## Bull Town Bulletins

A BILL IS BEING considered in the state legislature which would make a law providing for a presidential primary every four years on the appropriate year, to be held in conjunction with the state primaries.

This would be an excellent law, we feel, and is one we think you should write to your state representative, Bill Clayton, urging him to support.

The presidential primary was given to Texas voters for the first time in 1976, and the result was that for the first time, presidential candidates came into our area—at least as close as Amarillo, stumping for the local vote. The 1976 primary came about as the result of a special, one-time law enacted in 1974.

The pending bill, HB 1018, would set the presidential primary on the regular date for the Democratic and Republican primaries.

According to what we have heard, there are some legislative leaders who want to hold the presidential voting on a date separate from the regular primaries. This is probably supported by office holders, afraid that if the presidential vote was held on the same day as the state primary, it might hurt their chances to be re-elected.

Supporters of the proposed bill, to hold the primaries at the same time, argue that the presidential preference vote could be held in this way, at absolutely no extra expense to Texas taxpayers.

However, if we go the route of shifting the presidential vote to a separate date, it could cost Texans as much as \$4.7 million to hold the extra election.

We have not talked personally to Representative Clayton concerning the bill, but he was not listed as one of the sponsors in a report we received this week. Hence, we urge you to contact Clayton and ask his support of HB 1018.

Going by the usual voter turnout, if the forces succeed in getting the presidential primary shifted to a different date than the state primaries, it would be an approximate cost of \$2.00 per Texas voter.

That may not sound like much to the Texas lawmakers, but we believe it is a totally unnecessary expense, and urge our legislators to practice a little of the fiscal responsibility they would have us believe they are preaching.

State senator Bob Price has indicated his support of the measure, but you might want to contact him also, urging his continued support of the bill.

The presidential primary has received bi-partisan support in the state legislature, and we feel it is a bill long overdue. Such a primary not only causes the candidates for president to take notice of our Texas voters during the primary campaign, but also brings added publicity to our state during the campaign.

Why we have gone so long without a presidential primary is a mystery. We would hope that our legislators take care of this situation, and in a manner that all Texans, and not just special interest groups, would approve.

**CONGRATULATIONS TO** the Fillies' track team and to Coach Joel Nelson on another fine track year. Finishing third in the state is not to be sneezed at. In the past four years, Bovina girls have finished either first, second or third at the state meet, and no other class A team has been anywhere close to being that consistent.

The event times and marks continue to improve every year. It's hard to believe that the youngsters can continue to improve on what has already been accomplished, but they usually do.

# Fillies Are Third Best Class A Team

The Bovina High School Flying Fillies returned to Bovina Sunday, May 6, after travelling to Austin to compete in the 1979 State Track Meet.

The Fillies returned after a fine performance at the meet, which earned them third place in the Class A division. The Fillies placed second in every event they had entered, except for a sixth place in the triple jump. These finishes earned the team a total of 33 points.

First place went to the team from Sunray, with 48 points. Second place went to the Karnack team with 46 points. It is interesting to note, that in addition to winning first overall, teams from Region 1A had six first places, eight seconds, three thirds, five fourths and one sixth place.

Region One also placed in every event except for the long jump. In four of the events, Region 1A teams placed first and second.

From District 3-A, there was one first, four seconds, and one sixth place won at the state meet. According to Filly Coach Joel Nelson, if a team qualifies for state from Region 1A, they have an excellent chance to place at Austin.

The competition started for the Fillies in the triple jump on Saturday morning, May 5. Sandi Sides, who had qualified at Regional with a 35-4 leap, only managed a best of 34-9/4 to take sixth in the event.

The second event for the Fillies came in the 200 meter dash. Once again it was Miss Sides competing, but she bettered her qualifying time of 25.6 by one-hundredth of a second and finished second.

The Fillies' 800 meter relay team was the next to compete, and although they bettered their winning time at Regional by almost 2 seconds, they ran second to a very strong team from Karnack. Bovina's time was 1:44.7. Team members are Belinda Shelby, Fonda Griffin, Denise Read and Sandi Sides.

The club will serve a chicken dinner and all the trimmings, and invites the public to attend, and bring Mom out for a chicken dinner.



