**Cooler Weather, Rains Predicted**

Scattered showers fell in north Central Texas this morning and considerable cloudiness and slightly cooler temperatures prevailed over most of the state.

The Weather Bureau in Dallas said it appraised that Texas would have a comparatively cool but possibly damp week-end.

Yesterday's high was 103 degrees at Laredo and the low maximum was 85 at Marfa, which also had this morning's low of 63 degrees. Several points had low readings this morning included Dalhart 64, Lubbock 66, and Childress 67. The warmest overnight point was Galveston with 77.

Rainfall at the time the 6:30 A. M. observations were taken included Childress .60 inch, Abilene .19 and Marfa .08.

### Farmers Told Some Supports Are Necessary

COLLEGE STATION, Tex., July 30 (UP)—Delegates to the first annual Texas Farm Bureau meeting last night were told that some farm price supports were necessary because "this nation cannot afford a weak spot in her economy."

The speaker was Allan Kline, national president of the American Farm Bureau Federation. Speaking at a banquet which closed the annual meeting, Kline declared that the farm prosperity of the last 10 years was not due to price supports.

Prices, he said averaged 130 per cent of parity and only a very small part of farm income was due to government loans. But when recession comes, the farmers will keep up production because they can't maintain their standard of living with a low production, he reasoned.

That means, according to Kline, that prices of farm commodities will go down; industry will be able to cut production to maintain prices, and the farmer will be forced to pay proportionately more for the things he buys.

The national farm leaders expressed "every confidence" that the Farm Bureau formula for parity would be adopted by Congress as an amendment to the parity act of 1948.

### Ranger Police Alerted To Watch For Highwaymen

Ranger police were alerted Friday night at 11:15 o'clock to be on the lookout for two soldiers who were reported to have held up and robbed a Weatherford man.

John Young sheriff at Weatherford notified the Ranger officers shortly after the robbery was reported and Bill Hinman and Conk Ervin, together with two highway patrolmen, Oscar Avery and Terry Barrett set up a road block at the intersection of the country club road and Highway 80 east of Ranger. The officers remained at the post for nearly two hours, stopping all passing vehicles but apparently the soldiers who were said to be driving a two-tone Buick, had headed in another direction. By radio the officers were advised that the block could be abandoned at Ranger.

According to Weatherford officers, two men dressed in khaki clothes and Army dress caps held up and robbed C. J. Simpson of \$160 and two courtesy cards, one on the Magnolia and one on Phillips. They were said to be in a two-toned Buick, thought to be blue and gray.

Chief W. G. Pounds reported this morning that Greyhound bus driver coming into Ranger after the robbery stated that his bus had passed a similar car being chased by officers and headed toward Fort Worth. No report of the highwaymen being caught had been received in Ranger Saturday morning.

### Couple In Jail Here Suspects In Tex Thornton Murder Case

The Eastland County Sheriff's office is expecting word by Monday if fingerprints of a couple being held in County Jail match those of two suspects sought in the murder of Tex Thornton, famed oil well fire fighter in Amarillo several weeks ago.

The couple is in county jail serving out a \$25 fine and costs assessed Thursday by Justice of the Peace E. E. Wood, after they had pleaded guilty to misdemeanor theft.

Booked as Paul Weaver, 30 and wife, Frances Weaver, 23 the man and woman were arrested Wednesday night by City Police, when the man was seen siphoning gasoline from a Texas-New Mexico Busline near the Eastland bus

### SOME RELIEF PROMISED NATION FROM HEAT WAVE

The heat wave scorching the nation from the Rockies to the Atlantic coast took a mounting toll of dead today but relief was on the way and even New York city, where records were broken yesterday, was expected to have cooling breezes by nightfall.

A survey by United Press showed that 134 persons had died as a result of the week-long heat blitz. The total included 67 deaths as direct result of the heat and 67 caused by drowning.

The cool air seeping down from Canada was expected to hold temperature below 85 degrees at Chicago today.

### Suspended Sentence For Perry Dawson

A two year suspended sentence was given Perry Dawson, 45, Friday in 91st District Court, after he pleaded guilty to a Grand Jury indictment of "threatening the life of a human being."

Judge George L. Davenport was on the bench. The indictment was returned by the Grand Jury in connection with the home of a Cisco couple being broken into on the night of June 23, and the man and woman lives being threatened.

### Cisco School Tax Rate Set

CISCO — A school tax of \$1.30 on the \$100 valuation was set by a vote of 221 to 20 by residents of the newly-enlarged Cisco Independent School District Thursday.

