Poll Tax Sales Estimate Rises

Estimates on the number of poll taxes that probably will be bought this year in Eastland County went up Thursday as Tax Assessor-Collector Clyde Karkalits reported that 4273 had been bought so far. It was estimated that probably 7000 will have paid poll taxes when the deadline comes at midnight next Thursday. At this time a year ago, 3682 had paid poll taxes. There always is a last-minute rush to become eligible to vote, but the rush usually is greater in election years, and several warm local interest races are promised next summer.

Livestock Show Set For March 30 In Ranger Arena

The annual Eastland County Livestock Show will be held in Ranger Saturday, March 30, it was announced this week by C. M. McCain, Eastland, president of the Eastland County Livestock Association. The announcement by McCain followed a meeting in Ranger of the directors of the association with others interested in the show and in livestock. Chief Muphy, Ranger, was named general superintendent of the show.

Superintendents of the show appointed were R. E. Harrell, Ranger, dairy cattle; Johnny King, Ranger, beef cattle; H. C. Wilkinson, Ranger, sheep; J. F. (Red) Donley, Ranger, goats; W. T. Eaton, Ranger, swine; T. McMinn, Ranger, horses, and C. M. McCain, Eastland, auctioneer. Wilkinson was also named secretary-treasurer of the show.

The show will be open to livestock men and F.F.A. and 4-H Club boys and girls of Eastland and adjoining counties. Adult exhibitors will show for ribbons only. A total of \$225 has been allocated to the winners in the boys' F.F.A. and 4-H club division. T. G. Caudle, vocational agriculture teacher at Cisco; Johnny King, Ranger and J. M. Cooper, county agent, Eastland, were named on a committee to work up the different classes and the premium list.

Publicity committee named was Joe Dennis and Hall Walker of Ranger; T. G. Caudle and Arlin Birt, Cisco and Henry G. Vermillion of Eastland.

The annual show was held at Cisco in February last year. The plan is to rotate the show among Ranger, Eastland and Cisco, it was said.

Gourley To Receive A. & M. Degree

Jack Gourley of Eastland, former Army Air Corps captain who flew numerous missions in the Mediterranean theater, will receive his Bachelor of Science degree in agricultural engineering at Texas A. & M. College Feb. 1, according to a release from the college.

The annual President's Ball in Eastland to raise funds for the battle against infantile paralysis will be held this year Feb. 1, Friday night of next week, in the American Legion Hall, it was announced this week.

The ball, the first since the death of President Franklin D. Roosevelt whose birthday it honors, will begin at 9 p. m.

Victor Cornelius, Eastland chairman for the Eastland County Chapter of the National Infantile Paralysis Foundation, said this week that the chapter's funds are depleted because of the help given to three infantile paralysis victims in the county during the last year, and that all the funds that can be raised during the March of Dimes drive this year can be well used.

Persons who wish to make donations to the fund may leave them with Fred Brown or Pete Parker at the Eastland National Bank, Cornelius said.

T. & P. Officials Visit And Attend Luncheon

The first visit of a Texas & Pacific Railway president to Eastland County in a long while was marked last Thursday and Friday with a lot of down to earth friendliness and good will.

Here were President W. G. Vollmer, new president of the railroad, his assistant, L. C. Porter, and J. B. Ehores, director of public relations, all of Dallas, and J. G. Brannon, superintendent, and Walter J. McMurry, general agent, both of Fort Worth.

Vollmer spoke at luncheon or supper meetings in Eastland, Cisco and Ranger during the party's visit, and told of his intention of spending about \$6,000,000 as soon as possible on new and improved equipment for the railroad.

But he asked his listeners to side with the railroads in what he termed unfair competition by bus and rail lines, which he charged are operating at least partly on public tax money.

At an Eastland banquet Friday, Vollmer spoke to about 50 men. Presiding was Chamber of Commerce President C. J. Rhodes.

11 County 4-H Club Organizations Have 280 Girls Enrolled

The 4-H club in Eastland County have begun 1946 with eleven clubs and approximately 280 girls enrolled, according to a report from the County Agent's office. Programs for club meetings will be on dairying, and clothing and personal grooming.

In each club there are two demonstrators; one on each of the two topics of the year's program. The demonstrators will receive more help and encouragement in their projects from the sponsors than the other girls, and it is their duty to pass on the information to the other girls in their club.

For her project, each girl has selected different work according to her interest. In the dairying work the girls are learning to make cottage cheese, milk drinks, and various other dishes using milk; they are learning to wash milk equipment properly, and some are planning meals using dairy products.

In clothing work, some of the girls have decided to improve their storage space, make part of their clothes, keep records of their clothing expenditures, keep clothes in repair, and learn to select becoming clothes.

Farmers, Court, Engineer Discuss Road Route Again

A sort of re-enactment of a meeting a week before, but with a somewhat different set of characters and rather changed lines, was held in the Courthouse Thursday relative to the proposed farm to market road running east and southeast out of Eastland.

At the original meeting, farmers of the Staff area protested to District Highway Engineer Leo Ehlinger because the road will go almost due east out of Eastland instead of angling southeast as they want it. At that meeting, held in the Chamber of Commerce, members of the Chamber's highway committee participated in the discussions.

Thursday, many of the same Staff farmers were present, but Ehlinger, despite an invitation from County Judge P. L. Crossley, did not appear, and in his stead was E. M. Pritchard, resident engineer for the Highway Department.

