Eastland Rainfall For '49 Passes Entire '48 Total

Eastland passed the total of last year's rainfall over the week end as hard midnight showers Saturday and Sunday sent Lake Eastland surging over the spillway and apparently assured the city of nearly two years of water supply.

During all of 1948, only 13.08 inches of rain fell in Eastland, according to the U. S. Weather Bureau gauge at the home of J. A. Beard.

Beard gauged Saturday night's rain at .85 inch and Sunday night's at .65. Added to the generous moisture already received in the county this year, that brings the year's total so far to 13.90, or almost an inch more than fell during all the 12 months of 1948.

May normally is the rainiest month in Eastland, and more showers are in the offing, if the predictions of the old timers are to be believed.

"Rain breeds rain, and drouth breeds drouth, they say.

Farmers were getting restive after days of rains, but this week's clear and cooler weather put them in a good mood again.

To the south, in the Carbon area, not as much rain had fallen recently as it had in Eastland, and farmers were plowing at full speed last week, getting ready to plant peanuts and other crops.

The water running over the Lake Eastland spillway was a sight for dry eyes, and many an Eastland resident who had never seen the water flow over the top witnessed the spectacle for the first time Sunday.

The water came over with "fine force, but not with as much force as it did in 1942, the last year the spillway ran. In that year, water flooded parts of Eastland closest to the river, as it had on numerous occasions before that.

During the seven years since the last running of the spillway, the lake had filled nearly to the top several times.

C. T. Lucas, city commissioner for 12 years until his retirement two years ago, said the water running through the lake was quite beneficial, in that it would scour silt from the lake bottom and thus serve to clean out the lake, to an extent.

Children by the scores played in the swiftly running but shallow water of the spillway Sunday, and the adult spectators stood on the banks and commented on how different it was from a few months ago when it appeared Eastland was running out of water.

Towns On Katy Protest Train Cuts

Towns along the Texas Central branch of the Katy Railroad between Waco and Stamford are facing a possible curtailment of passenger and mail service on that line.

The Texas Railroad Commission was asked Wednesday to hold a hearing which may decide whether there will be a Central Texas duplication of the North Texas "Whistle Stop" dispute between Electra and other towns on that line and the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad.

Among the towns on the Texas Central branch of the M. K. & T. that would be affected by any change in passenger and mail service on that line are Cisco, Carbon, Gorman, DeLeon and Whitney.

The request for the Railroad Commission to hold a hearing on the matter came from officials of Whitney. A meeting was also held Wednesday at DeLeon to discuss the same matter. Katy officials are reported to have said that beginning May 22, passenger and mail service over the Texas Central branch between Waco and Stamford would be reduced to that of a mixed freight and passenger train service and that this would be irregular.

Ranch Week Events Set For Saturday; Band Will Benefit

Ranch Week in Eastland, by proclamation of Mayor W. W. Linkenhoger, begins today, Friday the 13th, and will continue for a week.

In his proclamation, the mayor noted that Eastland is thankful for the rains that have brought a new feeling of hope and optimism brought by the rains this spring, and is opening its doors to its friend from the surrounding ranching country.

Practically all of the events scheduled for the week so far will be held Saturday, when all citizens have been warned to wear western regalia or suffer the indignity of being lodged in the "jail" to be erected on the Courthouse lawn.

At 3 p. m. Saturday there will be a western parade around the Courthouse square and to the Post Office on Main Street, with decorated cars, floats, and mounted riders in the parade. Music will be furnished by the Eastland High School Band.

At 8 p. m. there will be a three-city band concert on the south side of the Courthouse, with the high school bands from Eastland, Ranger and Cisco taking part.

Also Saturday night, a carnival will be held on the Courthouse square, sponsored by the Eastland Band Boosters Club.

Proceeds from the carnival are to be put into the club's uniform fund, to be used to pay for the uniforms now being worn by the band.

One of the features of the afternoon parade will be members of Beta Sigma Phi Sorority, garbed in western costumes, riding the city fire truck.

