# Acheson, Senators In Accord On Pact

## BERLIN AIRLIFT PASSES MILLION TON MARK

FRANKFURT, Feb. 19 (UP)—The Anglo-American airlift, which yesterday delivered its millionth ton to blockaded Berlin, was stopped dead today by fog.

Airports in Berlin were blanketed by the heaviest fog since November, 1946, and airfields on this western end of the air corridor were closed by thick mist which extended as far west as Hamburg.

There was no prospect that the weather might improve enough to begin flying again before this evening at the earliest, officials said.

At the same time, the officials revealed that every American plane lying on "operation tittles" is being equipped with its own radar set.

These "seeing eye" sets will enable the planes to pierce the worst weather when and if ground radar fails or is "jammed" by radio interference from any point.

About half the C-54 Skymasters assigned to the airlift already are carrying Radar equipment. It shows on the belly of the big planes like rounded washstubs attached to the fuselage.

The Radar screen is placed in the pilot's compartment. In the screen he can "see" other planes flying within 10 miles, and also can detect the contour of the ground below him and any obstructions.

Theoretically, it would be possible to land a plane so equipped in the thickest fog or in the absence of any light whatever. Actually, this would not be done except in an emergency, however.

There comes a moment, in landing a plane, when it is necessary for the pilot to see the runway.

The Radar sets also would be valuable, officials said, in event Russian planes were maneuvering.

## Texas Weather Mild, Cloudy Skies

Cloudy skies, fog and light drizzle were general over most of Texas today with Lubbock, Salt Flat and Guadalupe Pass among the few points reporting clear weather.

The Weather Bureau forecast a continuation of mild weather with partly cloudy skies for the next 24 hours. A cold front in the Rockies appeared to be heading eastward and will miss Texas, though forecaster A. M. Hamrick said the state may get a little chilly by Monday.

Overnight, the low was 30 degrees at Salt Flat and Amarillo with Brownsville's 60 degrees the minimum. Yesterday's high was 74 at Wink, Big Spring and Midland, each had 72 yesterday and Salt Flat and Lubbock 70.

Rainfall reports for the 24 hours ending at 6:30 a. m., today included 1.04 at Beaumont, .80 at Houston and considerably lighter amounts elsewhere along the coast.

Among points reporting fog and low clouds this morning were Ft. Worth, Amarillo, Childress, Corpus Christi, Brownsville, Austin, San Antonio, Mineral Wells, Wichita Falls and Houston.

A British York Transport carried in the cargo yesterday which put the airlift, which began last June 26, over the 1,000,000-ton mark. The cargo was six and one-half tons of dried cabbage and raisins.

The second 1,000,000 tons "won't take anywhere near so long," officials said today.

They pointed out that the 2,250,000 persons in the western sectors of Berlin now are receiving an average of 2,000 calories daily for each person. This is 1,600 calories a day more than they were getting when the Soviet blockade began, and they said it is more than Germans in the Soviet zone receive.

## Special Openings In Marine Corps

Although the authorized recruit quota was filled early this month, Master Sergeant William L. Poole of the Eastland Marine recruiting office announced that he is interviewing candidates for the March quota and that he still has some openings this month for re-enlistees, 18-year-olds and non-veteran women.

It is anticipated that regular quotas will continue to be filled early in the month so all interested youths are advised to see their local recruiter as soon as possible to get on next month's list.

The Marine Corps maintains an unrestricted quota for all ex-leather-necks who can qualify for re-enlistment. These veteran Marines can ship over for any one of several posts and stations.

There are still a few openings for 18-year-olds to sign up for one-year enlistments. The young Marine may be sent to any one of many service schools or given on the job training which will fit him for a career in civilian life or as a professional Marine.

After one year's service in the U.S.M.C. he may leave the service and become affiliated with one of the Marine Reserve activities or he may remain in the service and be working toward retirement with a tidy income after 20 years.

Also the Marine Corps has recently opened the way for non-veteran women to become members of the regular Marine Corps. These women are extended all the privileges of their male counterparts. The women selected will be trained at Parris Island, South Carolina and after six weeks indoctrination will be assigned duty stations from Washington D. C. to San Francisco, Calif.

## Scout Officials Urge Speed-Up Of Fund Campaign

According to Buck Rickens, vice chairman of the Eastland Comanche Trail, Finance Drive, contributions have been unusually slow with only \$213 turned in thus far.

Of 45 team members only six have completed their list and brought in contributions to finance officials. A goal of \$1,600 has been set for Eastland.

All team workers are urged to complete their lists and submit their totals to team captains who in turn will contact the finance committee.

No time limit has been set on the campaign which will continue until all names have been solicited.

Purpose of the drive is to raise operating funds for Boy Scout activities in the county. The drive was launched with a kick-off breakfast early this week and similar fund raising movement are now in full swing in all county communities.

## ATTEMPT TO RE-OPEN STRIKE BOUND PLANT APPARENT FAILURE

TEXAS CITY, Tex. Feb. 19—(UP)—Carbide and Carbon Chemical Corporation's attempt to reopen its strikebound \$50,000,000 Texas City plant appeared today to be a failure, temporarily at least.

