After an eighteen day voyage on the water, Star landed in Nev York City in January 1914, and shortly thereafter was employed as a shipping clerk in a paper bag factory. He remained with this pe sition until June 5th, 1917, when the urge to do his duty by his adopted country caused him to en list in the United States army for service in the World War. In view of the fact that his friends, as well as the recruiting officer, in formed him that he was still ar alien, and not subject in any manner to military service, Star insist ed on not claiming his legal exemption. He therefore enlisted and was assigned on December 6 1917 as a private in the 308th Field Hospital of the 77th Division at Camp Upton, New York. "Since I had had some clerical experience in the mercantile business in Rus sia, I enlisted as a clerk in the army of the United States," said Star in commenting on his experiences. "But could you imagine an office clerk in the army not being able to speak English?"

A thorough application to his job of soldiering, however, soon brought Star to a promotion of first class private. Matters moved along smoothly, and finally one day he was transferred to the Division Receiving Station where he assisted in taking care of several hundred recruits a day until the division was filled.

"One day," commented Star, "during the month of April 1918, after the rains had started to fall, my company left for a long hike with full pack. I contracted a cold and the next day I could hardly speak above a whisper, when the doctor examined me and sent me to the Base Hospital for a twentyfour hours rest and observation. I had been to the hospital only a few hours when the sergeant came and had me sign for my belongings and told me good bye, and that my outfit was leaving for France. It was hard to see all of my buddies and friends leave and to know that I could not go with them. I had cast my lot with my adopted country, and this last minute notice that I would not be able to go on account of unforseen circumstances pained me very much."

And of course, that virtually ended the war insofar as Private Star was concerned. He was later transferred to the 152nd Depot Brigade; thence to the army G. U. Clinic in charge of a Major Sanborn. Among other things. Private Star's duties while thus employed consistsed of field drill, first aid and medical lectures twice daily, and finally, the actual practice of
