Strong Damaging Winds Hit Area

Some Hail, Little Rain Seen



Although little moisture was recorded, high winds took its toll on the Bailey county area Wednesday night.

What appeared to be a small tornado passed through the area approximately two to three miles north of Muleshoe Wednesday night, causing considerable damage.

STORM DAMAGE-- Wednesday night's storm tore the roof from this barn North of Muleshoe. Some of the roof was thrown into the yard of a neighboring yard. The storm also broke large limbs from trees and tore part of the roof from a house on down the highway (214) from this barn.

A barn at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Watson, west of North Highway 214 was destroyed. The roof landed in the back yard of the Carl Wheeler home.

Large tree limbs were broken and scattered across the country road. Debris was also scattered on the highway and the Texas Department of Public Safety workers were called out to clear the highway.

Farther north on Highway 214, a house just south of Locker Flying Service had part of its roof blown away.

Friday morning the Journal talked with Duane Lloyd, manager of Bailey County Electric. Lloyd stated that they lost 28 electrical poles in storms in the Circle Back, and West Camp areas, as well as west of Muleshoe. Workmen worked well into the night restoring electrical service in these areas.

It was reported that Gary Morris

horse was injured in the storm. Despite rumors of the horse being killed, the Journal was told Friday morning that the horse was at the vets and would soon recover.

Cindy Cargile at Lariat reported that they received .2 of an inch of rain and very strong winds Wednesday night.

In the West Camp area, the Jimmy Crawfords received .7 of an inch of rain and pea sized hail.

James Shepard at the West Camp Gin stated that the area received anywhere from .4 to .9 of an inch of rain and a little hail damage Wednesday night and .2 of an inch of rain on Thursday night.

"Most of the hail damage was back toward Lariat," Shepard said.

The James Wedels reported spotted rain and some hail damage.

Demp Foster from Foster Fertilizer in Lazbuddie reported that

5:00 a.m.--The group leaves the Extension office and travels to Littlefield to pick up the other four 4-H'ers--Brooks Brunson, Erin Kloiber, Keith Newton and Trissi Walden. We are now ready to go to Dallas to catch our first train this afternoon.

6:00 a.m.--Depart Littlefield after a last minute bathroom stop.

8:40 a.m.--Stop in Sweetwater at McDonald's for breakfast. Tricia and Kay fill up their vehicles. It takes almost an hour for our stop.

9:20 a.m.--On our way again.

11:40 a.m. Stop for gas for Kandy's car and a bathroom break.

1:00 p.m.--Stop for lunch in Arlington at Whataburger and McDonald's. This stop did not take as long as our breakfast stop did.

1:45 p.m.--Arrived at Union Station in Dallas. The train personnel told us that we could have gotten on the train in Ft. Worth. We checked our bags in at the station and walked through the tunnel under the street over to Reunion Tower and went to the observation deck. Kimberly almost passed out from fright and not

breathing. She may not make it to the top of the Sears Tower tomorrow in Chicago.

3:00 p.m.--We are back from Reunion Tower. All of our carry-on bags are brought into the train station and we waited to pre-board the train.

3:45 p.m.--We pre-boarded the train in our reserved section and left Kay at the station. We have the upper front half of the second car behind the locomotive.

4:17 p.m.--The train, the Texas Eagle, pulls away from the station, only 12 minutes late. We had about a 30 minute delay because of heavy freight traffic before we cleared the Dallas City limits. Just about all of the kids went to the lounge car for a soft drink. We wanted to eat at the 6:45 p.m. dinner seating, but the Chief of Services on board said we had to eat at the 5:30 p.m. one. That will be pretty early, but we will live with it.

4:45 p.m.--Kimberly got locked in the bathroom and the Cabin Steward had to get her out.

5:15 p.m.---We just passed the Mesquite High School building on the right. We seem to be beginning to pick up speed now.

5:30 p.m.--To the dining car for dinner. We had a baked half of chicken, mashed potatoes, corn, tossed salad and iced tea. The adults thought it was really good but the kids didn't like it.

6:30 p.m.--Back from dinner and we have to consolidate close together by the time we get to

Little Rock, Arkansas or at about 11:30 p.m. Most of the kids are either playing cards or sleeping.

9:00 p.m.--We decided to go ahead and move to our assigned 20 seats. It was easier to do it now than later.

11:30 p.m.--Almost everyone was asleep until we stopped in Little Rock to take on more passengers. Our kids got a little loud and we had to quieten them down.

11:45 p.m.--Everyone is down for the night to try to sleep.

SATURDAY, JUNE 19

7:30 A.M.--We arrive in Saint Louis. They add more cars to the train so we are not the first car after the crew car any longer. We leave Saint Louis at about 8:30 a.m. or so. The train made several more stops before we finally got to Chicago.

2:45 p.m.--We disembarked from the train at Union Station in Chicago after a 20 minute backwards ride into the station. Union Station is huge.

