



KEEP PUREBRED LIVE STOCK

North Dakota Farmer Eliminates Runts by Liberal Feeding and Proper Management.

(Prepared by the United States Depart-

ment of Agriculture.) To obtain the most rapid growth and best development of live stock keep good stock, and see that nothing checks its growth from the time it is born. This is the method by which a North Dakota farmer prevents runts among his animals.

In a letter on this subject to the United States Department of Agriculture, which has been studying the causes and prevention of undersized

animals, he says, "In the 40 years of my farming and breeding and raising live stock of all kinds I do not remember a runt in any class or breed. I have always been a liberal feeder and a good caretaker. Besides, all stock had access to good, fresh water at all times. With this, in addition to good shelter and ventilation, it seems that my young stock would not stop growing from the time they were born. Use good judgment in feeding, and don't neglect the details."

A farmer in Vermont writes, "A well-bred animal well cared for will not produce runts. There is absolutely no excuse for one in live stock or poultry. By well-bred live stock I mean strong, healthy stock, well taken care of for several generations, and bred for constitution. This has been my experience from boyhood, first, with rabbits and game fowls, and later with sheep, hogs, horses and cattle. An accident to a well-bred and healthy animal will, if the accident occurs before it reaches maturity, affect its size but not its productive capacity. That is, it will not influence its ability to produce such young as it would have had if no accident had occurred. Eliminate all females that are not good mothers, and you will soon stamp the whole herd with constitution. Then with care, which means attention and feed, your runts will fail to materialize."

ONLY BEST PUREBREDS SOLD

Some Breeders Insist That Every Animal They Buy or Sell Must Pass Standard.

So strongly has the purpose of the better-sires campaign, now being conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture, appealed to some breeders that they are not content with purebreds only, but every animal they buy or sell in addition to being a purebred must pass a standard of excellence. The methods of one breeder in Upshur county, West Virginia, according to a report received by the department, illustrate this tendency. This breeder has a fine herd of Angus cattle. All calves which fall below the standard of excellence that he has set are not registered, but are either castrated or sold on the open market as common cattle.

GIVE EWES NUTRITIOUS FEED

Animals Entitled to Liberal Treatment While Carrying Young and Growing Wool.

After the ewes are bred they are growing their young, growing a crop of wool, maintaining their own body and should be fed accordingly. Give the ewes enough good, nutritious feed to keep them in a good healthy, thrifty condition. Where pasture is abundant, they will need no other feed, as green feed is the natural and best feed for sheep.

BROOD SOWS NEED EXERCISE

Good Plan to Compel Animal to Come Out of Sleeping Quarters for Her Daily Feed.

Brood sows need exercise to avoid becoming too fat at farrowing time. Exercise can be forced on the sow.by forcing her to come out for feed instead of feeding close to the sleeping

IMPROVED ROADS

LARGER REVENUE FOR ROADS

Tendency Toward Devoting Increased Portion of Motor Vehicles Tax to Highways,

(Prepared by the United States Depart-ment of Agriculture)
For a number of years the general tendency toward devoting an ever-increasing portion of the motor-vehicle revenues to road work under the control and direct supervision of the state highway departments has been very noticeable. Prior to 1912 only a very small portion of the motor-vehicle registration was devoted to this purpose. In 1920, 76 per cent of the revenue, or \$77,531,582,57, was applied to road work under the direct supervision of the state highway departments, and in addition \$20,465,578.04 was applied to road work by counties or other local supervision, but with little or no direct supervision from the state highway departments.

In most states the motor-vehicle revenues are devoted to maintenance and repair of the state roads or other improved highways. These states seem to have solved fairly well the difficult problem of securing funds for the maintenance of the more important roads under the ever-increasing traffic requirements. As both the traffic and the revenues increase with the number of cars, there apparently exists a possibility of so adjusting the registration rates as to keep pace with the ever-growing maintenance charges.

A number of the states having in general but a small mileage of improved roads have recently adopted the plan of capitalizing the motorvehicle revenues and devoting these funds to road construction. The states doing this are Illinois, Maine, Minnesota, Missouri, Nevada, Utah, and Wyoming. In them bonds have been voted or issued for road construction, and the principal, in some instances also the interest, is to be paid entirely from the motor-vehicle

At the beginning of 1921 there were still seven states in which motor trucks were registered at the same rate as passenger cars, but in recent years there has been a very decided tendency in most states to increase the fees required for motor trucks over and above those required for passenger cars. This increase is usually based on the weight of the truck and its carrying capacity, its horse-power, or a combination of these factors. The most general practice seems to be toward definitely limiting the maximum total road weight of the vehicle and basing the registration fee

on the capacity of the truck. Some few states have adopted a scale of to make the operation of very heavy trucks impracticable.

In Colorado, New York, and Oregon, in addition to the registration fees, a state tax on gasoline or other products used for the propulsion of motor vehicles is also levied. In some states motor cars are taxed as personal property in addition to the required registration fees. In Alabama, Delaware, Idaho, Iowa, Michigan, New Hampshire, New York, Carolina, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Vermont, the registration fees are in lieu of all personal property taxes.





Gateway to Vast Empires.

"Very few people appreciate that prope and Asia meet at the feet of constantinople," continued Mr. Thom-"The chain of waters, the Daranelles, the Sea of Marmora and the osphorus, made available for free mmerce, open the gateway to vast pires of populous and fertile terriories beyond. When we realize that ssia, a country considerably more than twice as large as the United tates, has few seaports that are not bound for the greater part of the war, except those situated on the Black sea, we may imagine what mous traffic will flow through Continople when Russia, with a huned million of her people nearby, into her commercial stride."