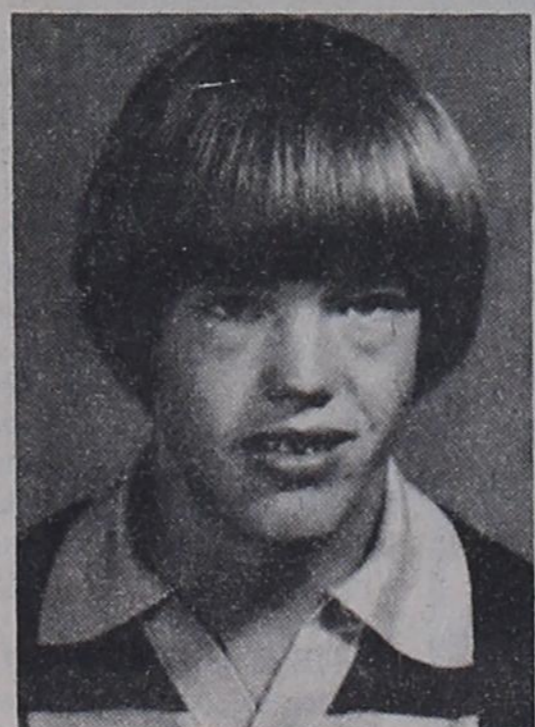

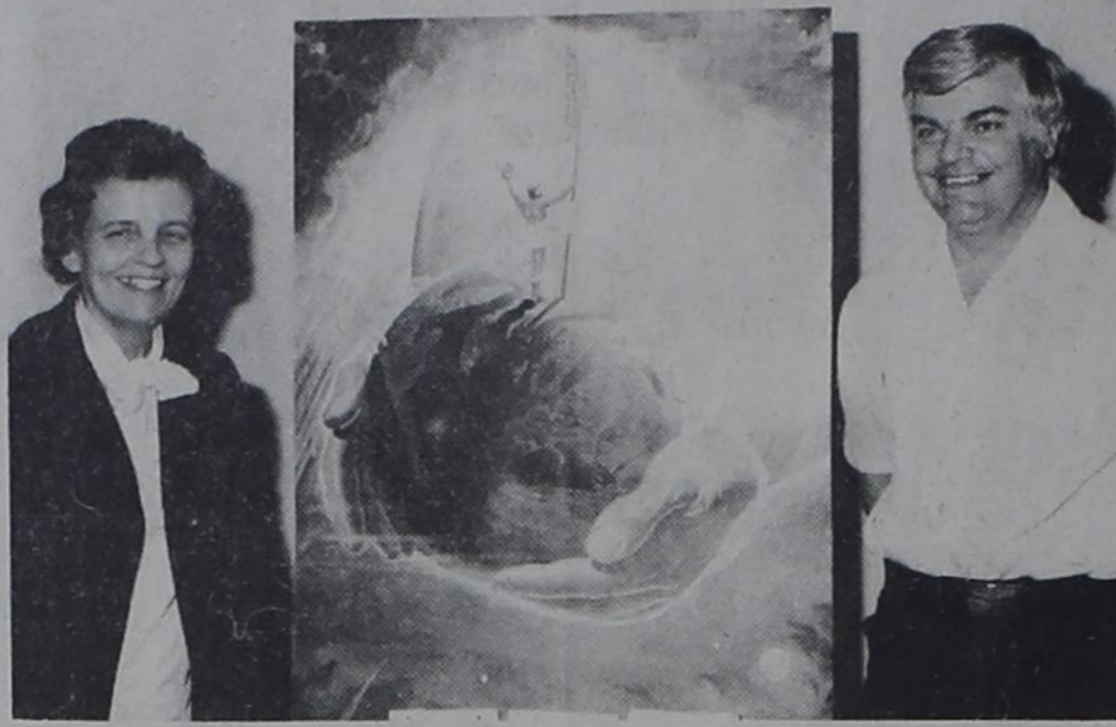

Rev. and Mrs. Dick Richards, minister of First United Methodist Church, Bovina, are attending a two-week orientation clinic of the Bethel Series, an international Bible study program administered by the Adult Christian Education Foundation, (ACEF). The Series is in its nineteenth year.

Orientation clinics are attended by pastors and Christian education

directors, who return to their churches to train lay teachers. The teachers, in turn, present an overview study of Scriptures to adult members, which is the foundation of continuing adult study.

Since 1959, more than 4,000 congregations, representing 17 denominations have involved over half a million lay teachers and students in the Bethel Series.

The Mental Health Association promotes mental health by strongly promoting research into the causes of mental illness and by continuing mental health education programs crucial to preventing mental health problems.

