Side Issues

It is not every man who can attend a golden wedding celebration of his parents, but I will Sunday in McKinney.

My mother and father, Dr. and Mrs. H. F. Vermillion, were married in Melbourne, Ark., May 28, 1896. Melbourne is where Mother and Dad live now, and in the 50 years in between, they have lived in various places in Arkansas, Texas, and New Mexico. Melbourne is the place in the Ozark foothills where more than half the people (by Dad's figures) are kin to Mother, since she was born nearby.

Dad's people colonized near McKinney, and that is what my parents call home. Although Dad is 75 and has been a Baptist minister for 55 years, he is holding a temporary pastorate at Melbourne. I don't know how many people will be at the reception in McKinney Sunday, but I'll bet a bunch. Dad was one of 11 children, mother one of 12, and once I counted up 104 first cousins for myself. That's a lot of kinfolks. I have five sisters, no brothers living.

So when people gasp at my five children, I want them to know that it's a habit in the Vermillion family.

Recent activities in the ceramics (clay to you) industry in Eastland County are part of a broad general picture of industrialization in West Texas that is being aided by advertising and other means.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is placing advertisements in Time and other national magazines which point out that West Texas, "long and truly known as the raw materials capital of the world," now also is the "brightest spot on the post-war map for industrial expansion and decentralization."

Also, recently the Dallas News took advantage of the coal strike to advertise in northern and eastern newspapers, pointing out that the "Dallas Southwest" (whatever that may be) is a place where there is plenty of petroleum and natural gas, few strikes, and wouldn't it be wonderful if some of those manufacturers up there had their plants down here instead.

West Texas is looking up. Mrs. Don Parker, who works here, came to work last Saturday complaining of pain in her foot, and before the day was over, I had to help her from Dr. Caton's office, where the good doctor had found a broken toe and applied an awkward and bulky cast.

Now Mrs. P. is getting kidded no end about how she broke the toe. She says she's mystified, but her friends watch her hobbling around and ease her pain no whit by commenting, with knowing leers, on how she kicked her husband, etc.

So if you ever break your toe you'd better have a good reason on tap. It's almost as bad as a black eye.

Mrs. Porter Woods Passes Suddenly

Mrs. Porter Woods, about 39, resident of the Lone Cedar community east of Eastland for about 17 years, died suddenly of a heart attack Thursday evening.

Cleanup Begun At City Dump; Garbage Covered

In a move to help clean up Eastland, workmen this week began burying all refuse and garbage at the city dump southeast of town.

A bulldozer was pushing the accumulated dumpings of about 15 years down the hillside, and then covering the mess with dirt.

Rats that have been living in the dump ground for years and have been sport for boys with rifles are being killed wholesale in the process.

With a polio scare hitting Texas, city officials believe that the dump clean-up is one of the most effective moves that can be made to insure against an epidemic in Eastland.

Measures for cleanliness by the individual citizens still will be needed as much as ever, they said.

In a move to facilitate the collection of garbage in the city, City Secretary K. B. Tanner this week asked householders not to burn trash on the days the garbage truck is due.

Trash cans cannot be handled while trash is being burned, he said, and leaving the collection until the next trip causes a bad situation.

Swimming Pool To Open Saturday

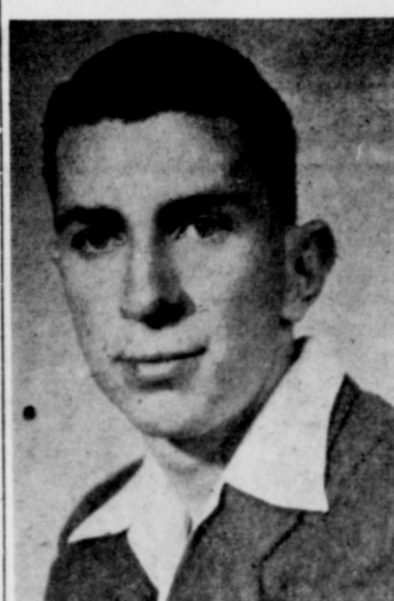
The Eastland Swimming Pool in the City Park will open Saturday, it was announced this week by city officials after the opening had been delayed a week.

