Revival Of Efforts To Obtain County Fair Here Begun

A revival of efforts to obtain a county fair and livestock show for Eastland County was made Monday night at a meeting of members of the Eastland County Livestock Association and others in the Eastland City Hall.

These developments came forth at the meeting, presided over by Dan Childress, president of the livestock group.

A barbecue and field day for members of the association and others interested was set for Friday, Oct. 5 in the City Park in Eastland.

An offer to help promote the fair and livestock show was made by Bob Vaught, Eastland feed dealer, on behalf of a group he said was to organize in Eastland a Junior Chamber of Commerce.

An estimate was made by Fred Brown, secretary of the association, that approximately \$1000 in cash has been put up by seven or eight men in Eastland toward starting the fair and stock show. It had been estimated that \$6,000 or \$7,000 would be needed.

County Agent J. M. Cooper said it is too late to promote a fair for the early spring of 1937. He knows of only two boys in Eastland County who are feeding calves for showing, he said, and it is too late for others to start. A time should be set soon, he said, if a fair is to be held in 1947, so boys can line up calves to feed.

Vaught's offer to help promote the fair and show seemed to be shot in the arm to lagging hopes for promoting the affair. However, others present said they thought Cisco and Ranger should have a chance to bid on the annual county affair if they wished to, and it was tentatively agreed that this should be done.

It already had developed that Cisco had been talking of trying to promote the fair and show there if Eastland fumbles the promotion.

This Eastland already appeared to be doing. Inquiries on the state of progress of the fund-raising campaign in recent weeks had elicited only the fact that everything was moving very slowly, if at all.

At the meeting, Vaught and Conrad Reeves said they had not been approached on buying stock in the proposed fair association.

Children named Vaught, Reeves, W. W. Linkenhogger and H. G. Vermillion on a committee to make arrangements for the barbecue and field day in October.

At the affair, memberships for the association will be solicited and the matter of the fair and livestock show will be brought up.

Fourteen men from all sections of the county attended the meeting Monday. All said they felt Eastland was the logical place for the fair because of its central location. Childress at the end of the meeting said he was more encouraged than he had been for a good while over chances of getting the fair and show across.

Chaotic Ups And Downs In Weather Mark Coming Of First Norther Of Fall

Temperatures ran the gamut in Eastland this week as one of the warmest days of the late summer—or early fall if you prefer—was followed by one of the coldest.

The extremely warm day was Tuesday, when the official U. S. weather Bureau thermometer at J. A. Beard's place hit a high of 102—near the high for the year except for a few unreasonably warm days in August.

But a typical winter norther—except for the temperature—blew

in Wednesday shortly after noon, and Thursday morning early risers were grabbing for wraps before doing the chores.

Although the weather was a bit warmer Thursday afternoon, the norther apparently ended the unseasonably warm weather that had brought back memories of mid-summer and made football season seem far away instead of close at hand.

Elsewhere in Texas the cold snap brought heavy rains, but as usual this year Eastland County was missed.

Jesse Kimbrough Wins Wild Race In Ranger Streets

Jesse Coy Kimbrough of Eastland, who escaped from the Howard County Jail in Big Spring Monday night, led Eastland County officers a merry chase in Ranger Tuesday night, but got away.

Local officers were on the alert Thursday for Kimbrough, who supposedly still was with Robert Martin, 29 of Robby, with whom he escaped.

Kimbrough, 29 who escaped with two others from the jail in Big Spring immediately after he had been sentenced to two years imprisonment for burglary of a Big Spring filling station, arrived in Eastland Tuesday night and talked with his father, W. C. Kimbrough.

The elder Kimbrough told officers he tried to persuade his son to surrender, but the boy refused, and left in one of his father's cars.

It was this car that officers were on the alert for. Sheriff John Hart, driving with some of his deputies in Ranger, met young Kimbrough on a Ranger street near the swimming pool. However, because it was night, and because the new Texas licenses are for the rear only, the sheriff and his men did not recognize the Kimbrough car until it already had passed. They said the car was going at a normal rate of speed at the time.

However, when Hart swung around to begin pursuit, Kimbrough stepped on it and the wild chase began. Kimbrough darted in and out of streets, turned corners at 50 and 60 miles an hour away from Hart, who refused to on two wheels, and slowly pulled take such chances.

Meanwhile, Ranger police saw what was going on and joined the movie-like chase. But Kimbrough was too fast and reckless for them, too, and finally lost the officers.

Wednesday, a car stolen in Big Spring Monday night was found abandoned in brushy country near Eastland Lake. It was owned by B. D. Rice of Big Spring, and presumably was driven to Eastland by Kimbrough and Martin.

The car had a blown-out head gasket, but otherwise was in fair shape.

