### Truman Passes 65th Birthday Trim And Fit

WASHINGTON, May 9 (UP)—President Truman seemed, if anything, to be stepping up the tempo of his work today.

The chief executive, who celebrated his 65th birthday anniversary yesterday, was up early and took his usual morning walk by 7 A. M. EDT.

He walked for 30 minutes through comparatively deserted downtown Washington at an even faster pace than his usual brisk 120 paces a minute, Army style. One secret service man who accompanied the president shook his head and said: "He really walked this morning. We had trouble keeping up."

Walking is Mr. Truman's principal exercise for keeping fit. He still swims in the White House pool, but the walking keeps his weight down to a trim and hard 175 pounds.

His physician, Brig. Gen. Wallace H. Graham, says he would like the president to take a little of that poundage off. And he'd like the president to slow his pace.

The only festive part of Mr. Truman's birthday weekend came Saturday night at a party given by Attorney General Tom C. Clark. The party was attended by cabinet members and a few of the chief executive's closest friends.

Cause of the accident was not determined.

## WEST GERMAN CONSTITUTION PRESENTED TO GOVERNORS

BONN, Germany, May 9 (UP)—A new West German constitution, patterned after that of the Weimar Republic and containing a safe-guard against the rise of another Hitler, was submitted to the three western military governors for approval today.

The constitution was adopted 53 to 12 by the Bonn Constituent Assembly last night after 250 days of drafting.

It provides for an elected president and prime minister. It will go to the various German state legislatures for ratification after approval by the American, British and French military governors.

Assembly delegates beat back, 66 to 2, a final Communist effort to sabotage the constitution last night. Communists proposed that the assembly abandon the work and start negotiations with Communists of eastern Germany for an all-German government.

"We don't want a Germany with concentration camps," non-Communists cried at the two Communist delegates. The new constitution was approved on the fourth anniversary of V-E Day. It will be the basis of the first German government since Hitler committed suicide in April, 1945.

Although strikingly similar to the basic law of the short-lived Weimar Republic, which Hitler took over, the new constitution does not contain the crucial provision that gave Hitler the legal opportunity to become dictator. This provision was an article that permitted the president to govern without the Reichstag in emergencies.

The new constitution, of 145 articles, provides for a Western German government headed by an elected president and a chancellor, or prime minister. The president's term will run five years. There will be a two-chamber legislature. The lower house of 450 members will be elected for four-year terms.

### 2 Men Fined On Drunk Charges

Two men were arrested over the weekend by Eastland County State Highway patrolmen in connection with drunk charges, according to the Sheriff's office.

One man, of Fort Worth, paid a fine this morning of \$50 and costs and had his driver's license suspended for six months in Justice Court, for driving while intoxicated. The other man paid a \$25 fine for being drunk in an automobile.

The upper house of 50 members will be elected by the governments of the 11 West German states.

A 19-article section on basic rights guarantees freedom of the press, religion and speech safeguards the liberties of the individual.

The new constitution will be administered informally by an interim government or executive committee of 18 members who will serve until after the German elections this summer.

About 30,000 lovers of the old west are expected to don chaps and calico Friday and Saturday for a series of dances, jamborees and parades. "It's okay if it's western" is the theme of the celebration and Bandera cowboys are determined to keep things that way. The "Stompede" got started last year when Bandera "seceded" from the union because President Truman refused to establish a national cowboy day. Local cowhands set about remedying the situation. They proclaimed the holiday without presidential sanction.

Today, they roamed through the hill country making sure that all juke boxes, automobiles and other such modern day gadgets would be hidden from view by Friday. "Don't believe in 'em," drawled an old rancher.

## Eastland Maverick Band Gives Enjoyable Concert

### Anniversary Of First Atlantic Flight Observed

LISBON, May 9 (UP)—The U. S. Navy's record-breaking patrol bomber Truculent Turtle arrived from the United States today on a flight commemorating the first Atlantic air crossing just 30 years ago.

Sixteen hours and 50 minutes out of Floyd Bennett Field, New York, the twin-engine Lockheed Neptune landed at 10:30 A. M. (6:30 A. M. EDT).

Aboard the Turtle as a passenger was Admiral Albert G. Read, retired. Thirty years ago he flew the same route aboard the trail blazer NC-4, a four engine seaplane. It took 19 days to go from the Rockaway Naval Air Station to Lisbon.

The next month Captain John Alcock and Arthur Whitten Brown made the first non-stop Atlantic flight. Both were knighted for the flight. They left St. John's, Newfoundland, June 14, and landed at Clifden, Ireland, 16 hours and 28 minutes later.