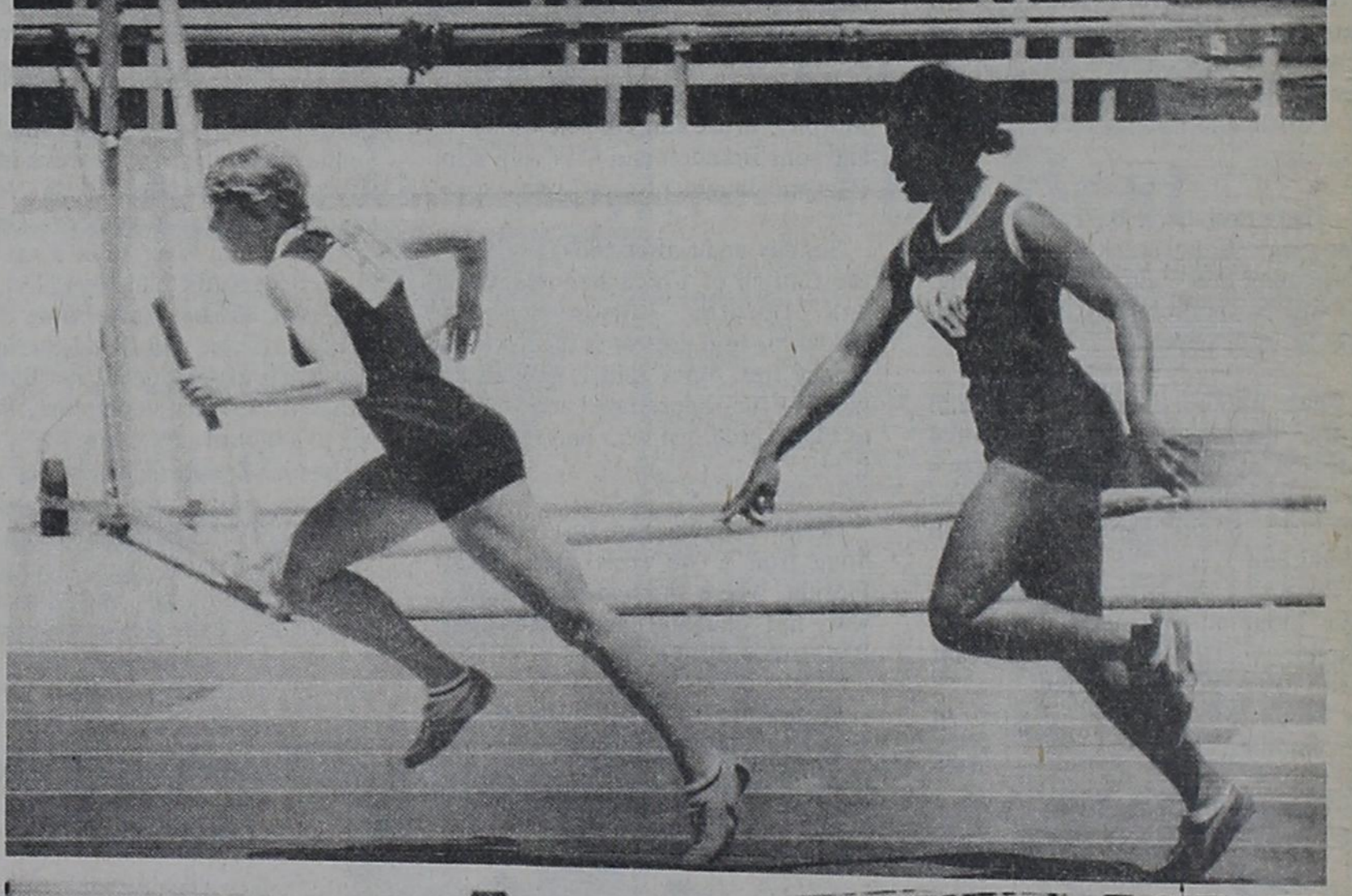
