Oil and Gas News

Area OIL News

J. Parker Oil Co., No. 1 T. N. Watt drilling at 1900 after having cased off the troublesome flow of water which has dogged that operation for about ten days.

National Cooperative Refinery Association No. 2 Krell (the second hole dug on this location, anyway—none of us know who who class it) are running a spinner survey which means that they are trying to locate where water is coming in. They recovered all those tools but they still have the water trouble.

National Cooperative Refinery Association No. 1 McFatter have set surface pipe and are WOC, however, they expect to be able to begin drilling under the surface this afternoon.

R. B. W. Oil Co., No. 1 Byrd have the rig on location according to Mr. Don Rodgers, one of the partners. They have started off with difficulties—first the entry gate to the tract was not wide enough for the machinery and they got stuck going through it, and then they bogged down in an unsuspected mud hole just before reaching the location. Enwright Brothers are the contractors. Maybe a bad beginning will follow out the old adage and make for a good ending.

Choate No. 3 Blackwell on the shallow test have gone to 650 feet and they had trouble. A cavin allowed all kinds of surface water to rush in on them. They have closed down temporarily but will resume operations as soon as they have the water under control. They are looking for the shallow vein of pay which Joe Hunter found on the No. 1 Blackwell at 657-660 feet. It showed almost completely saturated sand, if you will remember.

R. H. Patterson No. 1 Brown are drilling at 775 and they too, have an underreaming job occasioned by running into a veritable ocean of water.

J. & J. Oil Co., No. 1 Jones are drilling slightly more than 2900 feet and they did run into the pay at 2900 as we predicted—we do not feel particularly psychic, however. They struck both gas and oil, so if the oil content is sufficient, it looks like they will have the pressure to bring it up.

Commercial Production No. 2 R. S. Sanders are still struggling to finish drilling through that 100 foot cement blockage which is wedged in the hole approximately 2300 feet—just about another \$1000 thrown down that hole.

Commercial Production No. 1 Jeff Smith are rigging up with B. F. Gilchrist as contractor for the job. They moved their outfit through Gorman yesterday coming back from Cisco where they had drilled out several drilling contracts. As we have said before, Mr. Gilchrist and his crew are the type which we always welcome back into the territory.

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Farm Buildings Burned After Gas Line Explodes

NORTH VERNON, Ind., March 4 (UP)—A natural gas pipeline exploded today, burst into flames and destroyed a cluster of farm buildings, Indiana state police reported.

A farm woman suffered minor burns.

The explosion occurred six miles north of here near state highway No. 3, in one of the lines of the Texas Eastern Transmission Corp., police said.

The firm operates the "Big Inch" and "Little Inch" pipelines which run side by side across southern Indiana.

It was the fourth explosion in the pipe line in Indiana in a year. Earlier explosions occurred near Petersburg, Seymour and Batesville.

Police said the explosion occurred 150 feet from the farm home of the Lester Jones family in a converted frame schoolhouse. The house, barn and several smaller buildings were destroyed.

State police said Mrs. Jones suffered minor burns.

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Agent Tells How He Trapped Dope Ring Leader

LOS ANGELES, March 4 (UP)—U. S. Narcotics Agent, George White, told a federal jury yesterday that he used \$25,000 cash to trap a multi-million dollar opium smuggling ring he said was headed by a Mexican government official.

White said the combine's "sales manager" was Francisco Lavat, dapper 43-year-old Mexico City merchant and inspector of the Mexican Civil Aeronautics Administration. Lavat is one of nine defendants in the conspiracy trial.

"Lavat demanded that I show him I was capable of large scale purchases," White said. "So I met him in a Hollywood hotel, showed him \$25,000 and told him I wanted to invest in opium. He sent out for drinks to celebrate."

Lavat gave him a bill of lading for \$12,000 worth of opium disguised as tractor parts, after which the opium was rounded up Nov. 10, White testified. He said Lavat sold him three cans of opium in San Francisco.

JOHNSON CITY, March 4.—(UP)—An airplane crash which killed two persons plunged the southern part of Blanco County into darkness for several hours late yesterday.

Robert Hamilton, 35, and Marie Hill, both of San Antonio, were killed. As it crashed, their private 3-place plane knocked down a power line.

FORT WORTH, March 4 (UP)—Maj Gen. Roger A. Ramey, commander of the 8th Air Force has recommended Distinguished Flying Crosses for the 14 crewmen who flew non-stop around the world in the B-50 bomber, Lucky Lady II.

Ramey said the decoration ceremony probably would be held at Davis-Mountain Air Force Base, Tuscon, Ariz., the crew's home field.

TEXARKANA, March 4 (UP)—Authorities here lowered the boom on alleged Pyramid Club operators.

R. J. Perdue of Texarkana and S. P. Williams of Houston were charged with operating a lottery. Officers who arrested the men said they confiscated a list of 600 names, which they believed was a membership roster.

Perdue and Williams posted bonds of \$110 each and were released to await trial.

Pow-Wow May Settle Strike

TEXAS CITY, March 4 (UP)—A scheduled pow-wow between company officials and union men today hinted the possibility of a quick settlement in the six-week-old strike at the \$50,000,000 Carbide and Chemicals Corp. plant here.

Federal Conciliator T. F. Morrow announced he would meet with company and union representatives today in Galveston. Morrow held separate meetings with both sides yesterday, after both sides had rejected a proposal by Mayor Lee A. Robinson to meet Sunday for a public discussion of their differences.

Negotiations were dropped several days after some 1400 members of the Maintenance and Operator Union (AFL) left their jobs Jan. 23 over a wage dispute.