3:00 p.m.--We all store our carry-on luggage in the lockers and most everyone calls home. Curtis realizes that he left his hat on the train, even after making the speech about getting all of our belongings.

3:30 p.m.--We depart for the Sears Tower (the world's tallest building). Kimberly has conquered her fear of heights. She made the 90 second ride to the top with flying colors. She even said that the view was awesome and took pictures. We watched a short program about Chicago before going to the top.

4:30 p.m.--We ate supper at the Burger King in the Sears Tower. The food was really good and this

TDA Offers Farm Worker Pesticide Safety Training Here

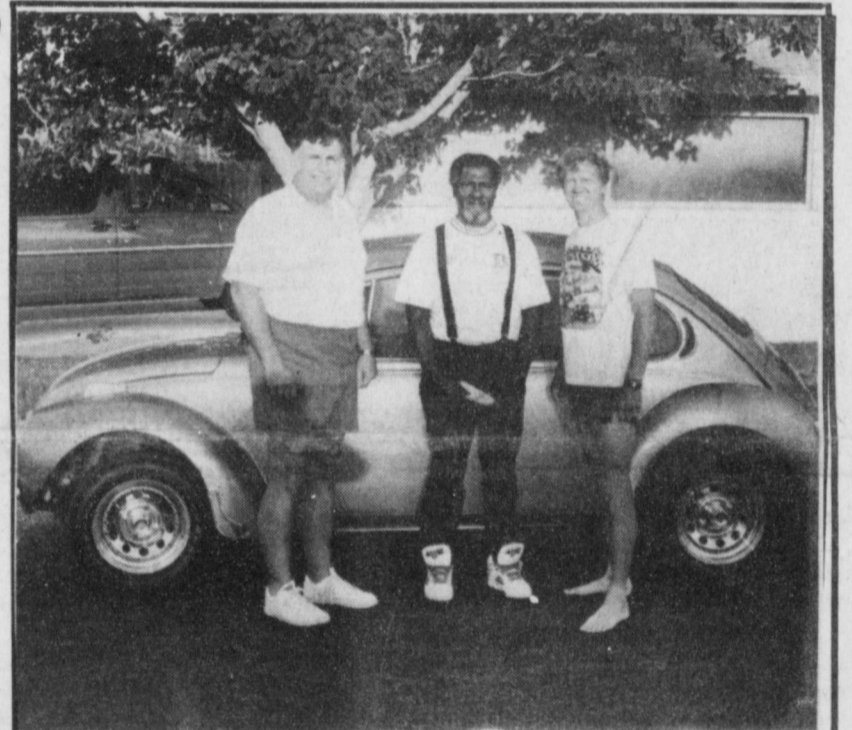
Farm workers who want to learn more about pesticide safety are urged to attend a free Texas Department of Agriculture training session at 7 p.m. Tuesday, July 20, at the Texas Migrant Council Head Start Center, 101 E. Ave. B in Muleshoe.

This training allows farm workers to protect themselves by working safely around chemicals and treated areas. Workers completing the training also receive a certificate in pesticide safety.

Workers will have an opportunity to ask TDA employees questions during the training session, which lasts about one hour.

"Texas is a pioneer in farm safety programs," Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said. "This training allows farm workers to keep up-to-date on the latest information about pesticides and safe ways of handling them."

Senator Bivins Will Hold Town Hall Meeting Here Tuesday

Senator Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo announced his plans to visit with Senate District 31 constituents at a series of town hall meetings.

Bivins will be in Muleshoe at 11:30 a.m. Tuesday in the Muleshoe State Bank community room.

With this second term, Bivins was instrumental in passing legislation to reform trucking regulations in Texas, reform products liability laws, implement Caller ID, and revise the state's Penal Code.

Bivins stated that he believed the 73rd Legislative Session was the most productive he had seen in years.

"We in the Crown of Texas fared better than we have in years, with legislation and appropriations. At the same time, Texas lived within its means, not passing a tax bill for the first time in biennia," Bivins said.

"School finance was the only sour note of the session," Bivins Cont. Page 6, Col. 2

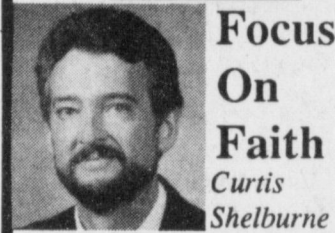

The parable was simple one, but its point nailed Simon to the wall. And with Simon, most of us.

We forget that Jesus didn't call us because of our superiority or intelligence or moral purity. He called us because of our deep need. It's always as dangerous as it is tempting to focus more on our own righteousness than on His.

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Bruns Wins Prize In International Competition

The 35th annual International Johann Sebastian Bach Competition was held June 28-30 in Washington, D.C. at the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. This year's competition was for organists, and Jeremy S. Bruns, Associate Organist at St. John's United Methodist Church in Lubbock, Texas, and organ performance major at Texas Tech University, was a competitor. Bruns, recent winner of the MTNA National Organ Competition in Spokane, Washington, was invited to perform as the youngest competitor in the competition.

