The number one problem of the Eastland City Commission at this time is that of sanitation, it was agreed by members of the commission and some 25 employees, including the heads of all departments, at a meeting Tuesday night in which the various matters pertaining to the city as a whole and the individual departments in particular, were discussed.

All members of the commission, with the exception of Commissioner Rushing, were present at the Tuesday night meeting.

The Tuesday night meeting, one of many similar meetings planned, was to find out what is needed to be done, what equipment and materials are on hand or available to do it with, and to consider plans for supplying needed materials and equipment.

The general public was invited to the Tuesday night meeting, but no one was in attendance other than city commissioners and employees.

Car Falls On Colin Campbell

Collin Campbell of Carbon, Mechanic employed by Moser Nash Motors, Eastland Nash dealers, was critically injured Sunday afternoon while doing some emergency repair work on a car belonging to Dan Boatwright of Carbon at the Boatwright home.

The car, a Lincoln Zephyr, had been jacked up off the ground and Campbell was underneath it endeavoring to repair a broken axle when the car fell on him pinning him beneath it, crushing his breast bone and breaking seven ribs. He was working alone.

Mrs. Boatwright, alone in the house, heard the car when it fell and immediately investigated, finding Campbell helpless beneath the machine and gave the alarm. Neighbors, responding to her cries for help, succeeded in lifting the car off Campbell barely in time, doctors said, to save his life.

Campbell was rushed to the hospital at Gorman where relatives said his condition was reported as being fairly good.

Campbell is a brother-in-law of Pete Clement, employee at the Eastland County Courthouse.

Shivers Accused By Rep. Jobe In Eastland Talk

Lieutenant Governor Allen Shivers was accused in Eastland Tuesday of having deserted the Texas Senate for a week and a half for a trip to Washington to get a job as ambassador to Mexico for Governor Jester, so Shivers could become governor.

The charge was made by State Rep. Billie Mae Jobe of Putnam, who spoke to the Eastland Lions Club as the guest of Dr. Edward Adelsten.

Jobe, a freshman member of the Legislature, said that both Shivers and Jester are good friends of his, but that he did not countenance such goings on.

Especially was the move bad, he said, in view of the fact that the Senate, over which Shivers presides, could do nothing during his absence, and the House was stymied too—and all the legislators were squirming, doing almost nothing, and drawing only \$5 per day after having gone past the statutory session limit.

Jobe, after having said he was going to make a non-political talk, described the doings in Austin at some length, and said that it now is up to the voters of Texas whether they want economy in state government, more taxes, and if more taxes, what kind.

He was highly in favor of the upcoming constitutional amendment to put legislators on an annual salary.

He was for part of the Gilmer-Aikin bills; against the part that re-organizes the state educational administrative setup.

Jobe's charges about Shivers and Jester made the state wire services, and drew denials from Jester and Shivers, who said it wasn't so.

Ex-Eastland Merchant Passes At Roscoe

A. Nemir of Roscoe, who with his brothers, B. and Stuart Nemir, formerly operated a dry goods store in Eastland, died Monday afternoon at his home in Roscoe following a heart attack suffered while he was working in his garden.

The Nemir brothers built and for many years occupied the brick building at West Patterson and North Lamar Streets now occupied by the Pipkin Grocery Company as a warehouse.

A. Nemir had been in the mercantile business in Roscoe for many years.

Official Opening Of City Park Set For Sunday

A concert by the Eastland High School band will highlight the official opening Sunday afternoon of the Eastland City Park. The band, under the direction of T. R. Atwood, will give an hour's program, beginning at 4 p. m.

Mayor W. W. Linkenhogger will speak briefly at the opening ceremonies.

While the City Park opening will not be until Sunday afternoon, the opening of the swimming pool will take place Saturday. Admission this season will be the same as last, except that children will pay nine cents instead of 12. Adults will pay 25 cents.

City officials have been working to get the park in shape for the opening. Benches for use of the public, are being located at various points throughout the park.

Officials were puzzled for a time as to where funds for re-conditioning and repainting the benches would come from, and they had considered soliciting individual business firms to furnish the needed money for the privilege of placing their advertisements on the benches.

They have announced, however, that the required funds have been secured, and that no advertisements will appear on the benches.

Auto Taken In Swindle Found

A 1947 automobile belonging to the King Motor Company which disappeared after two men representing themselves as prospective buyers drove it away from the motor firm May 11 on a pretext, was picked up by officers in Winfield, Kans., Wednesday night, the Eastland County sheriff's office was advised.

