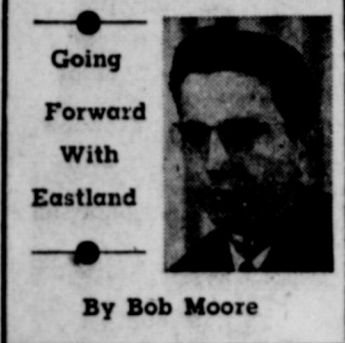

Fair And Mild Weather Covers Most Of Texas

Rainfall was due to take a holiday today in Texas, affording the state clear skies and comparatively mild mercury readings.
The weather Bureau at Dallas reported fair weather throughout Texas this morning with no indications of showers to add to the near-record dampness already felt by many sections of the state.
The Trinity River reached its crest of 36.04 feet at Dallas last night and this morning had fallen to 34.9 feet. Bankfull is 28 feet. The crest was moving toward the Gulf but weathermen expected no repetition of last month's flood damage.
Only rainfall recorded yesterday by reporting stations occurred at Brownsville, 71; Beaumont, 27, and Houston, .03.
This morning's lowest temperature in the state was 61 degrees at Amarillo and Clarendon. Slightly warmer weather was anticipated in that region.
Only station registering more than 100 degrees yesterday was at Presidio, where 104 was reached.

Jury Panel Summoned Monday For District Damage Suit Case

A special petit jury panel of forty men have been summoned Monday, June 20, at 9:30 A. M. for the 91st District Court trial of a civil suit filed by J. W. Lovell of Eastland against O. D. Dillingham of Abilene, doing business as Banner Ice Company, asking \$26,136 damages as the result of a traffic accident here Dec. 10, 1948.
The plaintiff alleged in the suit, filed Feb. 21, 1949, he suffered permanent injuries when struck by a vehicle operated by an agent of the defendant, when he started to cross the street on the southwest corner of the courthouse square in Eastland at 10:30 A. M. Dec. 10, 1948.
It was further claimed by the plaintiff that that defendant's agent "failed to keep a proper lookout, operated the vehicle on the left-hand side of the center of the street and on the wrong side of the street."
Of the damages asked, \$25,000 is for physical suffering, \$750 for medical and surgical costs and

SENATE READY TO TIGHTEN LABOR LAW AGAINST COMMUNISM

WASHINGTON, June 16 (UP)—The Senate was ready today to renew and broaden the anti-Communist provisions of the Taft-Hartley Law.
Awaiting action was the fourth of five compromise amendments drafted by a bipartisan group with the support of administration leaders. Three were approved by voice vote yesterday during consideration of the administration's Taft-Hartley repealer.
The pending amendment would require employer representatives and union officials to file non-Communist and non-Fascist affidavits before they used the machinery of the National Labor Relations Board. No affidavits would be required from organizations whose constitutions bar Communist or Fascist officials if the board was satisfied the constitutional provisions were enforced.
Approval of the amendment was assured. It differs from the existing Taft-Hartley law provision in that it is directed at Fascism as well as Communism and applies to employers as well as unions.
Once the affidavit requirement is settled, the Senate will be faced with amendments to carry forward the more controversial sections of the Taft-Hartley Law. One of those was laid before the Senate yesterday by Sen. Spessard L. Holland, D., Fla., who announced he would sponsor a "status rights" amendment.
His proposal would knock out a section of the administration bill overriding state laws insofar as they apply to interstate commerce — prohibiting or restricting close and union shop

Youth Breaks As Mother Testifies

BOSTON, Tex. June 16 (UP)—Clarence J. Hankins, on trial for murder, lost his composure yesterday for the first time when his mother testified.
She said her son was not mentally responsible for the tortureslaying of her daughter Bonnie Shelton in a Texarkana hotel last February.
Hankins, who had pleaded not guilty because of insanity, lost his stoic expression while his mother was being helped from the courtroom by her daughter, Mrs. Margaret Teague.
He strained forward, gripped his chair and then hid his face in his hand.
A confession introduced as evidence said Hankins killed the woman because she would not give him part of the money she earned as a prostitute.
Mrs. Hankins tearfully testified that her son had a fear that people were following him. He often wrote suicide notes, she said, and on one occasion slept in a closet because he thought someone was "after him."

