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Leon River Towns To Renew Talks On Dam Planning

A meeting to map a campaign for getting flood control and water supply dams along the Leon River will be held in DeLeon Monday night, with delegates attending from interested towns up and down the river.

Attending from Eastland will be Chamber of Commerce Secretary H. J. Tanner and Fred Brown, the Eastland delegate on a committee formed to promote conservation on the Leon and its tributaries.

Purpose of the Monday meeting, it was understood, is to devise an appeal to the U. S. Army Engineers to get a rehearing on works for the upper Leon. At previous hearings, the plea of the upper Leon towns were heard, but the only recommendations made by the engineers were for a \$15,000,000 dam near Belton, and a flood control project at Eastland to cost \$82,600. Congress last week authorized the Eastland project, but so far has not authorized the funds with which to do the work.

Tanner said that the idea for the storage dam to be erected by six West Texas towns on the Colorado River for municipal water supply came from previous meetings of the upper Leon group, who have similar problems of municipal water supply, as well as problems of flood control and erosion of valuable farm land.

Tanner and County Agent J. M. Cooper Thursday in working up figures for an engineering firm on the Leon projects, arrived at figures which show that about one-fourth of Eastland County is drained by the Leon River, and that approximately 26 per cent of the land in the county is under cultivation.

Sellers Enjoys Shade Of Courthouse Here

Speaking before a crowd of 300 or so, Grover Sellers of Sulphur Springs, candidate for governor, Tuesday afternoon outlined his platform in Eastland.

The present attorney general of Texas leaned heavily in his talk on his background as a dirt farmer in Hopkins County, and outlined a nine-point program he believes would help Texas and Texans.

He and his musicians appeared late in the afternoon on the east side of the Courthouse, and said the shade felt good to them after appearances at other places in the broiling Texas sun.

C. Of C. Dues Drive Success Reported

Marked initial success was reported this week in a drive by C. M. Neville and L. E. McGraw, directors of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, to increase membership in the organization and get in more dues from present members so the finances will take care of increasing expenses as Eastland grows.

It was reported that numbers of businessmen who were approached said they had not been contributing members of the organization only because they had not been approached.

Others who had been paying small monthly membership dues said they were glad to increase them, after activities and expenses of the chamber were explained to them.

Side Issues

Since I can first remember, and undoubtedly a lot longer than that, newspapers have been pleading with kids to be careful with fireworks, and for just as long, the lure of the big cannon cracker has proved more powerful than the pleas for safety, and the kids have gone right on shooting them and losing every once in a while a finger, or eye, or more.

This might seem to be a reflection on the newspapers and their ability to influence people, but I choose to believe it is more an indication that the reformers have not yet found a way to change human nature, and humans work on the same principles they did when the Chinese first discovered firecrackers, however many centuries ago that was.

These reflections are brought on by the fact that the Fourth of July firecracker shooting season is on us, and I would like to find some way to get the children and the older folks to use judgment in their handling of fireworks. No amount of fun will pay for one single injury, and there is rarely a year when several persons in any community fail to get hurt to a greater or less extent through the unintelligent use of fireworks.

This year there is another factor. The war is over, fireworks are on the market in quantity for the first time in a number of years, and also there are a lot of veterans around who probably are glad to hear anything except a lot of noise that reminds them of the times they had rather forget.

I'm not referring to the majority of the veterans with overseas experience, who came home just as well adjusted or better than when they left. But there are some who have light to heavy cases of shell-shock, or battle fatigue, or whatever you want to call it, and for them the sound of cannon crackers must be a nerve trying experience.

One lady in Eastland who lives near the City Hall asked city officials please to try to curb the shooting of firecrackers near her home. She said her husband is ill, and the noise of firecrackers is very trying for him.

So if you must shoot fireworks, please do it some place besides near the City Hall—in fact, the best place, if you must do it, is about five miles from where anyone lives, if you can find such a place.

Mrs. V. T. Seaberry sent The Record a postcard on which was pasted a clipping from the Dallas News, with a heading "Eliminate Fly Breeding Places, Warns Dr. Cox," and with a notation from Mrs. Seaberry, "Eastland could profit by this advice."

The pertinent part of the news story from Austin said, "Chicken pens, horse and cow lots and dump piles, any place where flies breed, should be eliminated as potential sources of poliomyelitis in population centers, Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, warned. "Dr. Cox said he heard Houston had adopted an ordinance forbidding raising of chickens within the city limits. There is no suspicion that chickens or pigeons themselves carry infantile paralysis, but flies often breed in chicken pens, said Dr. Cox."

There are many in Eastland who would contest strongly the doing away with cows and chickens in the city limits, pointing out that Eastland is no Houston, but if polio does spread by flies as is commonly believed, and has been more or less proved scientifically, there are lots of things to think about and do to get rid of flies in Eastland and every other inhabited place.