Livestock Show Location Deferred Until July First

Decision on where to locate the annual livestock show of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association was deferred until July 1 at a meeting of the group's board in Eastland Wednesday night.

Eastland, Ranger and Cisco delegations were on hand, and Ranger and Eastland proposals for obtaining the show were made, but Cisco men said they were not ready yet with a definite proposal.

On the basis of developments so far, Ranger seems to have the inside track for obtaining the show, which it is proposed to develop also as a fair. Ranger Junior Chamber of Commerce representatives said they were well on the way toward building their rodeo arena, and would have about \$5,000 left to put into a building to house the stock show. More funds can be raised if necessary, they said.

Eastland, represented by J. H. Tanner, repeated its offer to raise \$5,000 if the sum would be matched from outside Eastland.

Galloway Accepts Post At Ranger

R. V. "Rip" Galloway, connected with the Victor Cornelius theatrical printing concern in Eastland, has announced that he will resign to assume the job of manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce effective June 1.

Galloway said he will move his family to Ranger as soon as he can find a place to live. He formerly lived in Ranger when he operated a printing business there and later was county clerk.

Leon Ball Dies; Once Lived Here

Funeral services were held in Chisolm Monday for Leon Ball, 40, former Eastland resident who died in Dallas Saturday afternoon after having suffered a heart attack.

Survivors include his wife, his mother, a brother, Frank Ball of Tyler, and two sisters, Mrs. Dow Snyder of Cisco and Mrs. Howard Blakely of Albany.

Mr. and Mrs. Ball lived in Eastland, where Mr. Ball was a partner of H. L. King of King-Ball Motor Company, from 1939 to 1942. Mr. Ball entered the Army air forces, and King bought his interest in the business. Mr. Ball received his discharge last October, and had made his home in Dallas since.

Farm to Market Road Bid Opened

AUSTIN, May 22. (Sp.) — A new all weather farm-to-market road connecting Nimrod with U. S. 80 west of Cisco neared realization Wednesday as the State Highway Commission announced a low bid of \$57,823.73 had been submitted by A. L. Bucy of Brownwood for constructing the 5.5 mile section of FM Highway 569.

The project will provide for grading, drainage structures, flexible base and single asphalt surface. Construction is expected to begin within 30 to 60 days provided formal contracts are approved and executed by the Highway Department and receive the concurrence of the Public Roads Administration at Washington. Specifications will require that the road be completed within 70 working days after construction begins.

The Eastland County job is one of 16 for which bids were received by the Commission Tuesday and Wednesday under the \$60,000,000 three year postwar farm-to-market program set up under the Federal Aid Highway Act.

Farmers May Get AAA Cash For Seed

Eastland County farmers who plan to harvest winter legume seed can obtain AAA payments for the practice if they apply to the AAA office in Eastland before the seed are harvested, Emmett E. Powell, office head, said this week.

The rate of payment may be as much as \$3.50 per acre, but no more than \$35 per farm will be paid. Producers planning to harvest hairy vetch seed were asked to contact the AAA office.

Cooper stressed importance of the pecan industry in Eastland County. Largest pecan orchard in the county covers 1000 acres, and the owner turned down \$10,000 for last year's crop from it, he said.

Pecans grow on all the rivers, creeks, and small streams of the county, he said, and the native trees can be budded to produce good papershells.

Quarterback Club To Stage Drive For Memberships

A city-wide drive for memberships for Eastland's new and dynamic Quarterback Club will be held Tuesday morning, with four teams of three men each soliciting over Eastland.

The plan was formed at a meeting of the club Tuesday night. At the meeting, Treasurer Jack Chamberlain reported that the club made about \$890 from its minstrel show last week—about \$400 \$500 more, said President Conar. Reeves, than anyone expected the club to make.

Reeves said all plans are complete for the lighting system at Maverick Field, the poles have been bought and the reflectors ordered. Local business firms and individuals have volunteered to weld the poles and paint them, and digging the holes and pouring the concrete was about all that was left.

