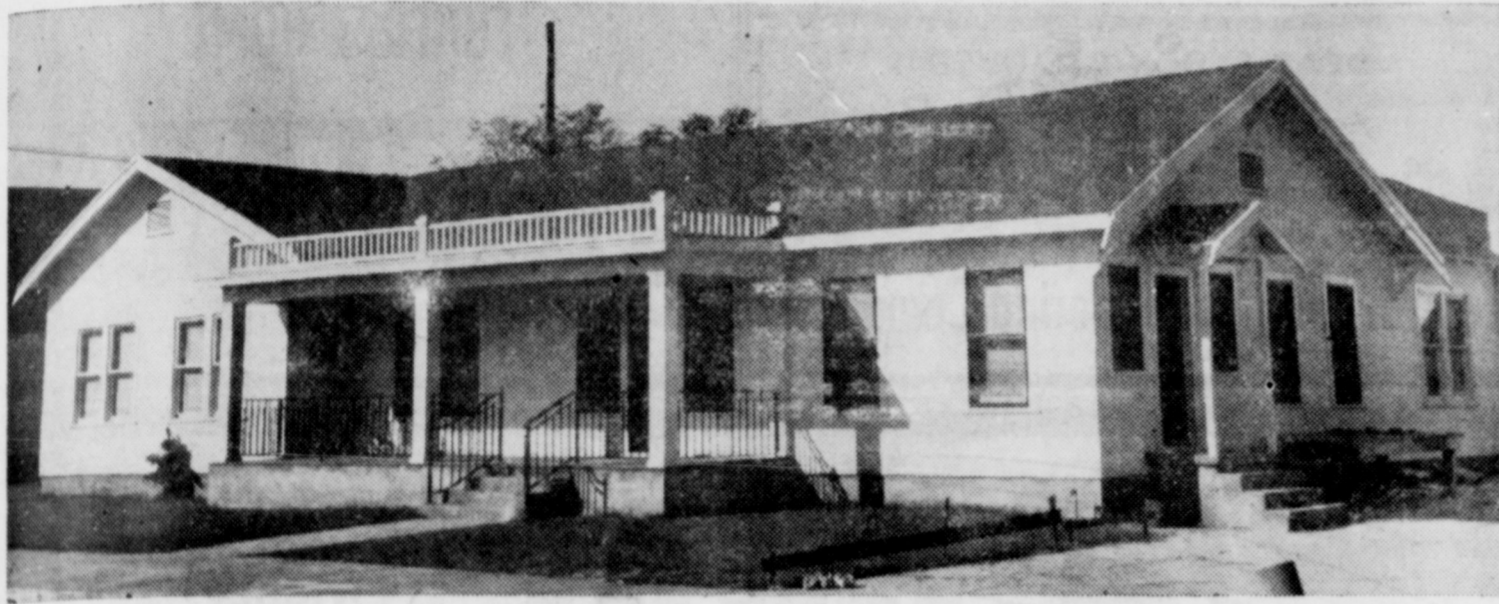

Vocational School Obtains Shops For Teaching Veterans

Individual instruction in commercial shops of various kinds in the county henceforth will be given ex-GI students in the Eastland County Vocational School, it was announced this week.

Two of the shops approved for training are in Eastland. They are Freeman's Wood Shop, operated by J. M. Freeman on East Main Street, in which building trade students will receive instructions and Wade Massengale's plumbing and tin working shop on South Seaman Street, where all teach plumbing.

Another shop chosen to give instructions is Jack Bennett's radio repair shop in Gorman, and Odie L. Hill of Ranger will instruct students in Welding.

The school has purchased materials to place in each shop for instructional work and practice, so trainees may receive all sorts of instruction fitting them to engage in almost any kind of work along the line of the trade they have chosen, it was said.

Not yet chosen definitely is a shop for instruction in electrical work and installation.

Trainees all over the county will attend classes in the shop of their trade—for example, all plumbing students will come to Massengale's shop in Eastland, no matter where in the county they live.

