



do you want to talk about?" "Well," said Jimmie, "I was down to Galesburg a few months ago when the boys came home from the Mexican border. They looked fine. Everybody was surprised to see how straight they stood and how manly they were. The boys seemed proud to wear the unlform. I tell you their mescles were as hard as nails. I heard Banker Haskett say that the training and discipline the Koys had had wus exactly what every boy in the country ought to have, and that now these boys could get a better job at higher pay than they could have had before. 




