C Of C To Erect **Pre-Fab Building** For Industrial Use

Absentee Vote Total In County Tops First Primary

On the chance that there will be a demand for an industrial type building in Eastland, the Eastland Chamber of Commerce this week ordered through W. W. Linkenhoger a 40 x 100 foot pre-fabricated type steel building to be erected in Eastland.

Manager H. J. Tanner of the Chamber of Commerce said that the building would be offered for industrial use by any firm that wants to lease it or buy it. If no such offer is made, the building still can be used for warehouse purposes, possibly for the storage of peanuts, Tanner said.

The building is not of the Quonset hut type, but has upright walls and a pitch roof. It is made entirely of steel.

Cost of the building erected in Eastland over a concrete floor is expected to be about \$5000.

Several tentative attempts by industries to locate in Eastland have been frustrated by lack of a suit able building. Tanner said, leading to decision to erect the steel build-

A decision of some sort is expected next week on the location in Eastland of a brassiere manufacturing plant by the Hollywood-Maxwell Company. A representative of the firm is expected here then to confer further with Chamber of Commerce representatives.

THE VOTERS OF PRECINCT NO.

Regardless of any reports which you might have heard, there has never been any partiality shown for any part of Precinct No. 1, over any other part of the precinct. I have two maintenance crews, one at Ranger, and one at Eastland. I have always been very thoughtful and diligent in trying to render an outstanding service for all of Eastland County, as well as for my precinct. I have built and maintained all of the roads that it was possible to build and maintain and have shown no partiality to any part of my precinct. As one of many examples of this, I refer you to an article on the front page of the Eastland County Record, dated February 19, 1943, quoting Mr. C. W. Hoffmann who was mayor at that time, which reads as follows:

The project for repair of the two spillways at Lake Eastland will be completed by the time limit of March 15th, allowed under the special W. P. A. order, and credit for this fact is given by city officials to the cooperation of County Commissioner Henry Davenport.

"It has been possible only through the splendid cooperation of Mr. Davenport," Mayor C. W. Hoffmann said Wednesday. "Without the use of the precinct's scrapers, bulldozers, and other dirt-moving machinery we could not within two months have moved the amount of earth that was necessary to effect these repairs. He really saved the day."

The project was authorized by the W. P. A. through the insistence of Mayor Hoffmann and other city of-

ficials after the presidential order had ordered the W. P. A. discontinued, called for repairing both spillwayswhich had been badly damaged in floods last fall-building cutoff walls, sodding the dam, repairing wings of the dam and concreting the channel for a considerable distance below the spillway.

The impossibility of moving the dirt required by hand was immediately realized and Mr. Davenport went to the scene, looked over th project and placed county machinery on the job. Within a week these machines had moved as much earth as the 100 men employed could have moved in two months by hand and the project is now safely "over the hump," city officials said.

"He really saved the day," said Mayor Hoffmann. "Mr. Davenport seemed as much interested in getting the job done as the city, and the people of Eastland certainly owe him their thanks. As a matter of fact we have always found him very cooperative with the city and willing to assist at any time when we call on him for help."

One hundred men are now at work completing the work on the project and by March 15th the job is expected to be done.