The additional equipment for the shops has been requisitioned from the State Board of Vocational Education, and the War Assets Administration.

It was felt that by centralizing classes and giving students first-hand experience in on-the-job conditions, they could learn more and acquire knowledge and skills faster.

Progress Reported In Fund Campaign

Good progress in the drive to obtain a \$10,000 revolving industrial fund for use by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce was reported this week by H. J. Tanner, manager.

Letters were sent out to 125 businessmen and individuals in Eastland seeking participation in the fund, he said. The letter stressed the fact that lack of buildings getting industries for Eastland, and sites is the chief obstacle in and the fund will be used in removing such obstacles.

P.-T.A. Membership Drive Is Launched

Good Roads Voting May Determine Taxes In County

If the proposed good roads constitutional amendment is passed in November, it will have no effect on the present refunds to farmers and others on non-highway gasoline, Jack Chamberlain, county chairman, and H. L. King, Eastland chairman of a group promoting passage of the amendment, said this week.

They also emphasized that the amendment would help Eastland County in that it would make provision for permanent state assumption of county and road district bonds issued to build state highways. The state now is assuming payment of a portion of the bonds gasoline tax money, but authorization for such payment has to be re-enacted each two years by the Legislature.

Large portion of Eastland County's bonded indebtedness—about three-fourths of highway bond debts—is being paid by the state under the assumption law, saving local taxpayers a heavy burden.

An Eastland school district budget hearing will be held in the office of Secretary Curtis Hertz in the Exchange Building from 11 a. m. to 12 noon Monday, Oct. 21, Hertz announced this week.

Hammers To Have Open House For New Funeral Home

Mr. and Mrs. Ben Hamner will have open house Sunday and Monday in their new funeral home at 310 South Lamar Street to mark the formal opening of the new establishment, they announced this week.

The building was completed recently after months of effort, and has been completely furnished.

The open house will be held from 1 to 6 P. M. on each of the two days.

Visitors will be shown a large and modern appointed funeral home that is the culmination of a dream of 23 years by Hamner, who came to Eastland then and began thinking of the establishment he wanted to build some day.

A number of the features in the building are unusual in a town the size of Eastland. The building has a large chapel that will seat 250 people, a private family room, two stumber rooms, a large casket display room, a modern operating room, a bedroom for a night attendant, offices for the Hamner Burial Association, and a private room for sitting up groups.

Hamner said that while he has studied and planned for the new building during 23 years here, he has never turned down a case during that time.

He is a member of the state and national funeral directors associations. Mrs. Hamner also is a licensed funeral director, as is W. H. Upchurch, connected with the firm. The new building is of frame construction, with asbestos shingle siding. Appointments are modern throughout.

New Flying School To Open Soon

Eastland, Ballinger To Meet With Foe As Favored Team

The so-far winless Eastland High School Mavericks will meet the strong Ballinger football team in Ballinger Friday night in a game which Coach John E. Little admits probably will be another reverse for the Eastland eleven.

However, Little figures the local team will make a good game of it, and will gain valuable experience.

Definitely out of the lineup will be Wayne Lambert and Chili Johnson, stellar linemen, and Johnny Hicks, outstanding back for the Mavericks, as well as another regular or two, Little said. However, Billy Brasher, still limping from a foot injury, may play some.

Little, who has used single and double wingback formations this year, said he may have the team run from the T formation some.

Hicks, who received a thigh injury early in the year, said this week he was ready to go, but Little said this was just wishful thinking.

The Maverick team played no game last week.

Little talked Thursday to R. J. Kidd, director of the Texas Interscholastic League, and was assured that all Maverick squadmen are eligible in the light of a recent ruling on players with 16 or more high school credits. Kidd said that the rule applied only where the player has enough credits and the right kind of credits to graduate.

Masonic Hall Nears Readiness For New Garment Factory

Final touches on the lower floor of the Masonic Hall, which will house a brassiere factory, were being completed this week and work was well under way on an addition at the rear of the building as machinery and fixtures for the plant arrived from Los Angeles by truck.

