## FROM OLD MAN HEARE

1905 Wichita St. Austin, Texas  
November 13, 1919.  
My Dear Comrades of the Never-Sweat Club of Miami, Texas.  
Your beloved President is now in Austin, the capital city of this great state, and a very suitable place to spend the winter. The City is surrounded by dense groves and thickets of cedar, live oak, prickly pear, and negroes, which protect it from the cold winds. Also the prices of goods help to keep you warm. The Colorado River and some dry branches flow by the city and empty their turbulent waters into some lake or bayou, or possibly in the Gulf of Mexico.

Three railroads have penetrated into this town, and I suppose go out again—the Katy, I & G. N., and H. & T. C. they are called. Also there are street cars and a good many automobiles here and good walking in many places.

The Governor lives here; also his wife. The big Capitol Building that we got for three million acres of land is here, and it is still standing. It is a nice looking house. The State University is here, and the biggest drove of young men and young ladies that I ever saw in one school. Our Miami boys and girls look cute, and have a penetrating look out of their eyes that indicates metaphysical acuteness.

Mrs. Cunningham is covering herself with glory by mothering our Miami boys. Her good cooking appeals to their ideals of greatness and their belts have to expend several notches during each meal. Did you ever see a schoolboy that was hungry?

Food articles are almost free here. Eggs are only 60c per dozen; butter only 75c per pound, beefsteak only 35c per pound, and other articles equally as cheap. As Mrs. Heare and your President came down here on the train I saw a man across the aisle chewing thick plug tobacco, and he looked so happy I asked him for a "chaw." He told me that he sold several bales of cotton for 45c per pound. I just chawed on awhile and then I told Mrs. Heare what he said. She fainted. But upon regaining her equilibrium she meekly remarked:

"Well, I'll just have to buy silk for work aprons. That will be cheaper than cotton."  
The Texas Legislature doesn't meet this winter unless called in special session by the Governor and me to try to hold down the price of eggs and other soaring commodities. In my way of thinking, these airplanes must have some influences on upward tendencies.

I need the advice of Uncle Bob Talley, Dave Lard, Bill Mathers, Jack Mead, and other faithful members to help me formulate resolutions demands that will bring things back to earth.  
The Governor has net called on me yet, but when he does I'll tell you all about it.

## BETTER BE CAREFUL AT P. O.

Of late, some malicious devilment has been going on among the unlocked boxes at the local postoffice. Several pieces of mail has been taken out and destroyed, and already some parties are being suspected and we might call the attention of the public to the following penalty of the postal laws: "That whosoever shall willfully or maliciously injure, tear down or destroy any letter box, or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail, or on any mail route, or shall break open the same, or shall willfully or maliciously injure, deface or destroy any mail deposited therein, or shall willfully take or steal such mail from or out of such letter box or other receptacle, or shall willfully aid or assist in any of the afore mentioned offenses, shall, for every such offence, be punished by a fine of not more than \$1,000 or by imprisonment for not more than three years."

The penalty you note is pretty severe, and it applies to all, whether children or grown ups.