In another development, the School Board bought a supply of angle iron to put into new stands it proposes to build at the field, and it appeared sure that a much improved stadium will await football fans in the fall.

Industrial Spread Is Possible, Expert Asserts

Possibilities of profitable development of natural resources such as limestone, clay, gravel and coal in this area were outlined before the Board of Directors of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce Thursday by Dr. F. B. Plummer of the Bureau of Economic Geology of the University of Texas.

Plummer, who is no stranger to Eastland, having been here many times through the years on geological matters, said Eastland is as blessed as any county in the United States with certain resources. The possibilities of development of the clay products have been fairly well published, he said, but there are other industries that can be developed here.

Among them he mentioned terraced ground agricultural limestone and rock wool from the same deposits that are plentiful in the county; filter gravel and sand to be used in water system; all well filters, from gravel and sand in abundance near here; well drilling mud from the same clay that cover much of this area; chemical products that can be made from the coal strata under the surface of Eastland County and a large area of adjoining areas.

Plummer also mentioned that an amiable veteran with a truck could himself up in business easily by selling flagstones from the hills of Eastland County and selling them in the larger cities of Texas where the demand is great.

Dr. Plummer was H. B. Plummer of the same bureau, who came to test the Eastland clay deposits for suitability as oil well mud.

The article will include late information on Eastland improvements, and a picture on Eastland, probably abstracted because of the newsprint shortage, was printed in the Friday's issue of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

A letter to Mrs. Frank Casberry, president of the Civic League and Garden Club Mrs. Robert Roberts of Howe, originator of the contest, said she was "delighted" that Eastland won the contest, and said in part: "Keep the spirit of cleanliness, and keep moving. How wonderful work is from a health standpoint—think of what filth and dirt can cause in a town by mechanics such as has been in Dallas, Texas. We, the little towns, are awake and working and planning for a safer, better future, and it brings happiness."

Texas has had many colorful figures on the bench—like Judge Roy Bean, the saloonkeeper, and Emanuel Dubbs, the buffalo hunter—but history has rather slighted Colonel Smithers (we'll call him that), who was justice of the peace at Fort Griffin when that town was the liveliest spot on the frontier.

Justice Smithers was a former army officer. He held the rank of colonel during the War Between the States, but with the close of hostilities he had to step back to his permanent rank as lieutenant. He came to Fort Griffin for a tour of duty shortly after the war and after a time resigned and settled down near the fort to make a home.

The judge was well regarded in the community and when the citizens came to see the need of a justice of the peace he was elected to office without opposition—and held the post until the fort was abandoned and the Griffin 'Flat' became a country village.

The ex-colonel, so say those who knew him, was one of 'the boys,' always ready to take part in a game of chance, or go the rounds of the saloons—and more than once, after a festive night, he appeared on his bench in the morning sporting black eyes and a swollen countenance. But this didn't, in the least, interfere with his administration of justice.

Sitting back in his chair, he would assess a fine on his comrades of the night before without the slightest hesitation, notwithstanding their looks of astonishment and their muttered comments. But they knew better than to protest too openly for the Colonel used more than law books to back up his decisions.

He kept in the pigeon holes of his desk—prominently placed so that all might behold—an ornate brass-barreled horse pistol and a long-bladed Turkish knife, and when the effects of too much firewater made some of his defendants obstreperous, Smithers emphasized his decisions by letting his right hand rest near the butt of the pistol or the haft of the knife. It seemed that the weapons—commonly called "The Colonel's peacemakers"—had the desired effect for the justice never had to use them. The big horse pistol became almost legendary.

As one cowboy described it—"The Colonel mows prairie grass for his hen nests with that gun. He just fills it to the muzzle with bird shot, then steps down into a gulch so that his arm can come on a level with the grass, then gives a sweeping motion as he pulls the trigger and down goes the grass."

Anyhow, such stories were told that none among those coming up

Because famine and starvation are stalking across the lands of Europe and the Far East, the Eastland County U. S. D. A. Council is again asking that citizens over the county conserve as much food as possible until the new harvests are moving freely. County Agent J. M. Cooper said after a meeting of the council.