Then consider Roumania, now with e her former area-a country of at natural resources, with a prespopulation of 15,000,000. the past. Has Natural Wealth.

"Both Jugo-Slavia and Greater eece will hold a more important sition than now in the Levantine trade of the future. Egypt is growing into a land of commercial significance. While certain territories have been detached from Turkey since the war, there remains much fertile and valuable land. Turkey is rich in minerals of all kinds.

"The war and its aftermath upset exchange throughout the Near East, and this has made commercial transactions difficult for the present. But the natural wealth is there; and a population for the most part industrious. Trade must surely grow.

"A high official of an international bank, one who is recognized as having unusually broad and accurate knowledge of Ottoman financial matters, stated to me at Constantinople that in Turkey fully 65,000,000 in gold is hoarded by the people in 'stocking-leg banks,' and not deposited at all with the public bankers. In this connection it should be remembered that the oriental mind is accustomed to think, financially, in terms of 'hard money, and that prior to the European war only gold and silver were in circulation, to any extent, in Turkey. There is evidence that great private wealth exists there today, in gold, silver and jewels, not to mention other valuables, and this wealth will come into the current market as trade returns to

"The Levant offers a splendid op-Portunity for the investment of American capital, in a wide range of enterprises. One of the great openings of the present is for the construction of dwellings, warehouses, harbor improvements, and so forth. Constantihople alone has lost 25,000 to 30,000 houses by fire since the war began, and affords a magnificent opportunity for housebuilding activity. I know for a fact that the Turkish authorities would welcome anyone coming there for the purpose and that they would even be glad to offer concessions. The prevailing spirit is progressive. Modern industrial equipment, too, is now sought where formerly it was shunned. I recall that a long time ago, prior to the coming into power of the Young Turk party, a business cablegram was intercepted by the Turkish authorities because it contained an offer to import some electric dynamos capable of '1,500 revolu-

tions per minute.' The wily adviser of Abdul Hamid is said to have thrown up his hands at the suggestion and remarked with some heat that Turkey had enough revolutions on her hands at the moment without encouraging these new-fangled trouble-raisers.'

Opportunities Are Great. "Constantinople now has an inadequate system to provide substantial barbor craft for use in the waters around Constantinople. People living on the other side of the Bosphorus lack sufficient facilities for commuting to Constantinople.

"The development of roadways on the European side of the Bosphorus is another matter for business enterprise. If the Bosphorus is not the most beautiful body of water in the world, I should like to know where it is to be found. A proper driveway along the shores of the Bosphorus would rather tax the memory of a world-traveler to recall anything more charm-

"Opportunites for housebuilding and other forms of construction are open in the other cities of the Levant as well as in Constantinople. There is widespread need for railroad construction and rehabilitation; while at the seaports modern docks and wharves and up-to-date freight nandling equipment must be provided.

"The Levant should become a growing market for American machinery and manufactures of all kinds. Importations from the Levant must be stimulated, too, in order to improve the exchange and credit situation so that the Near East can buy more from America. Tobacco, licorice, valonia. attar of roses, raisins, currants, dates. figs, goatskins, hides, furs, olive oil. long-staple cotton, rugs, carpets, and oriental objets d'art are among the imports coming into the United States from the Levant. It will be the aim of the American chamber of commerce for the Levant to help establish trade connections between responsible merchants on either side of the ocean, and to furnish all possible information and assistance to those engaging in trade in this field."

"Persons desiring to make homestead entries," said Mr. Femrite, "should first fully inform themselves as to the character and quality of lands they desire to enter and should in no case apply to enter until they have examined each legal subdivision for which they make application. Satisfactory information concerning the lands may be obtained from a personal visit to the district in which one ing's special comwishes to take out land.

"Each applicant is required to swear a comprehensive that he is well acquainted with the character of the land described in his application and the only way that veterans, which he can assure himself that prior settlers have no claim is to make a Brig. Gen. Charles | personal inspection of same.

"An ex-service man is required to establish residence on the land involved after his entry is allowed, unless an extension of time is granted than two days, on account of sickness, climatic an inquiry into reasons or similar excuses. Credit is given for service in the Army, Navy or Marines, providing the applicant has had eighteen months of service. If such is the case, the applicant is required to live on the land only seven months. If he obtains so much credit for military service that there is required only one year's residence, he must prove only such amount of is considered as a great victory for cultivation as will prove his good faith as a homestead claimant. If his credit for service requires more than one year's residence, he must show cultivation to the extent of one-sixteenth of the area of the land beginning with the second year. Study of Park Shrubs Helpful.

It is a good plan to have some of the large shrubs in the corner of the lawn, and smaller ones in between should be in an irregular line, with a tall specimen here and there near the front, so the top line will not be too straight. By visiting parks a study can be made of the growing habits of the various shrubs. This will be found helpful in deciding what plants will be best suited for certain locations. You will avoid such mistakes as planting shrubs too close together and planting the wide spreading varieties too near the walk. Close planting may be practiced, but it is usually necessary to take up every other one within a few years. If plants are set near the walk it is often necessary to keep trimming them back every year.

Get Busy With Paint

"Sadly in need of paint" is the verdict that anyone must pass upon the houses that in an automobile trip he will see along town and country roads while the trees are still bare. The 'paint-up and clean-up" weeks that we had before the war we dropped for more urgent business and because of the high price of paint and labor. 