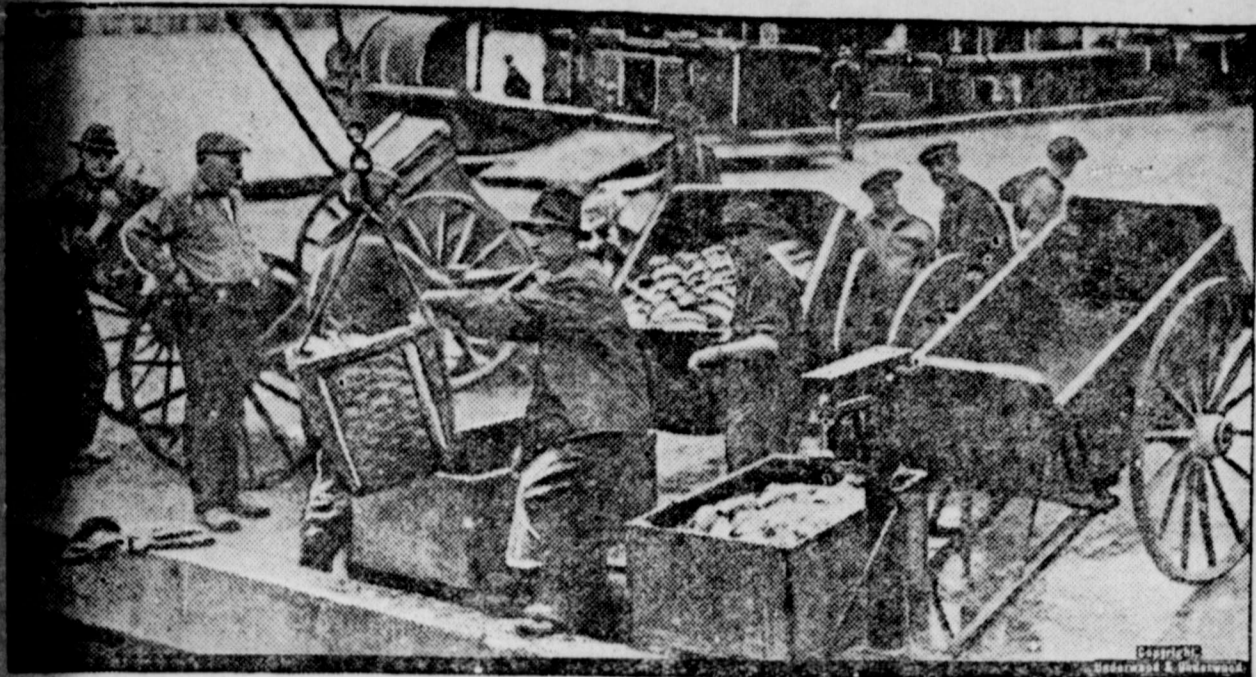

## Bag Many Wild Animals in West

#### Government Inspectors Kill Coyotes, Wolves, Lynxes and Mountain Lions.

#### HUNTERS ELIMINATE PESTS

#### Stockmen Are Delighted With Reductions Made in Wild Animal Plague in the Last Three Years—Cause of Heavy Losses.

Washington, D. C.—Wild, predatory animals in the West have had a hard time this summer. Government hunters reporting to the bureau of biological survey tell of great slaughter of the animals and some incidents where it almost was the other way round. Uncle Sam's bag of coyotes, wolves, mountain lions and lynxes cannot be counted yet, but enough data has come to hand to show that it will be a big one.

One of the most interesting narratives of this exciting business comes from E. F. Pope, an inspector of the service stationed in New Mexico. To give encouragement and assistance to the hunters located on ranches where their work is most needed, Mr. Pope has traveled two thousand miles in that state.

Stockmen Are Pleased. "Almost everywhere," he writes, "I found stockmen delighted with reductions made in the wild animal plague in the last three years. They say that from an economic standpoint it is one of the most far reaching and sensible undertakings the government has yet attempted. Among the stockmen are the Fullerton brothers, who have extensive sheep ranges on the St. Augustine plains west of Magdalena. Ever since they started they have suffered heavy animal losses from depredations of coyotes and wildcats, especially during the lambing season.

#### HEADS WOMEN DEMOCRATS



Mrs. George Bass of Chicago, former president of the Chicago Women's club, has been given the highest position offered by the Democratic party to the women of the country. She is chairman of the women's national committee of the Democratic party.

"Last winter one of our hunters was assigned to these ranges. He was handicapped by heavy snows and bad weather, but he got so many of the brutes that he virtually eliminated the pests from this section. A new hunter was assigned to the infested ranch of Edward Otero not far away. While waiting for him I set a line of twelve traps and distributed two hundred poison baits. My catch was five old coyotes, one of which was killed with a rifle at long range. A few days after his arrival the new hunter got two more coyotes and a brace of wildcats in the vicinity. For some time before that from three to six lambs had been lost every night. In ten days the hunter could find no more of the animals and moved to a neighboring ranch.