\$1517 Donated To Band Fund

A total of \$1517 has been contributed to the uniform and instrument purchase fund of the Eastland Band Boosters Club, and a total of about \$3200 is needed now to pay off current debts against uniform and instrument purchases.

Club officials said Thursday that virtually all the money collected to date has been applied on band instrument purchases.

The club is one of the chief promoters of the Ranch Week activities in Eastland, and the uniform fund will benefit from the carnival to be held Saturday night.

Former Record Employee Killed In Kansas Crash

Isaac Alva Head, 23, of Fort Worth, adopted son of Mr. and Mrs. R. Ellis Head of 1012 West Main Street, was killed about 10 p. m. Wednesday as he was helping change a flat tire by the roadside just outside Wichita, Kans., where he worked part of the time.

Head's employer, E. E. Manney, owner of print shops in Fort Worth and Wichita, was injured also.

Funeral services for Head will be held in Eastland at 2:30 p. m. Friday, but other details of the funeral had not been arranged Thursday evening.

According to reports, a truck struck the rear of Manney's car as the two men were fixing a flat near Wichita. Kansas officers arrested the truck driver.

Mrs. Head, the former Quata Laney of Eastland, collapsed at the Fort Worth Municipal Airport when informed of her husband's death. She and Mrs. Manney had heard of the accident and were preparing to fly to Wichita.

Head was a World War II veteran, and for a time after leaving the service was employed by The Eastland County Record in Eastland as a printer.

Survivors include his widow and two children, Ray, 4, and Michael, three months.

His body was to arrive at Hamner Funeral Home in Eastland at noon Friday.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Nardulli, en route to Chicago, suffered severe cuts and bruises about their faces and bodies, and Mrs. Nardulli received a broken shoulder. They and Taylor still were in the Ranger General Hospital Thursday.

Officers said the truck driven by Taylor belonged to Johnny Trigg of Cisco.

Born June 25, 1926, Stiffler was a 1944 graduate of Eastland High School. In August, 1944, he entered the Army, and was seriously wounded that winter in the Battle of the Bulge.

Following his discharge from the Army, he was employed for a time by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and served in Washington, D. C., and Portland, Ore.

Personnel To Stay Same, Heck Says; O'Brien Resigns

Changes in administrative policies and methods in the Eastland city government are forthcoming, but he is not ready to discuss them yet. I. C. Heck, new city manager, said this week.

Heck, one-time state comptroller of Alabama, was appointed at a special City Commission meeting Friday night of last week. At the same meeting, the resignation of Earl O'Brien, city manager for two years, was accepted.

O'Brien was helping out in the city hall this week only. He said he was considering several offers of employment, but had not yet decided on accepting any.

"I may just rest for a while," he said.

Heck, an auditor and accountant who moved to Eastland last Sept. 1 from San Antonio, said that no personnel changes are being considered at present for the city workers. There will be changes in policies and perhaps job assignments in an effort to obtain efficiency, he said.

He stressed that the city will try to do its best to serve the public, and will seek the co-operation of the public.

He said he had not had time to study all the problems faced by the city administration, and could not make any comprehensive statement of policy until he is more familiar with the workings of the city government.

One policy he already has decided on, however, is to try to stop the wild speeding in motor cars by teen-agers in Eastland, Heck said. He said he personally had observed several cases of excessively reckless driving, and had pondered over the possibly fatal results of such driving.

The parents of all such youthful offenders brought into Corporation Court will be told of their children's offenses and will know of the policies of the court, which include a light fine for first offenders, with a much stiffer fine for second offenders, and a still more severe one for third, and so on, Heck said.

Heck was born in Kansas and was taken to San Antonio as a small child. After going through the schools there, he began an industrial and merchandising career that finally led to a job with the U. S. Steel Corporation in Birmingham, Ala., and he was connected with various firms there until 1939, when he was appointed state comptroller of Alabama, a position he held under two governors until his resignation in 1946 because of Mrs. Heck's health.

