Stock Shipments Show Decline

Austin, Texas—Texas shipments of livestock in June slid 20 percent below May levels, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported. June movements totaled 8,870 carloads, or 12 per cent below a year earlier.

Hog shipments decreased the greatest over the month—29 per cent; while cattle shipments, down 27 per cent, followed closely behind. Movement of calves and sheep increased 8 and 4 per cent, respectively, from May.

Compared to June 1947, hog shipments climbed 31 per cent, despite the slack in shipments over the month. The other groups registered declines: sheep, 23 per cent; cattle, 12 per cent; and calves, 6 per cent.

Interstate shipments plus Fort Worth dipped 17 per cent from May and 10 per cent from a year earlier.

Typhus Reaches Peak In August, Dr. Cox Warns

Austin, Texas—Statistical information compiled by the State Health Department shows a total of 182 cases of typhus fever so far this year. During the week between July 17-24, seven new cases were reported, one-half the seven year median of fourteen for the week of July 24.

The disease reaches its peak in the month of August, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said.

Over a five year period from 1943 to 1947, typhus fever has been responsible for 273 deaths. The death rate has been reduced from sixty-three in 1943, to thirty in 1948.

"Typhus fever as we know it in Texas is transmitted by the fleas of infected rats," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said. "It can be controlled by the simple expedient of consistently maintaining a program of rat poisoning, rat trapping, and rat proofing."

Typhus fever is marked by a severe headache, chills and fever. A reddish mottling appears on the skin, and a hacking cough develops. The headache is the outstanding symptom because of its severity. Illness may last from 5 to 14 days.

The greatest outbreak of typhus fever, or Brill's disease, was in 1941, when there was a total of 733 reported cases.

The Health Officer added that it was a sad commentary on our position as the most health minded nation on Earth if we allow the disease to flourish when the means for its control and eradication is right at hand.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an Amendment to Article IV, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 3a, so as to provide for succession to the office of Governor in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, or fails to qualify, before taking his oath of office as Governor; and providing for the issuance of the

necessary proclamation and publication by the Governor.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended, by adding another Section to follow Section 3, and be designated Section 3a, to read as follows:
 "Section 3a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, has died, then the person having the highest number of votes for the office of

Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until after the next general election. It is further provided that in the event the person with the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, shall become disabled, or fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any succession to the Governorship not otherwise provided for in this constitution, may be provided for by law; provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all the restrictions and inhibitions imposed in this Constitution on the Governor."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine and each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.
 Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the date provided by law in the month of November, A. D. 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949, and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis be-

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


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Texas Farm Income Increases In June

Austin, Texas— Texas farm cash income, totaling \$131,858,000, climbed 23 per cent from May to June, the Bureau of Business Research reported.

However, June farm cash income slid 29 per cent below June 1947.

Wheat brought Texas farmers \$28,769,000 in June, for the greatest source of farm cash income. Increased marketings of oats, wool, sheep, calves, poultry, eggs and milk products contributed to the over-all gain from May.

The largest farm cash income was in the Red Bed Plains where farmers' incomes increased 95 per cent from a month earlier, totaling \$24,346,000. Black and Grand Prairies' income totaled \$19,652,000, and Edwards Plateau registered \$18,800,000.

Farm incomes in Black and Grand Prairies and East Texas Timbered Plains more than doubled their May averages, as sales of wheat, cattle, and fruits and vegetables increased. Decreases over the month were reported in the South Texas Plains, the Lower Rio Grande Valley, the Southern High Plains, the Trans-Pecos area, and the Coastal Prairies, in that order.

Only the Lower Rio Grande Valley, Edwards Plateau, Coastal Prairies, South Texas Plains, and the Trans-Pecos areas reported June-to-June gains, ranging from 19 to 4 per cent. Declines varied from 49-per-cent dips in the Red Bed Plains and the East Texas Timbered Plains to an 8-per-cent drop in the Southern Texas Prairies.

For the first one-half of 1948, farm cash income has been \$530,182,000 as compared to \$570,845,000 for a like period in 1947.

Adjusted for seasonal variations the Bureau's index of farm cash income for June was 345 per cent of the prewar base period (1935-39).

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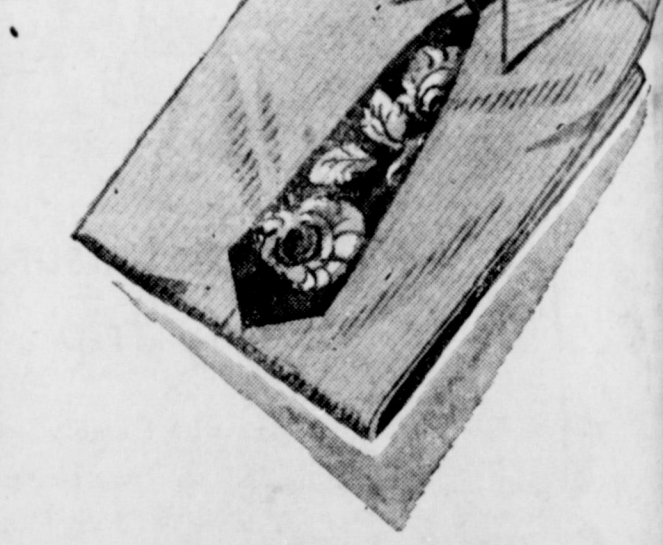


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