Old Ones Are Wary. "There are many instances where the younger and less shy coyotes and cats have been taken during the winter by fur hunters, leaving the older and more wary animals alive. These do the killing and keep the ranches paying toll to their kind. I have notes in my field diary describing the work of the old coyote which I have mentioned as having been killed with the rifle. This fellow bore evidence of having been previously caught in a trap from which he got away. Thinking to escape again he made the effort resulting in his death. It often requires more time and effort to destroy this sort of coyote than it takes to get the younger ones, but the value of the results obtained is very much greater."

to build up large herds or flocks under the constant onslaughts of beasts of prey. The elimination of the pests is giving them encouragement and increasing their sheep and cattle. Game animals with the passing of their enemies also are getting more numerous. "We have records," says Mr. Pope, "of antelope being constantly seen in timbered sections from which wolves, lions and cats have been eradicated, the deer, no doubt, having become aware that their dread foes no longer are there to spring upon them from cover. It is my own observation that wild game in some sections of the state is increasing under protective measures now being taken."

## Officer Explains Red Cross Sales

#### Only Perishable, Second Hand and Surplus Stock Being Disposed of.

#### WORKING IN 17 COUNTRIES

#### Shipment of Further Relief Material From the United States to Europe Continues in a Large Way—One-Third to France.

Paris.—Because many inaccurate reports of large sales of American Red Cross merchandise have appeared in the last few weeks, Red Cross headquarters in Paris has issued a statement explaining that the only materials which have been sold are certain perishables, second hand equipment, surplus stocks and articles which can no longer be used for direct relief work, either in France or in Eastern Europe.

The total sales of surplus and second hand material by the American Red Cross in Europe will aggregate not more than 30,000,000 francs, says the Red Cross, while the value of the relief material distributed in Europe during July and August alone amounted to more than 100,000,000 francs.

Work in 17 Countries. The American Red Cross is now conducting operations in seventeen European countries. The relief material distributed in France, mainly in the devastated districts, since the armistice, is valued at more than 125,000,000 francs, while in the same period other European countries have received more than 29,000,000 francs' of similar supplies, including not only medical and surgical material, but also clothing, food, barracks, etc.

Such sales as have been authorized in France have been conducted through the American Red Cross liquidation board. The official statement says regarding this material: "Unexpectedly heavy expenses of work in Poland and the Balkan states, and the beginnings of new relief ac-

tivities in western and southern Russia made it advisable to turn these stocks into cash to assist the relief programs, as well as to save certain of the accumulated stocks from total loss.

#### Supplies Still Come.

"Of all the relief material in the American Red Cross warehouses on May 1, one-third was set aside for distribution in the devastated districts of France. The distribution of this material is still continuing, and will continue for months to come, while the shipments of relief material to the commissions in eastern Europe are on a constantly increasing scale, and will continue for many months.

"In the meantime the shipment of further relief material from the United States continues in a large way, and we have recently received notice from America of the early shipment of supplies valued at 40,000,000 francs."

#### BLACK HAWK IS IN MUSEUM

#### Bones of Famous Indian Chief Are Placed in Glass Case in the Desert Museum in Utah.

Salt Lake City.—The bones of Chief Black Hawk, who played havoc with settlers in Utah in the early 60's, now rest peacefully in the Desert Museum in the Mormon temple grounds.

The skeleton was brought from an Indian burial ground near Spring Lake Villa, Utah county, this state, and with all accoutrements of Indian burial, now reposes in a glass case.

From veterans of raids made by Black Hawk's bands, it is declared the Black Hawk wars of Utah began in 1864, when a small band of Indians suffered an epidemic of smallpox and blamed the white settlers for it.

#### Blind Peddler Weds Widow.

Litchfield, England.—A widow of 80 and a blind peddler aged 50 were married here. Both parties were assisted by the steps of the registry office. The bridegroom apologized for the bride's infirmity, remarking that she was not so nimble as she used to be.

