Texas House Denounces Appeasement Of Russia

HESTER EXPECTED TO ASK LENIENCY IN VERDICT

CLEBURNE, April 29 (UP)— Arthur C. Hester, 19, was to take the stand again today in his murder trial, and indications were that the case would reach the jury by late tomorrow afternoon. Hester will be the final defense witness, and counsel indicated he would: (1) promise the jury to go "straight" if given a suspended sentence; (2) express regret launched the death attack on Dr. John Lord, TCU graduate school dean; (3) reaffirm his declaration that he did not intend to kill the elderly educator.

But Hester charged in his testimony that Lord had refused to give him money unless he consented to perform unnatural acts. He said he had asked Lord for permission to use the car on March 8 for a date with a girl in Fort Worth, and that Lord had agreed "if you'll be nice to me." Subsequently, Hester said, Lord broke his promise. He admitted he followed the dean into the cabin and struck him several times with a metal rod and then left for California in Lord's car. He said he did not know Lord was dead until he was arrested by California authorities in Los Angeles.

Vernon Protests Rail Order To RR Commission

AUSTIN, Tex. April 29 (UP)— A dozen militant citizens, led by Electra's Mayor T. Leo Moore, appeared today before the Texas Railroad Commission protesting attempts to turn their town into a "whistle stop" on the Fort Worth and Denver City Railway.

Moore keynoted his opposition campaign yesterday when he arranged distribution on the floor of the House of dozens of red plastic whistles shaped in the form of a locomotive. The idea it was explained was that Electra would be regulated to a whistle-stop status if the railroad is allowed to discontinue its stream line passenger train service to the city.

Testimony was being heard by Charles Pettit, railroad commission examiner. Among those speaking against the proposal were Moore, John E. McKeelvey, Electra city attorney, and Leon Rogers, manager of the town's Chamber of Commerce.

Unless the railroad commission would hold with the citizens of Electra, streamliner service to that city and seven other area towns would stop on May 1.

Shouts and heated exchanges between witnesses and Seth Barwise of Fort Worth, counsel for the railroad, marked the session's opening.

Curbs On Lending To Be Relaxed

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)— Federal curbs on bank lending will be relaxed next week in the government's fourth anti-inflation move in two months.

The Federal Reserve Board announced that because of "changing economic conditions" it has authorized member banks to lend out a greater proportion of the money they have on hand. It estimated that this move will put an additional \$1,200,000,000 at the disposal of potential borrowers.

Chairman Thomas B. McCabe said the board's action was part of its policy of "adjusting all credit regulations in accordance with... the credit requirements of the current business situation."

FLOOD WATERS TAKE TOLL AMONG CATTLE AND SHEEP

Carcasses of cattle and sheep were to be seen floating in the muddy waters of the San Antonio and Guadalupe Rivers today, as the two swollen streams rolled on toward the Gulf of Mexico.

The Guadalupe was expected to crest at Victoria about noon today at 28 feet. However, neither the business district nor the residential area was believed in danger of overflow.

Rushing on southward, the crest of the Guadalupe was expected to join with that of the San Antonio River just above Tivoli, but no threat to the town itself was believed imminent. Meanwhile, the Rio Grande spread out over the lowlands of both Mexico and Texas yesterday, as it set a new record of 17 hours flood crest between Mercedes and the Gulf.

Thousands of acres of Mexican land east of Matamoros were inundated. The double-jawed floodways of the valley, which drew 8,700 cubic feet of water per second from the rampaging stream, were ecided with keeping the international stream under control.

The flood waters were steadily abating in the upper reaches of the Rio Grande, where extensive damage to cotton and onion crops resulted from overflow last weekend.

The U. S. Weather Bureau reported today that thunderstorms activity in the South Texas area

likely would bring more rain to the Rio Grande watershed, possibly renewing the flood threat. More rain also was considered possible along the Guadalupe and San Antonio Rivers.

Except for the extreme southwestern sector of the state—around El Paso—mostly cloudy skies prevailed over Texas today. Scattered thundershowers continued during the morning in the Alice-Corpus Christi-Brownsville area.

Rainfall during the past 24 hours was spotted and fairly light. San Antonio had the largest 24-hour total reported to the Dallas Weather Bureau. It measured .68 inch there; Wichita Falls had .43; Waco .15 and Alice .05.

Yesterday's high was 91 at Presidio with the low maximum of 61 degrees reported at Amarillo and Wichita Falls. The high minimum this morning was 73 degrees at Laredo and the low minimum 44 at Amarillo.

Although the Dallas Weather Bureau at Love Field reported only .01 inch during the 24 hours ending at 6:30 A. M. today, heavy showers were reported in various sectors of Dallas and Dallas County.

A late report from Bonham said rainfall there measured 1.56 inches overnight and that heavier amounts fell to the north and east of that north Texas city.

Sponsored by the Cowboy Club of the University, the contest will be the second battle of the spring training. The first meeting coming at the end of 15 days of drill, resulted in a 20-7 victory for the white jerseyed varsity.

Coach Woodson will be using the game to help determine who will be getting the starting nod this fall.

Believe Rail Lines In China Cut By Reds

SHANGHAI, April 29 (UP)— A Nationalist train from Hangchow to Shanghai was six hours overdue today, rail officials reported, amid circumstances indicating that Communist armies have cut the line.

At last reports the Communists were only 10 miles north of Kashing, a main station on the Shanghai-Hangchow line about midway between the two cities.

Telephone reports from Hangchow said Nationalist troops already were fleeing south from Hangchow across the Chientang river and that no major battle against the Communists was anticipated at either Hangchow or Kashing.