He moved back to San Antonio and was a public accountant until his move to Eastland, where he has been employed by the Coast Oil Company and also has done auditing and accounting work for the public.

WELL PUMPS 20 BARRELS IN EIGHT HOURS

A beam pump tesa of the Bob Gilchrist No. 1 Brashear well east of Eastland early this week disclosed that Gilchrist definitely had drilled in a commercial oil well.

The pumping test showed 20 barrels of oil in eight hours, with only four barrels of water. It was estimated the well would produce 50 barrels per day, a good well at the depth of less than 1500 feet.

The water pouring over the spillway of Lake Eastland early this morning was beautiful to see after a long drouth and all the worry about our water supply.

None of them had ever seen the water pour over the spillway before in our four years of residence in Eastland.

When we have plenty of water in the lake, it seems to be the time to do some very interesting things about our water situation. Eastland is getting to be a big girl now, and she needs a lot of water.

We have heard all sorts of proposals, including a new dam at Col-Creek to pump water from the Cisco back when Lake Cisco had lots of water in it.

It seems to me a sensible and less expensive way out is to build the present dam and spillway to the height needed to impound a really sufficient lake.

It is objected, the water would flood the T. & P. tracks, the railroad would fight the spillway, and so on.

It seems so, but it still seems to me that the railroad bed could be raised along with the dam raising some other method of saturating the railroad used, much more than a new and expensive dam to be built.

It is all wet—but isn't better than what we've been hoping for?

Some of the members of the City Commission have been arguing about which one deserves the credit for producing the spillway in Lake Eastland, the former City Commission or the present one.

When the water spilling out of Lake Sunday, Herman Rush-Pearson Grimes were arguing point. And earlier, Dave still another member of the city body, had been modulating to take credit for the lake, which he said was of his campaign promise.

They were kidding, of course, but all were profoundly glad for a while, a water short-coming would not be added to the other things city commissioners have to worry about.

America Named By German Professor
 The western hemisphere was named "America" by a German professor—Martin Waldseemüller—who wrote the introduction to a sixteenth century edition of Ptolemy's Geography which was prepared by a small french college in the Vosges mountains. Only the small part of the new world which Americus Vesputius had seen from his ship was originally named in his honor: but when exploration revealed the geography of the hemisphere—linking the discoveries of Lief, Columbus, Henry Cabot, Vesputius, etc.—the word "America" was well on its way to becoming the by-word applied to the entire mainland from Labrador to Patagonia.

Versatile Waffles Fit Any Menu! (See Recipes Below)

Waffle Tricks
 "AS LONG as I know how to make waffles, I can get together a good breakfast, a fancy luncheon or serve a glamorous dessert," said a new bride. This young lady was indeed on the right track; she had perfected one dish, and she could be certain that any occasion would be covered simply but adequately with it.

Waffles may be varied in many different ways, and they can easily go from breakfast to luncheon to dessert for dinner or a party. No, not the same waffle, of course, but with a slight variation waffles really can do all these things.

Plain waffles with butter and syrup or honey are ideal for breakfast main dishes. Try pairing them with crisply browned sausages, crisply browned bacon strips, or ham.

For luncheon, vary the waffle, and serve with creamed eggs, chicken, tuna fish or mushrooms.

The dessert waffle is rich, and it may be plain, orange or even chocolate-flavored. Have you ever put together chocolate waffles with peppermint stick ice cream and passed the chocolate sauce? Yes, simple but very elegant! Or, how about crisp and golden brown waffles crowned with whipped cream and bananas? Yes, another favorite!

BASIC WAFFLES may be quickly and simply made from a pancake mix in the following manner:

Quick Waffles
 (Makes 5 servings)
 2 cups pancake ready-mix
 1/2 cup melted shortening
 2 eggs
 2 cups milk

Place all ingredients in a medium-sized mixing bowl. Beat with a rotary egg beater until batter is fairly smooth. Pour batter into a waffle iron which has been heated. Bake until iron stops steaming.

