Abilene Defeats DeLeon; King Ford Takes Cisco In Opening Of Tournament

Opening the eighth annual Eastland Invitational Softball Tournament, a double-header Monday night at Firemen's Field saw Thornton's of Abilene edge De Leon, 5 to 3, and King Ford of Eastland romp over Cisco, 7 to 3.

Another double-header is scheduled for tonight between Rising Star and Gorman, King Tractor of Eastland and Breckenridge, in the one game elimination series which is expected to be completed this week. Game time is 8 o'clock.

A loud speaker, with E. K. Henderson doing the announcing, has been arranged by the sponsors, Eastland Volunteer Fire Department. Umpires were: Sgt. Brannon, behind the plate; M. W. Cotton, first base; and Charley Jo Owen, third base.

Schultz was on the mound for Thornton's of Abilene, with Bell doing the catching. Reed pitched for the losing De Leon delegation, with Stewart catching. Abilene took the lead in the first inning, running in two men. Following a scoreless second period, Reed knocked a double to run in two De Leon men tying up the ball game. In the second half of the third, Abilene got a man in, with De Leon doing the same in the top half of the fourth-making the game tied again. Following a score in the fifth, Schultz beamed a home run in the sixth to cinch the game.

King Ford's team, composed of young college and high school athletes, had too much speed and

class for the Cisco delegation and the outcome was never in doubt. Walter Maynard was on the mound for King Ford, with Trout doing the catching. Morgan pitched for Cisco, with Pope behind the plate.

Following a scoreless first inning, Bobby Blair scored in the top half of the second, after getting a double and stealing in to home on an error. Crossley and Brasher scored in the fourth inning from bases, with Johnny Hicks paving the way in a nice hit to center field. Cisco came to life in the last of the fourth and got three men to home, capitalizing on a brief span of "fumblyitis" by King Ford. Coming back strong in the top half of the fifth, Eastland scored twice more to win easily, 7 to 3.

A total of \$250 in prizes are being offered by the sponsors to the top teams in the tournament.

Welcome Cool Front Cools Most Of Texas

A light cool front pushed across the Texas Panhandle and into the north central section of the state this morning, dropping temperatures a few degrees and producing scattered rainfalls.

The U. S. Weather Bureau said the front was pushing southward, losing some of its force, but probably would have the effect of forcing temperatures down slightly by their levels of yesterday.

Laredo, with 101, was the only station reporting an afternoon maximum of more than 100 degrees Monday. Del Rio and Mineral Wells had even 100's.

Waco reported 98, and Dallas, El Paso and San Antonio 97's. Abilene and Austin had 96, Brownsville and Houston 93, and Lufkin 92.

The lowest afternoon temperature Monday was 85 at Marfa.

Lows this morning ranged from a "chilly" 59 at Clarendon to 78 at Galveston.

Wichita Falls and Childress reported traces of rain in the 24-hour period ending this morning. Presidio was cooled off by a .55-inch shower, and Guadalupe Pass had .04-inch, as did San Antonio.

Klan Head Sent To Jail Again

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 2 (UP) — William Hugh Morris, Alabama Ku Klux Klan chief, was sent to jail again today for an "indefinite" sentence because of his persistent refusal to name members of his hooded organization.

Circuit Judge George Lewis Bailes ordered the imperial Wizard of the Klan imprisoned because he declined to furnish Klan records to a grand jury investigating masked gang terrorism here.

The grand jury has indicted 18 persons in connection with a wave of fuoggings and intimidations.

The order was a continuation of Morris' contempt of court sentence handed down by Circuit Judge Robert J. Wheeler July 7 and later upheld by the State Supreme Court.

Under the ruling Morris will remain in jail without bond until he produces the Klan records for a grand jury. The "mob terrorism" jury sought the records in its investigation of the federated Ku Klux Klan, Inc., as an Alabama corporation.

Funds Granted For Study Of Water Pollution

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (UP)—Federal Security Administrator Oscar R. Ewing today announced grants of \$850,000 for the states to study water pollution resulting from industrial waste.

Before the funds actually may be released for study of the problems, applications setting forth specific programs must be approved by the Public Health Service of P.S.A.

The P.S.A. has a \$2,200,000 appropriation from Congress to start the nationwide program of water pollution control and prevention.

