Truman To Get Honorary Degree In Florida Today

KEY WEST, Fla., March 8. (UP)—President Truman took time off from his vacation today to fly to Rollins College in Winter Park, Fla., to receive an honorary doctor of humanity degree.

The President was scheduled to take off from Boca Chica Naval Air Base at 8:15 A. M. (CST), arriving at the Orlando Air Force Base at 10:30 o'clock.

After a special convocation in his honor and an extemporaneous speech, the President will fly back to Key West.



FILIBUSTER, CLOTURE IN CONGRESS ARE REVIEWED

Editors note:—With rent controls in jeopardy as result of the Senate filibuster, the word "cloture" assumes increasing importance for Americans. The following story traces the history of cloture—The rule for shutting off prolonged senate debate.

 WASHINGTON, March 8 (UP)—Today is the 32nd birthday of the Senate's filibuster rule.

It was adopted March 8, 1917, upon angry demands by Woodrow Wilson that the Senate stop obstructionist tactics which had blocked many administration policies since he was inaugurated four years earlier.

Now President Truman wants to make the rule stronger to protect his own policies from delaying tactics. Mr. Truman, in effect, would make the new rule tight enough to prevent filibusters altogether. Whatever the Senate may do to the rule, it will NOT go so far as Mr. Truman would like in cutting off free debate. There are some indications the Senate finally will permit the rule to remain as it is.

Editorial research reports tell of the birth of the filibuster rule this way:

"Filibuster had kept Congress in almost continuous session during the summer of 1913 and 1914, and thereafter had prevented Senate action on many measures designed by the new Democratic administration.

"Angered by the obstruction of a little group of wilful men" during the short session of 1916-17, Wilson called the Senate into

special session the day the 64th Congress adjourned and demanded "save the country from disaster."

The cloture rule to prevent filibusters was adopted by a vote of 67 to 3 on the day it was reported, and with comparatively little debate. That was March 8, 1917.

Since then cloture petitions have been filed in the Senate on 26 occasions. Seven times the motions have been withdrawn and on 19 there have been votes. In the 19 Senate votes on the question of limiting debate, debate has been limited on four occasions only. The last time was Feb. 28, 1929 on a bill to reorganize the enforcement of prohibition.

casional showers, light rain and drizzle reported, while clouds were broken in West Texas and along the lower coast.