Impartial bystanders said more than 40 to 50 workers crossed picket lines to enter the plant this morning. Carbide had hoped to resume production today, in defiance of a striking AFL union.

What went on inside the plant remained a mystery, but there was no outward appearance of any production activity. Only a few jets of steam arose from the dozens of buildings scattered over the 400-acre industrial site.

Top Carbide officials were in conference at Galveston and would not comment. Carbide still operated a downtown recruiting office. A few job hunters were there at mid-morning.

There were no incidents—save for scattered boos and catcalls—as a relative handful of automobiles loaded with workers sped through the main gate at the plant. Two sign-carrying pickets and an estimated 75 other observers were in the vicinity, along with city police and Galveston county sheriff's deputies.

One of the year's heaviest fogs enshrouded the plant, three miles south of the city, as the Carbide management and the AFL Maintenance and Operators Union reached the showdown stage in a 28-day old strike that had paralyzed the chemical producing unit.

Through the dawn's pea-soup shroud, visible from the streets outside on the main plant gate from a second floor window in the Carbide administration building.

The union called out 1,400 workers on Jan. 23 to enforce its wage demands. Three days ago, the parties were nearly in agreement on the amount of the raises—14 cents hourly for operators and 18 for maintenance men—but negotiations broke off when they deadlocked on the question of retroactivity.

Carbide offered to make 10 cents of the amount retroactive to last September, but the union, insisted on full retroactivity.

Then, Carbide announced it would resume production despite the strike. It began hiring workers, some of them new and some of them strikers, at the wage scale it had offered the Union.

Spokesmen for the maintenance and operators union accused the company of disregarding Texas City's welfare and safety by hiring inexperienced workers.

The striking union said it had some new recruits in its struggle with the company. It reported that the Texas City Terminal Railway crews would not operate trains through picket lines and that Union Barge Crews would not move cargo for Carbide on the Intercoastal Canal.

Labor Wasted TACOMA, Wash. (UP)—Burglars who broke into Sam Collosa's tavern at nearby Orting, Wash., did a lot of unnecessary work. They tried one door and found it locked. Then they broke into the place through another door that also was locked. The third door was unlocked.

## Chiang Still Has Chinese Reins

NANKING, Feb. 19 (UP)—Although officially Chiang-Kai-Shek is in retirement, he is still giving orders which have a great effect on China.

He has retained enough presidential power to give him a veto over forthcoming talks with the Communists and daily is exercising these powers to keep the way open for his return to office.

During his 21-year career as China's national leader he retired twice and came back twice. There is no doubt in the minds of excellently informed Nanking sources that he is preparing for another comeback.

When Chiang first went into retirement at Chikow, in Fenghua, his orders were transmitted by two special planes which shuttled between Chikow, Nanking, Shanghai and Canton.

More recently powerful radio sending-receiving facilities have been brought in from Nanking, and Chikow now has the appearance of a temporary presidential headquarters.

Besides his control of the Kuomintang as director general, Chiang has retained his military power. He is in constant telephonic and telegraphic contact with the national defense ministry in Nanking. He receives reports of the military situation and gives instructions on troop dispositions and military appointments.

## Plan To Conduct Religious Census

## AGREEMENT MAY SPEED UP FINAL NEGOTIATIONS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19—(UP)—Secretary of State Dean G. Acheson and key Senators appeared to see practically eye-to-eye today on the North Atlantic Security Pact.

Acheson gave members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee a look at the preliminary draft of the seven-nation treaty during a lengthy top-secret conference late yesterday. And committee members raised no serious objection to his going ahead with negotiations on its basis.

The treaty, designed to prevent aggression in Europe, would pledge the United States to take immediate steps to help any signatory that is attacked. But it would leave it up to the individual nations to decide what these steps should be.

At the conference, Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., R., Mass., and a few other "young turk" Senators protested that the treaty should be even stronger. They wanted Acheson to pledge U. S. "military or other action" to meet any armed attack in Europe.

They urged Acheson to make it clear in the pact that the United States "means what it says" and that it intends to meet any aggression with "overwhelming military force."

But committee chairman Tom Connally, D., Tex., and Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg, R., Mich., the Senate's top bi-partisan Foreign Policy spokesmen, warned that a stronger U. S. commitment may lose the treaty votes when it comes up in the Senate for ratification.

Connally has said that, unless the pact receives an overwhelming vote of approval in the Senate, it would be "worse than useless," even though it obtained the two-thirds vote necessary for ratification.

Acheson's next step will probably be a meeting next week with the ambassadors of the six foreign nations involved in the treaty—Britain, Canada, France, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg.

State Department officials were hopeful that the meeting last night will go far toward speeding up treaty negotiations and in ending the fears of Western European diplomats who were upset by the recent Vandenberg-Connally pronouncements.

## Two Killed In Navy Plane Crash

MACON, Ga. (UP)—Two men were killed early today in the crash of a Navy dive-bomber which had been turned away from a field here because of weather conditions the sheriff's office reported.