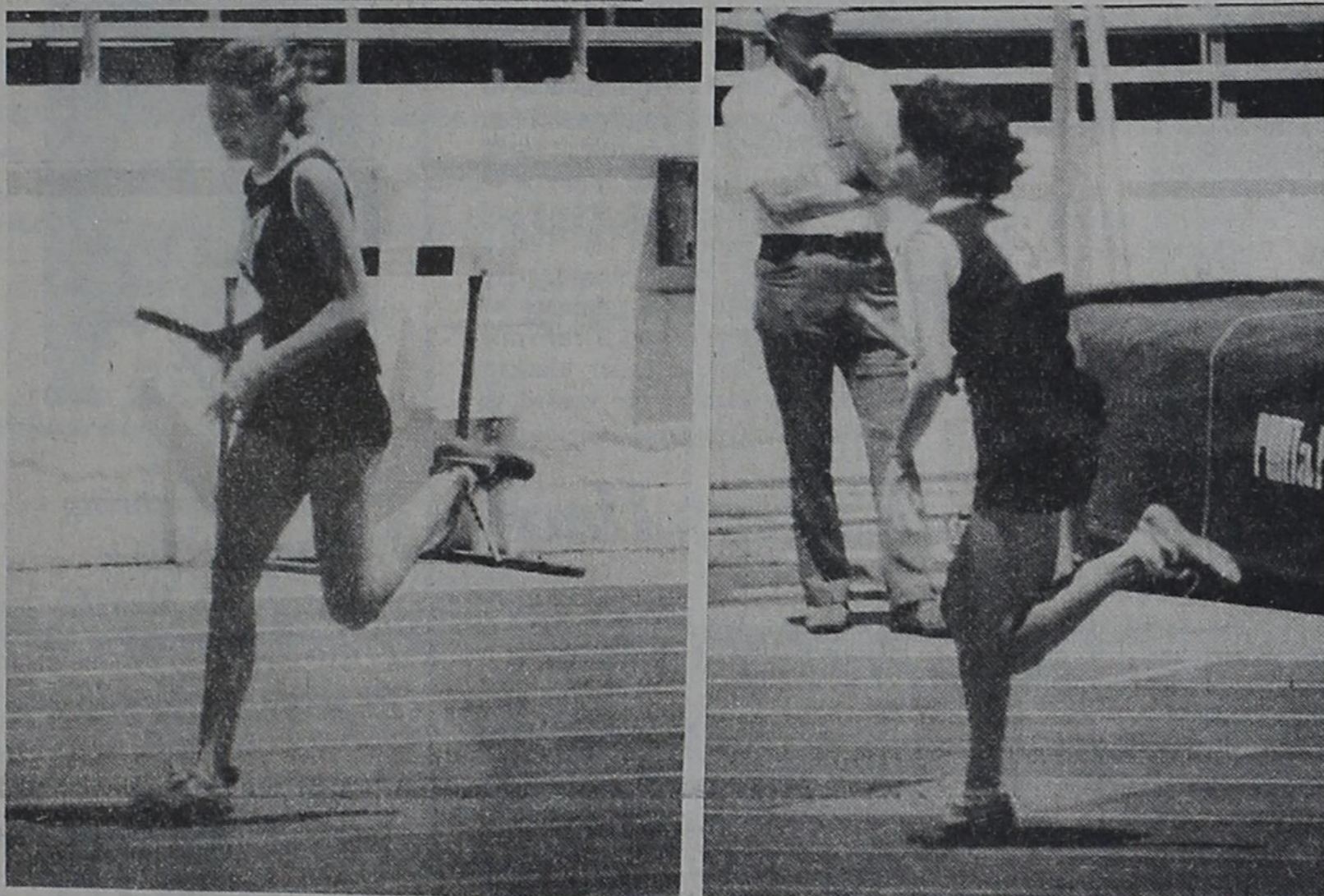