## SIMPLICITY AND BEAUTY IN DAINY NEGLIGEEES



The average woman may have little use for very elaborate negligees, but for daintiness, loveliness of color and simplicity she has an instinctive longing. These always appeal to her and specialists in the manufacture of negligees understand this—so that the bulk of their output combines just these elements. "Negligee" is a term that includes a very wide variety of garments—inspired by the garb of many peoples—for it is in the seclusion of home that women may indulge themselves in the fanciful. Japan and China contribute much and we have interpreted their ideas to suit ourselves besides buying generously of their productions. France is an inexhaustible source of inspiration and we use its wonderful creations all the time, adopting and adapting ideas according to our own needs.

Our needs demand at least ten negligees that are simple and pretty, daintily made in lovely colors, to one that is elaborate.

Morning jackets and coats of taffeta silk in gay colors, to be worn with lace-trimmed petticoats are popular, because they embody the things we like best, and negligees of the character of the two shown here are in constant demand. All these appear in

flower-like colors—pink, rose, blue, yellow, lavender, light and vivid greens, occasionally cerise and rich reds. Imagine the negligee shown at the left of the picture in any of these lovely colors and you will find yourself deciding as to which one would suit you best. In this model a long close-fitting and plain slip of box-plaited crepe-de-chine is the easiest thing that ever was to slip into. Over it there is a short kimono-like jacket—a slip-over garment—with scalloped edge buttonhole with embroidery silk, and small sprays of embroidered flowers scattered over it. It could hardly be simpler—or prettier.

The negligee at the right has a straight under-slip of charmeuse satin with a long-draped overgarment of the same material edged with lace. The material is gathered at the shoulders and sides and arranged in a drape that widens at the hips and narrows toward the bottom. It has the effect of a long coat with ribbon that ties across the front below the waistline, to confine it, but this is a one-piece negligee easy to get into and as pretty as any one can ask for. Autumn brides will be interested in these fine examples of American designing and so will every other woman who has eyes to see them.

## FARM ANIMALS

#### EXTRA FEED FATTENS CATTLE

#### Cottonseed Cake as Supplement to Summer Pasture Increases Materially Rate of Gains.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Feeding cottonseed cake to steers as a supplement to summer pasture increases materially the rate of gains made by the animals, causes them to finish more quickly and take on a higher degree of finish, and increases the margin between the buying and selling prices, specialists of the United States department of agriculture say in Bulletin 777, just published by the department. The bulletin is a report of experiments in fattening steers on summer pasture conducted co-operatively by the department and the Alabama experiment station in 1912 and 1913, and the Mississippi experiment station, in 1915 and 1916.

All the experiments were carried out under actual and typical farm conditions. Consequently the results may be applied directly in many regions to the management and feeding of cattle on pasture. In each experiment, groups of steers were kept on pasture alone; on pasture with a supplementary feed of one-half corn chop and one-half cottonseed cake; and on pasture with a supplementary feed of cottonseed cake. The average daily gains for each animal, which may be considered the most valuable standard in judging the efficiency of rations, were 1.49 pounds for the steers getting pasture only; 1.83 pounds for the steers getting cottonseed cake with pasture; and 1.53 pounds for those on pasture supplemented by the mixture of cake and corn chop.

The initial cost of the steers per 100 pounds of the three groups was the same for any one year, but in each case the steers on pasture alone sold for a lower price. The margins between the buying and selling prices of the cattle were always in favor of those which were fed supplements with their pastures. The margins averaged less than 25 cents a hundred pounds for the steers on pasture alone, compared to 90 cents for animals which were fed cottonseed cake with pasture, and 81½ cents for the animals whose pasture was supplemented with the mixture of cake and corn chop. After the animals had been

butchered inspection showed that the steers which were fed cottonseed cake or a mixture of cake and corn with pasture dressed out higher than the cattle which had pasture alone.

While the steers that had pasture alone made gains cheaply, the total gains were not large, and the steers did not take on a high finish. Their unfinished condition is reflected in the small margin on which they were sold and low dressing percentages. Thus the profits they returned were smaller than for the steers in the other two groups.

