ARMY REPORT SAYS RING KEPT REDS POSTED ON JAP, GERMAN WAR PLANS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10—(UP)—A Communist spy ring, perhaps the most successful of all time, kept Russia informed of Japanese and German war plans for nine years before Pearl Harbor, the Army reported today. The ring operated out of Tokyo. Its 20 members were headed by a German Communist—Richard Sorge—who posed as a Nazi journalist and hoodwinked high German as well as Japanese officials. Some of its survivors, the Army said, probably are "secretly busy with their trade at this very moment in the capitals of the world." The Army also reported a prewar Communist ring which it said spied for Russia in China. One of the members of this group, the Army said, was an American writer. Of the Japanese ring headquartered at Tokyo the Army said: "Probably never in history has there been a ring more bold or more successful." It added that by comparison, the famous Canadian Atomic Spy Case of World War II "was an amateur show."

Dallas Doctors Speakers At Medical Meet

Dr. Charles Bloss of Dallas and Dr. Paul Thomas, also of Dallas were the guest speakers Tuesday night when the Eastland-Callahan Counties Medical Society met at the Gholson Hotel in Ranger at 7:30 o'clock. Dr. Bloss spoke on "Psycho Therapy and General Practice" and Dr. Thomas discussed "Recent Advances in Management of Heart Disease." In a business session, Dr. R. G. Baker of Fort Worth, councillor for the 13th District of the Texas Medical Society, urged on those present the need of informing the public against socialized medicine. Dr. E. E. Eddy of Cisco, president, presided at the meeting which was preceded by a dinner at which wives of the doctors were also guests. Following the dinner the women went to the home of Mrs. Calvin Harris for a business meeting of the Auxiliary of the Society. Members of the society attending the meeting were from Eastland, Doctors Cowen, Caton, Townsend and Murdock; from Baird, Dr. Stubblefield; from Cisco, Doctors Graham, Ball, and Addy; from Gorman, Doctors, Blackwell, Cole and Jackson; from Rising Star, Dr. Bradley and from Ranger, Doctors Kuykendall, Wier, Harris, Watkins and Brazda.

Service Officers School Feb. 26-27

The Veterans Affairs Commission of Texas announced today that it will hold a Service Officers School at Mineral Wells, Texas on Saturday and Sunday, February 26-27, 1949 in the Community Building. This school will be for all County Service Officers and Veterans Organizations Posts and Chapter Service Officers within a radius of approximately seventy-five to one hundred miles of Mineral Wells. All persons interested in veterans' affairs are cordially invited. This is the second of a series of schools being held by the Veterans Affairs Commission throughout Texas, the first of the series having been held last winter and spring. The purpose is to stress instruction on insurance, education, out-patient treatment, state laws, and new laws passed by the 80th Congress relating to veterans and their dependents. Harry E. Rather, Educational Director of the Commission, will conduct the school and will be assisted by representatives from the various veterans organizations of Texas, Federal and State Agencies and the Veterans Administration.

Expect Almost 5000 To Enroll For 4-H Program

More than 4,700 Texas 4-H Club boys and girls who pledged their "hands to larger service" last year are expected again to enroll in the 1949 National 4-H Garden program. Announcement of this state's acceptance of the program has been made by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. The activity is conducted under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service. Last year nearly 375,000 4-H Club members ranging in age from 10 to 21 years planted and tended approximately 80,000 acres of garden, according to reports of State Club leaders. Born of wartime necessity, the National 4-H Garden contest was first launched in 1942. Peacetime has not lessened the incentive to produce, because 4-H'ers continue to raise a large variety of fruits and vegetables which keeps the home table supplied and reduces the family outlay for food. Records are kept of costs, progress and money returns as part of the 4-H requirements. County Extension agents and local Club leaders organize and encourage the youth to learn how to care for and manage a well-planned garden, carry out a program of disease control, and market surplus produce. In an effort to "make the best better," products are exhibited at county, district and state fairs, as well as in community competition. Each 4-H Club member enrolling in the garden program has an opportunity to win one of four county medal awards by Allis-Chalmers. Also a state award of an all-expense trip to the 1949 National Club Congress in Chicago, and a chance to become a candidate of one of eight \$300 scholarships.

ELUSIVE CHECK FORGER WILL FACE TRIAL HERE

A check forger sought since Oct. 1947 by the Eastland Sheriff's office was identified in Breckenridge yesterday by county authorities and victims of the accused. He is Robert A. Chick, 26, of Columbus, Ohio, who is wanted by police in six states and has a long list of criminal charges. Chick has been indicted on two counts by Eastland County. A check forger sought since Oct. 1947 by the Eastland Sheriff's office was identified in Breckenridge yesterday by county authorities and victims of the accused. He is Robert A. Chick, 26, of Columbus, Ohio, who is wanted by police in six states and has a long list of criminal charges. Chick has been indicted on two counts by Eastland County. In 1947 he passed six forged checks here, each for the amount of \$46.23. Two of those checks were turned into authorities when it was discovered they were forgeries. Chick used the alias of Frank Willis. The checks were submitted to Austin by the sheriff's office and put in the fraudulent check files. When similar forgeries arrived at the office from Greenville, Hillsboro, Breckenridge, Denton and other cities the similarity in handwriting was checked and indictments were returned. Chick was arrested by authorities in Las Vegas, Nev. on a general pick-up. The local office was notified of his arrest January 4, then the F. B. I. transported him to Oklahoma where he is also sought by authorities. From Oklahoma he was brought to Texas and questioned by authorities throughout West Texas. He will face trial in Eastland County in the near future.

