Zimmerman who sold his Hall county ranch to Chicago capitalists last Friday his 180,000 acre ranch and about 12,000 head of cattle, together with all ranch equipage. The consideration in the deal will approximate a million dollars. This ranch consists of some of the best agricultural and grazing land in Hall county, and it is the intention of the purchasers to dispose of a portion of the cattle and place the agricultural lands on the market in 160-acre tracts to actual settlers.—Chronicle.

Parker is indignant because of the action of the board, for he entertains fond hopes of giving his son a complete English education.—Exchange

### Increase in Values.

Austin, Texas, October 29th.—With but five counties to hear from the tax rolls show that the increase in assessed values for this year over last will be approximately \$60,000,000, which means that the grand total of taxable values in Texas is on the rolls at \$1,200,000,000. Last year the assessed values totaled \$1,139,000,000. An increase of approximately \$60,000,000 will make the total indicated.

The figures given do not include the \$50,000,000 of assessed values placed on the rolls as a result of the values ascertained by the State Tax Board in assessing the intangible assets of certain corporations in the State. While the values are included on the rolls they are not included in this estimate because the validity of the law under which these values were ascertained is being attacked in the courts and the final result is uncertain.

Secretary Taft ordered that the arms that have been surrendered by the Cuban insurgents be cast into the sea. They are said to be old and absolute patterns, and the accumulations of forty years.

Oscar S. Straus, who is to enter Roosevelt's cabinet, is a Democrat. It is said he is to reverse the policy

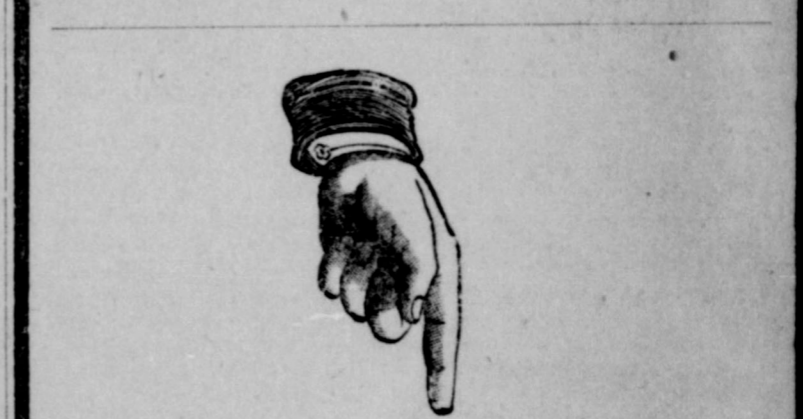

To Meet Next Easter. London.—The Daily Telegraph's correspondent at the Hague says he learns that the second peace conference will be convoked next Easter.

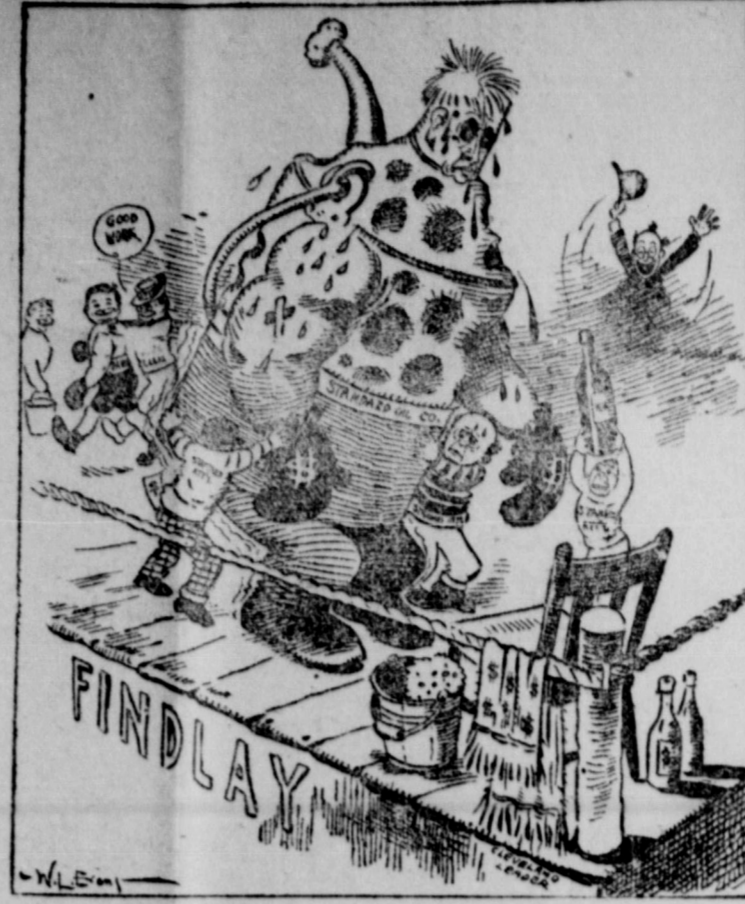
Russian Prince Dead. Oueky, Switzerland.—Prince Bariatinsky of Tamboff, Russia, died here Sunday.