Marriages Beating Divorces—Barely

Marriages in Eastland County are barely keeping ahead of the divorces, but births are outstripping both, according to records in the office of County Clerk Virgil Love.

During a month and a half period, there were 23 divorces granted as against 25 marriages recorded.

But the stork kept busy. During the same period, there were 44 births recorded.

Work Started On \$100,000 Clay Aggregate Plant

Candidates Given Places On Ballot For July Primary

Members of the Eastland County Democratic Executive Committee Monday drew names for places on the ballot of the July 27 ballot, and Grover Sellers named the list of candidates for governor.

In the hotly contested race for Congress from this district, the name of Omar Bursleson of Anson will be first on the ballot, followed in order by R. M. (Bob) Wagstaff of Abilene, Nina J. Headrick of Sweetwater, Robert R. Herring of Breckenridge, William W. Blanton of Albany, Ted Miles of Stamford, Gib Sandefer of Abilene, and Bryan Bradbury of Abilene.

In contested county races, P. L. Crossley drew first place in the county judge contest ahead of John Hart. Neil Day will be first on the ballot in the tax assessor-collector race, ahead of Clyde Karkalits; G. A. Fox, Jr., is ahead of Mrs. Ruth (Garland) Branton in the ballot place for county treasurer; those listed for sheriff are, in order, J. B. Williams, John Barber and W. W. Eddleman, and the listing for county commissioner of Precinct 1 is Earl Blackwell, H. V. (Henry) Davenport, and T. E. (Ed) Castleberry, in that order.

County Chairman Oscar Lyerla said that the candidates' first expense report must be filed with the county clerk by Monday, for county offices, and with the Texas secretary of state for district offices. The law permits county candidates to spend \$500 in the race for the first primary.

Crossley Makes Announcement For County Judge Post.

County Judge P. L. Crossley this week issued his formal announcement for re-election to the office.

In his statement, Judge Crossley said: "Since the beginning of our country and the institution of our democratic form of government, it has been broadly considered that one who has served his constituency faithfully, honestly, and constructively, should at least be entitled to a second term in office. I am proud of the fact, however, that we live in a free America, where anyone who feels so inclined may run for the office of his choice. It is on this theory, however, that a faithful servant is entitled to at least his second term in office, plus the record of actual achievement and benefits derived and accruing to the people's interest and benefit, that I am asking for a second term as county judge.

"I refer to my promises two years ago, wherein I said that I would, to the best of my ability, perform the duties of the county judge's office in as businesslike and economical a manner as was consistent with good business judgment and practices, and I now submit that this has been done. By reason of our adherence to this principle and policy, some personalities were injected into it in the early days of my tenure of office, and at various times last year, all of which probably will be revealed as the campaign progresses. We have tried to pay the employees of the county all that we felt we could afford to pay. (Continued on Page Five)

Completion Set For October 1; Force To Be 25

Construction on the new \$100,000 clay aggregate plant of the Texas Aggregate Company at Eastland began this week as workmen began preparing foundation forms for machinery that is on order and due here the first part of next month.

C. W. Cline, president of the firm which has headquarters in Dallas, and Ches Faircloth, engineer-draftsman, set up temporary offices in the Connelley Hotel and began laying the groundwork for the long, hard construction job that will precede actual production of Haydite, light-weight construction material, at the plant, first of its kind in Texas.

Cline said he has purchased a dragline that is scheduled to be here in a day or two. Later, other machinery for the construction job is scheduled to arrive, and Cline said he has been promised a spur track from the Texas & Pacific Railway's main line the first of July, in time to move in his heavy machinery on it.

Principal items of equipment will be two large rotary kilns with steel outer walls and fire brick interiors. The kilns will burn Eastland County gas and convert Eastland clay into the aggregate, so light in weight it will float on water.

Approximatel 22 to 25 men will be employed on the construction job, which is scheduled to be completed by Oct. 1, and in the operation of the plant, about 25 men will be used, Cline said.

All labor will be hired locally except Faircloth, the plant superintendent, H. J. Witcher, who is to move here soon, and a head burner who has not yet been employed.

Capacity of the plant will be 300 cubic yards of Haydite each working day, or about enough to load five freight cars.

About one-fourth of the output will be used in a building block plant the company is erecting in Dallas, and the rest will be sold to contractors—and already has been contracted for, Cline said.

If the demand calls for expansion of the plant, and it looks now as if it might, he will try to see to it that the plant is enlarged, Cline said.

The plant is located at the northwest corner of Eastland, across the railroad track near the road to Eastland Lake.

Business Houses To Close For Vacations

Owners of two Eastland business houses have announced that, tired of it all, they are going to quit—for two weeks.