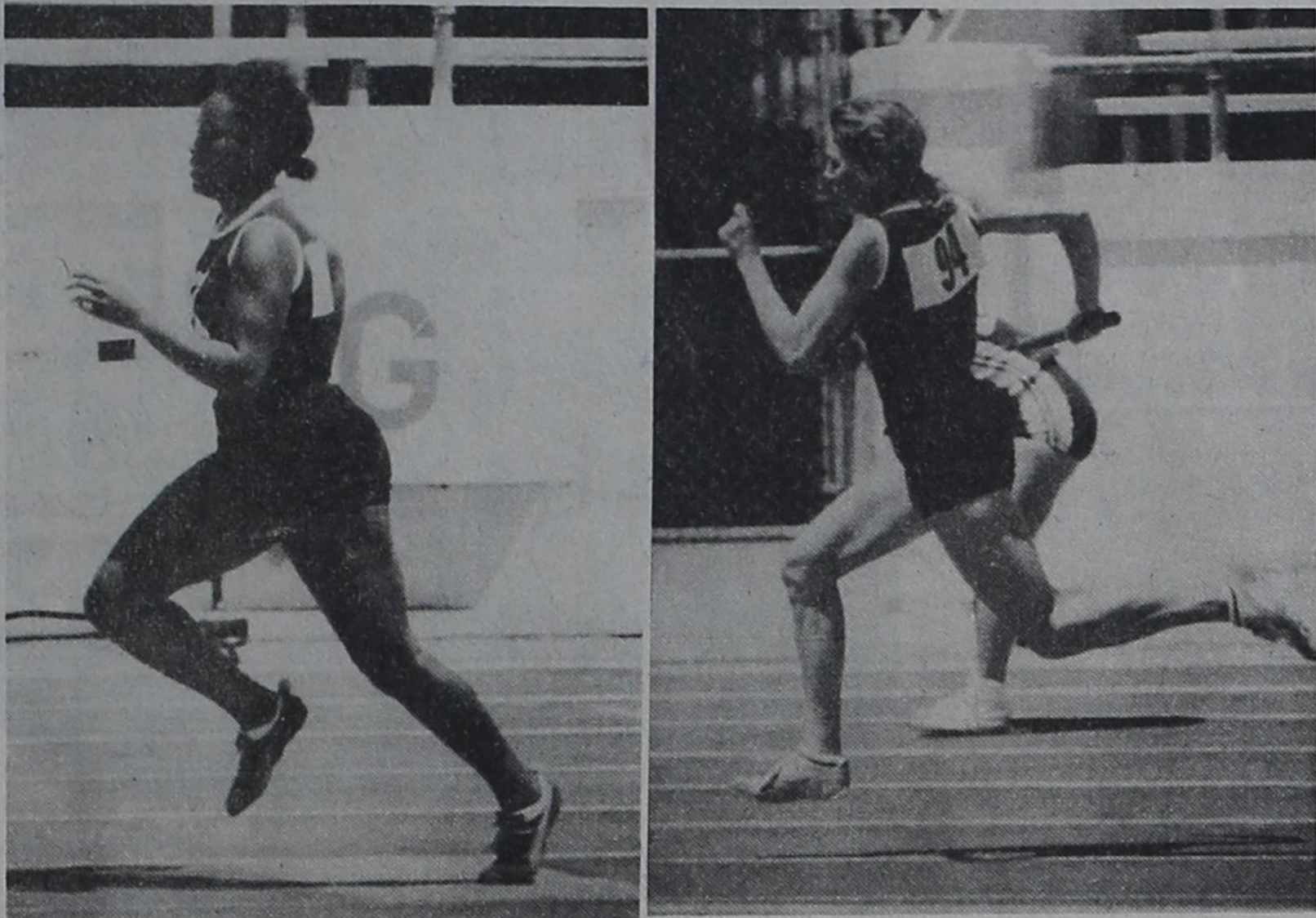