Chamber of Commerce Manager H. J. Tanner said he believes that by Saturday work of setting up the machines can be begun.

There will be 58 sewing machines in the plant, to be operated by the Hollywood Corset Company, subsidiary of the Hollywood-Maxwell Company. They are operated by central motors operating shafts from which belts power each machine individually.

Officials of the firm are talking about putting in a cutting plant in Eastland later.

The plant will begin with 10 women learning to operate the machines, officials have told Tanner, and later the most apt of the 10 will be chosen to instruct others until the full force of 70 or more people is employed.

The plant is expected to be in operation by Nov. 1.

Rotarians' Governor To Pay Official Visit Here On October 28

W. Aubrey Stephenson, governor of 127th District of Rotary International, will visit the Eastland Rotary Club Monday, Oct. 28, it was announced this week by President Bill Maddrey.

Stephenson, professor of government and assistant dean at Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, will advise and assist Maddrey and secretary Curtis Hertz on matters of club administration and Rotary service activities while on his official visit here.

He is one of 157 district Rotary governors supervising the activities of 5800 clubs with more than 250,000 members in 73 counties and geographical regions of the world. During the last year, the organization has added 404 new clubs in 35 counties.

Highway Commission Hears Plea On Road

The State Highway Commission Monday took under consideration an application for designation of the Ranger-Caddo road as a state-maintained farm to market road at a hearing attended by delegations from Eastland and Stephens Counties.

The road, now in poor repair, is about 13 miles long. Caddo is in Stephens County, and on the most direct route from most Eastland County towns to the nearest area of Possum Kingdom lake.

Those present at the hearing included County Judge P. L. Crossley and County Auditor Don Parker of Eastland; Al Larson, Mayor J. J. Kelley, Paul McDonald, Chamber of Commerce Manager Rip Galloway, and L. R. Pearson of Ranger, Tom Downing of Caddo and a Breckenridge delegation.

Outlook Favorable For Next Few Years If No Debt Added

When Eastland County pays off \$71,000 in refunded road bonds Nov. 1 the total bonded debt left to be paid by the taxpayers of the county will be reduced to a probable \$411,000, County Auditor Don Parker said this week.

This may seem a sizable amount, but it compares with more than \$4,500,000 in road bonds alone that were outstanding about 25 years ago.

In the next five or six years most of the current outstanding bonds will have been paid off, and the county then will be in the best shape financially in a generation, unless more bonds are voted.

The 1934 refunding road bonds to be paid next month are almost the last of the series. Next year another instalment of \$54,500 will wipe out the issue, Parker said, and the money already is on hand—as well as enough money to pay all other bonds due during the next two years.

Actually, he said, there are \$880,500 in road bonds left owing, but the state is paying off about three-fourths of them, or \$660,375, and presumably will continue to, leaving the county to pay \$220,125.

Also, there are \$191,000 in bonds owing on the Courthouse, bringing the county debt load to the above-mentioned total of \$411,125.

Four Concerts To Be Presented By Association

Eastland County Community Concerts Association this season will present four attractions, including a violinist, male singer, Russian chorus and pianist, it was announced this week.

The first season last year had only three programs.

It also was announced that those who have moved into the county since the membership campaign was conducted last spring are eligible for membership and should get in touch with Mrs. Clyde Grissom if interested.

First program will be presented Nov. 27 when Carroll Glenn, violinist, will appear. Miss Glenn is the wife of Eugene List, pianist, who made headlines when as an Army sergeant he played for the "Big Three" at Potsdam.

The second concert, Feb. 3, will feature James Pease, singer.

On Feb. 14, Flatoff's Don Cossack Chorus and dancers will be presented.

The final concert March 12 will be given by Solveig Lunde, pianist who has appeared in Town Hall, N. Y., and in concert and on the radio.

All concerts will be presented in Eastland High School auditorium.