Deputy Sheriff Obie Calhoun said the plane crashed in a woods about seven miles northeast of Macon. The bodies of two fliers were recovered from the wreckage but were not immediately identified.

(The plane was believed to have come from Atlantic City, N. J. and to have refueled at Cherry Point, N. C., shortly after midnight. Authorities at the two bases would give no details early today.)

Calhoun said a farm woman, A. Mrs. Harris, reported at 4:20 A. M. (EST) that she heard a plane pass over her home at low altitude, and shortly afterward heard it crash. Calhoun and another deputy were dispatched to the scene by radio and located the wreckage.

E. Glen McNatt, field representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration will be at the Eastland Army Recruiting office at 10:00 A. M. on Thursday, February 24. Persons wishing to file retirement or death claims, or having social security problems to discuss, should call as soon after 10:00 as possible.

In a statement made today, Mr. McNatt urged all employees to protect their old-age and survivors insurance accounts by showing their social security cards to employers immediately upon reporting for duty on a new job. The employer must have correct information as to the name and account number before he can make complete and correct social security reports. Since both death payments and survivors payments are based upon the workers account, every worker should be vitally interested in helping his employer keep complete and accurate records.

## Carbon Recruit Assigned To 5th

Larry J. McAfee, son of Sam McAfee, Route 2, Carbon has been assigned to the Fifth Armored "Victory" Division for eight weeks of basic training.

Reactivated July 6, 1948, the Fifth Armored "Victory" Division hung up a brilliant war record in six European campaigns during World War II. Before the end of 1949, Camp Chaffee is expected to have 20,000 troops, making it the largest Army training center in the nation.

## Liquor Law Gives Sales Monopoly

TOPEKA, Kans., Feb. 19 (UP)—The bill which will make Kansas a "wet" state next week after 65 years of prohibition contains a legal joker that would give one distiller a virtual sales monopoly, it was charged today.

The charge was leveled by Leo W. Mulloy of Wichita, head of the Kansas legal control council which spearheaded the drive to end prohibition. Mulloy also said the bill actually would force Kansans to drink bonded liquor if they wanted to imbibe. Cheaper brands would still be outlawed due to a legal quirk in the bill.

He said the particular provision would "make liquor available only to wealthy citizens and would play right into the hands of the one distiller" which refused to promise to refrain from lobbying while the bill was being considered by Legislators.

Gov. Frank Carlson promised an immediate study of the bill. He said "if this is true the act will be amended right away." "We're not writing this bill for any one distiller," Carlson said. Mulloy said his organization was "stunned" by its discovery of the alleged legal quirk.

"In section 69 of the proposed law," he said, "it is provided that whiskey bottle labels must show the date when manufactured." Under Federal regulations, only bonded whiskeys may carry such a marking.

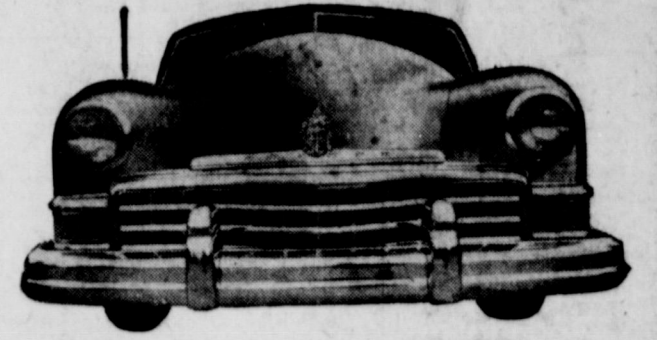

### Jewel Thief Held Without Bail

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Feb. 19 (UP) — Gerald Graham Dennis, 29, handsome jewel thief whose coast-to-coast crime career may have netted him a \$1,000,000 in loot, was held without bail today for action by the Westchester County grand jury next Wednesday.

Dennis, a Canadian ex-convict, was brought here yesterday from Cleveland, O., where he was arrested. He was charged with first degree assault and first degree larceny.

He waived hearing and took police on a tour of wealthy Westchester suburbs to point out 16 mansions he remembered

having robbed of at least \$200,000 in jewels and furs. He is specifically charged with wounding Marshall E. Tulloch in 1946 after robbing the Tulloch home in New Rochelle of \$9,000 in jewels.

It also disclosed that the Federal Bureau of Investigation has taken an interest in the inter-state aspects of Dennis' activities and will question him.

A raid on Dennis' apartment in Beverly Hills, Cal., uncovered \$100,000 in jewels and \$20,000 in furs, and he told police here he was planning to rob the home of 22 big name movie stars. Canadian police said he was

wanted there for numerous robberies.

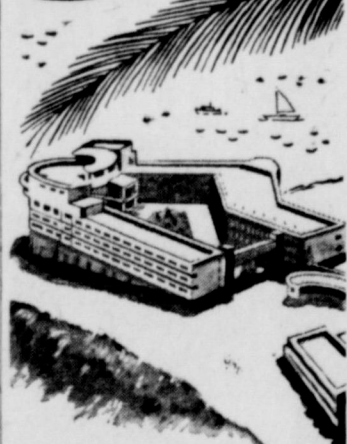
