Federal Tax Bill Of Motorists Is Greatly Increased

WASHINGTON. -- Motoris taxpayers dug deeper into their collective pockets in 1936 as special federal taxes imposed upon automotive products rose 14.2 per cent. The total federal automotive tax bill for 1936 was \$338,100,-126.56, an all-time high since the inception of these special taxes. The 1936 total was greater by \$42,013,146.30 than the 1935 to tal of \$296,086,980.26, according to Bureau of Internal Revenue reports received by the American

Petroleum Industries Committee. Chief factor in both the size of the tax bill and the large increas over the previous year was duplicating federal gasoline tax. This levy, imposed at the rate of cent per gallon, in 1936 cost otorists a total of \$186,321,448,-52. This amounted to 55 per cent of the total federal autom tive tax bill.

Compared with 1935 federal gasoline taxes last year increased \$14,057,967.65, accounting for approximately one-third of the to-Gasoline taxes last year enriched the federal treasury by better than \$5,000,000 more than in 1983, when the gasoline tax rate stood at 1 1-2 cents for half the





Museum Shows Surrealist Art

PHILADELPHIA-An exhibition of Surrealism—the latest thing in art-has been attracting considerable attention at the Philadelphia Museum of Art.

About 500 works of art, painted from the imagination of 150 Surrealists, arrived here recently from the Modern Museum of Art in New York City to be placed on exhibit at Philadelphia's art center.

This type art is a newcomer to circles where artists and critics gather to discuss art. The average citizen is hard put to find a definition for it.

According to Fiske Kimball, director of the museum, Surrealism supposed to represent a sort of 'Alice in Wonderland" in art. An other artist said that it is simply a dream of the artist put on canvas and might be considered in the same light as the "stream of Consciousness" writing.

Surrealism had its start early this century in Paris. A number of young painters and etchers decided that everything had been done in classic art and youth needed a new field. The result was that two-headed people, multi-legged cows on trapezes, and trains going forward in reverse, appeared on canvas.

Decorators and commercial artists were quick to sense that here was something new and useful. Merchandise displays and decorations soon began to feature Surrealism.

An example of the art seen at the preview of the exhibition was a wax foot with six toes and swollen ankles underneath a pink um-breila and titled: "Man Throwing Stone at Bird."