Enlistees May Get Former Rank Again

Former members of the armed forces who have left the services now may enlist in the Army in grades similar in rank to those formerly held in any of the armed forces, Master Sgt. E. E. Elmore of the Eastland Army Recruiting Station said this week.

However, the enlistee to be given the rank must have served at least six months in one of the occupational specialties needed by the Army, and must enlist for three years, he said. After Oct. 30 under these provisions no one will be enlisted in a grade higher than that of staff sergeant.

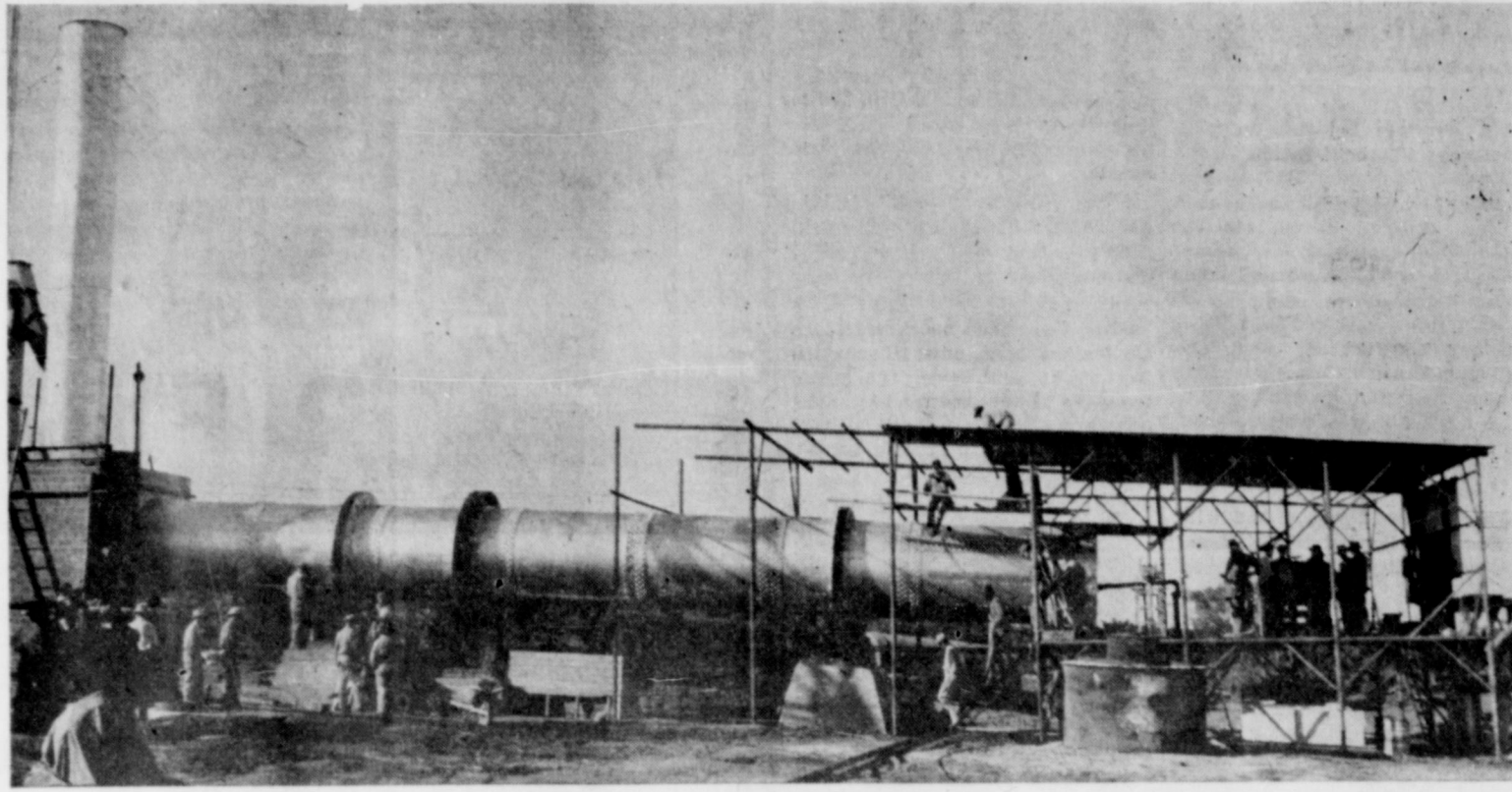

Construction Here Extensive

Many New Building Projects Begun In Recent Years

Opening of the new Hamner Funeral Home this week end will mark another step in the building of a more modern Eastland downtown business section that has been going on for more than two years.

The end is not yet in sight, and one builder said he had several other projects lined up awaiting the end of restrictive government controls and the extreme scarcity of materials.

Those who marked Eastland off the list as "dead" ten or more years ago would be surprised individuals today if they could be taken on a tour of the city and

shown the modern business structures and homes that are being erected.

One of the first on the modern list of business structures erected here was the hollow tile building of the Knox Machine and Supply Co. on West Main Street.

Later came the purchase of two buildings by W. W. Linkenhoger and their complete reconstruction and remodeling into a modern farm implement and hardware store.

Victor Cornelius bought the big old Mickle Hardware building and rebuilt it inside and out to house his theatrical printing company.

Pat Murphy put up a small hollow tile building on White Street to house his radiator shop, and later added two more buildings, one of which houses a butane agency and the other the office of the West Texas Transportation Company.

Next to Murphy's building, E. M. Anderson put up a hollow tile building, stuccoed outside like Murphy's, for his automotive repair shop.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Pullman, deciding their store on East Main Street was too small, put up a much larger building around it, and continued doing business while the building went on. The new building is of rinder block construction.

Theo Lamb had a Quonset hut type pre-fabricated building erected on East Main Street for his Chevrolet agency, and later plans to add a brick and tile building