Publishers In Galveston For Annual Meeting

GALVESTON, June 16 (UP)—Texas newspaper publishers moved in on Galveston today for the annual Texas Press Assn. meeting — and just as quickly moved right out into the Gulf of Mexico.
Business sessions with talks by salesmen and spy-hunters won't get started until tomorrow morning. So some 500 delegates took advantage of a dozen yachts placed at their disposal and cruised around Galveston Harbor.
Tonight the 70th annual gathering of the Association will honor a Texas newspaper pioneer, Lou Calder, at a dinner. Calder was one of the men responsible for building Lufkin's Southland Paper Mill which helped solve the newspaper shortage for Texas newspapers immediately following the war.
Tomorrow and Saturday, speakers will include Elmer Wheeler of Dallas, the well known "sizzling salesman," Robert E. Stripling, former chairman of the House Committee of un-American activities, and Stanley Walker, Texas rancher and author and former New York City editor.

French Workers Back On Jobs

PARIS, June 16 (UP)—French civil service workers went back to their jobs today ending a 24-hour strike which crippled many of the nation's services.
But at the same time the interior ministry cancelled all weekend leaves and alerted 10,000 armed police and security guards for possible trouble when rightists and leftists gathered in Paris Saturday in separate meetings.
The first service to return to normal this morning was the long-distance telephone network.
The airlines also moved back toward normalcy when the overnight shift of government meteorology experts returned to their jobs. And it was announced that normal mail deliveries would be made.

One Dies, Two Burned In Blast

AMARILLO, June 16 (UP)—Emmett C. Davis, 43, Colorado farmer, died last night in an Amarillo hospital and his two companions remained in critical condition today from burns.
Davis, Van Boling, 50, and Lawrence McCorkle, 31, all of Springfield, Colo., were burned in a flash fire and explosion at a tourist court Tuesday night.
Escaping gas from a water heater was blamed tentatively for the blast and fire.

Construction Of New Business Firm Underway Near Here

Construction is expected to be completed within three weeks of a 16 by 20 foot building being erected on U. S. Highway 80, between Eastland and Olden, which will be operated as a curio and souvenir business, Guy Quinn, Jr., owner has announced.
A botanical garden will also be installed, Quinn said. Mexican handicraft will be featured.
The firm will serve as a retail outlet for a pottery manufacturing plant, which Quinn is connected with here.

Truman Given Power To Work Over Government

WASHINGTON, June 16 (UP)—President Truman said today he does not believe the country is going through an unemployment or economic crisis.
He made that statement at his news conference when asked about his meeting yesterday with Walter P. Reuther, president of the CIO United Auto Workers. Reuther said, talking with the president, that he expected the administration to take vigorous steps to combat increasing unemployment.
Mr. Truman said the administration viewpoint on that subject would be expressed in his midyear economic report, required under the so-called "full employment" law.
Asked whether he felt the nation was in any such crisis, the president shook his head and responded with a vigorous no.
Earlier, Dr. Edwin G. Nourse said there would be no cause for alarm even if unemployment should hit the 4,000,000 mark this month, as predicted by some economists.

PLEA MADE IN SPECIAL MESSAGE TO LEGISLATURE

AUSTIN, Tex., June 16—(UP)—Gov. Beauford Jester, in a special message to the Legislature, today asked for immediate creation of a committee "to study the entire matter of state and local taxation."
The governor tagged his request as an emergency.
"Our present taxes," he said, "are a hodge-podge. Many taxes are imposed which yield little revenue but which are costly to collect and burdensome on the public."
He revealed officially that "some months ago the governor named a tax study commission, consisting of state officials and staff members of state agencies to review this entire field and make a factual report on the basis of which the Legislature might consider appropriate action."
The commission, he said, would have a "comprehensive report ready by the latter part of the summer."
The governor's message dovetailed with a recommendation made last week by House Speaker Durwood Mansford.
Mansford, painting a dismal picture of the state's finances, urged immediate appointment of an interim tax study committee which would report back to a special session of the Legislature, probably by next September.
The governor said that "it seems desirable that a committee be established to review the findings of his tax study commission and make recommendations for the consideration of the Legislature."
He implied that this consideration would be done at a special session.
"We have all been cognizant," the governor noted, "of the need for a comprehensive examination of the tax policy of this state, in respect to its efficient administration, to the adequacy of the funds so raised, and to the just and equitable distribution of tax levies."
"There is a growing demand," he continued, "on the part of the public for expanded services of the state."
"County and municipal governments are faced with perplexing problems in financing their activities."
His tax commission, the governor revealed, was composed of Dr. Stuart MacCorkle, director of the Bureau of Municipal Research at University of Texas; State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, Hall H. Logan, chairman of the state board of control; Jesse James, State Treasurer; L. F. Gabbard, Texas A. & M. College; Bullock Hyder, North Texas State College; Dr. E. T. Miller, University of Texas, and Dr. Reginald Rushing, Texas Technological College.
The governor, stepping personally into the financial picture, found legislative circles studying another new formula suggested as a cure for the state's monetary headache.