Carl Johnson, owner of the dry goods store bearing his name, and Jim George, owner of the Manhattan Cafe, will close up on Monday, first day in July, and will not reopen their places until Monday, July 15.

Johnson and his family will go to California for a vacation, and George said he will go to Marlin for some hot baths and "just to rest."

Veterans To Get Advice On Surpluses

Two representatives of the Fort Worth office of the War Assets Administration will be in the American Legion Hall at Abilene all day Friday to certify veterans of the recent war for purchase of war surplus goods, and to provide them with facts on purchasing such property, it was announced.

The men will be at the hall, First and Cedar Streets, Abilene, from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. Friday. They advised veterans who wish to qualify for purchasing surplus government property to bring with them their honorable discharge or certificate of satisfactory service.

making such salary adjustments as we thought were necessary and reasonable, and at the same time have consistently refused to grant out of line and ridiculous salary raises, both for the office holders and the employees.

"A close study of the financial picture of the county will reveal that the county is in better financial condition than it has been in 30 years. This is because we have entered into a delinquent tax collection campaign that has enured to the benefit of the entire citizenship, to the end that out tax rate has been very materially reduced, and will be still further materially reduced for another year. The tax rate for the immediately surrounding counties runs from 43c per hundred valuation to 60c per hundred, whereas Eastland County's

rate has been considerably more than double these rates. At the beginning of my term of office, the tax rate in this county was \$1.16. I am happy to say that the 1946-47 rate will not be more than 60c per hundred, which rate will be duly set by law. This savings of 56c per hundred, or \$5.60 per thousand valuation, is something that all the people should be proud of. This has been done through a fine spirit of co-operation, without a single contested suit having been filed, and at a time when if one ever start doing something toward paying, it is now. Adjustments have been given when they were due to be given, and the plea to everyone alike, notwithstanding the mouth to ear whispering and anonymous letters and postcards that have been sent throughout the county. If anyone desires to know about any particular matter pertaining to county business, the best place to learn the facts is from the official handling of the business, by all the

units involved. By reason of the co-operative spirit that has been demonstrated by the people, we are far ahead of our sinking fund requirements and indebtedness, and by the end of the year, will be two years ahead of ourselves in the payment of our indebtedness. All indications point to the fact that the tax rate for 1947 will be even lower, probably not more than 50c per hundred valuation, and if we are permitted to continue this delinquent tax program, there should be no reason for our tax rate being more than 50c per hundred at any time in the future, unless additional bonds are voted for some purpose by the people. We must bear in mind, however, that these low rates cannot continue to prevail if the job is to be abandoned just half completed. It is essential that the program not be abandoned in the middle of the stream in order that fair play to all alike be had, and full benefit of the results be gained for the entire citizenship of the county.

"The routine legal duties of the county judges office, plus duties in connection with the tax program, have been quite strenuous and it has been necessary that I devote all of my time to these duties. I expect to see every voter that I possibly can, and expect to acquaint each voter with every phase of the work before the campaign ends. May I say in this connection that there has never been a two-year period when as much publicity, newspaper and otherwise, has been given to the people as has been given in the past two years, in an effort to keep them fully informed as to what was going on in the county's business."

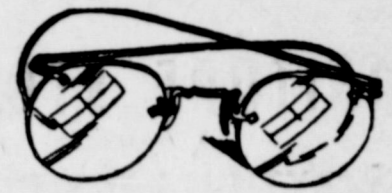

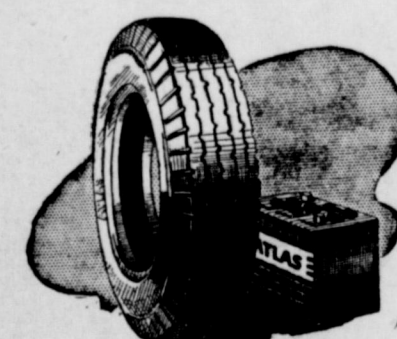

REV. HOLLIS RETURNS HOME FROM HOSPITAL

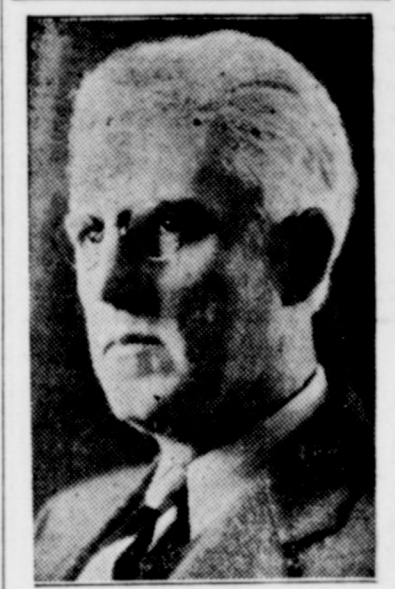