WINTER HARRIED WEST BRACES FOR NEW STORM

By United Press Parts of the west were whipped today by "quickie" windstorms and snow squalls that pushed new piles of snow over roads as fast as bulldozers cleared them. A new major storm area was spawned in the Aleutians and was moving southeastward toward the continental coastline to unrelenting fury. Nightlong rains melted snowdrifts in eastern Washington, creating flood conditions. Water poured into Dayton, Wash., and crept over Walla Walla sidewalks. Residents of the two towns turned out to erect sandbag barricades. Highways became muddy, swirling streams. But eastern states enjoyed mild, springlike weather that sent temperatures soaring yesterday to 59 at New York and 68 at Washington to set new records for Feb. 9. Snowplow crews gave up hope of restoring transportation lines today into Rawlins, Wyo., as 35 and 45 mile an hour winds whistled over the area. Perishable foods were running low in the city, the last major community still snowbound as result of the storms that struck earlier this week. The Challenger Airlines said that if weather permitted it would begin a shuttle service for 650 westbound railroad passengers stranded there. At one place on highway 287 near Rawlins, snowplow crews measured a drift that was 50 feet high. They said new drifts formed behind them as fast as their plow cleared away those in front. AROUSSED PUBLIC INSISTS ON U. S. PROTEST TO CARDINAL TRIAL

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10. (UP)—The United States, under mounting public and Congressional pressures, today considered dramatic steps to express its indignation over the trial of Joseph Cardinal Mindszenty. Chief State Department consideration was devoted to a possible appeal to the United Nations to condemn Hungary's handling of the Mindszenty case and its suppression of human rights as a threat to world peace. Other means of taking action against the Soviet satellite nation include a stern official protest to Hungary, breaking off diplomatic relations, closing Hungarian consulates in New York and Cleveland, and notifying Americans that this government cannot guarantee protection to its citizens travelling in that country. Except for a possible protest, however, diplomatic officials refused to say that any of the other measures would be taken. President Truman was to be asked for his views on Hungary's heavy-handed tactics in the Mindszenty case at his news conference (10:30 A. M. EST). Secretary of State Dean Acheson asserted yesterday that people of the United States were "sickened and horrified" by Hungary's recent actions in curbing moral resistance to Communism. He laid the blame on Moscow and the "minority" Communist party in Hungary. Letters, telegrams, postcards, and petitions protesting the Mindszenty case are piling up at the White House and State Department. The total was expected to go far over 20,000 separate protests today. Only 11 letters approving the Mindszenty trial and conviction have been counted to date, officials said. Of even greater force was the special resolution adopted late yesterday by the House. Drafted by the House Foreign Affairs Committee, it called on the United States to protest the Cardinal's case in the UN or by other appropriate means. The resolution now goes to the Senate where it is assured of approval.

Gandhi Assassin Gets Death Sentence

NEW DELHI, Feb. 10. (UP)—Nathuram Vinayak Godse, 36, the assassin who shot Mohandas K. Gandhi, and Narayan Dattarya Apte, 35, a school teacher described as the brains behind the conspiracy, were sentenced to death by hanging today.

Five of seven other defendants were sentenced to life imprisonment. One was acquitted and one was granted a King's pardon because he turned state's evidence and testified against the others.

Gandhi, the spiritual leader of Hindu India, was killed by three bullets fired into his frail body on the terrace of Birla House

here during an evening prayer meeting on Jan. 30, 1948.

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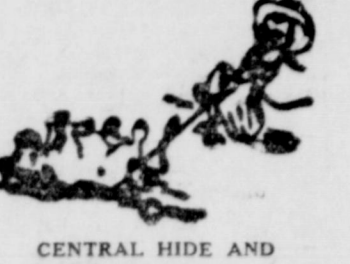

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Pledges Ku Klux Klan to Fight to Last Drop of Blood Against Racial Equality

DENMARK, S. C., Feb. 10—(UP)—The Ku Klux Klan was pledged today to its "last drop of blood" to resist efforts to force racial equality on the south.

Dr. Samuel Green, Grand Dragon of the Klan, made the pledge to some 250 robed members of the organization and a rain-drenched crowd here last night. The Klansmen paraded through town watched by some 2,000 persons, many of them negroes.

most of its members did not stay to hear Green's speech, delivered from under a shed at the railroad depot. He denounced "Northern Carpetbaggers" and "Southern Scalawags" for interference in the south's race problems. "The man who says a negro is the equal of a white man is not as good as a negro himself," he shouted. "You can't tell me that an ignorant African slave who came here 150 years ago has gained the culture, refinement and education that the white man

has acquired in these 5,000 years. Green singled out South Carolina personages for both praise and blame. Of Gov. J. Strom Thurmond, presidential candidate on the State's Rights Democratic ticket last fall, he said: "It was your governor who had the courage of convictions to stand before the people of the United States and fight for the rights of the individual states." He criticized the Rev. Maxey Collins, head of the South Carolina Federated (Church) Forces, as "far below the cloth he wears." The organization seeks legislation to ban demonstrations by masked organizations such as the Klan.

Mexican Ship Sinks, Survivors Sought

MAZATLAN, Sinaloa, Mexico, Feb. 10. (UP)—Coast Guard vessels searched the waters 80 miles northwest of Sinaloa today for possible survivors of the 300-ton Mexican coastal freighter Anita which Army fliers reported sank yesterday.

There was no estimate of the number aboard the ship which was en route from here to Quaymas with a cargo of corn.

The fliers, members of a Mexican Air Force squadron, reported they located the stricken ship
