Burleson Campaign For Congress Reaches Climax



Candidate Issues Statement On Eve of Election

From the beginning of this campaign, I have not solicited the support, nor am I under obligation to any pressure group. No petition has been circulated in my behalf, saying that I can get things done in Washington for any special interest group. But instead, behalf of my opponent. But I have had the support of many friends from all over the district—merchants, housewives, ministers, farmers, ranchers, professional men, and students. These same people, and many others have been actively engaged in promoting my candidacy for Congress during this run-off. The folks in Jones County formed a "Burleson for Congress" group, and supporters in other counties followed suit. The offices have been manned by volunteer workers from the ranks mentioned above. In Abilene, a group of veterans who are students from each of the three colleges there have been taking my campaign to the people of Taylor and neighboring counties. In Stephenville, other college students have done likewise. Hardly a day passes that letters and telegrams haven't reached my home in Anson, from supporters all over the district informing me of the progress of my campaign in a particular area. All during this time, my wife, the former Ruth DeWesse, daughter of a pioneer Baptist preacher of Texas, and myself have tried to cover every town and community in the district, doing personal campaigning and speaking on street corners and at rallies. We two have visited with thousands of citizens from Fisher

and Nolan counties in the west to Palo Pinto, Erath, Hamilton, and Comanche counties in the east and southeast of the District. We wish to express our sincere gratitude for the reception that has been afforded us, and the enthusiastic response to my campaign.

To those many men and women from all over the District who have joined with Ruth and me in promoting my candidacy, I sincerely thank each of you from the bottom of my heart. Your loyalty and support has been evidence of true friendship, and has been noticed by the citizens of the places you have visited. By your interest and recommendations, I believe that all the people of the 17th District will know that when I go to Washington as Congressman, I shall take with me the responsibility and duty of faithfully representing the entire citizenship of the District. The people will know that I am obligated to no one except the PEOPLE of this District, and I pledge myself to represent ALL the people in Congress energetically and with sincerity of purpose. The honor of representing the people of the 17th Congressional District of Texas will be guarded well.

In campaign folders which have been widely distributed during the last few weeks, there appears a brief biography of my life. You know, from reading that, that I have not promoted myself or my campaign on my military record. In 1942 I volunteered for service and accepted what was assigned to me, as did all other volunteers. I served with the invasion forces from New Guinea to Borneo, from the Philippines to Okinawa, and was discharged in December 1945. I repeat here, briefly, the clear and definite stand I have taken on issues since the beginning of the campaign, a program of reasonable constructiveness, and not one of radicalism.

1. For the right to work without interference from the CIO, any labor racketeer, pressure group, communism or other "isms."

2. For free enterprise and the right of private business to operate without interference from useless bureaucratic orders, decrees, and regulations.

3. For a federal government appropriation to provide needed research in the field of Polio and Cancer. These diseases are nationwide, and must be controlled.

4. For full support of the United Nations Organization as a method of promoting World Peace. But, we must maintain armed strength to discourage aggression against us.

5. For a revision of our Military Law, and revision of the curricula of the military institutions of Annapolis and West Point, to the extent that men graduating as military leaders will be well rounded leaders and not just disciples of social snobbery.

6. For equality of freight rates between the industrial north and the Agricultural South. The inequality now existing is costing the people of this district thousands

of dollars annually in increased cost of manufactured goods

7. For uniformity of payment of pensions and other social security benefits.

8. For improvement of our internal security laws to prevent espionage and sabotage.

9. For the administration of a compulsory military training program, if enacted into law, through the junior and senior colleges of our Country. I want to see our public money spent for the building of character and education at the same time the boy is receiving military training.

10. For programs designed to improve farm living, such as extension of R. E. A., Soil Conservation, and Farm-to-market roads.

Further, from my campaign folder, may I refer to the following

statement which I made early in the campaign:

"A genuine republic must be governed in the impartial interest of ALL the people ALL the time, instead of in the interest of a few pressure groups most of the time."

I believe in the Christian and Democratic principles which have made this country great, and take them as my political rule and guide. Entrust them to me as your Congressman and I shall give unstintedly of my time, my energies, and what talents I have to meet every responsibility with courage and determination; to exercise my best judgment and to account to you for my actions.