Officers were looking for Kimbrough in Ranger because his wife, the former Betty Jean Smith of Eastland, was in a hospital there.

W. C. Kimbrough, who lives east of Eastland, turned over to officers a pistol which Jesse Coy and the other escaping prisoners had taken from Deputy Sheriff A. D. Bryan during the escape Monday night. Bryan said he was putting Kimbrough in a cell when the prisoner shoved him, another prisoner inside the cell grabbed his pistol, there was a scuffle, and Bryan wound up by being locked in the cell.

The third prisoner in the break, Felix Dominguez, separated from the other two the night of the escape.

640 Are Enrolled In Eastland Schools During First Week

Six hundred and forty pupils were enrolled in the Eastland schools this week, only a few more than at this time a year ago, School Supt. W. G. Womack said.

Womack, who had expected a sharp attendance increase, said he was at a loss to explain why it did not arrive, in view of the fact that all other indications point to a sharply greater population in Eastland than a year ago.

All houses are filled and people are looking all the time for places to rent or buy, water, gas and electric connections are at record post-depression levels, and all other indices point to a population boom, he said.

Perhaps, he said the people moving in just don't have many children.

Of the 640 in school here, 210 are enrolled in the high school, rather a large percentage.

The Eastland school population had declined steadily for four years previous to the current registration. However, it was in step with the national downward trend, as the national birth rate dropped until the big crop of "war babies" began arriving.

It is still too early, however, for that group to begin being felt in school attendance figures, education experts have pointed out.

Vaccination Urged For Children Just Starting To School

AUSTIN, Texas. — Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, urges the parents of all children who will respond to the school bell for the first time in September to be sure the child is physically ready

for school duties. "First and foremost is the need for vaccination against smallpox. Parents should see that children are vaccinated before they are one year of age; however if not done previously, at school age vaccination becomes absolutely necessary," Dr. Cox said.

"If your child has not been vaccinated, have it done immediately for his own protection and that of others."

Immunization against diphtheria is also highly important, Dr. Cox declared. This disease, which causes serious illness and deaths among young children, can be prevented with toxoid. The child who has never been protected should be given this safeguard against a dreaded killing disease.

Even though he may have been immunized as a baby, doctors and health officers usually recommend an additional dose of toxoid to strengthen immunity before entrance into school.

"In addition, before you send your child to school you are urged to take him to your family physician and dentist for a thorough examination," Dr. Cox adds. "You will want to know that he is in good physical condition and can compete with the other children

for school duties.

Not even at the peak of our war effort, when fats were required for mountains of shells and bombs and medicines, in addition to the ever-present need for soap, were our needs for salvaging fat greater than now. Our stocks have been drained by four long years of war, and there isn't enough on hand to meet all requirements.

Don't let "Victory psychology" blind you to this national need! If housewives stop saving fats now, the shortage will become even more critical.

Don't let a single drop of used fats go to waste! Little trimmings of fat left on the platter at the table, scraps left on plates, and even the skimmings of soups and gravies are important. It is the consistent saving of even these small amounts that counts.

Don't turn in fats that can be re-used! But some fats, such as those rendered from lamb and mutton, are not suitable for re-use. Put them immediately in the salvage can. And, with other fats, after you've got all cooking good out of them, there is always a little left. No matter how little it is, save it.

Your butcher will still give you 4¢ and 2 red points for every pound you turn in. Save consistently—save every drop you can—every day—until Uncle Sam says the job is done.

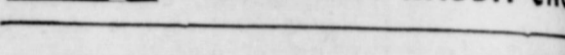

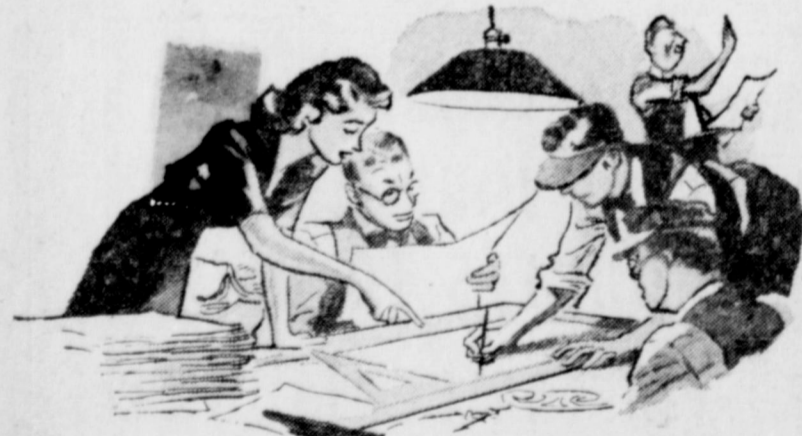