Honey-Butter Sauce: Warm one cup of liquid honey in the top part of a double boiler. Add to it 1/4 cup butter, 1/4 teaspoon of cinnamon and a dash of nutmeg. Serve warm.

Light and delicious oatmeal waffles have a nutty flavor all their own. Besides adding flavor, rolled oats make waffles high in the important B vitamins, protein and iron. They're excellent served with butter and syrup, along with crisp bacon. For a supper main dish, pair them with creamed eggs.

Oatmeal Waffles
 (Makes 6 servings)
 1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour
 3 teaspoons baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 2 eggs
 1 1/2 cups milk
 1/3 cup melted shortening
 1/2 cup quick, rolled oats, uncooked

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add eggs, milk and melted shortening. Beat with rotary egg beater until fairly smooth. Fold in rolled oats.

LYNN SAYS:
 Use these Hints For Making Waffles
 Season the grids of a new waffle iron unless the manufacturer advises you otherwise. To season the iron, when it is still cold, brush with cooking oil. Heat the iron to baking temperature and allow to cool. Discard the first waffle made as it will be greasy. After this, waffles will not stick to the iron.

Don't peek into the waffle iron while it steams. This means the waffle is still baking.

Creamed Eggs
 (Serves 6)
 2 tablespoons butter
 3 tablespoons flour
 1/2 teaspoon onion juice
 2 cups milk
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 6 hard-cooked eggs, shelled and chopped

Melt butter in top of double boiler; add flour, onion juice and salt. Add milk slowly, stirring constantly, and cook until smooth and thickened. Add the eggs and cook until heated through. Serve over waffles.

***Corn Meal Waffles**
 (Makes 5 servings)
 1 cup sifted enriched flour
 3 teaspoons baking powder
 1 teaspoon salt
 2 tablespoons sugar
 1 cup corn meal
 2 eggs
 1-1/3 cups milk
 1/2 cup melted butter or fat

Sift together dry ingredients. Place eggs, milk, sifted dry ingredients and melted butter in a bowl. Beat with rotary beater until batter is smooth. Do not overbeat. Pour batter onto hot waffle iron and bake until iron stops steaming.

THERE ARE ANY number of variations for dessert waffles. Use them for an easy dessert, or serve them as a party snack.

Dessert Waffles
 (Makes 10-12 small waffles)
 1 cup sifted cake flour
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 3 teaspoons baking powder
 3 eggs, separated
 1 cup rich milk

Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon-colored. Add to milk, then blend in dry ingredients. Fold in melted butter and last, the stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into waffle iron and bake until steaming ceases.

Ice Cream and Waffles: Use dessert waffles, top with a scoop of vanilla ice cream and serve with sweetened, crushed strawberries or chocolate sauce and bananas.

Chocolate Chip Waffles: Stir into the batter, before baking, 1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips.

Chocolate Waffle: Add to dessert waffle, 1/2 cup sugar sifted with dry ingredients. Fold in with butter, 1 1/2 squares, melted, unsweetened chocolate.

Orange Waffles: Fold in the dessert waffle batter, two tablespoons orange juice and 1 1/2 teaspoons grated orange rind. Serve with orange or pineapple sauce.

If batter spills on the iron, let it cook on before trying to remove it. When dry, it flicks off easily.
 When brown spots appear on the iron, from spattering fat, use a fine scouring powder, rubbed gently, to remove them.
 Keep waffle grids in good condition by putting them away without kinks and knots.
 Leftover kernel corn, cooked rice and blueberries may be added to waffle batter. One cup of any of these food items is folded in the waffle before baking.

Care of Floors

Question: A few months ago I had all the floors sanded, filled and varnished. I would like to wash them but have been advised not to use water, as it discolors floors. Please advise.

Answer: The manufacturers of hardwood flooring do not, as a rule, approve of using water on such flooring. As your floors have been so recently varnished, it should be fairly easy to clean them with some of the special cleaning preparations intended for this purpose. Or you can clean them by wiping with cloths damp with turpentine. Consult your hardware dealer. First take up the loose dust in the usual way.
