Road Work Started.

County Engineer A. H. Doucette of Pampa came down Monday and put a party of surveyors at work on the Roberts County roads. Mr. Doucette will make profiles and blue prints of the roads proposed in this county and submit them with an estimate of cost to the commissioners court at the second Monday in next month. They will then let such contracts as they deem necessary and work can start at any time.

Out of the \$30,000 road bond money, presinct one will receive \$15,000 to her part. Mr. Doucette has as his assistant, J. R. Skahan and they will engineer the roads in the entire county.

Over the Plains

The Canadian Brass Band has been reorganized and began practice under the instruction of Prof. J. D. Ballaro.

Shamrock boasts of having nine boys in the U. S. Navy and army. Four of the boys in the navy, two in the army and three in the national guard. Shamrock is rather a patriotic town.

Plainview will have a new charter under an act of this legislature which has just passed. That town also recently voted \$40,000 for street paving.

After April 1st, the Santa Fe will put on double daily passenger train service between Amarillo and Sweetwater.

Reports come from Hansford that parties have leased land in that county on the old Turkey Track ranch, and propose to dig for oil, beginning within twelve months.

The splendid big barn belonging to T. J. Morgan near Ochiltree burned last week. He lost a fine horse besides other contents of the barn, totaling near \$2500.

McLean has organized a dairy association and propose to begin work soon.

Mobeetie News.

When it comes to pulling off "Big Stunts" Mobeetie is equal to the occasion as much or more now, than she was thirty years ago when cattlemen, hunters and soldiers come here from hundreds of miles. On Friday night of last week our town gave one of the biggest banquets ever pulled off in this section of the country. Two rooms of the high school building was cleared and set in tables preparatory to feeding three or four hundred people. A bounteous supper was set consisting of three courses, and all of them so well filled and deliciously prepared that not many of the eaters were able to do full justice to the entire supper. Everybody was well pleased over the supper and there was plenty left to have fed more people.

Immediately after the supper the crowd entered the auditorium, packing it to its fullest capacity and there listened for near two hours to the several speakers on the program which was arranged in assistance toward voting the road bonds on Saturday. Among the speakers were prominent business men of Canadian, Shamrock and Wheeler and the President and Secretary of the Dallas-Canadian-Denver Highway who outlined briefly the purpose of this highway and its many advantages to the town. Mr. Grant, a state highway promoter also gave some very interesting facts regarding highways, and stated that he was then on an inspection trip locating the Great Plains Highway, which is to run from the Gulf coast to the Canadian line in North Dakota. This line has been established fully with the exception of a few gaps and we feel sure that it will be designated over this route.

Saturday our big bond election was held, and a big victory won when the people voted four to one in favor of the issue. This road district, extending from near Shamrock to Wheeler, Mobeetie and the north end of the county is about four miles wide and in the strip as above outlined. They have voted to issue \$35,000 worth of bonds for the construction and maintenance of this highway, and we propose to have one of the very best links in the new highway.

District court has been session this week at Wheeler. They have many men from Mobeetie on the jury, and will likely finish this term of court this week.

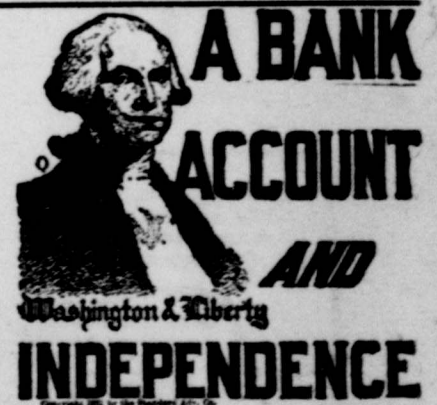

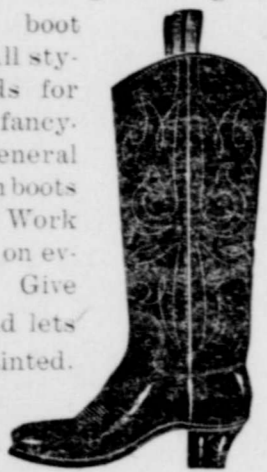

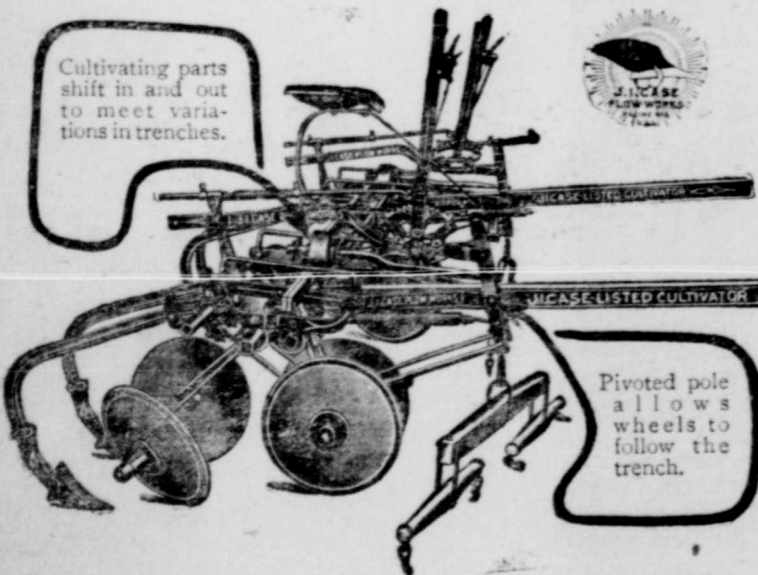