The Shanghai Railway Administration announced that the 5 P. M. train from Hangchow, due in Shanghai at 11 A. M., had not arrived at 5 P. M. and that there had been no word as to its fate from any point along the line.

RR Engineers Turn Down Deal

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers late yesterday rejected the fact-finding board's report denying them the right to put a second engineer on big Diesel locomotives.

SOIL CONSERVATION WINNERS TO BE GIVEN AWARDS TONIGHT

FORT WORTH, Tex. April 29 (UP)—The Atascosa County Soil Conservation District in South Texas was announced today as top winner in the 1949 "Save the Soil and Save Texas" conservation awards program.

The board of supervisors of the district will be presented a \$1,000 check at the 1949 awards dinner here tomorrow night, when winners of \$13,000 in conservation awards will be announced.

The awards program, largest in the country and now in its fourth year, is staged by the Fort Worth Press with the cooperation of the other Scripps-Howard papers in Texas—the Houston Press and El Paso Herald-Post.

The second \$1,000 award will go to the Salt Branch Conservation Group in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District, as the outstanding conservation community in the state during the past year. W. O. Dawson of Abilene, Route Five, will be crowned the state conservation farmer and receive a \$500 cash award. A similar award goes to Ed Bartz, Bartlett, for the most outstanding job of restoring a worn out farm to productivity through conservation methods.

Hester Pets Jail Mascot



AUSTIN, Tex. April 29 (UP)— Members of the House, lifting their legislative sights beyond the borders of Texas, today denounced a policy of appeasement toward Russia and demanded a shake-up in the state department.

"The government of the United States," the House said, "should dismiss from the department of state and the foreign services the men whose records show that they have helped to bring our country into this present peril by following the policy of treating the Soviet Union as a 'peace-loving Democracy' and the Chinese Communists as mere agrarian reformers who have no connection with Moscow..."

The action was taken in the form of a resolution offered by representatives including Phil Willis of Kaufman, Doyle Willis of Fort Worth and R. E. (Peppy) Blount, Jr., of Big Spring.

Members of the lower chamber, after giving the resolution unanimous approval, sent it on to the Senate for concurrence. The resolution referred to "daily insults which the Russians inflict upon our country" by the Soviet blockade of Berlin, and warned that if China goes to the Communists, "Indo-China, Siam, the Malay States and Indonesia will surely fall..."

either get the information, or to tell the person where he may get the help he desires.

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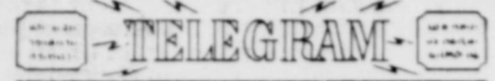
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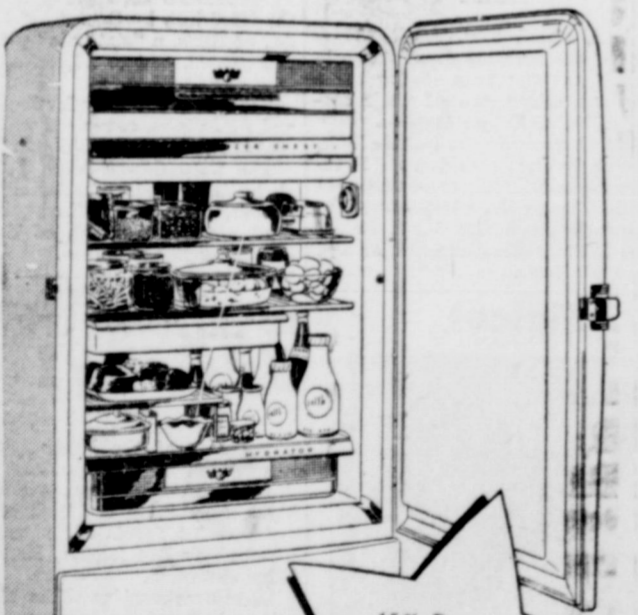

May Avert Dallas Transit Strike

DALLAS, April 29 (UP)—Officials of the Dallas Railway and Transit Co. and union leaders were hopeful today that a potential strike of some 1,200 employees might be averted through negotiations.

The AFL employees decided in a series of meetings yesterday to take a strike vote next Tuesday, but agreed to stay at work during the balloting.

The union and company opened negotiations last week on the workers' demands for wage hikes.

The tram and bus operators are members of the Amalgamated Federation of Streetcar and Motor Coach Employees.

Their spokesmen assert that present wages in Dallas are five to ten cents per hour lower than in other cities of comparable size.

The transit company requested an increase in fares, but the Dallas city council rejected it.

Wichita Falls Riding Again

WICHITA FALLS, April 29—(UP)—Residents of this foot-weary city were digging out their dimes with a sigh of relief today.

The buses were back on the streets again.

A six-day strike of drivers for the Wichita Transit Lines ended yesterday when negotiations were completed for sale of the company to Joe Perusse, owner of a Biloxi, Miss., bus line.

Under the new ownership, the fare rate will increase. Adults will pay 10 cents for each ride or buy 11 tokens for \$1, while school children will be charged a straight five cents or \$1 for 24

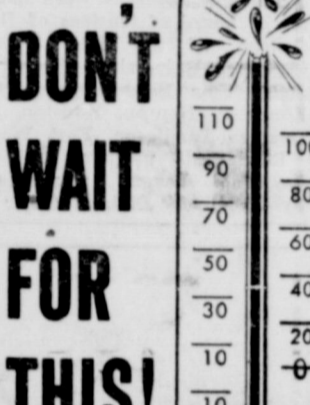