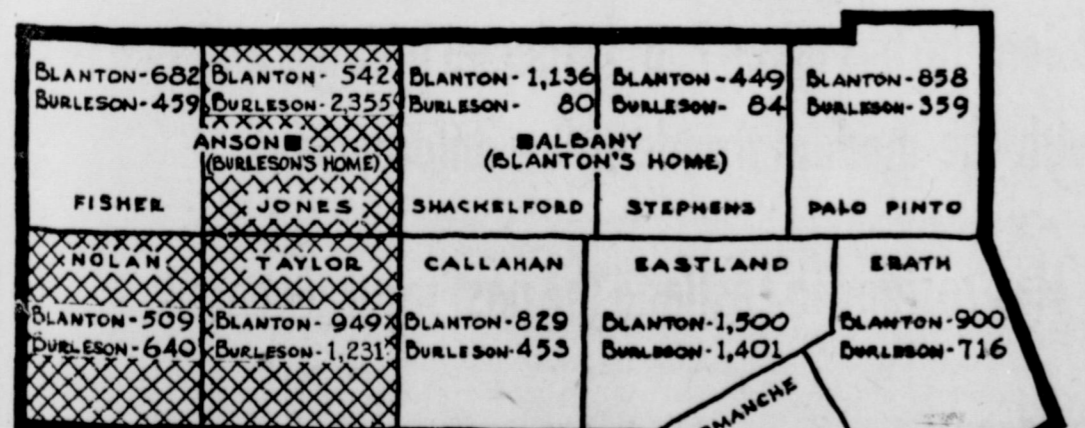

**Venereal disease
Effects Shocking,
Cox Declares**

AUSTIN—Because of the fact that a venereal disease is no respecter of persons, people of every class and color, rich and poor, educated or ignorant are numbered among the victims, asserts Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer.

"Venereal diseases are among the most vital health problems in the state of Texas today," Dr. Cox said. "The amount of suffering, economic loss, insanity and even death from venereal diseases cannot be accurately estimated but would reach a shocking figure if disclosed."

The state health officer pointed out that self-diagnosis and self-

treatment are extremely dangerous and advised consulting a physician for determining definitely whether or not a venereal disease is present.

"Only a reputable physician can properly diagnose such a disease. The presence of gonorrhoea is not disclosed by a routine blood test, and the diagnosis of syphilis requires more than a blood examination," declared Dr. Cox. "Both syphilis and gonorrhoea are almost 100 per cent curable if discovered and treated in their very earliest stages. Thousands of deaths annually could be prevented," Dr. Cox said, "if sufficient attention were given to the early diagnosis and thorough treatment of syphilis. Delay reduces the chance of cure and in many cases is the direct cause of death."

Dr. Cox urges that every person who might suspect a venereal disease infection have a physical examination, so that if present, the disease can be brought under treatment at the earliest possible date.

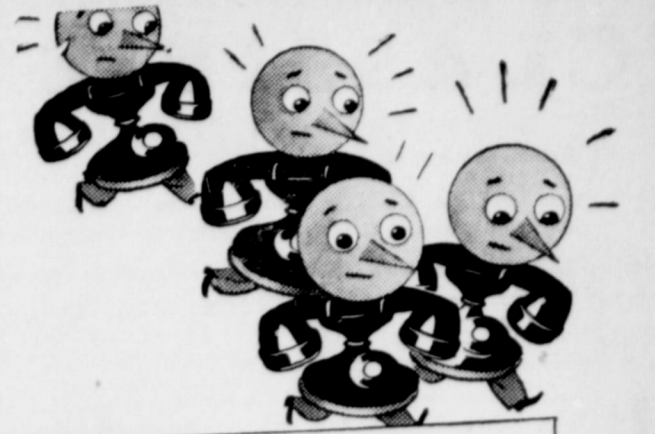

TO THE VOTERS OF PRECINCT NO. 1

Regardless of any reports which you might have heard, there has never been any partiality shown for any part of Precinct No. 1, over any other part of the precinct. I have two maintenance crews, one at Ranger, and one at Eastland. I have always been very thoughtful and diligent in trying to render an outstanding service for all of Eastland County, as well as for my precinct. I have built and maintained all of the roads that it was possible to build and maintain and have shown no partiality to any part of my precinct. As one of many examples of this, I refer you to an article on the front page of the Eastland County Record, dated February 19, 1943, quoting Mr. C. W. Hoffmann who was mayor at that time, which reads as follows:

The project for repair of the two spillways at Lake Eastland will be completed by the time limit of March 15th, allowed under the special W. P. A. order, and credit for this fact is given by city officials to the cooperation of County Commissioner Henry Davenport.

"It has been possible only through the splendid cooperation of Mr. Davenport," Mayor C. W. Hoffmann said Wednesday. "Without the use of the precinct's scrapers, bulldozers, and other dirt-moving machinery we could not within two months have moved the amount of earth that was necessary to effect these repairs. He really saved the day."

The project was authorized by the W. P. A. through the insistence of Mayor Hoffmann and other city of-

ficials after the presidential order had ordered the W. P. A. discontinued, called for repairing both spillways—which had been badly damaged in floods last fall—building cutoff walls, sodding the dam, repairing wings of the dam and concreting the channel for a considerable distance below the spillway.

The impossibility of moving the dirt required by hand was immediately realized and Mr. Davenport went to the scene, looked over the project and placed county machinery on the job. Within a week these machines had moved as much earth as the 100 men employed could have moved in two months by hand and the project is now safely "over the hump," city officials said.

"He really saved the day," said Mayor Hoffmann. "Mr. Davenport seemed as much interested in getting the job done as the city, and the people of Eastland certainly owe him their thanks. As a matter of fact we have always found him very cooperative with the city and willing to assist at any time when we call on him for help."

One hundred men are now at work completing the work on the project and by March 15th the job is expected to be done.

If I am re-elected your Commissioner, I pledge that I shall always give the same efficient service to Eastland County as I have in the past and that there will be no partiality shown to any part of the precinct over any other part of the precinct.