The man driving the car when it was seized was held by Kansas officers, but he apparently was not one of the men in the car when it left Eastland.

Roy L. Meirs, who had been in Comanche County some time and with whom the King Motor Company had had prior dealings, came to Eastland May 11 with another man who said he wanted to buy the car. Meirs already had talked to H. L. King of the motor firm about the car, and wanted to see it.

King was not in at the time, but the men were permitted to drive away with the car, to go out of town ostensibly to visit a sister of the man with Meirs, after Meirs had posted a draft on an out of town bank for the sales price of the car.

When the men and car failed to return, the draft was sent in for collection, but the bank refused to honor it, and reported the man on whom it was drawn said he had not authorized it.

A complaint charging Meirs with swindling by check was filed in Justice of the Peace E. E. Wood's court in Eastland.

Officers to date have been unable to locate Meirs.

Buddy Poppy Sale Set For Saturday

The 28th annual nationwide Buddy Poppy sale of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will be held in Eastland Saturday, James Gilbreath, Jr., local post commander, said this week.

The sale is held annually to carry on the vast veteran welfare program of the veterans' organization, Gilbreath said. About two-thirds of the funds raised are used for local aid to needy veterans and their families, and the other phase goes to national welfare projects, including the V. F. W. national home for war orphans and widows at Eaton Rapids, Mich. Gilbreath pointed out that the Buddy Poppies are made throughout the year by disabled war veterans as a part of rehabilitation.

The veterans are paid for their work through the sale of the poppies.

Cisco To Install Parking Meters

As a means of relieving congested parking conditions in Cisco, the Cisco City Commission at a meeting Tuesday ordered parking meters installed in a downtown area.

It was expected that the meters will be installed and in operation within four to six weeks.

The parking meters will be the first in any Eastland County city, although officials of Eastland, Ranger and Cisco all have considered their installation at various times during the past few years.

Various companies manufacturing the meters will install them free of charge and let them pay themselves out with a percentage of returns from parking fees.

Although almost all cities which have installed the meters have realized good financial returns from them, they are not installed, in theory, to make a city money, but to control the parking problem and to eliminate the overtime parker who "hogs" downtown parking places to the discomfort of visiting shoppers and others.

Chief opponents of the parking meters have been segments of the general public who feel that the right to park should be free, and merchants who feel that installation of the meters will drive business away from their doors and to other towns.

In Cisco, about 275 meters will be installed on Avenue D and Avenue E from 9th Street to 7th Street, on 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th Streets from the Katy Railroad tracks to Avenue E, and on 8th Street between Avenues D and E.



"Her son Vance died April 16, 1940. She is survived by one son, John M. Clegg of Dallas.

"The members of the Eastland Fifty Year Pioneer Club, of which she was a member, attended her funeral in a body. With Mrs. J. M. Bond at the piano, Homer Smith, Mrs. Curtis Koen and Mrs. G. E. Dendy sang 'The Old Rugged Cross' and 'The Unclouded Day,' songs requested in her obituary she herself wrote Sept. 4, 1947.

"The song 'The Unclouded Day' was one she frequently sang to her grandchildren when she rock-

ed them to sleep at night. This song, she said, she had sung to her own children when they were babies.

"Among her favorite nephews, if it could be said she had any favorites, were John H. Garner of Dallas and Bryce Twitty of Tulsa, Okla.

"Just before the funeral a long time friend, Mrs. Bob Watson, took from her refrigerator her Mother's Day corsage of white carnations and pinned them on Mother Clegg's breast."



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



Astor Had Plenty Of Room For Personal Initiative In 1808, Old Letters Reveal

The free enterprise system which resulted from, and helped identify, the character of America was established firmly in the northwestern part of the United States by John Jacob Astor and some intrepid fur traders 141 years ago this month.

Personal letters and correspondence, culled from aging volumes and unearthed in libraries, reveal how Astor and his partners entered the over-crowded and highly-competitive fur trading business, erected the foundation for one of the world's great fortunes, and added measurably to the strength of an expanding nation.

Historians may not agree now that personal enterprise and competition in commerce will survive the onslaught of the welfare state, but there was no doubt about the matter in the spring of 1808. At that time, men decided it was high time for Americans to do business in the wilderness of the northwest and that the well-established British would have to prepare to meet competition head-on.

Personal letters written by the people involved in the events disclosed, as they usually do, interesting details about the times and the individuals who influenced them.