Ross Testimony Due Tomorrow

LA GRANGE, June 16 (UP)—Only 13 men in a new panel of 36 remained to be questioned in the sanity trial of Dr. Lloyd Ross today, but it was apparent testimony would not begin before tomorrow.
The new panel was summoned by Judge J. R. Fuchs after the first 36 were exhausted without getting the required eligible to serve.
Ross is under death sentence for the ambush slaying of four members of the Willard York family in May, 1947.
His attorneys seek to save him from the electric chair by proving him insane.
Ross' wife and 15-year old daughter were present at yesterday's proceedings.

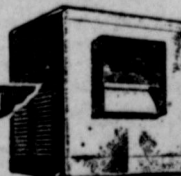

BEVIN FIRM IN STAND TO DISMISS CONFERENCE TODAY

By United Press
The Big Four Foreign Ministers may wind up their Paris conference tonight. Whether any firm agreements on Germany, Berlin or Austria will be reached still was an open question as the ministers gathered in the Rose Marble Palace for perhaps the last time.

British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin was determined that today's meeting will be the last—even if it has to continue all night. He saw U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson this morning and was understood to have told him that he definitely would attend a Brussels Pact Conference in Luxembourg tomorrow.

Bevin wants the western powers to insist that Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky decide tonight whether the conference shall end in a limited agreement or total failure.

The western powers are waiting specifically for Vishinsky's

reply to the latest western proposal for a stop gap live-and-let-live arrangement on Germany, a right of access to Berlin and a agreement on outstanding Austrian treaty issues.

Other foreign news included: BUDAPEST—The Hungarian Workers' Party (Communist) expelled former Foreign Minister Laszlo Rajk and Cadre Commission Head Tibor Szonyi for "spying for imperialist powers." Political observers said the announcement confirmed that a purge is under way in Hungary's Communist ranks.

 Dean Frank Young was notified of the plan in a message from House Speaker Sam Rayburn.