The cost of gains of steers on pasture is greatly increased by feeding cottonseed cake, it was found, but the better market price received for caked cattle usually pays for the additional cost of feeding cake, and returns a greater average profit than is realized on the grass-fed cattle. One of the distinct advantages of supplementing pastures for concentrates is the fact that steers so handled can be finished more quickly and can be marketed earlier than steers getting grass alone. Thus the cattle can be sold before the rush of grass-fed cattle glut the market and depresses prices. Moreover, when cattle are marketed early, the pastures have time to recuperate and furnish good grazing for other stock during the fall.

There is only one case, says the bulletin, when pasture alone is preferable to pastures with concentrates. Steers of inferior quality may return more profit by grazing alone than by grazing with the addition of supplementary feeds, especially when they are on good pastures that are cheap. Scrub steers do not respond readily to the use of good feeds, and even when well finished do not command satisfactory prices in competition with well-bred cattle similarly finished. The better the quality of the steers, the safer it is to give them high-priced feeds.

#### Sheep Need Much Water.

An impression prevails that sheep can get along without water for long periods, but this is wrong. The sheep is no relation to a camel. They should have access to plenty of fresh, clean water.

## Hats That Interpret Autumn



If, in all the varied styles in millinery, there is a single point in common, it is that fall hats interpret the season. They are rich, brilliant, generously trimmed, many of them superb and unusual, and they are refined.

Three ultra-smart examples pictured in the group above may have been selected as exponents of the mode, but three hats selected at random would probably convey the same ideas. The hat at the right of the group is made of black satin ribbon, bordered with gold. The barrette is mounted to a band of plain satin ribbon, overlaid with two rows of gold-edged ribbon, and this same ribbon makes the plaited pompon at the left. Worn with this hat is an overblouse of silk voile made to match the hat by the addition of a collar and wide band of the embroidered ribbon. This hat might be named October.

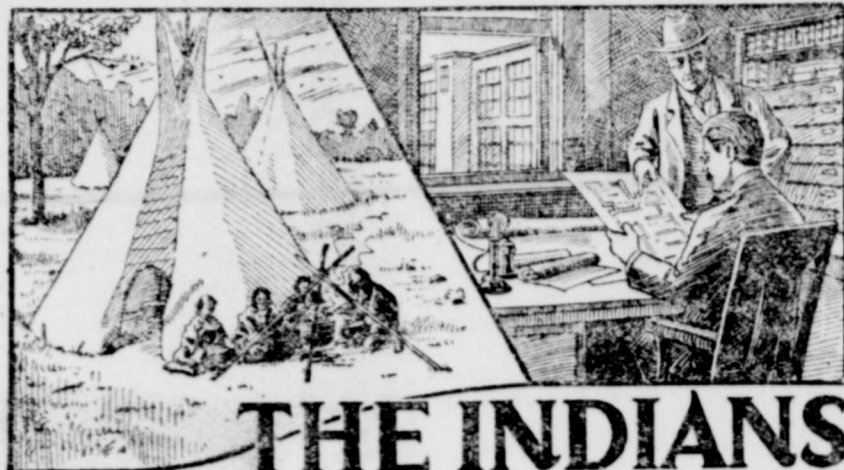

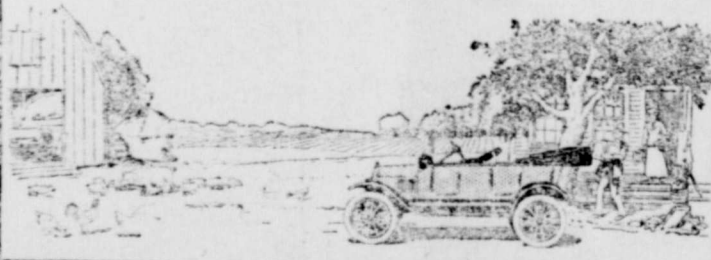
