Business Places And Public Offices To Close Monday

Most Eastland business places will close Monday, Labor Day, in line with an agreement made several years ago, Manager H. J. Tanner of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce said Thursday.

Labor Day is one of a list of designated holidays on which Chamber of Commerce members agreed to close.

Tanner said he had checked with managers of several of the stores, and that all had told him their establishments would shut down for the holiday, the last before Thanksgiving.

The Eastland County Courthouse and the City Hall will be closed all day Monday, officials announced.

County Against State Amendment

About one-fifth of the qualified voters of Eastland County turned out Saturday to show under the state college building fund constitutional amendment by a vote of 1020 against to 280 for.

However, the amendment carried over the state, according to Texas Election Bureau figures. Eastland County was one of a block of West Texas counties that voted heavily against the amendment.

This county also was one in the area where a newspaper advertising campaign against the amendment was conducted by a Texas Tech ex-students' committee.

County Clerk Virgil Love said the figures as reported made up the total vote in the county, as far as he knew. He had a report from only one box in Cisco, but understood the two boxes there had merged for the election, he said.

Showers Gladden Parts Of County

Rainfall of varying proportions fell over fairly large areas of Eastland County Wednesday, after a week of spotty thundershowers had helped alleviate the drought in some sections of the county.

However, the county missed the deluges that fell to the south and east.

Rainfall near Mangum Wednesday put much water into the Leon River, and helped lift the level of the Leon Lake southeast of Eastland. The rainfall also fell on a good deal of the peanut farming area at Flatwood and other showers helped farmers near Staff and south of Cisco.

Gorman got little rain, as did Eastland.

Rainfall at various spots over the county was reported as varying from nothing to more than four inches during the past week, with the average being possibly less than an inch—not enough to break the drought.

Last year's drought was ended on August 26 with a general rain.

Peanut Show Set For Cisco Sept. 13; Queen To Get Bond

Plans are being completed for the third annual Eastland County Peanut Show to be held at the Livestock Show Barn in Cisco Saturday, Sept. 13.

A \$50 saving bond will be presented to the lucky girl selected by the festival as Peanut Queen of the county. All rural communities are being asked to send a girl, and from among those present one will be chosen as Queen of Peanutland.

The program will get underway at 10 a. m. with outstanding speakers on peanut topics. Among the speakers will be B. C. Langley, superintendent of the Stephenville Experiment Station; Emmett Powell, Eastland County PMA administrator; Eastland; R. F. Reeves, Soil Conservation Service, Rising Star; George I. Lane, FHA Eastland; E. A. Miller, extension agronomist, Texas A. & M. College; E. D. David, manager, Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, Gorman and W. B. Starr of Cisco.

The peanut show is open to any adult or boy or girl in the county who has a peanut crop this year. The entries of the boys and girls will compete against the adult entries are limited to three vines each, with the peanuts attached. Prizes for the best peanuts and donors are as follows:

First, ten sacks of Pakab 4-14-4 fertilizer by Gorman Peanut Co., Gorman.

Second, \$10 cash, by Eastland National Bank.

Third, \$7.50 cash, by Linkenhogger Truck and Tractor Co., Eastland.

Fourth, One sack of Ford Fertilizer by King Tractor Co., Eastland.

Fifth, One dress shirt by Carl Johnson Dry Goods Co., Eastland.

Sixth and seventh, ribbons.

There were more than 100 entries in the peanut show last year, and in spite of the drought an equal number is expected to be entered in the 1947 show. The first annual Eastland County Peanut Show was held at Carbon on Sept. 10, 1945. Last year's show was also held in Cisco.

Final work was being done on the new Maverick Field stands Thursday as Eastland High School football prospects prepared for the first day of football practice Monday.

Minus the services of two pre-season casualties, the Mavericks will report to the high school gym at 7:30 Monday for outfitting, and a short workout Monday morning is scheduled to inaugurate a two-day workout schedule, Coach Johnny Little said.

The squad will have 10 days of practice to prepare for the season's first game with Ranger here Sept. 12.

Little said about 100 of the season reserved seat tickets remain unsold.

Two Plead Guilty, Are Taken To Prison

Two men accused of check crimes in Eastland County pleaded guilty before District Judge George Davenport, were sentenced to prison, and were taken to Huntsville Wednesday by Sheriff J. B. Williams.