The allotments include:

- Arkansas \$17,396, Iowa \$15,999, Kansas \$18,697,
- Louisiana \$17,805, Missouri \$19,559, Nebraska \$12,021, New Mexico \$10,372, Oklahoma \$16,723, Texas \$30,197.

Officials Of City, County Meet For 'Peace' Session On Meter War; No Treaty

Officials of the City of Eastland met with the officials of the County of Eastland Monday morning in a peace talk on the parking meter war, but were unable to come to terms.

Mayor W. W. Linkenhoger, City Commissioner Pearson Grimes, and their attorney, V. T. Seaberry appeared before a regular meeting of the County Commissioners Court and requested withdrawal of a suit filed by the County against the City and the Magee-Hale Park-O-Meter Co. of Oklahoma City, Okla., in 91st District Court July 27, seeking a restraining order and injunction against defendants installing and operating parking meters around the courthouse.

The Commissioners Court declined to withdraw the suit, and County Judge Lewis Crossley said today the status of the affair remained the same. District Judge George L. Davenport has granted a temporary restraining order against the City, with a hearing to be held Monday, Aug. 8, to decide if a permanent injunction should be issued.

CARDINAL SPELLMAN GETS FIRE FROM CZECH EDITOR

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Aug. 2 (UP)—The Czechoslovakian Communist party charged today that Francis Cardinal Spellman of New York was on the "general staff of the American organization whose task it is to organize espionage and sabotage" in communist countries.

The attack, most outspoken thus far against any American churchman, was made in a lengthy editorial in the Communist party newspaper Rude Pravo. It was written by Andre Simon, foreign editor of the newspaper.

Simon said that Spellman "is, after the Pope, the most powerful man in the world Catholic hierarchy."

"He is great worshipper of the Spanish Fascist dictator (Generalissimo Franco) and wrote several articles in praise of him," Simon added. "He is an arch-enemy of everything that has the least connection with progress."

"The organization is one of the centers that are sending into the world a steady current of lies and slanders about the Soviet Union and the Peoples Democratic countries," the editorial said.

"In close cooperation with the Vatican espionage service, which is directed by the general of the Jesuit Order, Jensen, under the auspices of Vatican State Secretary Montini, the organization is trying to bring confusion into the Peoples Democratic countries."

Simon said the American organization, headed by Spellman, "spares neither dollars nor people."

"Only because of the constant and steady guard by the governments and the people of the peoples Democratic countries were their efforts frustrated," the editorial added.

Former Butler Arrested As Woman's Slayer

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Aug. 2 (UP)—Monroe Medlin, 23, a discharged butler and Army deserter, was arrested today in connection with the shotgun slaying of a wealthy society matron.

Police Chief Frank Littlejohn said Medlin was picked up in a downtown residence following a concentrated manhunt started when the shotgun-blasted body of the woman was found in the bedroom of her fashionable residence yesterday.

Officers suggested that the negro may have killed Mrs. Esley O. Anderson, 68, and bludgeoned and knifed her new negro butler out of revenge of being friends.

Littlejohn said his fingerprints were found on the shotgun used in the slaying.

Littlejohn declined to name the suspect before his arrest but said he was fired as butler by Mrs. Anderson's businessman husband two weeks ago.

He said he had been notified by the Army disciplinary barracks at Madison, Wis., that the 23-year-old negro escaped while serving a three year sentence for desertion received in March 1948.

The suspect, police said, also was arrested here in 1944 on a charge of draft evasion and subsequently evaded.

He was fired July 19 by Anderson, an automobile dealer, when he allegedly caught the butler with a girl in the servants quarters.

Meanwhile doctors worked to save the life of their only witness—Wilford Randleman, 43, the butler hired to replace the suspect. He was reported still unconscious this morning in a hospital room guarded by police.

Smithwick Faces Hearing Today

ALICE, Tex., Aug. 2 (UP)—Deputy Sheriff Sam Smithwick, accused of slaying a radio newscaster who charged that the deputy operated a "wide open" bawdy house, faced a preliminary hearing today.

Lawyers said the deputy had "made no arrangements for his defense" on charges of killing newscaster W. H. (Bill) Mason.

"I wouldn't be surprised if Smithwick went to court without an attorney," said Lawyer Raeburn Norris. "It's not that he is not interested in one. It's just that he's feeling his way and wants to talk over his situation with his family."

Mason charged in his broadcast over Alice station KBLI last Thursday that Smithwick owned the Rancho Allegro and permitted prostitutes to solicit trade without interference there. He also charged that the club ignored liquor laws.