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A KANSAS WOMAN'S APPEAL.

Mrs. Smith Wants Stop Put to White Slave Trade - W. C. T. U. Officers.

Hartford, Conn.—There are 10,000 young women in Chicago who are obliged to work at \$5 a week and there are 5,000 saloons there, too, said Mrs. Lurinda B. Smith of Kansas, at the afternoon session of the National convention, Women's Christian temperance Union.

Mrs. Smith made a splendid appeal for the effort of all the delegates from all parts of the country to put speaker cited instances of young women held in captivity and sold at auction in New York and asked why it was 40 years after the Civil war had been fought for the liberation of the black slaves, that slavery of young women should be tolerated in this country. She said that one of the most hopeful signs of the times was when the 17 nations recently banded together for the suppression of this awful vice. CLOSE OF CAMPAIGN.

The Leaders of the Opposing Parties Touring New York State—Campaign Warm.

New York.—Refreshed by the over Sunday ball, the state candidates pitched in for the final and hardest week of the campaign. The Republican gubernatorial candidate spoke at Poughkeepsie and Syracuse and the head of the Independence League and Executive ticket made night addresses at Albany and Syracuse. Charles E. Hughes pleaded before Republican mass meeting for sane judgment on big business interests and urged Republicans and Democrats alike to vote for a sincere administration of public affairs.

William R. Hearst assailed the corporations and bitterly arraigned the board of elections before whom many league nominating contests were heard. He asked his audience to free themselves of state officials controlled by money interests.

Both candidates will continue campaigning in the western part of the state until late in the week when they return for a whirlwind tour in this city. So far both have drawn large and demonstrative audiences.

Standard Oil is Fined \$5,000.  
Findlay, Ohio.—The Standard Oil company has been fined \$5,000 and costs of prosecution for operating in restraint of trade in Ohio. The defense was allowed 10 days to file a bill of exceptions and sentence was suspended 60 days to give defense time to file the petition in error.

The Chicago Horse Show.  
Chicago.—The seventh annual horse show of Chicago is now opened and will continue until Saturday night. The animals on exhibition this year excel anything ever shown in this city and competition for blue ribbons was keen in almost every event.

Attempted Assassination.  
Admiral, F. T.—Federal details were notified Friday of the attempted assassination Thursday night of J. W. Hecker, a prominent citizen of Purcell, and republican nominee for delegate to the constitutional convention from the Purcell district.

The Explosion Mystery.  
Coffeyville, Kan.—The theory that the destruction of five buildings here was caused by an explosion of natural gas is not generally believed Monday morning. Nearly every one believes that dynamite or nitroglycerin, especially the latter, caused it.

Cuba is Peacified.  
Haynes, Cuba.—The reports received by telegraph from the commanders of the garrisons in all parts of Cuba show that complete tranquility prevails.

A National Historical Society.  
Washington, D. C.—At a meeting Thursday night of the United States Historical society, Harry A. Colman of Washington, D. C., was elected president. Action was taken toward the formation of state branches.

May Be Too Heavy.  
Rome.—The Italian press is considerably stirred up in the matter of the twenty locomotive works of Philadelphia for use on the state railroads and which arrived in Italy August 10.

Wireless Station in Cuba.  
Havana, Cuba.—The signal corps has erected a wireless telegraph station at Camp Columbia and is exchanging messages with Key West promptly. This puts Gen. J. Franklin Bell's headquarters in immediate communication with Washington.

Two Killed in Accident.  
Kansas City.—R. M. Snyder, a capitalist and promoter of this city, and Arthur M. Redell, a 14-year old boy were killed here Saturday evening in an automobile accident.

HURLED TO WATERY GRAVE

Fifty-Seven Lives Lost in a Wreck at Atlantic City, N. J.

A Train of Three Electric Cars Plunged off a Bridge into 30 Feet of Water.

Atlantic City, N. J.—A railroad accident that was even worse than the Meadow wreck of July 29, 1896, sent about 57 people to a sudden death Sunday afternoon, catching them like rats in a trap. The cars of the 1:30 electric train of the West Jersey & Seashore railroad lines, due here at 2:20 jumped the track on the trestle bridge over the Thoroughfare and before any one could get out they were hurled to a watery grave. The trestle is about 15 feet above the water and the drop to the water required several seconds, giving time for the passengers, men, women and children to see and calculate their fate.

Forty four bodies were recovered over wrecking train is now at work trying to 1 o'clock Monday morning and the wrecking train is now at work trying to hoist the submerged cars from the water, where fully 70 dead bodies must be entombed. The accident was due to a rail "turning in." It appears that the rail which was an outside one on the right hand side coming down must have been out of plumb about an eighth of an inch. The sharp flange of the electric train caught this and twisted it inward. Had it spread instead of twisting inward the accident never would have happened. This twist threw the first car off the track and into the water. The result was that the second and third cars were dragged with it and while the third car was descending, the rear portion struck a piece of the abutment, hung for a short time and then slid into the water.