L. D. Deatheridge, charged with altering a check, was sentenced to two years, and M. C. Whitehead, charged with forgery in a check case, was given three years.

Williams was to return with Jetty N. Wright, who has been serving a prison term and is to stand trial here on six forgery charges.

Harris To Take Forehand's Place

Blake Forehand, who resigned last week as county jailor because of what he termed "private reasons," will be succeeded Monday by City Policeman Bill Harris, who turned in his resignation to the city early this week.

Forehand's resignation came four or five days before the escape last Friday of a prisoner from the county jail. The escapee was C. C. Dooley, who had been arrested in Hamilton and was charged here with swindling and theft by bailee. Dooley also was wanted on various counts in at least six other Texas counties.

An investigation was conducted before Justice of the Peace E. E. Wood on Dooley's escape. Forehand said he had told his wife to lock up the prisoners in the jail, and somehow Dooley was able to get out.

Harris said he felt he would do better financially in the county job, since he will get \$100 a month in cash, plus his living quarters and food for his family.

Dove Hunters To Open Offensive Monday

Dove hunters of Eastland County were oiling their shotguns this week as Monday, first day of the official dove hunting season, drew near.

Hunting and bag limit rules are much the same as last season, with hunting permitted from a half hour before sunrise to sundown, and a one-day bag limit of ten doves per hunter.

Doves were in great danger in drier parts of the county, where water holes are scarce and the birds must flock to the little water to be found.

Magnolia Project To Take Month; Rooms Are Needed

Work was started Thursday on the right-of-way for a 30-mile pipeline laying project south of Eastland which will employ about 150 men for a month or so.

The line is a loop on a Magnolia Petroleum Company pipeline from West Texas to Corsicana. Also to be laid is a 19½ mile loop near Walnut Springs. Both lines are of 12-inch pipe, and contractor for both is the Oklahoma Contracting Company of Dallas.

Many of the workmen who will help build the line were in Eastland this week, and others were arriving daily. Headquarters for the work project is in an office in the King Motor Company building.

C. R. Ice, construction superintendent, said the work near Eastland will take from 20 to 30 days, depending on conditions.

Men on the job need rooms and apartments, and Manager H. J. Tanner of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce asked anyone having extra living space to contact his office at once.

Ice said some men for the job are being hired locally.

The crew laying the line here is one that has been laying a 20-inch line for Magnolia east of Corsicana, and Ice said a record has been set on the project there by averaging 8000 feet of line laid a day.

New Traffic Code To Take Effect Soon

Texas' uniform traffic code will go into effect Friday of next week, and Highway Patrolmen Oscar Avera and P. A. Zeissel Thursday urged motorists to familiarize themselves with rules of the new law.

Many driving practices that could bring no penalty in the past now are strictly against the law, they pointed out.

A booklet on the new law may be obtained by writing the Texas Safety Association at Austin.

Zeissel and Avera will conduct schools on the new code for officers and safety directors at Ranger and Cisco this week end. Classes will be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights, at Ranger from 6 to 8 p. m. and at Cisco from 9 to 11 p. m. Classes will be in the police stations of the two towns.

The average liability per failure was \$98,000 in July compared to \$67,000 in June and \$17,000 in May, indicating that the size of businesses undergoing failures is larger each month.

Stock Shipments Remain Above 1946

Livestock shipments in Texas slid below May figures during June but remained far above June 1946 levels, The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Total shipments sagged 19 per cent from May to June, but May had seen accelerated activity in sheep marketings, and the decline was an expected one. June shipments totaled 10,083 carloads for an 8 per cent gain over June 1946 loadings.

Cattle shipments slid 27 per cent from May to June, shipments of calves sagged 6 per cent, and hog shipments plunged lower by 28 per cent. Only gain during the month was the 10 per cent hike in shipments of sheep.

The June-to-June comparison reverses the monthly trend, as cattle, calves and hogs saw increased shipments and sheep felt a 21 per cent decline.

AUSTIN — Accelerated movement of grain and grain products was responsible for the rising revenue freight in the Southwestern District, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

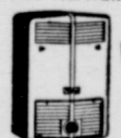

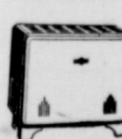

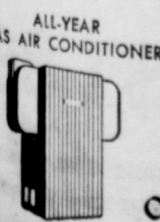
