Big Land Deal this Week

One of the largest land deals made in Roberts county this year was closed this week. The White Deer Land Co. sold to Thos. E. Durham of Amarillo and Walter Darlington of Kansas City, a 25 section ranch located on Indian and Chicken creek, about twelve miles from Miami. The consideration was private, more than they are to have possession May 20th, this year.

Mr. Darlington is one of the biggest loan men in the south-west, and possibly has more money loaned out in this part of the Panhandle than any other company. He has also made a special study of land and cattle values for the past several years in Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas. He says Roberts county looks better than any place he has found, and proved it by placing his money in land here.

Mr. Durham, one of the Panhandles most successful bankers with a wide range of acquaintance and almost an unlimited experience in land, has recently traveled from the Rio Grande in Texas to the North line in North Dakota, Wyoming and Montana looking for land and comes back to Roberts county to buy. Mr. Durham stated to a Chief writer this week that in all his travels, he saw nothing that looks as good as the ranch he and Mr. Darlington recently bought.

This ranch is a specially good grazing proposition, and would keep possibly 2,000 head of cattle. The Messrs Durham and Darlington will buy and place a thousand head on the place this summer. Most likely young steers.

Locke Bros Buys

Business Property.

Locke Bros closed a deal first of the week with John Dodson whereby they become owners of the Dodson business property, consisting of building they are now located in with Furniture and Groceries and also the Seiber Dry Goods store.

They expect to take charge of the entire building as soon as their leases expire, and arrange to put their entire stock of Dry Goods, Hardware, Groceries and Furniture under one roof. This building will give them 75x150 feet on which to have one of the largest stores in the Panhandle. They will make the changes some time this summer, possibly in August.

When we speak of Locke Bros. we are talking of one the Panhandles biggest business concerns. They will soon be carrying over \$50,000 worth of merchandise and there is few business houses in the Panhandle that carry that much.

Aside from the above mentioned businesses, they also have a big Garage in Miami, and are interested in a Garage at McLean, Shamrock and Canadian, and Monday of this week opened a new one at Pampa with Ernest Black in charge. Newt says "We are preparing to give the people everything they want right off the counter. We figure on volumes of business at small profit, rather than a less amount at a bigger profit." When it comes to "Gingering" up business and always after it, it would be hard to find a set of business men with more negligence than the set of Locke Bros.



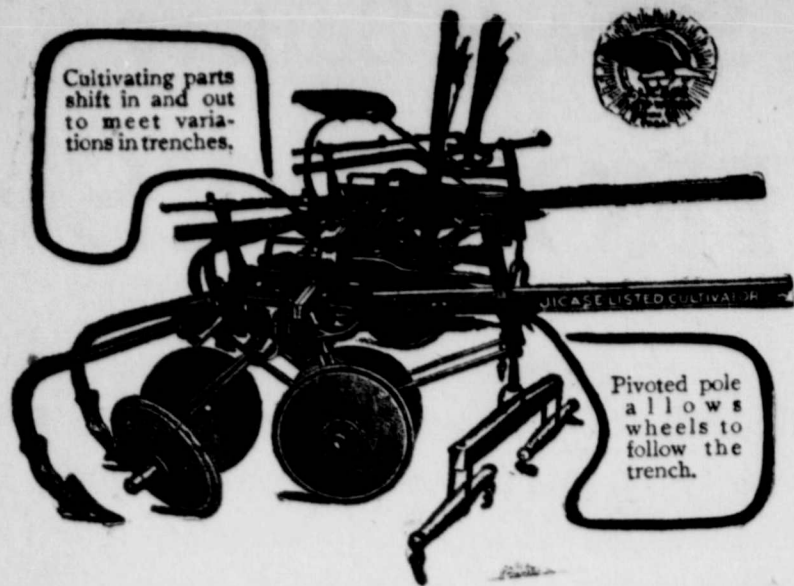