Twenty-six organists from around the world, between 20 and 40 years of age, met at 9 a.m. on Monday morning, June 28, to review the rules of the competition and view the competition instrument before they each were allowed a very strict 10 minutes to practice on the instrument before the competitions.

Tuesday, the Semi-Finals began. Three judges, one from the U.S., one from Germany, and one from Paris, France heard all 26 competitors play the same work by Bach, performed from memory, and gave a score between 0 and 95 (hidden by a screen, the judges were not allowed to see the competitors or converse with each other). On Wednesday at noon, everyone

finished playing, the results were compiled, and six finalists were announced. Mr. Bruns was one of the finalists.

The finalists then performed once more for the final rating (the competition is so close that the judges are to name three First-prize winners and three Runner-up winners, without ranking them further). Bruns was named Runner-up.

The youngest First-prize winner, Joel Hastings, is a graduate of the University of Michigan and is a candidate for a Master's Degree in Performance there. Wesley Beal, another First-prize winner, received a Bachelor's degree from Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York, and received Master's Degrees in Theology, Organ Performance and Piano Performance from Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas, where he now resides. Kathy Hanford, also First-prize winner, is a Doctoral Candidate at Eastman, where she received her Master's Degree. Other Runner-up prize winners were Sung Hu Chung of Rockville, a doctoral candidate at Catholic University, and Samuel S. Soria Jr. of Chicago.

Countries other than the U.S. represented by competitors included Spain, Sweden, Canada, Germany, and Norway.

Mango And Pineapple Coconut Tart

1 cup all purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/8 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup unsalted butter
2 large eggs
1/2 fresh pineapple, sliced

1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/8 teaspoon ground clover
1 1/2 cup shredded or ground coconut
1/2 cup sugar
1 cup mango preserves

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Butter 10 in. springform pan. Sift first 5 ingredients into medium bowl. Stir in coconut. Using electric mixer, cream butter and 1/2 cup sugar in large bowl until smooth. Beat in egg yolks. Add flour to mixture and mix until just blended. Spread 1 and 3/4 cup of the batter on bottom of prepared pan. Top with preserves and sliced pineapple leaving 1/2 inch border. Spoon remaining batter into pastry bag fitted with 3/8 inch plain tip. Pipe filing in lattice design over preserves and pineapple. Chill for 20 minutes. Bake tart for 45 minutes. Transfer to rack and cool. Just before serving, sprinkle lightly with powdered sugar.

Grilled Kingfish And Mango And Papaya Guacamole

This is a great sauce for any grilled or barbecued fish (Tuna, King Marlin, Mahi Mahi, etc.)

FISH:
4, 8 oz. Kingfish fillets, seasoned and grilled

SAUCE:
1 mango and 1/2 papaya, peeled, crushed, seeded, and diced
1 large tomato, diced
2 green onions, diced
1 tablespoon cilantro, chopped
1 tablespoon cumin
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon honey

1 red onion, diced
3 cloves garlic, minced
1/2 cup lime juice
2 teaspoons hot sauce
1/4 teaspoon black ground pepper
1/4 cup rice vinegar

Place all ingredients in food processor and blend until mixed (but still course). Then refrigerate. Makes 3 cups. Serve with grilled fish.

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Diving History Topic Of Rotary Program

According to a film shown at the Rotary meeting at noon Tuesday man has tried to unravel the mysteries of the ocean floor for decades. "The future of food, energy, and space requires more knowledge of the sea floor. The ocean floor has become more important over the past few years."

"When man first began to explore the ocean floor they could only stay under water as long as they could go without breathing."

"In the 18th century the first bell, with air piped down into it was invented. Out of the water, the bell weighed about 200 pounds and it restricted movement in the water. The bell was suspended by two lines, the life line and an air line."

"Diving history was made in 1937 in Lake Michigan. For the first time they didn't have to rely on air piped down a tube. The first scuba diving gear was tested. Over the years more sophisticated gear was developed."

"A glass bottomed boat and scuba diving gear helped to explore the ocean floor."

"Under sea robots were later developed, various shapes and designs were developed."

"In August 1966, an event took place, an Air Force Bomber went down and the Navy sent an undersea robot down to retrieve it. With the help of Alvin, (robot) designed to carry a group of three, it was retrieved."

"In the 1970's Alvin was more thoroughly used to explore the ocean floor."

"Although two decades have been successful, unraveling the mysteries of the bottom of the sea are just beginning."

The Texas Agricultural Hazard Communication Act, more commonly known as the Right-to-Know law, serves to protect farm workers when they work around pesticides.

Under this law, administered by TDA, workers must be advised about the chemicals they are working around, pesticide exposure

symptoms and ways to guard against contamination.

Farmers must provide written information sheets on pesticides and read these sheets to workers in the field.

After taking this course, participants receive a certification card which they can present to employers.