John Jacob Astor, born near Heidelberg, Germany, in 1763, had arrived in America with seven flutes and twenty-five dollars, which he parlayed into an international business. President Jefferson wrote him in April, 1808, to express pleasure over some recent news:

I learned with great satisfaction the disposition of our merchants to form in companies for undertaking the Indian trade within our own territory. . . . I consider it as highly desirable to have that trade centered in the hands of our citizens. . . . and to oust foreign traders who so much abuse their privileges. . . .

Astor put up \$400,000 and became a major owner, with four other partners, of the Pacific Fur Company. From New York he sent to the mouth of the Columbia River two expeditions, one by sea around the southernmost tip of South America, and the other overland across the newly-explored routes of Lewis and Clark.

The magnitude of these expeditions can hardly be understood today. Men made their wills and bade goodby to their families, fully aware of the likelihood they would not meet for years if ever again.

David Stuart, one of Astor's partners, had this to say in a touching farewell letter written to Margaret A. Cooper, an intimate friend who lived in Bushwick, Long Island, as Astor's ship, the TONQUIN, carried him out of New York harbor en route to Oregon:

I embrace the opportunity of the Pilot, who promises to convey my letter . . . to you, and by this I must bid you a long farewell, and hope you may enjoy every blessing Nature mingled with Art can produce until I can see you again. . . . I hereby repeat my desire that you would omit no opportunity of sending me letters; I only expect them yearly and then I hope you will give me a full relation of every occurrence during the interval with some interesting piece out of the Long Island Star, and some small garden seeds tied up in a package, carefully assorted; and by giving them yourself to John Jacob Astor, Esq., in Broadway; we will be sure to receive them.

You cannot expect a letter from me sooner than two years from hence—a very long time indeed. Nothing now before me but the roaring ocean and the boundless deep, so adieu.

Early in 1812, members of the overland expedition began to arrive in Astoria, the new trading post and port where the Columbia river pours into the Pacific.

President Jefferson was pleased. He wrote to Astor:

I view it (Astoria) as the germ of a great, free, independent empire and that liberty and self-government spreading from that, as well as this side, will insure and complete establishment over the whole. It must be still more gratifying to yourself to be handed down with that of Columbus and Raleigh as the founder of such an empire.

Astor never quite became known as a Columbus or a Raleigh. Some of his critics called him "Napoleon," in the belief that he sought to establish an empire.

The great Northwest Fur Company, British owned, had its agents and trappers everywhere in the Northwest but Astor's company made money. Men filled ships with furs, and Astor, operating from New York, had the vessels sent to the Orient, where furs were traded for other goods and sold in all the countries of the world.

Disaster struck early however.

The Tonquin was lost with all hands, not on the high seas, but as she lay at anchor. The vessel blew up in an explosion set off during an attack on it by Indians. In a personal letter, written to a friend by Margaret A. Cooper, the confident of David Stuart, from whom she undoubtedly got the story, is the report of the fate of the Tonquin:

. . . I tell you the fate of our poor Northwesterners. After having endured every hardship . . . having just arrived at the end of their voyage—when a tribe of barbarous savages rushed upon them, set fire to their magazines, and blew them, ship and all to atoms.

Stuart was one of a party which had left the ship and thus escaped the disaster to the Tonquin and her crew. There were reports, of course, that the rival British had set the Indians upon the newcomers.

Early in 1813, a letter sent from Montreal to the North West Company's post on the Spokane River, arrived by "express canoe." The letter was in transit nearly four months and contained word about the war of 1812. It also contained a blunt threat that a British warship was on its way to Astoria and the Americans were advised to sell at once or submit to attack. The "express canoe" letter was important news at Astoria. The Americans held out for a time but were forced to sell at great financial loss because they had no means of defending themselves against a British vessel.

Although an act of Congress restored the holdings to Astor in 1818, he had to abandon the vast project because it would have taken a military force to enforce the law. For 20 years the lucrative trade of the Oregon Territory was in British hands.

But Astoria, in its brief history, made money. It had put private enterprise to work in the wilderness and, in doing so, extended the boundary of the United States to its logical northwestern limit.

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



Applicants for the work should secure Civil Service form 60, which may be obtained at the Eastland postoffice and if not there from the Abilene district office, 218 Morris Building at 211 1/2 North 2nd Street, Abilene.
Applicants sending in applications will be interviewed by a representative from the Abilene District office and enumerators selected to do the work will be given extensive training in small business procedure.
The small business survey now being conducted by the census bureau covers all retail, wholesale and service trades.




