HSU Cowboy Band To Play For Dublin's Annual Rodeo

The internationally famous Hardin-Simmons Cowboy Band will again play for all performances of the big Pre-Madison Square Garden World's Championship Rodeo, in Dublin, Aug. 1-2-3.

Another highlight of this big Southwest show will be the performance of nine of the finest square dance teams in Texas, including the famous "Mixsters" from Sweetwater, who are the National Champions. This promises to be very interesting because square dancing at its best will be shown.

The rodeo arena in Dublin now seats 9,000 people and plenty of good parking space is available. Mr. Everett Colborn is still the director of this show as well as

the Madison Square Garden Rodeo in New York City. The entire organization will go there as soon as the Dublin show has ended. This gives Dublin the opportunity to obtain the very best of contestants because they all gather here to ride to New York on the twenty-one car special train.

The 1949 performance will be the Tenth Anniversary of the Pre-Madison Square Garden World's Championship Dublin Rodeo. Everett Colborn, Gene Autry and Associates own large ranches at Florence, Arizona; Gene Autry, Oklahoma; Blackfoot, Idaho, and Dublin, Texas. Headquarters are at Dublin. NEW IDEAS IN ASBESTOS HOMES



These two attractive small homes, finished on the outside with large asbestos cement boards, are examples of a new siding technique. Full or half sheets of asbestos board, a fire-safe and weather-proof building material often used for interior walls or utility purposes, were applied as siding for reasons of economy and design. The house at the top, privately built in Urbana, Ill., is sided with full 4x8-foot asbestos boards applied vertically. Wood battens, placed on 16-inch centers, conceal the vertical joints and provide a decorative effect. Asbestos cement boards, cut in half lengthwise to make 2x8-foot panels, were applied to the house at the bottom. This is one of the research houses built in Urbana by the Small Homes Council of the University of Illinois. Panels were applied in clapboard style with a strip of lath placed under each course to deepen the shadow line.

Miss Patsy Collinsworth, a very beautiful Dublin girl, will ride in the parade and grand entry this year. Patsy recently gained recognition as the cover girl for "This Week" Magazine. In 1948 she was the Texas Queen to the Madison Square Garden Rodeo in New York City. Patsy is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Collinsworth of Dublin.

Cash Awards For 4-H Clubs

Forty-five business concerns and private citizens are offering \$380,000 in 4-H incentives Company through the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, according to G. L. Noble, director.

This amount will be presented to 4-H boys and girls who have outstanding records of accomplishment in the 28 agricultural and home economics program arranged by the National Committee and supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service. Awards range from county medals to college scholarships. Some 1,800,000 members in 80,000 4-H Clubs from 46 states-plus Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico—may take part in the activities.

Climaxing the year's events is the National 4-H Club Congress to be held in Chicago, November 27 to December 1. An estimated 1,500 members, accompanied by leaders and other 4-H workers, will attend and receive well-earned recognition.

Dairymen's 'Must' List

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 11 — There are certain items that should be on every dairyman's "must" list and one of these, says R. E. Burleson, associate extension dairy husbandman of Texas A. & M. College, is small grain pastures for fall and winter grazing. Plan at least one acre for

each cow in the herd, for it is one way to get more feed for less money and that means lower production costs and more net income.

Silage is another source of cheap feed, nutrients so have the silo ready for filling by the time the crop you are growing for silage is ready for harvesting.

In many sections of the state, it will pay you well to supplement the drying pastures with plenty of good quality hay and silage, says Burleson. Give the cows all they

will eat. They will pay you well for it. Summer time isn't over in Texas and chances are good that many pastures will be brown from the heat and dry weather before fall grazing crops are available so have the supplements ready.

Herd culling is always in order, says Burleson. Make the herd fit the feed supply. The same amount of feed produces more milk when fed to high producing cows, he adds. There is no profit in feeding cows that only pay board bill. They should be culled.