The rate is the same in effect for several years, but did not cover nine dormant common school districts which were recently annexed to the Cisco District.

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### PLANES CRASH IN ADJOINING FARM FIELDS

WRIGHTSTOWN, N. J., July 30 (UP)—Sixteen persons died today when an air liner and a Navy fighter collided in the air and then crashed.

The passenger plane was a two-engine DC-3 of the Eastern Air Lines en route from Boston to Memphis by way of New York and Washington. It carried 12 passengers, including a child, and a crew of three.

The Navy plane was a "Hell Cat" fighter. The only person on board was the pilot.

No one aboard either plane survived. Witnesses on the ground, not seeing the tiny fighter at the high altitude, thought the air liner had exploded. It crashed on a farm five miles from Fort Dix, scattering wreckage over a wide area.

The fuselage burst into flames on impact. The Navy plane ploughed into a farmer's field two miles distant.

Crash crews, ambulances, and doctors were rushed to the scene from McGuire Air Base at Fort Dix. State police said no one survived and that the plane was demolished in the crash.

The military plane, identified as belonging to the Navy, crashed on a near-by farm. State police said that the pilot was killed.

At LaGuardia Field, New York, it was learned that a Navy plane was over due on a flight from Warrenton, Pa., to Anacostia, Md.

The air liner carried 11 passengers and a crew of three.

Major Somerby, wing executive at the Army Air Base at Fort Dix, said the air liner crashed into a field just off the main highway.

Crash crews, ambulances, and doctors from Fort Dix were rushed to the scene. There first reports back to Major Somerby were that the DC-3 was demolished.

The scene of the air liner crash was on the Peter Munderan farm which is on the road between Chesterfield and Sycamore, N. J. The Navy plane crashed on an adjoining farm.

Eastern Airlines said the plane was their flight number 557 which left Boston at 7:55 A. M. EST. It was due to reach LaGuardia Airport at 9:04 EST and to leave at 9:55-A EST for Wilmington, Washington and Memphis.

**LEGAL NOTICE**  
**ORDINANCE NO. 327**  
AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO TRAFFIC AND REGULATING THE USE OF PUBLIC STREETS AND HIGHWAYS OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS, PROVIDING FOR THE INSTALLATION, REGULATION AND CONTROL OF THE USE OF PARKING METERS AND DEFINING PARKING METER ZONES; AUTHORIZING A METHOD OF PAYMENT FOR PARKING METERS AND THE INSTALLATION THEREOF EXCLUSIVELY FROM THE RECEIPTS OBTAINED FROM THEIR OPERATION; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF AND PROVIDING THAT INVALIDITY OF PART SHALL NOT AFFECT THE VALIDITY OF REMAINDER; AND DECLARE AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS: SECTION 1. The word "vehicle" as used herein shall mean any device or animal by which any person or property may be transported upon a highway, except those operated upon rails or tracks.

SEC. 2 That the following described streets in the City of Eastland, Texas are hereby designated and established as parking meter zones, to-wit: Green Street, Mulberry Street, Lamar Street, Seaman Street, Ross Wood Street, and Bassett Street, running North from Plummer Street to their intersections with Patterson Street; and Patterson Street, White Street, Main Street, Commerce Street, Olive Street, and Plummer Street running West from their intersections with Bassett Street to their intersections with Green Street; and including all four sides or boundaries of the County Courthouse square, within the City of Eastland, Eastland County, Texas, as laid out in the plat or map of the City of Eastland, recorded in Volume 77, page 497, Maps or Plats of the City of Eastland in the office of the County Clerk of Eastland County, Texas. All of those streets and parts of streets upon which limited parking is now permitted under authority, and by virtue of all limited parking ordinances now effective, and the parking limits and restrictions therein provided as hereby incorporated in this ordinance for all uses and purposes applicable to the conditions, terms, and enforcement hereof.

SECTION 3. The City Manager shall provide for installation of meters, including curb or street marking lines, regulation and operation thereof, and shall cause said meters to be maintained in good workable condition. Meters shall be placed upon the curb next individual parking places and meters shall be so constructed as to display a signal showing legal parking upon deposit therein of the proper coin, or coins, of the United States as indicated by instructions on said meter, and for a period of time conforming to the parking limits of the City of Eastland, Texas, said signal to remain in evidence until expiration of said parking period so designated, at which time a change of signal or some other mechanical operation shall indicate expiration of said parking period.

