and Bailey on one side and the president and Attorney-General Moody on the other, with Chandler as the go-between, and that the president threw them all overboard and made his agreement with the railroad senators without notice to himself, to Bailey, to Chandler or even to his own cabinet officer, Moody. The president issued a statement charging Chandler with falsehood, and Chandler reiterates the truth of Tillman's statement. The following day Senator Tillman published Roosevelt's note to Chandler, asking him to open negotiations with Tillman and Bailey. Root and Taft advise the president to maintain a dignified silence.

Expressions from the U. S. senators indicate that President Roosevelt is now almost without friends in that body. The republicans are offended because he clandestinely dickered with the democrats, and the democrats are furious because he clandestinely went back on his agreement with them—an agreement first sought by him.

**Comanche Counts Quercy.**  
A peculiar feature of the Comanche language is the method of counting. A Comanche will count to ten in the 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 method, but there he stops. He doesn't use eleven, but instead he counts it as "ten and one more," and so on, until he reaches nineteen, when he pronounces twenty, but starts in with "twenty and one more" until he reaches twenty-nine, which he counts twenty-nine, then starts in with thirty, like he did twenty, and counts to thirty-nine, and so on all the way up. Counting is the most difficult thing to learn in the Comanche language. In fact, by the time a person has learned to count in that language he has probably well mastered it. As there is no alphabet in the language the only way to learn it is by word of mouth.

## CHINESE SOLDIERS DID WELL

An Englishman's Testimony, Showing How Brave They Are.

When Great Britain took Wei-Hai-Wel on the coast of China, she pursued her usual policy and organized a company of native soldiers, with British officers in command, says "Mary Porter Gamewell, in The Chautauquan. When the allies met the Chinese Imperial army in hard-fought battles around Tientsin and finally formed and took the city in the summer of 1900, preparatory to the march on Peking, the Chinese troops, officered by British gentlemen, fought shoulder to shoulder with the British.

The fight over, one day some one talking carelessly made the usual claim that the Chinese are cowards, whereupon an officer, who had led that valiant band of British-uniformed Chinese, spoke for his men with all the ardor of British love of fair play. He said:

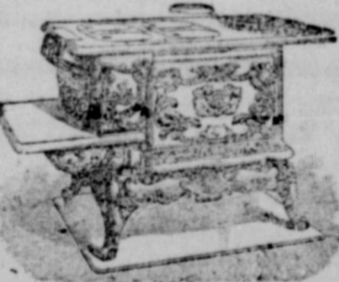

## A Menace to Public Health.

The foul fumes arising from the feed  
pens back of the old Graham & Rainey  
stables is something awful, causing one  
to hold their nostrils when passing near  
them, or even at a considerable dis-  
tance to the leeward. Such a stench  
permitted near the business section of  
a town is anything but praiseworthy  
to its citizens, and such a condition  
must be repulsive to any person who

if permitted to remain. Steps should

at once. Public health and decency  
demands it. We believe, too, that in

also be removed, for the hot weather  
will aggravate the conditions, the heat  
causing the decaying matter to gener-  
ate poisonous gases to be inhaled by  
the inhabitants.

This is not for the purpose of censur-  
ing anybody, for we believe the parties  
responsible for the cattle being there  
never once thought it would prove to  
be such a foul place. The owner of the  
cattle not living in town and not hav-  
ing been here for some time likely does  
not know the situation, and as the  
writer knows him he is not one who  
would purposely place the health of  
the town in jeopardy, and when the  
matter is brought to his attention we  
feel sure he will make arrangements to  
abate the nuisance by moving the cat-  
tle. Our citizens are good, very good  
people. They realize that to move the  
cattle at the present time would greatly  
inconvenience the owner, therefore  
have refrained from making the prop-  
er complaint to the health officer, but  
as we regard it the matter will not per-  
mit of delay and something should be  
done soon.