Also present were most members of the Commissioners Court, and a sprinkling of farmers from the Lone Cedar community, who were anxious that the road follow the easterly course now mapped since it then would pass close to their homes.

Members of the court wanted to clear their records with their constituents, since Ehlinger at the meeting the week before had said the court approved the route of the road east and not southeast. Judge Crossley explained at the meeting Thursday that the court had indeed approved the route, but that the program, route and all, had been presented to the court by Ehlinger on a take it or leave it basis, and as far as he was concerned, he would vote for roads anywhere in the county, no matter how much or how little needed, rather than see the roads go to some other county.

The latter alternative was exactly what was threatened by the Highway Department officials last spring when the lateral road program was up for decision, Judge Crossley said.

Pritchard said that the more southerly route for the Eastland-Staff road had been considered by the Highway Department, but was not favored because of the expense of building two bridges over the Leon River and a roadbed in the river flats.

The road as now proposed will go to Staff from Eastland by a round-about course involving a drive of three to five miles farther to travel the approximately ten to 12 airline miles.

Side Issues

There used to be a thing called "bone-break fever" or something like that, and at the time of this writing, I think I've got it.

If my grandfather, who lived in the rolling blackland region of Collin County, could have that kind of fever, so can I, even if they do call it some fancier name now, probably.

Or maybe I've just got the flu, which is a name that seems to cover a multitude of aches nowadays. They used to call it lagrippe and other names I couldn't print here, but now it's just the flu, no matter what ails you.

I notice in a report from State Health Officer Dr. George Cox that the flu epidemic in Texas the last month or two was estimated to have affected nearly a million people, which is just about one in every six or seven people in Texas.

That is somewhat surprising to me. Judging by what has happened around Eastland County, I would judge the total at three or four million flu victims in Texas, at least.

Dr. Cox went on to say that the total flu infections numbered about ten times the normal number the last few years, but that the death rate is not very great.

This last observation is little comfort to a flu victim who really has the flu. He's not much worried about the death rate, even if he's a statistic in it. What he's worried about is whether he will ever get out of his misery, one way or another.

I'm trying awfully hard to be cheerful about all this, using as my precept an editor I once worked under. He was a hide-bound Republican, born that way, grew up that way, and finally to the best of my knowledge, died that way.

But he worked the last 25 years of his life or so on a sternly Democratic daily newspaper that required him to write daily editorials on the merits of the then Democratic president or demerits of the then Republican president.

He didn't seem to suffer too much from this burden, and aside from the fact that he had a shining bald dome, looked the picture of health up to the day he passed on from a heart attack.

What I was trying to bring out was the fact that if he could be cheerful that long about writing Democratic editorials despite his Republican leanings, I should be able to be cheerful while I'm writing this guff about the flu, despite the fact that it's sitting on top of my head at work with a little mallet and chisel.

The latest issue of "West Texas Today," official organ of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, has a very nice picture of the Leon Power Plant of the Texas Electric Service Company. And the picture is on the front cover. The outlines say the plant is one of several owned by the company, and is located near Eastland and Ranger.

L. A. Horn, who was born in Eastland and has lived here all his life, celebrated his 70th birthday Tuesday, Jan. 22.

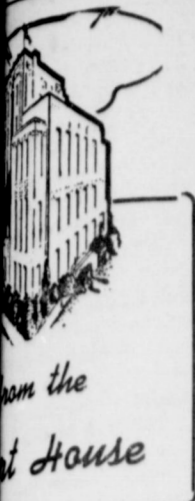

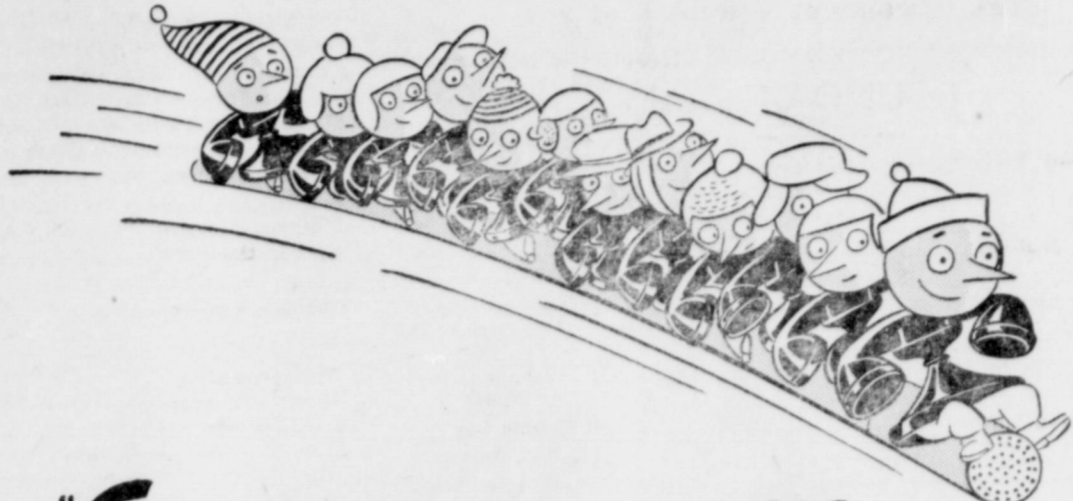