adjacent to it for his office and show room.

Bob Vaught built a new tile structure, with a corrugated iron section in the rear, on South Seaman Street to house his peanut bag repair and sales business, which he handles with peanut selling and buying.

Carl Timons built a concrete block building on South Seaman Street to house his electrical business, and J. R. Lanier put up a frame building on North Daugherty Street for his new grocery store.

C. E. and C. J. Owen erected a hollow tile building on Bassett Street to house their blacksmith and welding shop.

J. O. Earnest started his tile and concrete locker plant and grocery store, building in May, but it was only recently that he opened it, after tremendous effort to find materials and machinery. The building at Lamar and Olive Streets, is one of the most modern in Texas in design and construction.

On the opposite corner from Earnest's building is the new Hamner Funeral Home, which is of frame construction with asbestos siding. Construction on the building would have been finished many weeks earlier had it not been for lack of some critical materials for finishing it, and Ben Hamner, owner, said he still has not been able to get all the things he wanted to furnish it with.

L. E. McGraw this week moved into his new Dodge-Plymouth agency building on South Seaman Street. The shop, building is of Quonset hut construction, and the front office and showroom is of brick and tile with extensive window surfaces.

Opening soon will be the new Majestic Theatre, now being remodelled from the old Connellee Theatre by Interstate Theatres at great expense. The new showhouse on North Lamar Street will be one of the most modern in Texas.

Preliminary work is under way for a new building on South Seaman Street to house the Eastland Auto Parts business operated by M. A. "Pop" Gaines.

In addition, many business houses have made extensive repairs and alterations in line with the prosperous and progressive era the city is undergoing, and three industries have built or are building in the city—the Horton Ceramics, with a Quonset hut structure on South Bassett Street, the Texas Lightweight Aggregate Company, with a plant northwest of the residential area toward Eastland Lake, and the Hollywood Corset Company, subsidiary of the Hollywood-Maxwell Company, which has moved equipment into its plant which was remodelled from the lower floor of the Masonic Hall. An addition is being built on the rear end of the building.