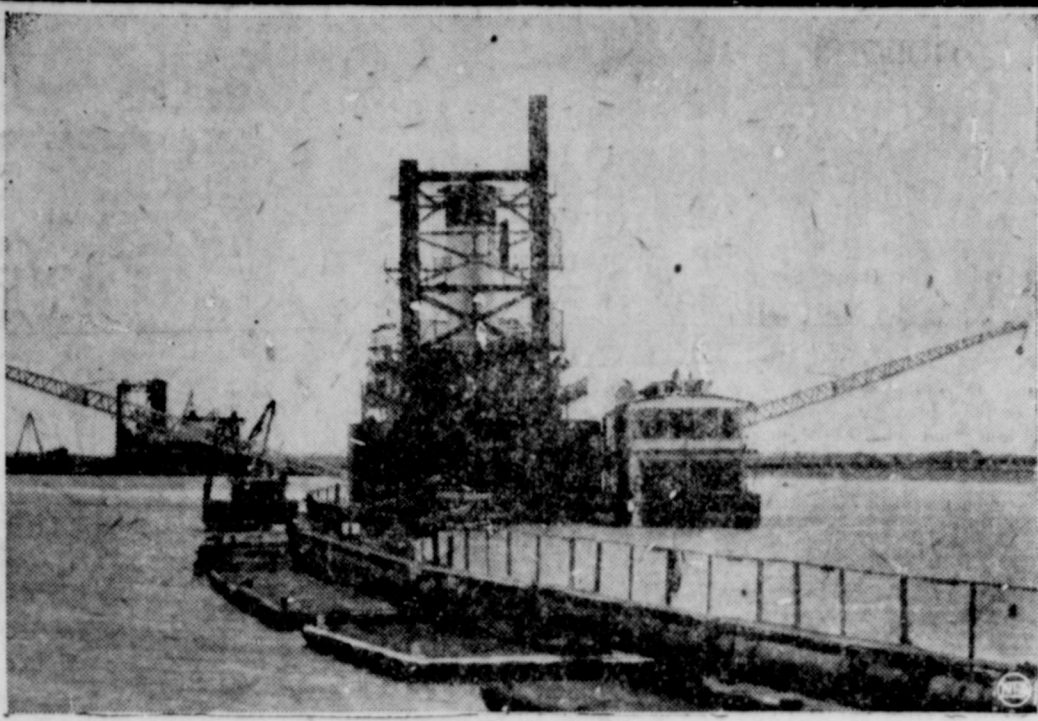

National Guard and the F. B. I. was alerted today to halt Birmingham's series of acts of violence and terror by men in hoods and white robes.

And Sheriff Holt A. McDowell planned to call on the F. B. I. during the day, to see if it can give G-man help in the critical state of affairs here. Already he had advised householders that they have a right to fight violence with violence, to protect their homes.

State Trooper forces here have been strengthened by order of Gov. James E. Folsom. He indicated that he would have called out the guard if he thought that would do any good.

The latest assault, on the white father of two young children, was the most serious. B.G. Stovall, 31, was lashed 20 times until his back was raw. He thinks the men picked on him because he and Mrs. Stovall frequently have to leave the children at night.

McDowell slated a conference with F. B. I. Agent George King, after officially telling every citizen he has a right to defend his

home "with whatever means he finds necessary."

The Ku Klux Klan had been blamed by the state attorney general for threats against a grandmother and a cafe owner last week end and Stovall said the men who beat him wore outfits somewhat similar to that organization's. McDowell, however, believed the Klan was not responsible.

He suggested that non-members could put on white robes in such outrages and feel that public indignation would be directed at the Klan.

Wentz didn't forget his 35 personal employees, who will get 25 per cent of their total wages while working for him. Just how much at this time, according to the executors, T. W. Lantice and Merle P. Long.

