Subscriptions to Be Increased On First of the Year





aswers to a questionnaire that offenses against corporate property hurt the conscience of young playmates, Results of the study showed that

before the age of 6, boys start with a tendency to seize whatever catches their fancy, Dr. Eberhart said. Boys in grammar school deoffenses more quickly than do igh school pupils. Younger boys, he explained, are

impulsive in judgment. Older boys make their "conscience" an intelectual task.

"It becomes less serious for the growing boy to ride on the streetcar for half-fare when he should pay full; to steal candy and cigarets from a box-car; and to sneak past the 'L' cashier without paying," Dr. Eberhart said.

The gravity of offenses listed in the psychologist's 20 questions varied from "swiping your moth-er's wrist watch and pawning it" to "borrowing your brother's baseball bat without asking."

Young boys and delinquents give fear of punishment as the reason for not being bad but those further developed realize the evil of their acts and give varied reasons for their judgments, Dr. Eberhart



20,000 Students Are Given Opportunity To Receive Jobs

AUSTIN. - Twenty thousand Texas boys and girls have been placed in schools or given an oppertunity to go to work, in two months by the National Youth Administration, Lyndon R. Johnson, tate director, said Tuesday night

in a radio address at Austin.
Of this number, 5,700 were given part-time jobs in all the eligible colleges and universities of Texas. Approximately 9,000 have been given jobs to help defray in-cidental expenses in high school. Freshman colleges centers are being opened to care for 750 high school graduates who did not enter college this fall. Two thousand young men and women from 16 to 25 have been called for work on WPA projects, in addition to the adult workers requisitioned, and NYA projects, designated exclusively for youth, are to be started

"The NYA is investing this money in actual, productive work," Johnson said. "It is work which is good for the young people who are doing it, and is of real permanent value to your city, your town, your county, the whole commonwealth of Texas.

Lax Society Fosters Warring Gangsters

Someone seems to have been turning the clock back on us. All this business from New York about gang murders, underworld syndicates, protection, and the like sounds as if it ought to have come out of Chicago in the pre-repeal era. It was the sort of thing that was going to fall apart of its own weight when prohibition was ended.

Well, it didn't fall apart. Annual turnover of underworld rackets in the nation's biggest city is close to half a billion dollars, according to Thomas E. Dewey, special prosecutor of the governor's anti-rackets investigation.

The New York police say there are 500,000 guns at the disposal of the Gotham underworld. Since August, 12 gangsters have been murdered, 20 have been wounded, three have been kidnaped, and four simply have vanished.

Here we have a struggle which, from the point of view of sheer size, is worthy of comparison with the Italo- him. Ethiopian War. The cash income at stake is larger than any return Mussolini can hope to milk out of the natural resources of Ethiopia. The number of firearms available seems to be quite as great as the number now being discharged on Ethiopian soil, and the casualty list is almost as impressive as that of Mussolini's armies.

All of this might have been foreseen. It should have been perfectly obvious that those well-organized, wellfinanced and utterly ruthless illegal organizations that waxed fat under the prohibition law were not simply going to lay away their guns and go back to honest toil when, the prohibition law ended.

If one racket failed, they would inevitably turn to another; they did so, and the warfare which culminated in the murder of Dutch Schultz is the natural result.

But to say that does not help much. The American people, who supposed that gangsterism was at last on the run, are shocked to learn that in New York, at least, it is as lawless and defiant as ever; and what they chiefly want to know is: What can be done about it?

The worst of it is that there is no simple, easy answer. In the last analysis, we have vicious gangs and gang wars because we have built up the kind of society in which such things can grow.

That is, we have tolerated corrupt politics, we have made "Does it pay?" the chief criterion of success, we have developed a fondness for the "open town" in which law-abiding citizens demand the right to buy the things which only the gangsters will sell to them, and we have let the doctrine that might makes right govern all too many of the activities of our economic life.

With such a background, big city gangs are inevitable. Until we change the background-until, in short, we reform our whole social setup-we can't hope to clean up our metropolitan underworlds.

Rep. Blanton Gives Advice to High School Boys of Abilene

Cong. Thomas L. Blanton of Abilene, in an address to the Abilene High school student body, declared the "United States learned its lesson in the World War and will not be drawn into the present maelstrom." Representative Blanton is not a pacificist although a strong advocate of peace. He is for war should war become necessary. For instance: "Our safest and surest way to keep out of war is for us to be able to whip the very devil out of any nation having a desire to attack us, and no nation is going to attack us if they know we are amply prepared to defend ourselves and repel all invasions.