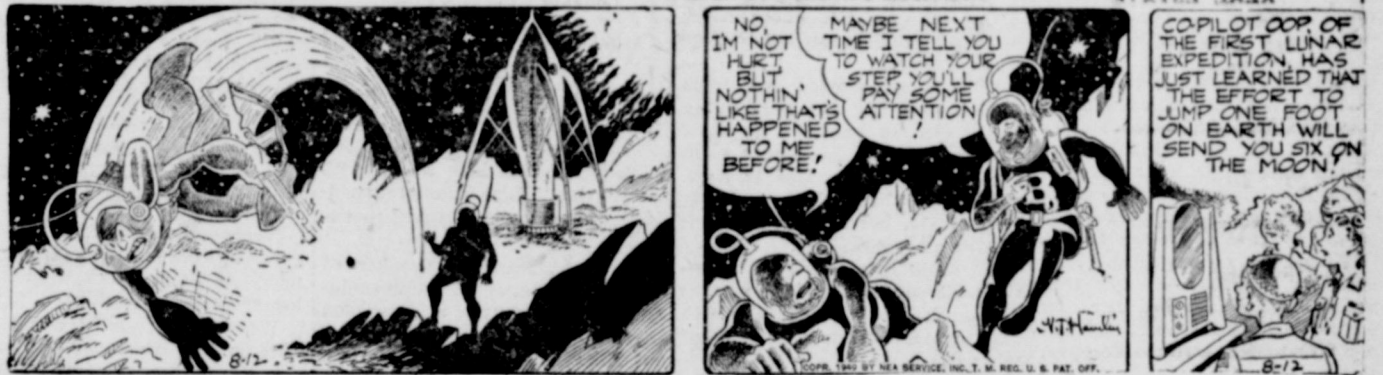

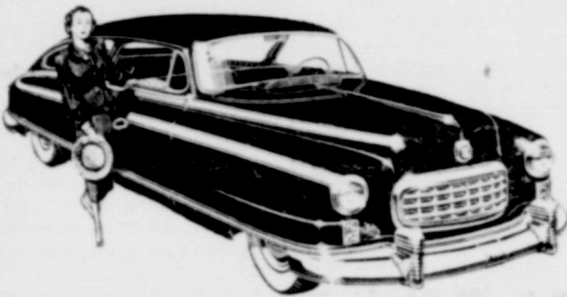

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Patients Grow Hair On Tongues

CHICAGO, Aug. 12 (UP)—Penicillin may cause fine black hair to grow on patient's tongues, a doctor reported today.

Dr. Samuel Wolfson, of Los Angeles described the condition in the current issue of the journal of the American Medical Association. He said he knows of four cases of the malady and that there is "strong evidence" that it is caused by using penicillin.

A Briton report showed that the condition appeared in 29 per cent of penicillin users specifically examined for it, Wolfson wrote. He added that he did not know the figures "to high."

He said that many times the manifestation is recognized but is blamed on the disease for which the penicillin is being administered.

The hair on the tongue usually disappears about one month after treatments are stopped, according to Wolfson. He said the symptoms appear within 48 hours after use of the drug if the patient is susceptible.

Small elevations of the tongue may become "densely matted" with "hair-like filaments" up to a half inch long, Wolfson wrote.

Confession Ends Burglary Case

HOUSTON, Tex., Aug. 12 (UP)—
A five month old, \$4,275 bur-
glary mystery was solved today
by the simple procedure of a man
going to the Houston police sta-
tion and confessing.
John Larocca, 49, discharged
route superintendent for the
Public Laundries, told police last
night he took the \$4,275 from
the company safe last March 26.
He was charged with felony
theft and released on \$500 bond.
Larocca said he copied the safe
combination from some confidential
papers, took the money and
placed it in two suit cases which
he checked at a downtown bus
terminal.

What he didn't know until
he was arrested was that a bag-
gage room clerk four months ago
lofted the bags, heard change
gattling and called police to in-
vestigate. Officers returned the
money to its owners but left the
suitcases as a trap.

Once monthly for four months,
the bus terminal received a let-
ter explaining the owner of the
bags would call for them as soon
as he could. The last letter con-
tained half of a Social Security
Card. The holder of the other half
the letter said, would pick up the
luggage.

Last Monday a taxi driver
called for the bags. Larocca said
he followed him to the terminal,
saw police talk to him, then fled.
From the taximan's descrip-
tion, investigators knew Larocca
was the man they wanted, al-
though he had successfully passed a
lie detector test immediately
following the burglary. A few
days after that, his employer,
suspicious of him, fired him.

When police called Larocca to
come down "and talk about the
case," he complied and signed a
confession.

Stewardess Is Hailed Heroine

PORTLAND, Me., Aug. 12 (UP)—
A pretty stewardess—only two
weeks on the job—was hailed a
heroine today after all 27 persons
aboard escaped unharmed from a
Northwest Airlines Plane that
crashed and burned at Portland
airport.