# Scooter's Scoops

Mrs. Amos Steelman called me the other day and was telling me about the barn swallows that migrate each year to their farm which is about two miles south of Bovina, and she said they spend the summers there and leave then return the next summer.

A few years ago, Dan True, who was a weather forecaster in Amarillo gave a report on these little birds and some of you may have heard him. He said it has only been in the past few years that they have migrated to this part of the country.

The barn swallow is a small graceful bird with long powerful wings and small weak feet suited only for perching. Their backs are the color of steel-blue with chestnut-colored breast and a deeply forked tail. They have a wide mouth adapted to catching flying insects which make up nearly all their food. They travel as much as 10,000 miles in yearly migration.

Mrs. Steelman said they have been coming to their farm for about seven years now and they build their nests under the eaves of their house out of mud and grass.

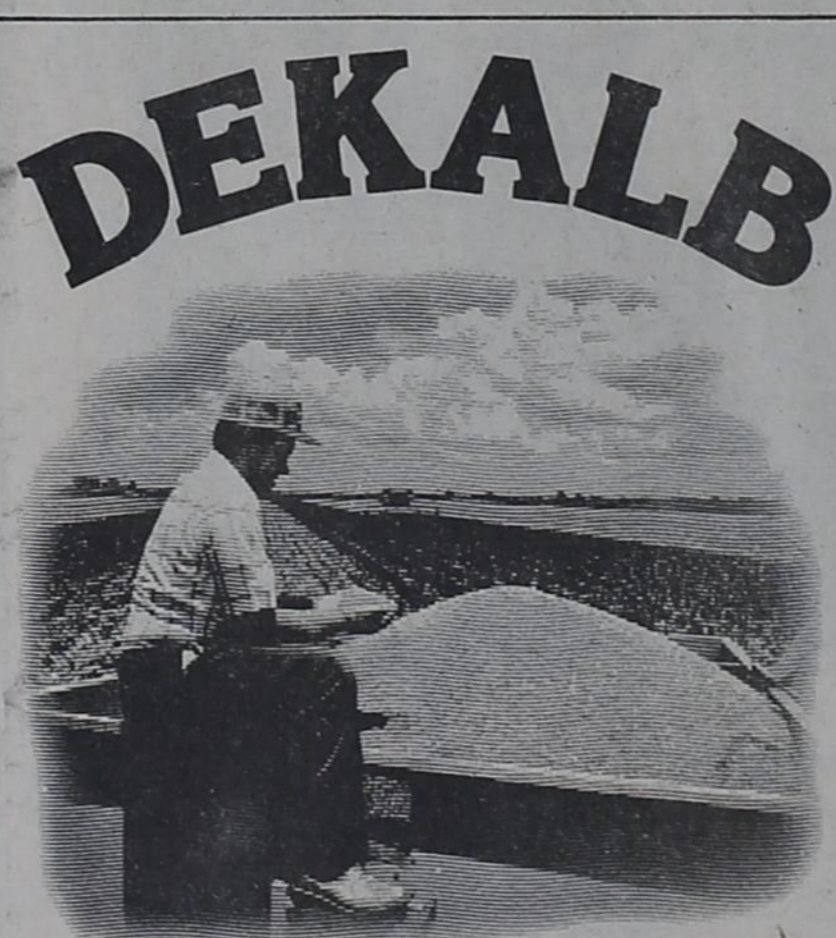

# Legal Notice

The Board of Trustees of Bovina Independent School District has awarded a contract to L.L. Jacobs and Associates of Amarillo to appraise all properties in the Bovina Independent School District for the tax year 1979.

The Board of Trustees made this decision after reviewing the laws passed by our legislators in the special session of the legislature.

Laws were passed requiring local fund assignments to be based on market value as determined by the Governor's Education Resources and in the new school finance bill "Senate Bill No. 1," which in part provides or the withholding of state funds, if a School District does not maintain equal and uniform values

that are reasonably close to market value. The state will provide inspectors to check records and see if School Districts are following the guide lines they have set out.

The Board of Equalization and L.L. Jacobs and Associates will work together in establishing values. This should result in a fair and equal value on all properties and meet state guide lines.

L.L. Jacobs and Associates will provide three (3) appraisers for field work. All three have their Texas Real Estate License, License issued by Board of Tax Assessors Examiners, and two (2) are members of The American Association of Certified Appraisers, Inc.

These men will inspect, measure, class and grade all improvements in the School District, as well as classify all land.

A city map will be used as a guide for urban property as to location, condition and type of street. (Dirt, all weather, paved and paved curb and gutter.)

Aerial photographs will be used to denote use and grade of land. Farm and pasture

land will have six separate grades from "1" being the best grade to "6" the lowest grade. The classification of lands will be based on the general guidelines of the Soil Survey made by Soil Conservation Service. The grade will depend on soil, slope and crop production. Irrigation will apply to the amount of land that can be irrigated with the water available. Not all 8" discharge pipe has a full 8" capacity. We will try to contact the owner or operator to establish the amount of irrigation water that is available from each well. If we are unable to make contact with the owner or the operator, they can take the information to the Bovina School Tax Office and they will pass the information on to L.L. Jacobs and Associates.

When the appraisers are doing the field work they will ask questions about the improvements, such as the number of baths, inside finish, type of floors, heating and cooling system etc. The appraiser does not have to enter the house, but will come in at our invitation to inspect a fault you wish to

call to his attention. They will measure the improvements from the outside to the nearest foot and square the house before leaving the property. The appraiser will not have the information as to value while in the field.

When L.L. Jacobs and Associates have all the information transferred to work sheets and final value has been established, each property owner will be notified by mail as to the appraised value of his property, and a time and place he can meet with the appraisers to discuss his property value and make comparisons of other property if he so desires. If he feels his property is not in equalization he will be able to go before the Board of Equalization for final disposition.

L.L. Jacobs and Associates welcome any and all information from the owners and the appraisers will be cooperative in all matters.