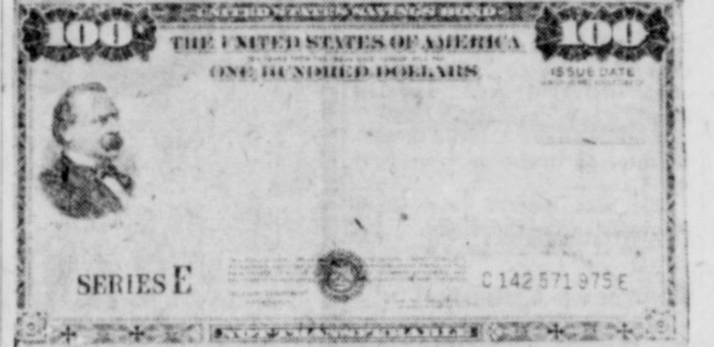

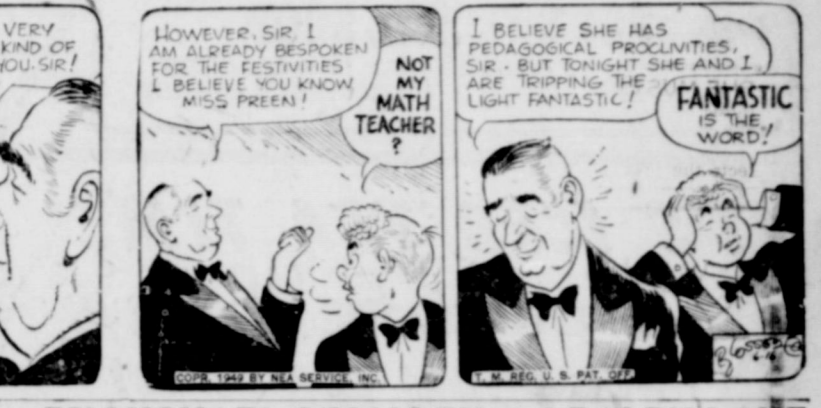

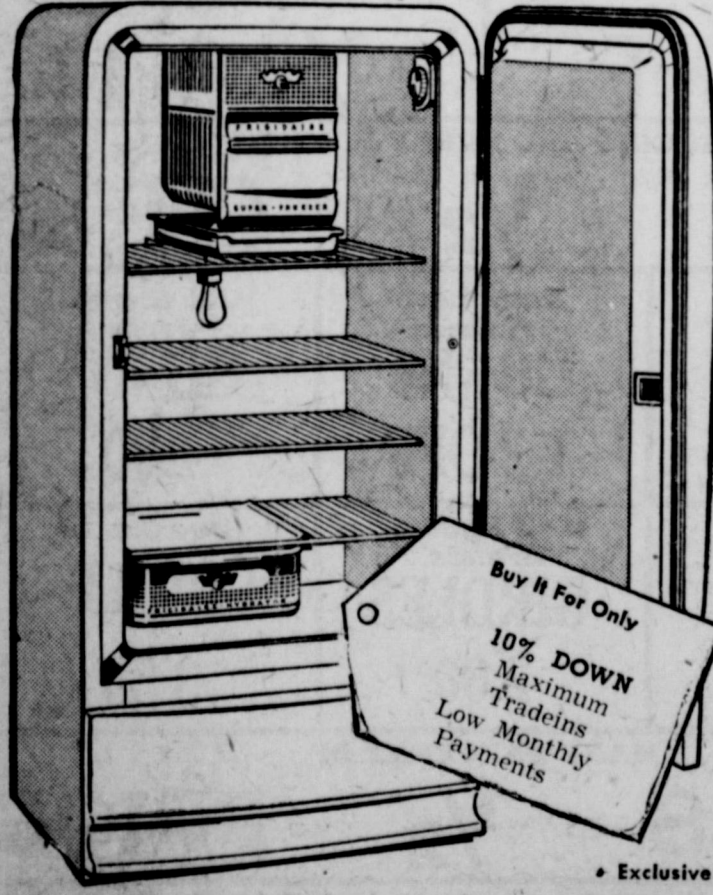

TRUMAN REITERATES SUPPORT OF FARM SUBSIDY PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, June 16 (UP)—President Truman today renewed his support of the Brannan Farm Subsidy Plan, asserting that it should and would be passed at this or the next session of the 81st Congress.

The President talked at length with reporters on the general subject of current spy trials and investigations. He took the position that the country is going

through a period of hysteria that follows every great crisis. He said that he felt confident that no part of his executive branch of the government was hysterical and he promised to clean out any official who became a victim of the spy hunt hysteria. He said, under questioning, that he knew of no intention on the part of J. Edgar Hoover to resign as director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

"Does Hoover have your confidence?" the President was asked. Mr. Hoover has done a good job as the President's only reply.

At his news conference last week Mr. Truman said that he thought much of the current hue-and-cry over spies was caused by headline hunters.

He was asked today whether he included Hoover in this category—a victim of headline hunters.

The President told the reporter to make his own evaluation. He said the reporter was as capable of doing this as he was.

The lengthy exchange of questions and answers began when a reporter asserted that a number of "fine people" are being branded as "Reds" in the current spy hunts, investigations and hearings.

The President was asked if he had any word of advice for the nation on that topic.

He said the best recommendation he could make was to reread the history of the alien-sedition cases of the Jefferson administration, late in the 18th century.

The President said the parallel between that year and today was surprising.

Reporters then asked Mr. Truman to apply the lesson he drew from the alien-sedition cases and the present day situation.

Well, he said, the hysteria finally died out and the country did not go to hell and it's not going there now.

Hospital attendants said the condition of all three was "very critical." The boat burned and sank witnesses on the shore said.

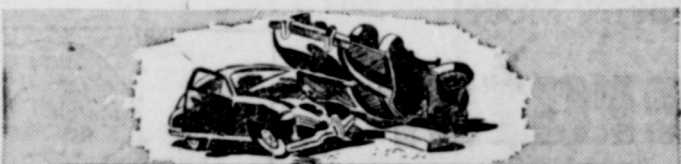

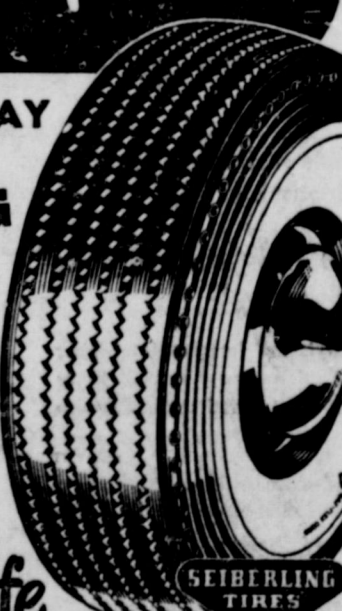