SECTION 4. The City is hereby vested with the authority to enter into a contract for the purchase and installation of parking meters and to provide payment there-

of exclusively from the receipts obtained by the City from their operation and that said means of payment shall be in addition to any other purchasing powers heretofore granted the City by its charter, or by the laws of the State of Texas.

SECTION 5. When any vehicle shall be parked next to a parking meter the owner or operator of said vehicle shall park within the area designated by the curb or street marking lines as indicated for parallel or diagonal parking and upon entering said parking space shall immediately deposit in said meter one or more five cent coins of the United States, and/or one or more one cent coins of the United States as indicated by instructions on said meter. It shall be unlawful for any person to fail to park within said designated area, or fail or neglect to so deposit the proper coin, or coins.

Said parking space may then be used by such vehicle during the legal parking limit provided by the ordinances of the City, and said vehicle shall be considered as unlawfully parked if it remains in said space beyond the legal parking limit and/or when said parking meter displays a signal showing such illegal parking.

It shall be unlawful for any person to cause or permit any vehicle registered in his name to be unlawfully parked as set out in this section.

SECTION 6. It shall be unlawful for any person to deposit, or cause to be deposited in a parking meter one or more five cent coins and/or one or more one cent coins for the purpose of extending the parking time beyond the maximum time fixed by the ordinance of the City of Eastland, Texas.

SECTION 7. It shall be unlawful to deposit or cause to be deposited in any parking meter, any slug, device or a metallic substitute for a coin of the United States.

SECTION 8. It shall be unlawful for any person to tamper with, open, willfully break or destroy any parking meter.

SECTION 9. It shall be the duty of traffic officers so instructed to take the parking meter number, and the state vehicle tag number, of all persons violating the provisions of this ordinance and make complaint therefor in the Municipal or Police Court of the City of Eastland, Texas.

SECTION 10. Any person, firm, or corporation who shall violate or permit or allow anyone to violate Section Five (5) or Section Six (6) of this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined not more than Five Dollars (\$5.00) and

costs.

SECTION 11. Any person who shall violate or assist in violation of Section Seven (7) or Section Eight (8) of this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined not more than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) and costs.

SECTION 12. The fee required to be deposited in said meters is hereby levied as a police regulation and inspection fee to cover the cost of providing parking spaces, parking meters, and installation, and maintenance thereof, the cost of regulation and inspection, operation, control and use of the parking meter spaces and zones created herein, for the regulation and control of traffic moving in and out of, and parking in said parking spaces and zones so created, and for the cost of any resultant traffic administration expense.

SECTION 13. If any section, provision or part thereof in this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, then such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole, or any section, provision or part thereof not so adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 14. The fact that the City of Eastland has no adequate vehicle parking zone or regulation, and no provision for regulated parking vehicles in such zones, and no penalty for violation of parking regulations, and such fact endangers the public peace, health and safety, and creates an emergency requiring the suspension of the rule requiring ordinance be not passed on the day at which the same is introduced, and requiring that this ordinance become effective upon final passage and publication as required by law and the charter of the City of Eastland, and it is so ordained and ordered.

Passed by the Board of City Commissioners of the City of Eastland, this the 19th day of July, 1949.

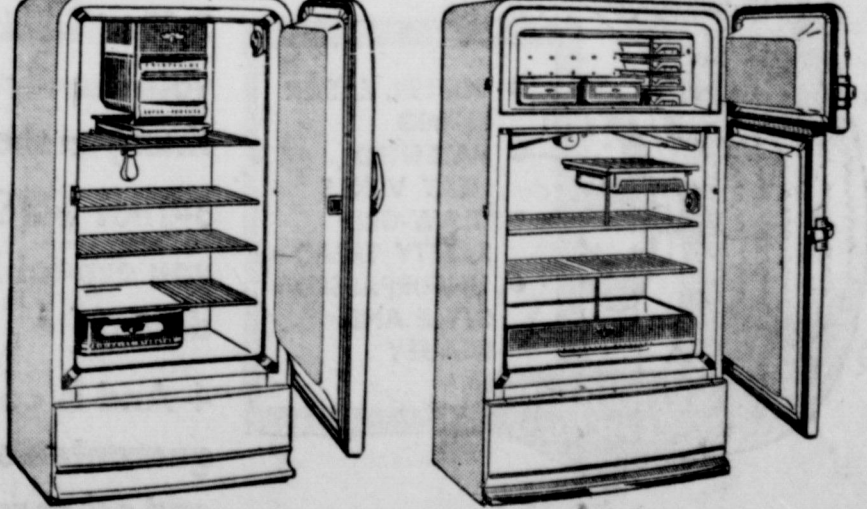