The Council is composed of representatives of the different agricultural agencies working in the county, including the Farm Security Administration, the Soil Conservation Service, the Agricultural Conservation Association, and

the Extension Service.

The Council asked for the cooperation of every person in saving as much bread, rice, and other cereals, and fats and oils, as possible. They suggested eating more potatoes, eggs, poultry, peas, beans and locally abundant fresh vegetables so larger shipments may be made to starving people.

The worst famine since the Dark Ages is now sweeping across many lands, and people are dying by the thousands according to information brought out at the meeting.

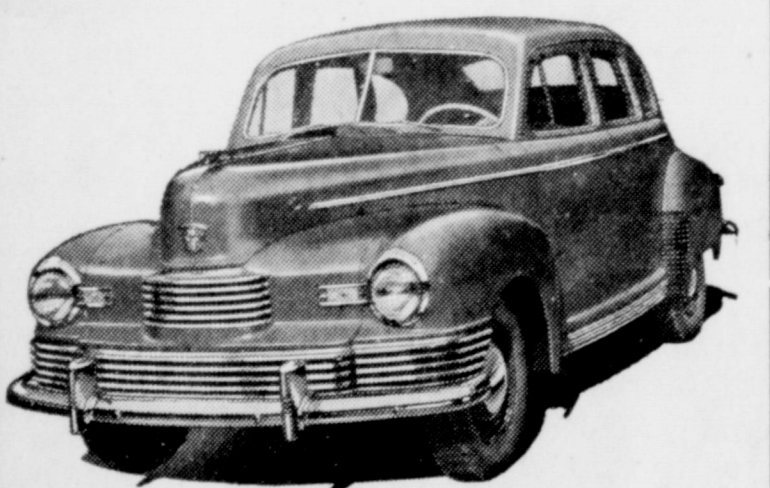

"Use sirup and honey in addition to sugar, or in place of sugar in making desserts," Miss Goldmann says. "Deep dish fruit pies conserve pastry, may be made with honey, and are perfectly delicious."

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



Carbon Man Named Officer In Air Command

First Lt. James S. Stone, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. Stone of Carbon, Texas, has just been assigned as personal affairs officer for Fort Totten, N. Y., headquarters of the Atlantic Division of the Air Transport Command. He is responsible for co-ordinating personal affairs procedures between this headquarters and other bases throughout the division.

The Atlantic Division, commanded by Major General Laurence S. Kuter, has command responsibility in the entire Atlantic area, where it operates military airlines to Europe, Africa and Asia. The Atlantic Division operates air bases in Newfoundland, Labrador, Greenland, Iceland, Eastern Can-

ada, Baffinland, Bermuda, the Azores, the Caribbean area, South America and Ascension Island.

In May, 1943, Lieutenant Stone enlisted in the Aviation Cadets and was assigned for basic training to Sheppard Field, Texas. Following intensive training at Texas Tech, in the desert at Santa Ana, Calif., and in Marfa, Texas, he was commissioned as a second lieutenant in September, 1944 and received his wings.

Stone was then sent to Roswell, New Mexico for B-17 training as a first pilot. The Roswell base was later made famous as the place where the "atomic bomb" pilots were trained for their history-making mission.

Upon completion of his formal B-17 training, Stone was assigned to a bomber group at Plant Park in Tampa, Fla., and received combat crew-member training at Drew Field, Fla., and in Alexandria, La. In May 1945, the pilots of the bomber group were assigned to Gunnery Training School at Laredo Army Air Field, Texas.

With the sudden cessation of hostilities with Japan, the Army had to shift emphasis from the all-out effort for total warfare to a conversion program. This necessitated the salvaging of all material that could be used in the peacetime world. In line with this accelerated program, Stone was assigned as surplus property officer for Air Technical Service Command at Hill Field, Ogden, Utah, where he supervised the collection, salvage and eventual re-

sale of usable items. In March, 1946, he was transferred to Air Transport Command at Fort Totten.

Stone graduated in 1941 from Carbon High School. He is married to the former Katherine Williams of Alpine, Texas.
