Big Pastures to be Opened.

Mr. Stephens' bill, providing for the opening to settlement under the homestead act of the "Big Pasture," containing 505,000 acres in the Kiowa, Comanche and Apache reservation of Oklahoma, passed the senate. The measure has already passed the house so that it needs only the signature of the President to make it a law. Inasmuch as the bill was recalled from the White House to permit some changes in accordance with the President's wishes, it will probably be signed.

The bill provides that the land shall be sold in tracts of 160 acres, but not at less than \$5 an acre, payable in five annual installments. The proclamation declaring the land open to settlement is to be issued within six months of the passage of the act. Allotments are made to all children of members of the tribe born since 1900.—Clarendon Chronicle.

The Alameda correspondent of the McLean News says: "The lightning rod man got in his graft on some of our people. They say \$10, \$20, \$30, for the job and when it is done it costs from \$30 to \$100. I believe our people should cut out any sort of a contract that requires a note in advance or that is not definite as to the final cost, and this applies to life insurance, lightning rods and any contract that is not definite, and there should be a law voiding any insurance note where a policy is not delivered and to set aside any contract that is not definite and that when done calls for two or three times as much as first agreed upon. Sign no note until the goods and property is delivered to you and the contract is properly fulfilled."

Death of John Seiber.

John Seiber died at the home of his daughter Mrs. Mason, at Galena, Kansas, last Sunday. Mr. Seiber had been in declining health for over a year and several weeks ago was taken to the hospital at Wichita, Kansas, for treatment, and from there went to the home of his daughter at Galena in the hope that the change would prove beneficial to him.

The remains, accompanied by a son, C. S. Seiber, and two daughters, Mrs. Walton and Mrs. Mason, and a daughter of the latter, Miss Alice Mason, arrived Tuesday morning.

Funeral services conducted by Rev. Frank of the Presbyterian church were held at the residence. From the residence a large concourse of sorrowing friends followed to the cemetery where the last sad rites were held and the body consigned to mother earth.

With the passing away of Mr. Seiber the country loses one of its oldest and most respected citizens. Mr. Seiber moved with his family to the Panhandle twenty-four years ago, and thus has been identified with the growing interests of the country since the early days. He was the first settler on Red Deer creek near the present town of Miami and his energy was exerted in the upbuilding of the town, having moved some seven or eight buildings from Mobeetie to Miami soon after the railway was built through this country and engaging in business here.

The deceased leaves a wife, a lady of much refinement who has a large circle of friends; also two sons and two daughters. The two sons, C. S. and J. L. Seiber, are representative business men of Miami while one daughter, Mrs. Walton, lives at Guthrie, Okla., and the other, Mrs. Mason, lives at Galena, Kansas. The community deeply sympathizes with the bereaved relatives in their sad loss, and sorrow over the loss of a good man from our midst.

Mr. Seiber at the time of his death was 70 years old.