A sprained ankle suffered by
the stewardess, 23-year-old Pat-
ricia Donnellan of Quincy, Mass.,
was the sole casualty of what po-
lice described as a near disaster.

Coincidentally, the accident oc-
curred as Northwest Airlines end-
ed 16 years' service without a
fatality.

The plane was destroyed at a
loss of \$400,000.

Miss Donnellan opened an em-
ergency exit after the twin-engine
aircraft crashed while landing.
The plane, on a scheduled flight
from Boston, carried 24 passen-

ers, including a month old baby
and three crewmembers.

An airline spokesman said Capt.
Roderick O. Cote, 40, of Melrose
Mass., the pilot, reported the
plane's propellers unaccountably
reversed as he made a routine ap-
proach to the field.

The plane veered sharply down-
ward and hit the field at an angle,
collapsing the landing gear. The
craft skidded down the field and
flames broke out as sparks from
the friction ignited an oil line on
the bottom of the fuselage.

Flames blocked one emergency
exit and the disrupted hydraulic
system failed and locked the main
door. Miss Donnellan ran toward
another emergency exit, shouting
for the passengers to follow her.

Parker Closes In On Reeves

GRAND PRAIRIE, Tex., Aug. 12 (UP)—Sailplane expert Ray Parker of Mississippi State College today closed in on E. J. Reeves, Dallas businessman who currently holds first place in the Southwestern Soaring Contests here.

Parker, flying an experimental model whose unique part was made in the college bakery, soared 265 airline miles yesterday from Grand Prairie to Pryor, Okla., but fell short by 42 miles of Miami, Okla., his "target" city.

Parker was in the air seven hours and three minutes, and the

flight gave him a total of 1,028 compared with 1,100 for Reeves, who set a national record Wednesday on a trip to a pre-announced destination.

Reeves soared 235 miles to Muskogee, Okla., on Wednesday to set the record, and yesterday increased his points with a 164-mile flight to McAlester, Okla.

At the controls of his plane, Parker sits under a plastic blown on a plywood form at Mississippi State College. The plastic was placed in this form and shoved into an oven at the college bakery after the daily ration of bread had been baked. When compressed air was released under this frame, the plastic bubble grew like an ordinary soap-bubble.

Wally Wiberg, Grand Prairie, remains in third place, although he failed to mark up any points yesterday.

The week long contests end at 2 P. M. Sunday with sailplane aerobatics.

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Death Blamed On Weather

One death was blamed today on weather conditions in West Texas during the past 24 hours and at least two other persons were injured because of slick highways.

Mrs. Marion Coy, 33, of Leveland, was killed about 4 P. M. yesterday near Seminole when the pickup truck driven by her husband, Stephen N. Coy skidded on slick pavement and overturned. Coy was injured slightly.

Mrs. Raide Meacham of Turkey Tex., was injured when her car overturned on a slick road near Matador.

Rains measuring from one inch to three inches fell in a wide area over the South Plains Wednesday night and Thursday. Hall accompanied the rains in some places, particularly in Hockley and Cochran Counties. Some 5,000 acres of cotton were damaged.

The weather was fair to partly cloudy today and the outlook was for widely scattered showers with little change in temperatures.

The entire state was warming up after a brief cool spell. It was 101 degrees at Laredo yesterday with the state average in the middle 90s. Marfa had the state low maximum yesterday of 85. It was 95 at Houston and Austin and 94 at Brownsville, Big Spring and San Antonio.

Overnight, the low was 61 at Guadalupe Pass and the high minimum 81 at Palacios.

Some rainfall reports included .94 inch at Beaumont; .48 at Childress; .26 at Salt Flat; .14 at Lubbock and .07 at Guadalupe Pass.

To prevent any more, the town of 3000 hired a helicopter to cover its swamps, stagnant pools, backyards and river with an aerosol fog containing DDT. The fog, forced into mosquito-breeding places by the powerful downdraft of the copter's main rotor, killed off the town's mosquito and fly population, and, residents hope, any further polio.

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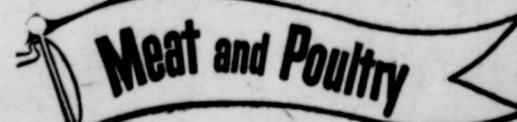
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
