Mrs. Daughette Passes Away.

A shadow of gloom was cast over the many friends last Thursday evening at 7 o'clock when the death of Mrs. M. C. Daughette was announced.

Mrs. Melvin Cathrine Daughette, (nee) Christopher was born in Madison county Kentucky, May 2nd, 1830. Married Rev. V. B. Daughette of Clark County Ky., Oct. 3rd, 1854. To this union was born two sons, Geo. R. and Wiley J. The latter passed away many years ago, while Geo. R. in the good providence of God, was left to care for his good mother until her translation to the better world. Her husband was a faithful Methodist preacher for many years, and passed to his reward ten years ago. Mrs. Daughette professed religion 66 years ago and her way seemed to grow brighter each day to the perfect day. She was a sufferer for many months of the dreaded cancer, but bore the burden lightly, and bent willingly to the will of her great master.

The remains of the diseased were shipped Saturday to Winchester, Ky., where they were laid beside that of her husband. A short funeral service was held at the family residence by Rev. Huffman at 1 p. m. Saturday.

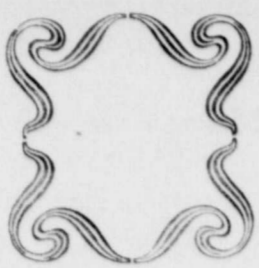

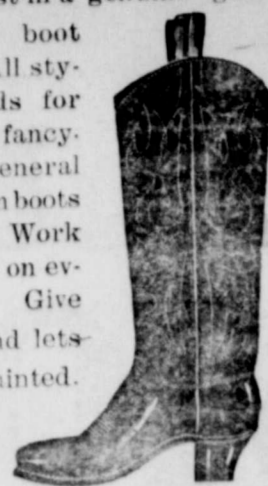