A number of men and a few women leaped out of windows and the rear door either into the water or caught hold of a post and were rescued. It was stated that fully 80 to 100 passengers were aboard mostly all crowded into the first and second cars. These are engulfed. Among the passengers were 20 men of the Royal artillery band who were on their way here from Philadelphia.

MAY GET MORE PAY.

An Increase in Salaries to Be Recommended for Rural Mail Carriers.

Washington, D. C.—Fourth Assistant Postmaster General DeGraw will recommend to Postmaster General Cortelyou an increase in the maximum salary allowed letter carriers in the rural free delivery service. Estimates recently submitted by the postmaster general to the secretary of the treasury for the postal service for the coming fiscal year, including an increase of \$1,475,000 for the rural delivery service, did not include an appropriation necessary to provide for an increase in the salaries of the rural carriers. The item referred to is merely to cover the normal addition to the cost of existing service and \$1,070,000 which will be required for the establishment of additional rural service. Estimates for the appropriation necessary to provide for an increase in salaries of rural carriers, if determined upon, will have to be submitted to congress by the postmaster general.

The Youngest Civil War Soldier.  
Washington, D. C.—The controversy as to who was the youngest soldier of the civil war probably has been settled in favor of Perry Ryan, of Seattle, Wash. He enlisted as a drummer boy in Company D, Twenty-fourth Iowa volunteers, on August 22, 1862, at the age of 9 years and 10 months.

He Shot His Own Child.  
Ehebyville, Ind.—Charles A. Aysa, living near Fountainstown, accidentally shot and killed his little daughter Martha, three-years-old. The father had a loaded rifle in his hand and the trigger caught in a rent in a towel and the gun was discharged.

A Long Time Married.  
Denver, Colo.—Rev. Orin Richardson, retired minister and his wife celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary Sunday at the home of their son, George E. Richardson in this city.

Government Buys Silver.  
Washington, D. C.—The director of the mint has purchased one hundred thousand ounces of silver at 79.57 per fine ounce to be delivered at the New Orleans mint.

Fire in a Girl's College.  
Defiance, O.—Early Sunday morning fire partially destroyed Trowbridge hall, the young ladies' dormitory of Defiance college and 56 girls had a narrow escape.

Miners Honor Mitchell.  
Wilkesbarre, Pa.—"Mitchell Day" was celebrated in this city by a large parade of mine workers.

Mrs. Foster's New Job.  
Washington, D. C.—By direction of President Roosevelt, Mrs. J. Ellen Foster has been detailed from the department of justice to investigate the condition of women and child workers throughout the country.

Russian Steamer Founders.  
London.—The Hamburg correspondent of the Tribune reports the foundering of the Russian steamer Jessica in the Gulf of Bothnia. The captain of the steamer and 39 men were drowned.

Four Trainmen Killed.  
Indianapolis, Ind.—In a head-on collision of two freight trains west of Springfield, O., on the Peoria & Eastern division of the Big Four late Saturday night four trainmen lost their lives, while a fifth is not expected to recover.

Authority on Cancer Dead.  
Utica, N. Y., Oct. 27.—Dr. Charles P. Russell, known throughout the country as an authority on dermatology and the treatment of cancer, died here Friday of pneumonia.

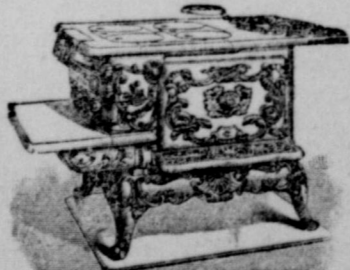

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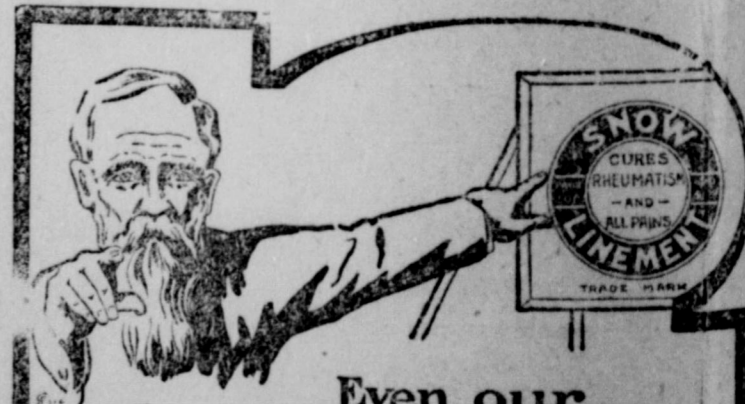
