#### Farm Live Stock

CAN RID SHEEP OF INSECTS

Irritation Causes Animals to Pull Their Wool and Thus Injure Fleece-Use Any Dip.

Dipping is the only practical way to rid sheep of ticks and lice, say experienced sheep men, who further point out that lice cause sheep to pull their wool and thus injure the

Bad as ticks are, lice are said to be even more dreaded. Sometimes it is even difficult to find them. If a sheep has pulled its wool badly, however, and the farmer looks closely at the skin over the spots where the wool. is most disturbed, he will likely find small black specks which at first he may take for timothy seeds or chaff. As he watches them closely, however, he will see that they move.

After the sheep has been shorn it should be dipped. The lambs also, as

soon as they are of any size, may be given the same treatment. In order that the sheep may go into winter quarters in good condition and free from ticks, it is well to dip again in the fall. "Why, you know, your little boy.

Any of the well-known dips are satisfactory, say the sheep men at the New York state college of agriculture, but whatever one is selected it is important to follow directions closely, they point out. Dips are of two kinds, the powder dips and the socalled coal-tar dips.

He did not have many bills but the wad of silver dollars he had in that old wallet made the most unwighter bulk. I had ever seen any attempt to carry in a trouser pocket and was almost impossible to conceal. He had decided that the negroes had discovered it and believe they were planning to rob him. This fear was greathy increased when we were shown to our room, which was on the first floor, and found the windows up and held with some patent catch which he was not able to release. He was gone quite a while then we heared him coming again, and around and around they went all night long, and as strange as it now appears it never once occured to use through all those long hours that it was

just the usual negro guard that was on duty there each night.

Business was good the next day and the wallet continued to grow, and not having a chance to exchange any silver fer bills he decided to stop with a family he knew that night. It was almost dark when we came to the neat brick house and much to our disappointment found is occupied by strangers who had recently bought the place. They invited us to stop for the night and there was little else we could do but accept the invitation, however, on entering the house the atmosphre appeared homelike and inviting.

They soon noticed that we were sleepy and tired and showed us to our room. Not long after we retired we heared the family assamble in a room near by and then heared the father as he read softly though distinctly a familiar Psalm. Then we could hear him as called to prayer and invoked the blessings of The Heavenly Father upon his household and his protecting care for the night, then we heared him as he fervently commended the strangers that were within his gates to the care and keeping of The Almighty