The Truculent Turtle was piloted for today's flight by Cmdr. Thomas D. Davies, Chevy Chase, Md., who flew the big Navy bomber on its record non-stop hop of 11,236 miles from Perth, Australia, to Columbus, O., in the fall of 1946.

The Turtle flew 3,100 miles and used 2,641 gallons of gasoline. U. S. Ambassador Lincoln McVeigh, his wife, members of the embassy staff and a group of Portuguese air and naval officers welcomed the Turtle.

State Communist Chairman James F. Forest said Younglove's testimony was "compounded of lies" both as to details and in its total effect.

"Needless to say," Forest said, Thomas A. Younglove has been expelled from the Communist Party as a stool pigeon, agent provocateur and enemy of the working class, and all Communist Party clubs and labor organizations are warned against associating with him."

## FORD TURNS DOWN OFFER TO MEDIATE CIO STRIKE

DETROIT, May 9 (UP)—The Ford Motor Company today snubbed all offers to mediate the strike against its two key plants, increasing prospects of a prolonged walkout that in 10 days will leave 100,000 U. S. workers idle.

In 30 days, the strike's effects, will be felt throughout the world. The company said that the walkout of 62,200 CIO United Auto Workers against its River Rouge and Lincoln-Mercury plants is a matter for company-union negotiations. It is willing to meet the union and submit the dispute to arbitration.

The strike, now in its fifth day, forced the company to begin a wide program of plant shutdowns and layoffs in 16 states and Canada, starting tonight. In a clear cut statement, John Bugas, Ford vice president in charge of industrial relations, rejected offers of city officials to arrange mediation sessions. 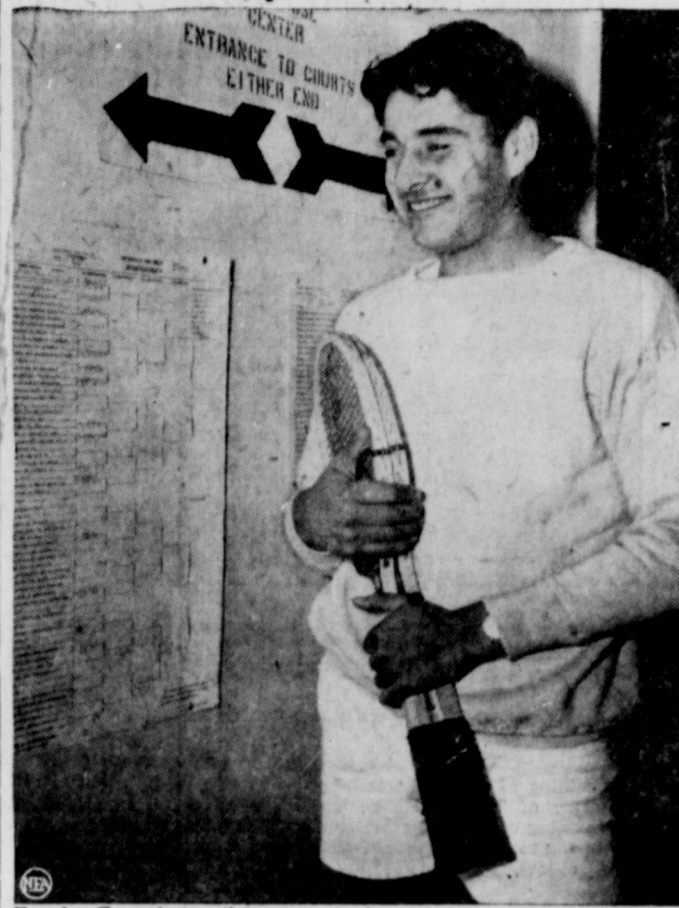

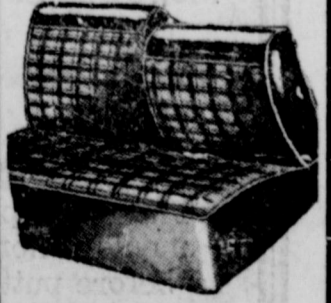

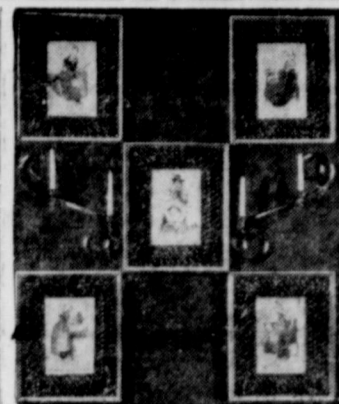
