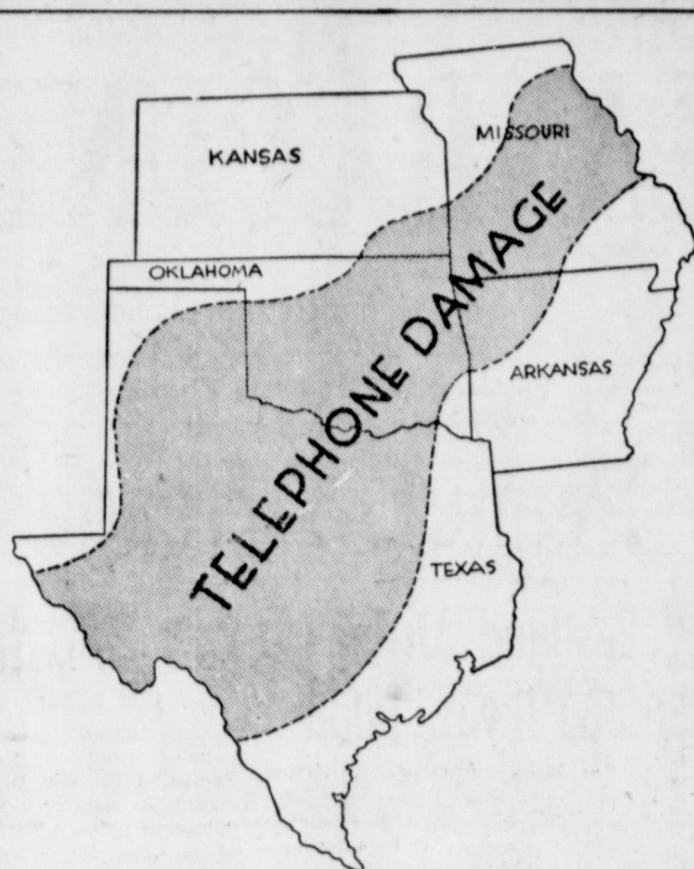
OLDEN HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

Back in the Early 20's - we started out abstracting Eastland County land titles. Then as now, the abstract was a necessary part of every estate or leasehold transaction.