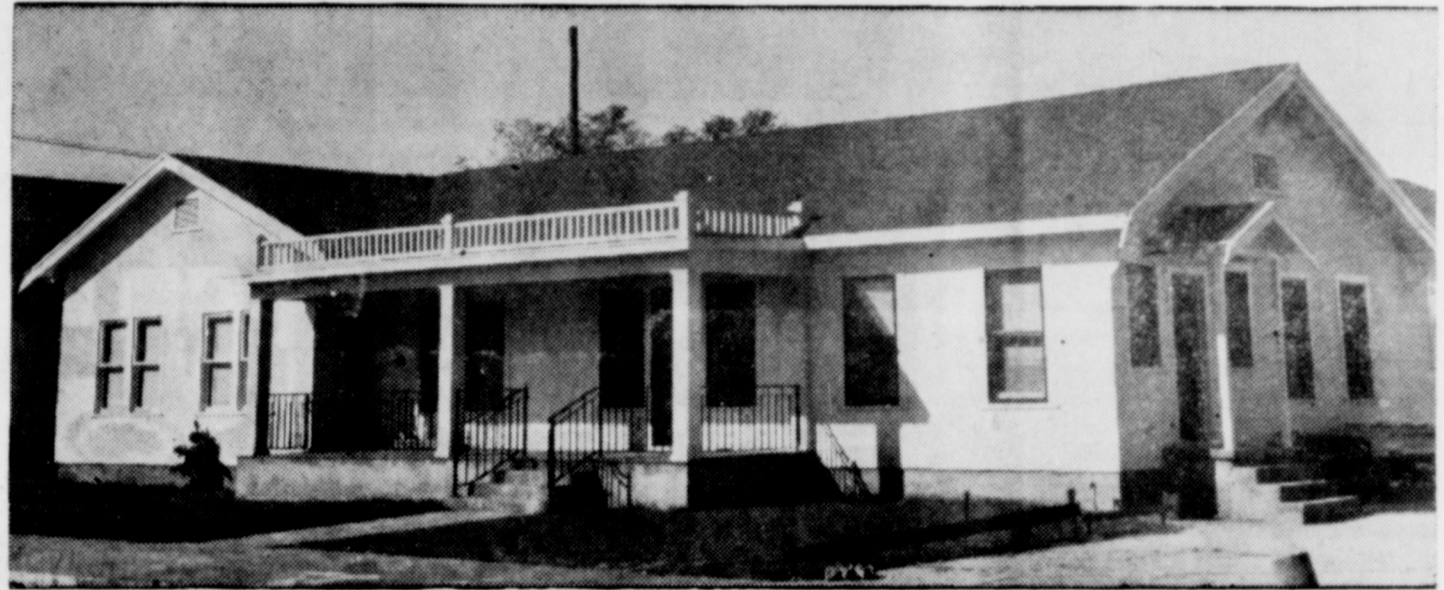

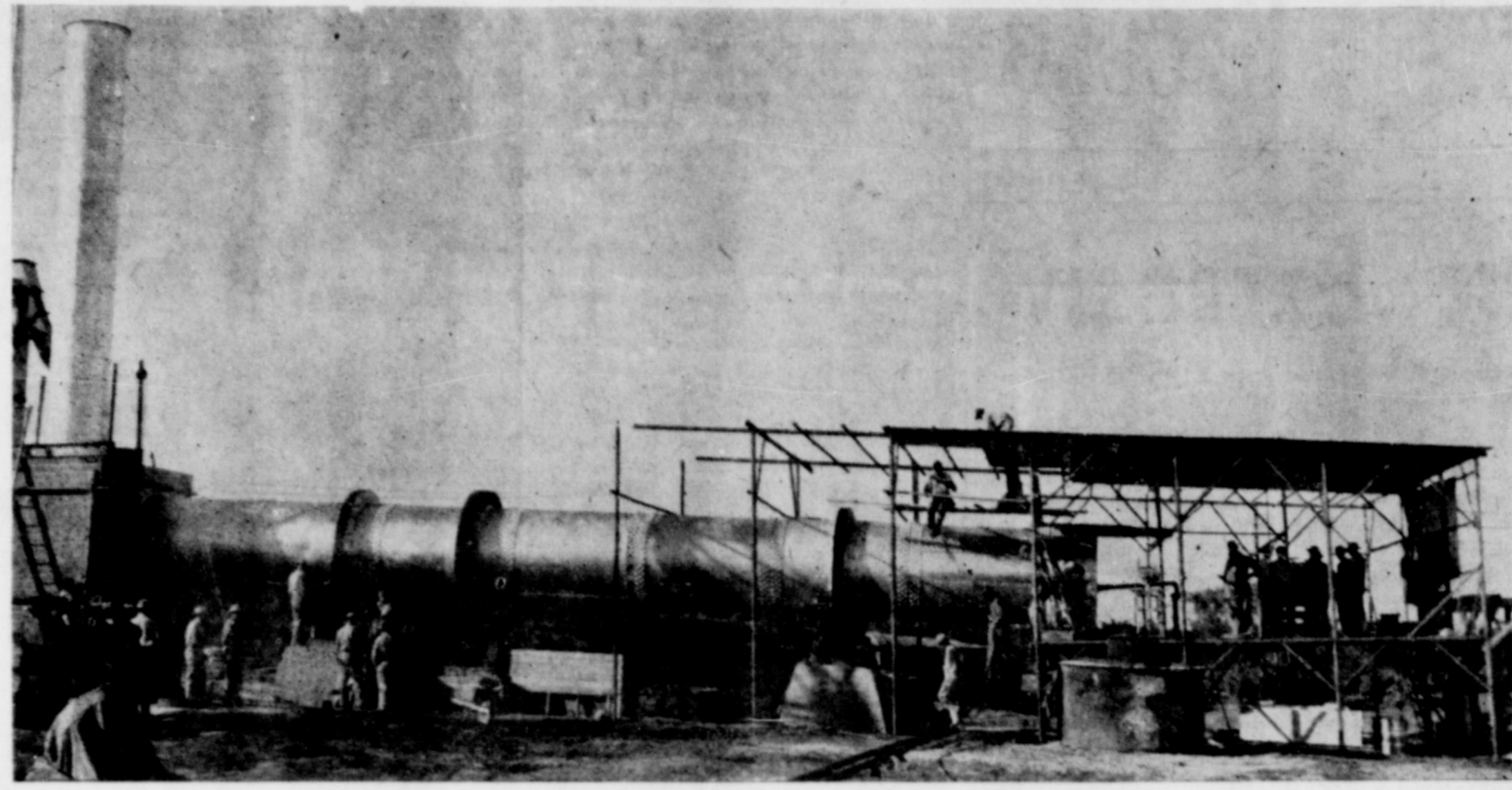

AS IT BEGINS PRODUCTION OF HAYDITE FOR THE FIRST TIME IN TEXAS IN ITS NEW EASTLAND PLANT.

The picture above shows just the first unit of at least two that are to be installed at Eastland's new Texas Lightweight Aggregate Company for the production of Haydite, a lightweight baked clay material similar in use to gravel for making concrete, but far lighter than gravel.

This is the first such plant to be established in the Southwest; the first, in fact south of St. Louis in the United States. Haydite has been used since 1902, but its use has been severely restricted in Texas because of the high shipping rate from St. Louis.

C. W. Cline, president of the Texas Lightweight Aggregate Company and engineer who built the Eastland plant, is authority for the statement that Haydite can be mixed with cement to make materials that will fully finish a residence except for such items as plumbing, windows, doors, etc. Haydite blocks or shaped pieces can be used for walls, floors, ceilings, roofs, even for joists and rafters. It is so versatile that nails can be driven into it and hold.

We all will be doing Eastland a favor by talking up our new industry. Let's do it!