Mason was shot to death the next day.

As a last tribute to him, the radio station silenced its transmitter for five minutes at noon yesterday. A brief memorial service was held at 12:30 P. M., the time Mason formerly went on the air with his program "Bill Mason Speaks."

K-F Introduces 2nd Model, Utility Kaiser 'Vagabond'

WILLOW RUN, Mich. — The new market for "utility" sedans created early this year with the introduction of the Kaiser Traveler was broadened today with the announcement of a second Kaiser-Frazer multi-purpose model, the "Vagabond."

In appearance and styling, the new six-passenger automobile is identical to the conventional Kaiser DeLux four-door sedan, and is powered by the same 112-horsepower "Thunderhead" engine.

But the back seat of the Vagabond folds away in 10 seconds, and the rear of the car opens from floor to roof to provide access to more than 130 cubic feet of space for cargo. The cargo floor is 10 feet long and more than 32 square feet in area.

Now being shipped to dealers, the new model retails at \$2,288 plus only state and local taxes, if any, and transportation from the factory. The original Traveler, comparable to the conventional Kaiser Special sedan and equipped with the K-F 100 horsepower engine, delivers for 2,088.

As the Traveler, the versatility of the Kaiser Vagabond is achieved through the functional design of two large hinged panels at the rear of the car.

The lower panel hinges downward to form a tailgate level with the cargo floor. The second panel, which includes the broad rear window, hinges from the roof and opens upward. When loaded to capacity, the car may be driven with both panels open.

Henry J. Kaiser, K-F chairman, who developed the idea for the original utility model, said that the Vagabond is being offered to meet the combination cargo-passenger requirements of car buyers who traditionally have operated a second vehicle.

But higher insurance rates, the extra taxes, maintenance costs and other premiums involved have imposed a heavy penalty on two-car ownership, he pointed out.

The Vagabond may be used as a conventional six-passenger sedan, for light hauling or delivery, or as a multi-functional car for sports minded motorists. For overnight camping or touring stops, the cargo floor of the Vagabond easily accommodates a conventional twin-bed or rubber air mattress.

A new note in fashionable interior styling is achieved in the Vagabond despite the use of washable vinyl plastic upholstery. The rugged material is pleated over air-foam rubber seat cushions and used in fashioning the custom-styled door panel upholstery. All vinyl or a combination of vinyl and fabric in harmonizing colors is available.

The new sedan is offered in six colorful body finishes—Caribbean coral metallic, saddle bronze metallic, glass green, garden green polar gray and onyx. Interiors are executive green, oakwood brown, cardinal red and pepper red.

Heavy duty shock absorbers & springs are standard equipment on the 123 1/2-inch wheelbase model. Overdrive and four or six-ply tires are available optionally.

In August, 1948, he said, 212 persons were killed in Texas traffic accidents, exceeding the toll for December, usually the worst month for traffic fatalities.

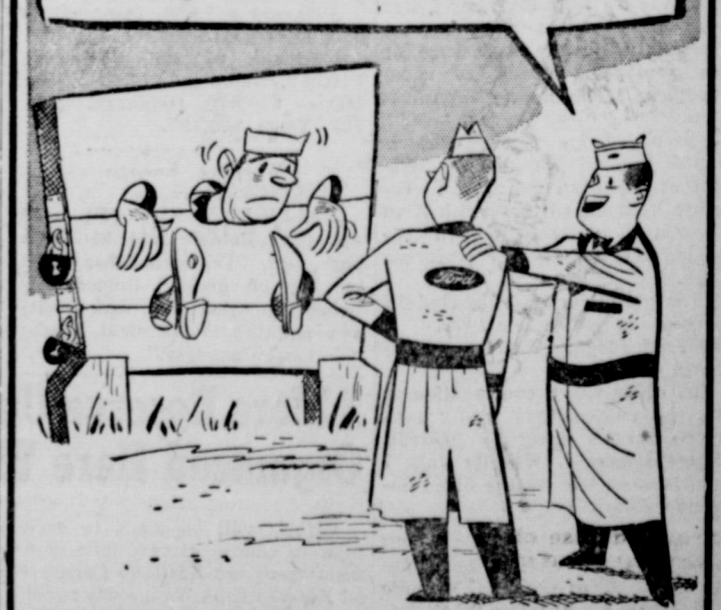
