Concerning Plans For Education Veterans who are planning to

resume interrupted education and training under the GI Bill should wait until they get their supple mental certificates of eligibility before they go back to classes of on-the-job-training, the local Vet erans Administration office h a s announced, said a VA spokesman today.

The recent large number of veerans who have gone back to schools or on-the-job-training without waiting to get their sup-plemental certificates from the VA, prompted the VA's warning. Until the certificates are issued, the VA is not obligated to pay for tuition, subsistence allowance, or other expenses. Collection, under these circumstances, is strictly up to the school and the veteran, the VA said.

The VA has repeatedly informed veterans that 30 days is the minimum time in which to apply for a supplemental certificate. The place to get it is at your nearest VA regional office. So, veterans, if you've interrupted your education or on-the-job-training and are planning to go back to school or in training be sure to apply for your supplemental certificates 30 days in advance. That way, you'll avoid any difficulty about government payment for your tui-
