**Touring Complicates Home Sales Problem**

They were discussing the housing problem—why more private builders haven't built new homes during the last few years, thus improving housing conditions and bringing jobs back to long-unemployed building craftsmen.

All the old considerations were threshed out the high cost of building materials and labor, low wages, high cost of lots and financing charges, and all the rest of it.

Then a very astute editor broke into the conversation. "I think the biggest factor in housing is not houses at all, but the automobile," he said.

He argued that a man with an average salary below \$1500 a year could not afford payments on both a house and an automobile. And that today this average man unable to have both, prefers the auto house.

The manner in which automobile sales of 1935 have stood up all year long at the highest point in several years gives strength to this idea.

It would seem that men re-employed and men beginning to "get out of the red" have been buying automobiles first, but not houses. Perhaps the houses will come later, but it seems to be getting established that the auto now comes first.

For in these days you can live in the car most of the time. Many a man chooses inferior housing plus a car in preference to a more comfortable home without one.

This was not said critically, but in an honest effort to determine whether new influences may not be at work on the housing situation which is only in recent months beginning feebly to revive.

The day is past when the automobile was considered a luxury. Under present conditions of life, it may well be thought of as a necessity to most men. Therefore, it is no use to bewail the change in taste. If it is a fact, it must be faced.

And the American way to face the issue is to work for establishment of such conditions that a man need not choose between a decent home and an automobile. The American way is to work for such a condition that he may have both. That way prosperity lies.

**Farm-City Conflict Flares Up Again**

One of the oldest of all problems, how to reconcile the interests of men who work on farms and those who work in factories, is coming to the front again.

Each group depends on the other, each buys the products of the other, and you would think their interests would be the same. But there has been, and is today, definite conflict of interests.

The current legal attack by processors on the AAA is the thing that has brought the question into relief. Here is a law taxing the consumer (through the processor as collector) to benefit farmers and give them the difference between low world prices for farm products and the prices that we believe an American standard requires.

The big industrial processors and distributors are now attacking this law as unconstitutional. Maybe it is. Time and the courts will tell.

But from Texas farmers who have benefited from the AAA program, comes a counter-attack. "All right," say they, "if you wreck the processing taxes which protect us from ruinous world competition, then we'll go out to wreck the tariffs that have protected you from world competition."

And of course the wages and jobs of American factory workers, as well as the profits of the manufacturers, have been protected by the tariff from foreign competition.

Thus the conflict. The farmers have always paid higher prices for clothing and tools, because they either paid the tariff on the imported kind or paid to American makers a price equal to the foreign price plus tariff. Now they say: you city people must pay prices for wheat and corn equal to the foreign price plus processing tax—or else.

The difference between tariff and processing tax is mainly this: the money collected in tariffs goes into the general treasury for the use of all. The money from processing taxes is paid directly to farmers for reducing crops. Thus there is apparently a difference in their standing before the Constitution.

But farmers are less interested in that than in the simple give-and-take aspect of the proposition. They literally believe that what's sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander.

This is the essence of the problem at stake in the present wave of processor suits against AAA, and in the counter-attack on industry starting in Texas.

The supreme court decision on NRA and its forthcoming decision on AAA may leave the essential problem untouched, except for a broader study of it than the American people have ever given it before.

Newspaper advertising, courtesy and quality goods get the business. Why not get more business?

Practically a one-animal zoo, the okapi combines features of the giraffe, zebra and deer, and is a native of Belgian Congo.

**Society Pools Data to Lift Polar Curtain**

NEW YORK—The American Polar Society, recently organized as a clearing house for Arctic and Antarctic information, has drawn its members from 18 states, England, France, Norway, Germany, Turkey and China. It proposes to band together all persons interested in Polar history and exploration.

Among the society's members are explorers who served with Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd, Sir Ernest Shackleton, Lincoln Ellsworth and the French explorer, Dr. Jean B. Charcot.

**Broad Work Outlined**  
The compilation of data, the chief work of the society includes: Geography—Oceanography, Polar Art.

History—Cosmic Ray Research, Motion Pictures.  
Biology—Geological studies, Cattle used in Polar Regions.  
Geophysics—Aurora Observations.  
Ice Studies—Gravity determina-

tions, Claims of nations, ships used and routes.  
Radio—Magnetic Soundings, Personnel Data.  
Seismology—Meteorological Studies, Collection of Maps, Polar Phenomena.  
Aviation—Terrestrial Magnetism, Fuel Consumption.  
Health Ultra Violet Studies, Base Construction.

Ellsworth, a trustee of the American Museum of Natural History, who will leave his chalet in Switzerland Aug. 24, for a flight to South America where he will rejoin his ship, the Wyatt Earp at Montevideo, for his third attempt to band the Antarctic Continent by air, has agreed to serve the society as a member of its executive board.

**Publication Is Issued**  
August Horowitz, Long Beach, N. Y., is acting as secretary of the society until its first election of officers in September. He also is editor of "The Polar Times," semi-annual publication. Associated with him as art editor is Herbert R. Loges, New York City. Horowitz and Loges have had experience in collecting and publishing polar news. For 18 months during the recent Byrd and Ellsworth Antarctic Expeditions they published a monthly newspaper, the

"Little America Times," for 250 friends and relatives of explorers with the Byrd and Ellsworth parties.

The society is collecting books, reports, maps and photographs relating to the Polar regions. It keeps in close touch with the Scott Polar Research Institute of Cambridge, England; the New Zealand Antarctic society; the Arctic Institute at Leningrad, U. S. S. R., and other groups throughout the world that are interesting in Polar affairs.

**Oxford Honor Due American**

OXFORD, Eng.—Fenton A. S. Gentry may be the first American to become president of athletics at Oxford University.

Gentry, who came from University of Virginia, has been in the Oxford squad as a shot-putter for the last two years, receiving his "blue" or letter when he competed against Cambridge University.

Gentry is a colonel in his own country and his nickname here is inevitably "The Colonel." He is extremely popular with the sporting fraternity.

He would fill the post held by A. G. Pilbrow, who graduates at the end of this year. K.S. "Sandy" Duncan, the athletics secretary, would normally take over from Pilbrow next year, but he is unable to do so, and the choice therefore falls on Gentry on seniority grounds.

Once before an American has held the position of honorary secretary. This was in 1934 when Charles Stanwood, specialist in triple victories from Bowdoin, was secretary to Jack Lovelock's presidency.

If Gentry is passed over, L. R. MacIntyre, the Tamsanian distance runner, or W. H. Elkins, Texas pole-vaulter, will be in the running.

**CCC Enrollments To Finish Oct. 1st**

AUSTIN.—Enrollment of 16,000 youths in Texas in civilian conservation corps will be completed within two months, Neal E. Guy, state enrollment supervisor, said today.

The first allotment will be 3,224, only 338 of whom will remain in Texas. Of the total, about 10,000 will be sent out of the state. The 16,000 will make the total of young Texans in CCC camps number almost 30,000.

Fifty-three CCC camps are now operated in the state, and 43 more are being constructed.
